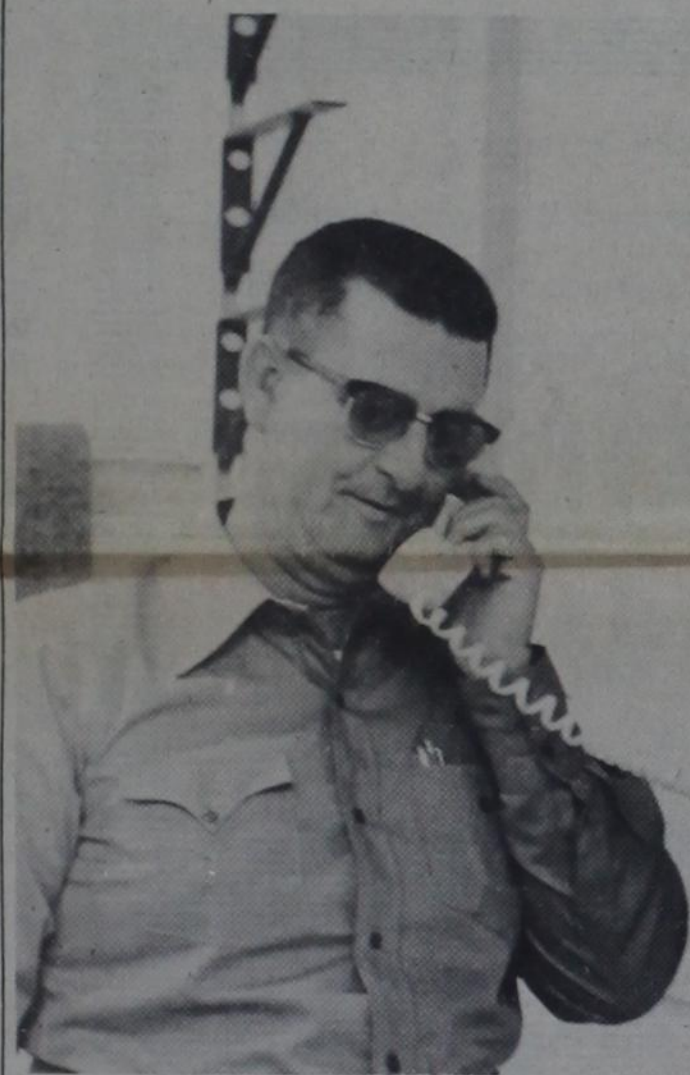

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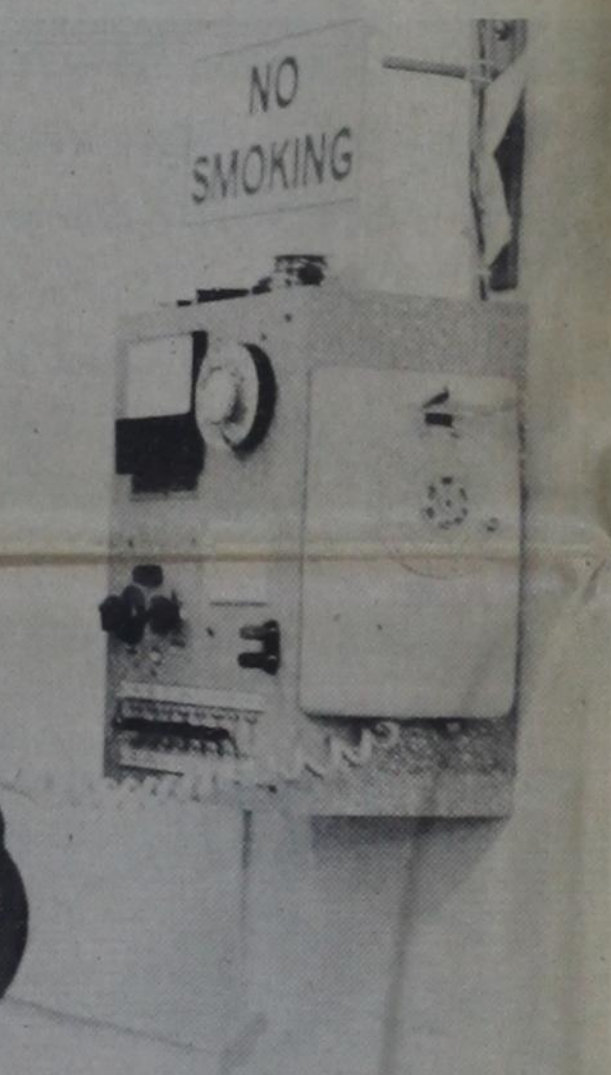

