

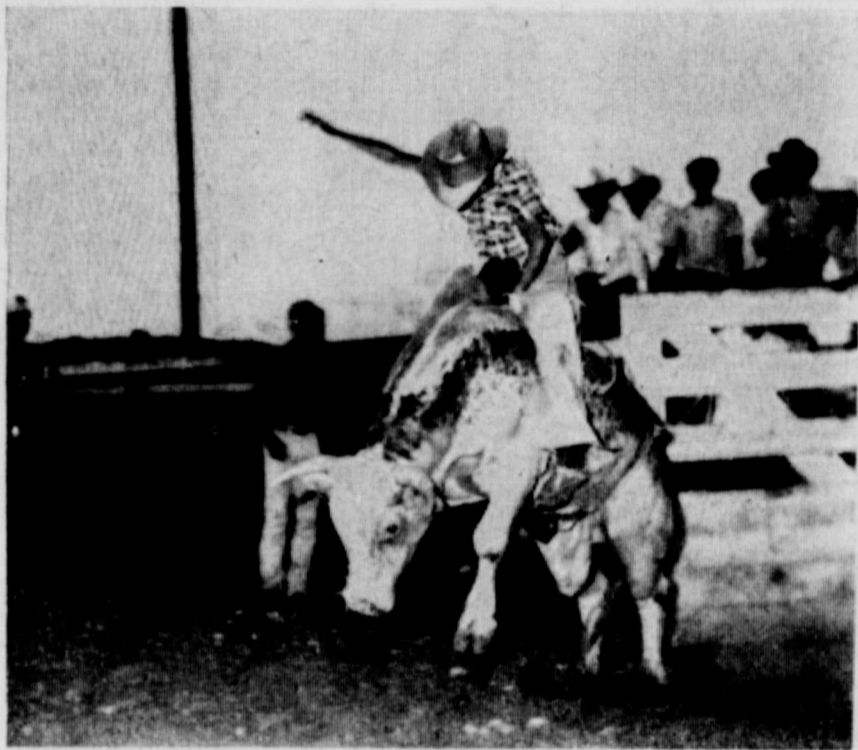

Mayor Wilson Bryan said more money from some source is needed by the city and voters are being asked to decide if they want the sales tax or some other form of increased taxation.

### George Newby Is Painfully Injured In Auto Accident

George Newby was painfully injured Saturday when his ambulance went out of control near Smithville. He was on his way to Houston to pick up the body of Mrs. A. H. Jones when the accident occurred.

Newby is in Clinic Hospital in San Angelo recovering from a broken rib, an injured right shoulder and multiple cuts and bruises.

Mrs. Newby told the Observer her husband was following a car and meeting a pickup, when the car ahead suddenly slowed down to turn left into a swimming pool parking lot. Newby hit his brakes and the ambulance went into a whirling skid, throwing him out of the vehicle onto the highway which was covered with loose gravel.

Newby received treatment at Smithville and was transferred Monday to San Angelo. Mrs. Newby said he would be all right in a few days but was feeling "pretty awful" because of all the cuts and bruises, but she added "he was lucky not to have been killed."

Sam and Sherman Williams took over for Newby and were in charge of the service for Mrs. Jones.

## Debbie Clark Awarded Trip As Result of Outstanding Scouting

Debbie Clark, daughter of CMSgt. and Mrs. James R. (Bobby) Clark, has been chosen to attend the Natural Heritage and Preservation Camp from July 19-31. The event is being conducted by Girl Scouts of Southwestern Pennsylvania at Camp Henry Kaufman near Ligonier, Pa.

Sergeant and Mrs. Clark are stationed at Travis Air Force Base, Calif. They are former residents of Bronte. Debbie's grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Clark and Mrs. Willie B. Millikin, all of Bronte.

During the camp she will have an opportunity to meet, hear and work with experts in the fields of ecology, geology, forestry, game management and conservation. She will participate in field trips including an air tour of conservation work projects in or near the camp and will share some of the regular camp activities.

