LAWMAKER PAY HIKE PUSHED-A sub-committee of House Speaker Gus Mutscher's blue ribbon "Committee of 100" termed legislator pay "unrealistically low" and said the \$4,800 limit should be stricken from the State Constitution.

Sub-panel, headed by Newspaper Publisher S. B. Whittenberg of Amarillo, recommended that a six-member commission be named by the governor to fix legislative pay and expense account boundaries.

VOTE FOR 18 YEAR OLDS-County tax assessors-collectors have been notified that voter registration certificates should be issued to applicants 18 years and above and those who will be 18 by March 1, 1972.

Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr., chief state election officer, has sent out instructions for implementing the U.S. Supreme Court order giving 18 year olds the right to vote in federal elec-

Certificates issued to those under 21 will be labeled for "federal elections only until 21 years of age." Same document will contain birthdate so it can be used for state and local elections after applicant turns 21.

OPINIONS - Commissione courts are authorized to approve expenditure for dues in non-profit association of counties, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

In other opinions, Martin ruled that:

* City-cunty hospital boards can't borrow money for operation except by revenue bonds.

* Higher Education Coordinating Board may alter role and scope of the Texas Tech University Medical School in Lubbock and order initiation of a degree rogram in veterinary in the school.

* School trustees can delberate on hiring a teacher in closed session-but not if the teacher demands a public hearing.

* Property taxes, which become exempt between Jan. 1 and Oct. 1 by virtue of the land's being acquired by government agencies, must be prorated to the date of conveyance or date of the order of possession as provided by law.

* County or district attorneys may seek grand jury or commissioner court action against sheriffs releasing prisoners who have not served their time.

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

The tall, friendly rancher who is known to all New Mexicans simply as "Bruce," lives in Stanley, N. M., only a mile from the house in which he was born on the family homestead in 1924.

His father, William S. King, moved from Coke County to Stanley in the early 1920's, shortly after wedding an area girl, Molly Schooler. Homesteading 160 acres, they reared three sons-Sam, Bruce and Don-and a daughter, Leota, now Mrs. Jack Vinion of Libby, Mont.

All three sons actively helped their father run the homestead, particularly during the depression when William King worked for the New Mexico Highway Department. Through sound management and hard work, the homestead had grown to about 20,000 acres in the late 1940's.

Following the senior King's death in 1949, Sam, Bruce and Don continued to expand the operation until today it consists of three ranches in six counties and is one of the largest cattle operations in New Mexico.

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