## Too late for Hart Feeders

# Cattle market on upswing



FIRST CALL—Mayor Urban Ball made the first call from Continental Telephone Co.'s new Nazareth station when the automatic service center was "cut in" at 6 a.m. last Wednesday. Not wanting to awaken anyone,



Ball decided to call the Dimmitt operator. The new station is equipped for Direct Distance Dialing, which will go into effect in November for all Continental customers in the county.

Higher cattle prices, lower feed prices and good weather have combined to create a feeling of optimism in the cattle business, a feeling which most local custom feeders reflect.

OVER THE last 45 days, cattle prices have gone up to \$50 to \$52 per hundredweight and most local feeders believe the prices will stay in that range for awhile.

With the cost of grain down some and the weather allowing a good rate of gain, the current cattle prices are allowing a profit up to \$100 a head.

Dimmitt Feed Yards, Kemp Cattle, Markley Feed Yard and Taylor Feed Lot have all seen an increase in business lately.

A spokesman for Dimmitt Feed Yards, said they are

currently feeding about 15,000 head, which is "less than six months ago but a lot more than three months ago." Kemp Cattle and Taylor Feed Lot also reported increases of 15 to 18% during the past month.

WHILE the upswing has raised spirits at most of the lots, it came too late for Hart Feeders Inc.

According to Jim Canada, manager, the company will be going out of business as soon as they sell the cattle on hand now.

"Things are looking up in the business now, but we were undecided on what to do for almost a year," Canada explained. "We finally decided to close and sold our feed and lot option to Hill Farms."

At Markley Feed Yards in Easter, the higher prices haven't had much effect yet either.

"We just haven't had many calves ready at the higher prices," said Mrs. Markley. "Feed expenses haven't dropped much for us yet either since we are still under contract, but we've picked up some new customers and bought a few more calves ourselves so I think it's picking up."

Most feeders indicate that they will stick with short term feeding until the market situation improves further.

### Services held for Mr. Smith

Graveside services were held Friday in Brownfield for Heywood P. Smith of Dimmitt.

MR. SMITH, 66, died last Wednesday morning in Shannon Memorial Hospital in San Angelo where he had undergone lung surgery.

Mr. Smith grew up in the Tokio community. A resident of Dimmitt over 25 years, he had farmed at Big Square, worked for the ASCS office and worked for Five Point Gin and Elevator. He was a member of the Masons.

Survivors include two sisters; a brother and several nieces and nephews.

### Conference attracts Marguerite McLain

Mrs. Marguerite McLain of Hart will attend a meeting of the Women Who Want to be Women (WWW) next Thursday in Fort Worth.

WWW MEMBERS will be gathering from across the state to be brought up to date on the status of the Equal Rights Amendment in Texas. Representative Bill Hilliard and a number of lobbyists are scheduled to speak.

The group is urging the legislature to rescind the ERA amendment it passed in 1972.

Mrs. McLain has been active in WWW since taking a trip to Austin with the group April 13 to attend opening hearings on ERA.

Since then, she has spoken to a number of local groups and would like to see a local WWW unit get started.

### Jail visit made by commissioners

The county commissioners visited the jail and checked state jail regulations during their meeting June 9.

THE commissioners recommended that jail rules and regulations be posted for prisoners to see on entry.

In other business, the commissioners agreed to take bids on a filing cabinet.

## Hart school taxes go up

The Hart Board of Education voted to raise the assessment ratio on taxes for the school district from 90% to 100% of appraised value.

"THE action was necessary as a result of the new Educa-

tion Bill that doubled the local fund assignment for the Hart Schools from \$46,000 to \$92,000," explained Supt. Ted Averitt.

"Two other factors are the larger increases in utility bills and a bill passed by the legislature that requires the school to buy workmens compensation insurance for all employees beginning July 1," he continued.

The board also accepted resignations from teachers Dorothy Stringer, Yolanda Gonzales, Juanita Taylor and teacher's aide, Penny Ringler, at its June 9 meeting.

New teachers employed were Reta Upton for Plan A special education and Janet Mitchel and Margaret Ann Parker for elementary school assignments.