There will be three days of hospitality time in Pittsburgh before and another three days after the camp when Debbie will spend some time on tours which have been arranged by her hosts.

Camp Henry Kaufman is a beautiful 490 acre area, located

on Chestnut Ridge of the Allegheny Mountains about 10 miles from Ligonier. Elevation is approximately 3,000 feet. The days will be warm and the nights cool. The camp has a large swimming pool, health center, two dining halls, trading post, unit buildings with indoor rest rooms and showers, three ponds and a stream. Four girls will share a side-wall tent with a wooden platform.

In the 10 years that Debbie has been in Scouting, she was awarded her Wings when she was a Brownie; she earned the Sign of the Arrow and Sign of the Star in her junior years, plus 21 proficiency badges; in Cadettes she was awarded First Class rank along with 24 more proficiency badges. During this time, her troop earned enough money to spend three days in San Antonio during the HemisFair, with a side trip to the Aquarena at San Marcos.

Since she has been a Senior Scout, she has accompanied her former troop to Mexico City as a program aide. There they visited the Girl Scout International House, Our Cabana and toured the city. She now has five service aide bars to her credit: a-

quatic safety, library, program, public relations and ranger. To wear these aide bars, a girl must have given at least 50 hours service in each area.

Debbie was one of 34 chosen to go to the camp in Pennsylvania. She had to do much research in ecology before she could apply. Each girl scout is asked to bring something from her area about problems and how they can be improved. Debbie, with the help of some government agencies, prepared a report on the death of horses due to lead poisoning. The lead apparently comes from a smelting plant close to the pastures and contaminates the grass, thus killing the animals that feed there.

Debbie will be a senior in Vanden High School next year. She spent five years in San Angelo, 10 years in Abilene, one year at Little Rock AFB, Ark., and has been in California since February.

She is a member of Job's Daughters. She has just completed her senior life saving course in swimming and has spent two weeks helping the Napa-Solano Girl Scout Council hold a day camp on base.

Austin — Eighteen-year-olds will be registered to vote in Texas this year unless the U. S. Supreme Court, in the meantime, invalidates the new federal voting rights act.

State officials plan to give federal authorities this assurance in reply to an inquiry of U. S. Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell asking all governors to report on steps they provision and other sections of will take to comply with the new the federal bill effective Jan. 1.

Texas, reportedly, already is in compliance with the act, except for the lowered voting age. This state has no literacy test and "good character" requirements for election participation such as those outlawed by a bill signed into law by President Nixon on June 22.

When the Texas voter-regis-

tration period opens on October 1, 19-year olds will be signed up if the expected court test is not settled by then. Local registration officials will be advised by state election authorities to register them pending a court decision.

According to election division director Randall Wood, the Secretary of State's office proposes to suggest that teen-age registrations be kept separately from those of voters 21 and above. This would simplify subsequent invalidation in the event the Supreme Court should rule the federal act unconstitutional after state registration already is under way.

Test case probably will be in Washington State. There the 18-year-old vote-referendum already is set for the November ballot. Washington officials are in a bet-

ter political position to state that they will not comply with the federal law until their voters voice approval of the lowered age propositions.

Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. figures the federal act would add about 395,000 under-21 voters to Texas' registration rolls if it survives the court test.

OIL PRODUCTION RAISED—Oil production for August will be boosted 335,263 barrels a day, due largely to the high cost of shipping petroleum from foreign sources.

Railroad Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey said the increase was brought about by high tanker rates as well as a demand for more cheap domestic oil. He noted that the Commission had disregarded recommendations of some to shut stripper or marginal wells, therefore the state has additional capacity.

Statewide allowable was pegged at 62.9 per cent of potential for August after a three months' decline. July allowable was 55.5 per cent. Maximum estimated production for August is 3,602,296 barrels a day, up from 3,267,033 in July.

