Boston, Mass. (NNW)-Newspaper journalism began in this country just 280 years ago.

But there were no celebrations, speeches, proclamations, or any special occasions to mark the auspicious event.

As a matter of fact when PUB-LICK OCCURRENCES BOTH FOREIGN AND DOMESTICK, the nation's first newspaper, "hit the streets" in the town of Boston on the morning of Sept. 25, 1690, there was considerable apprehension and a feeling of fore-

To be sure, the little four-page newspaper was eagerly accepted by the local residents. As a matter of fact, every copy was snatched up. The demand far exceeded the supply.

Absentee Voting Now in Progress

Any qualified Texas voter eligible to cast an absentee ballot may now make application to his county clerk for an absentee ballot for the Nov. 3 general election.

In order to vote absentee by mail in this election, a voter must: (1) be unable to appear Nov. 3 at the polling place because of sickness or physical disability; or (2) expect to be absent from his county of residence on Nov. 3 and during the county clerk's office hours throughout the period Oct. 14-Oct. 30, inclusive.

All applications for absentee ballots must be received in the county clerk's office not later than Oct. 30.

Details as to absentee voting procedure may be obtained from a voter's county clerk. Generally, these provisions apply:

A voter applying for an absentee ballot by reason of sickness or physical disability must mail his application to the county clerk. It should be accompanied by the voter's registration certificate, and by a certificate of a duly licensed physician, chiropractor on accredited Christian Science practitioner certifying to the voter's illness or physical disability.

A voter desiring to vote absentee by reason of absence from the county may deliver or mail his application to the county clerk. In the application, the voter must state that he expects to be absent from the county on election day and during the clerk's regular office hours for the entire period of personal appearance absentee voting (Oct. 14-Oct. 30). The absentee ballot then must be mailed to the voter at an address outside his county of residence. Also, the envelope in which the voter returns the ballot must be postmarked from a point outside his county of residence.

Persons who will be out of the county on election day and wish to vote absentee may appear at the county clerk's office any time during regular office hours through Oct. 30.

Voter registration in Texas this year is at an all-time high with 4,150,645. On Nov. 3, voters will express their preference in state, district and local races, as well as on seven proposed constitutional amendments.



Crushed Patents

Crushed patentis, a favorite fabric for rain garments and sportswear, requires specia techniques for sewing.

A pattern with few seams makes it easier to manipulate the vinyl-type fabric. Raglan of kimono sleeves are easiest, but some of the crushed patents are soft and pliable enough to sew set-in sleeves.

The pattern should be altered to fit before the garment is cut. Seams cannot be let out without damage to the fabric.

When fastening the pattern to the fabric, place pins in seam allowances only or tape the pattern to the fabric. Cut with sharp shears.

Mairk darts, seamlines and other construction details with chalk or a pencil on the wrong side of the fabric. Use a grease pencil when making markings on the right side. These can easily be wiped off.

A medium-sized machine needle and 10 to 12 stitches per inch are satisfactory for top stitching on crushed patents. A piece of tissue paper placed between the shiny or right side of the fabric and the feed-dog of the machine prevents damage to the fabric when stitching. The tissue paper can easily be torn away when stitching is complet-

Finger press seams and darts, unless the label on the bolt or roll of crushed patents states that the fabric can be pressed with steam or warm iron.

Both zippers and buttonholes can be used on crushed patents. The centered application makes a flat zipper closing.

Hems can be top stitched or slip stitched in place to the backing of the fabric.

Follow the fabric manufacturer's care recommendation for cleaning. Some vinyl-like fabrics can be hand waished, while others need to be wiped clean with a damp cloth. If linings are used in the garment, they should require the same care as the outer fabric.

Teen Snacks

Establishing good food patterns during adolescence is tre-

mendously important for health The Bronte Enterprise and well-being of both boys and girls.

During the years of rapid growth when the body has great need for all nutrients, the adolescent may consume large quantities of floods yet be lacking in such nutrients as calcium, vitamin A, vitamin C, thiamine, riboflavin and iron. This deficiency in nutrients results when food choices are heavily loaded with cookies, cakes, doughnuts and

Snack foods that furnish some of the body needs include milk, milk drinks, fruit juices and crisp raw vegetables.

The weight - conscious teenager may include skim milk at snack time. One eight ounce cup of non-fat skim milk has 81 calories and supplies the body with calcium, thiamine and riboflavin. Eight ounces of pop give 106 calories period.

Cheese, meat, peanut butter sandwiches are high in flood value plus have fewer calories than cakes and pies. Carrot sticks, raw tomatoes and oranges are also good snack foods. Carrot sticks furnish vitamin A, and tomatoes and oranges furnish vitamin C.