The board also approved a band budget of \$6,200 for the 1975-76 school year and accepted the high bid of \$1,300 on the 1966 Chevrolet bus by Brazosport Bus Service of Clute.

JULY 24 was set as the date for tax equalization and an equalization board was appointed.

Approval was given for approximately \$6,000 for new equipment for the girls CVAE house. Federal funds will provide 68% of this money.

## Society gets fifth award in six years

The Castro County Unit of the American Cancer Society received the Golden Achievement Award at the District III meeting Saturday in Lubbock. This is the fifth year of the past six years for the Castro County to be recognized as a Unit which has reached the 40 cents per capita or more goal.

THIS year the local unit has transmitted to the state office a total of \$7,025. The best year prior to this was \$5,183.

The local volunteers are most appreciative and grateful to each and every citizen of the county who helped to achieve this goal.

At the meeting Saturday, which was conducted by Earl Jones of Brownfield, president of the 20-county district, two local ladies were elected to serve on district committees for the coming year. They were Mrs. Paraly Moore for the district crusade committee and Mrs. Marguerite McLain for the district public education committee.

Others attending from Dimmitt were Mrs. Cleo Forson, Mrs. Doris Lindsey and Mrs. Shirley Hall.

## City wants more info for phone-rate decision

City attorney Jack Edwards briefed Dimmitt City commissioners Monday night on questions raised by Bill McMorries, city engineer, regarding Continental Telephone's request for a rate increase.

WITH THE help of McMorries, the city prepared a letter requesting additional information from the telephone company before a final decision is made.

City Manager Garnett Holland said Wednesday that the commission will call a public hearing on the phone-rate issue for the first week of July.

"The hearing will give the public an opportunity to ask any questions they might have of local telephone company people," Holland said.

The commission granted permission to Virgil Justice to reduce lot and house sizes on the dedication deed on acreage he has purchased from Brooke Alexander. Provisions will be revised to state that there will be no lots under 60 feet and no houses under 1200 square feet.

J. B. Moore, represented by Jack Miller, attorney, ap-

proached the commission to deed a small portion of abandoned street and alley to his property at E. Halsell and Broadway. Moore previously paid for curbing and gutters in the 14x50 foot area. The city will retain an easement for utilities maintenance. Temporary approval was granted until legal papers can be presented.