COURTS SPEAK — Federal court suit has been filed against the City of Tyler by the U. S. government seeking to end school segregation by this fall.

Court of Criminal Appeals held that a driving while intoxicated conviction is invalid if the defendant was on private property at the time of arrest.

State Supreme Court refused to upset a lower court denial of damages to the widow of a man, killed in an auto-train crash near Edna. Jury found negligence on the part of both the man and Southern Pacific Railroad employees.

High Court also held that a Potter County couple was not entitled to damages from a doctor because a woman could no longer have children after an operation.

Harris County district court granted an injunction against Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, prohibiting it from discharging industrial wastes into Sims Bayou in greater amounts than that permitted by the Water Quality Board. Court ordered a \$20,000 fine, the largest civil penalty in Texas pollution case history.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — Wichita Falls school board is without authority to adopt a resolution or policy providing for recall elections of its members, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

Martin ruled in other recent opinions that:

\* A county treasurer is the proper official to make delivery of county warrants to payees.

\* County attorney who resigns as of a future date may not withdraw his resignation after it is duly accepted by the commissioners court even though the effective date has not arrived. However, until a successor is appointed, it is his duty to serve.

Martin said a Spring Branch real estate developer (Cypress Lake Gardens) gave assurance of voluntary compliance with directives to discontinue misleading advertising and sales practices.

DRAFT QUOTA DROPS—August draft call for Texas is 560. That's 257 less than the 817 in July. No man will be inducted with random sequence number higher than 195.

State quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in August is 1,490, down from 1,601 in July. Those called for these examinations will have random sequence numbers one to 215.

Deferred or exempt men may be forwarded for examinations if they are likely to lose deferred or exempt status within the next

six months. No men with random sequences higher than 215 will be forwarded for examination until further notice. All inducted ahead of the non-volunteers at draft boards must be teens selected and ordered to report for draft by r.s.n. National call is for 10,000 men, all for the army.

BUDGET REQUESTS SOARING—Major state agency budget requests continued to prompt speculation of a huge tax need next year—perhaps as high as \$700 million.

Board of Welfare finally officially approved a \$2.1 billion biennial spending plan which is \$347.6 million above present spending levels. Mental Health - Mental Retardation request of \$315 million is \$139.7 million above the current level, and colleges and universities want an increase of \$258.9 million. Combined with public schools biennial operating proposals of \$377.1

million, major agencies of education, mental hospitals-retardation schools and welfare want more than \$1 billion more than they now are getting.

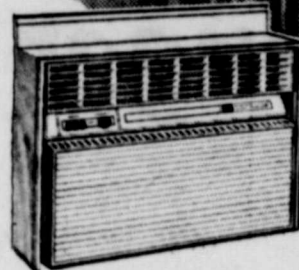
Veteran newspaperman and state capital correspondent Harry Benge Crozier died here June 14, at age 78.

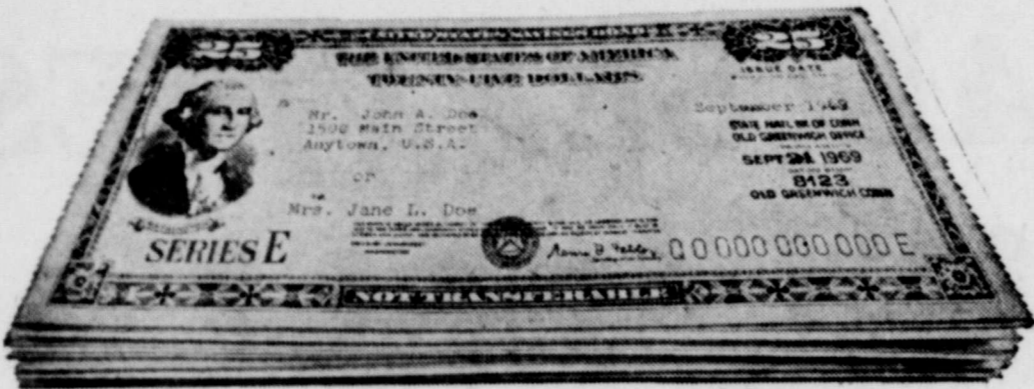

Washington—In 1913 the Congress delegated full control over money of the United States to the Federal Reserve System. Under the System, 12 banks, located at various places in the country, issue notes on what amounts to the faith and credit of the United States.

For years it has been said that one qualifying as an expert on our monetary system has to be a little bit "teched in the head." There is about as wide disagreement among the monetary experts on theory and philosophy as there are experts. Some are now saying that the cause of high taxes and ever increasing, never ending, inflation can be blamed upon the System. Some contend that the privately owned Federal Reserve Banks issue notes, whether \$1,000 or \$10,000, which cost 1/2 cent to print. The value changes when the purchaser or borrower of those notes assumes and obligation for the amount printed on its face.

The Federal Reserve lends to the United States government and he interest on this and all other sources of borrowed money now amounts to more than \$17 billion annually.

A bill has been introduced into the Congress to vest in the government of the United States the absolute, complete and unconditional control over our money through government ownership of the Federal Reserve banks. The report of the United States Treasurer of January 1970 showed the total coinage in circulation to be about \$6 billion. The total currency was around 47 billion. If the reasoning holds that Federal Reserve Notes are nothing more or less than faith and credit, established by the Federal Reserve System, then only \$6 billion in currency backed by coins, really belongs to the people. The \$47 billion is put into circulation on loans on which everyone pays interest.

Needless to say, high interest rates and inflation are becoming an unbearable burden on everyone. Some are led to believe that he only answer lies in higher

wages and higher prices. Some consumer groups seek relief through price controls. One begets the other, often coupled with a fear that more inflation is coming, which means a further lessening of the value of the dollar. This is another way of saying that inflation is a sort of a lack of confidence in our ability to stabilize the price of money. Even money responds to the law of price and demand.

The legislation referred to, which incidentally is not likely to catch on in the foreseeable future, would supposedly shore up the breakdown of confidence in our financial system. Those who adhere to the idea say that with the return of the Federal Reserve System to the control of the Congress, it would be back in the hands of the people, since only the congress is elected by them. The author of the bill says that the founding fathers intended that the power to issue and control money was only to be entrusted to elected officials who are constantly accountable to the voters.

The decision of the court cited last week was based on the Constitution, which says that the Congress shall have the power "to coin money, regulate the value thereof... and fix the standard of weights and measures." (Article I, Section 8, Clause 5.)

This idea is not a new one by any means. It has cropped up in every monetary crisis since the Act of Congress in 1913. It has lain dormant during periods considered normal. Not even everyone can agree on what is "normal" and what is otherwise but probably there are more prevailing doubts at this time than since the great depression of the early '30's.

There are no simple solutions and certainly none to be effective overnight but the issuance of Federal Reserve Notes not backed by anything more than faith and credit becomes the central question.

There is nothing more complicated than our monetary system and doubtless this was a part of the reason for the Congress to have delegated the power of money management to the Federal Reserve in the first place. Since our economy and entire society has increased to the extent of its present day complicity, it would, of course, again raise the question even higher as to whether or not the Congress in all the wisdom it could muster, would be able to manage a monetary system. Indeed, the legislative and executive branches of the government are now paralyzed in many instances in controlling their own spending operations. It is doubtful if it would be able to again manage a system so intricate and complicated. Just maybe there is an in-between somewhere.

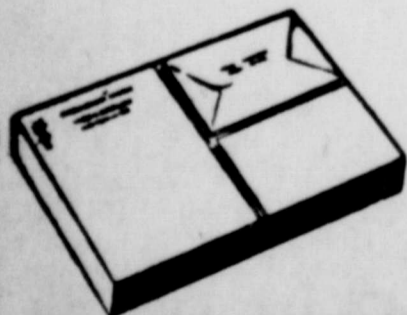