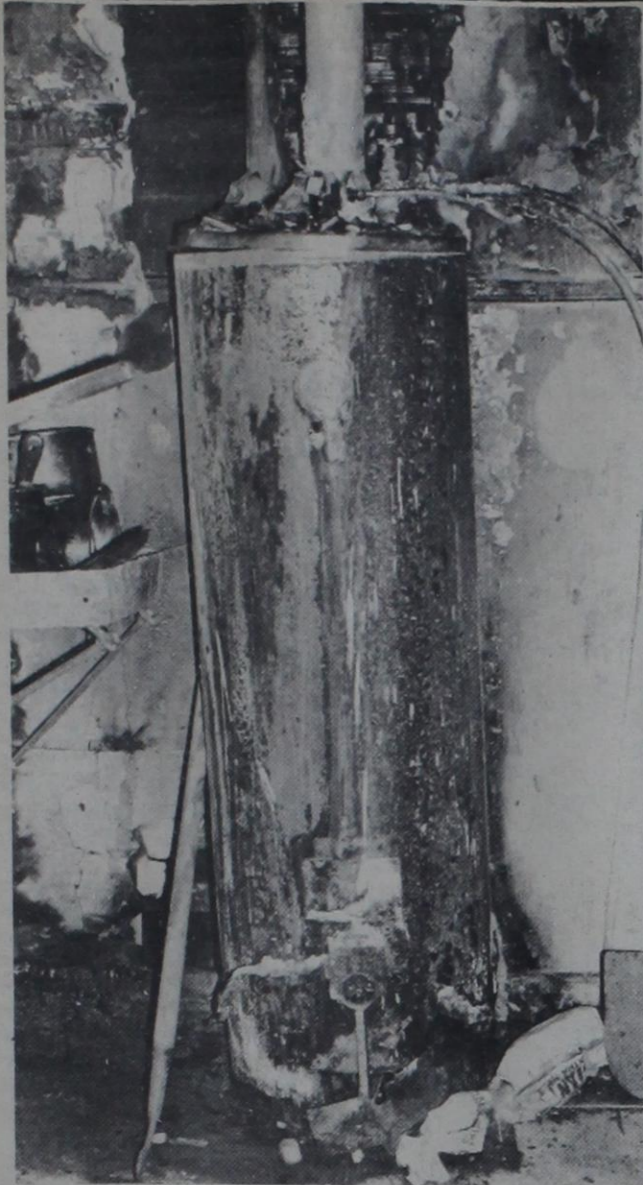

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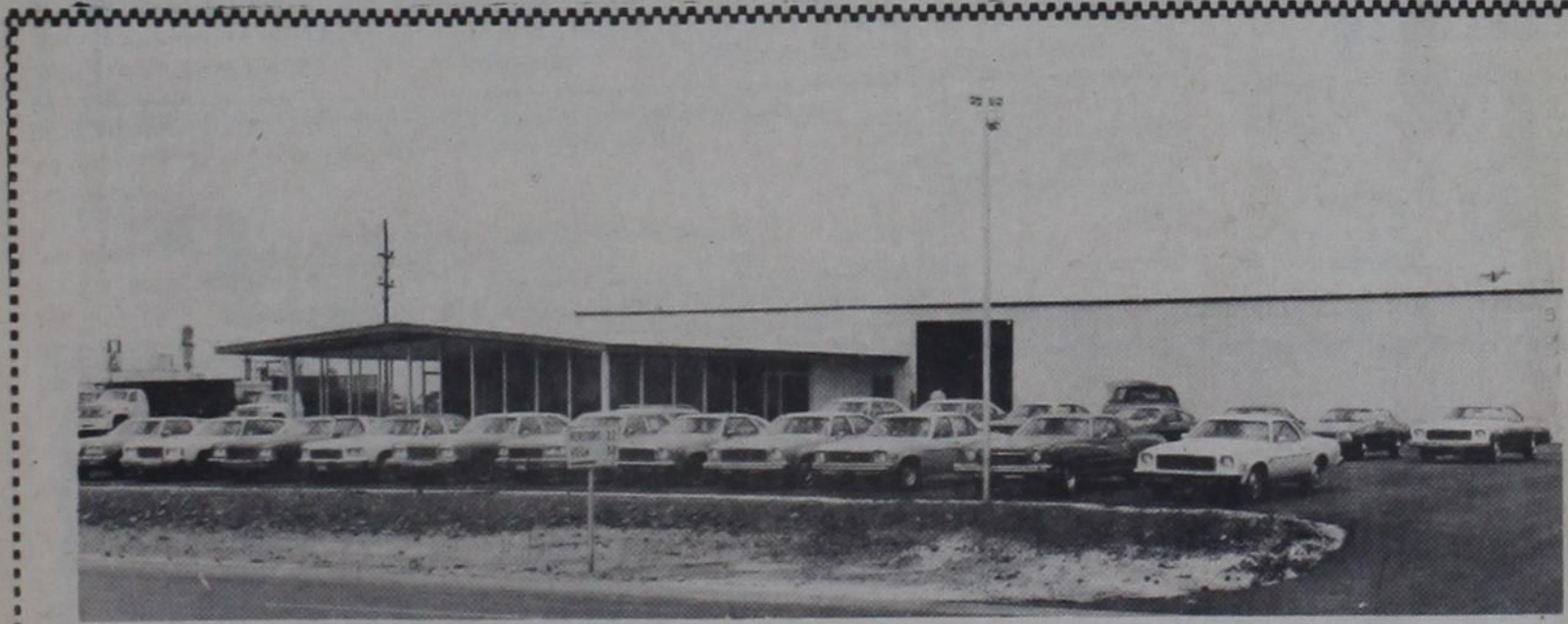

# It pays to manage native grasses

"Why manage native grasses? It doesn't pay anyway." Have you ever heard this statement? I have and I cannot think of anything farther from the truth.

GRASS, even when the cattle industry is depressed, is one of man's greatest assets. What crop can you think of that you

do not have to plant each year but yet can harvest gains through four-legged harvesting machines? There is only one type I know about and that is the native grasses such as blue grama, sideoats grama, western wheatgrass, and others.

My next question is very important. Can we abuse, overgraze and overlook these grasses and expect their return year after year? The answer is simple—no. Grass is a self-sustaining manufacturing plant. Leaves collect sunlight and the roots collect the essential raw materials.

Through the combination of these essential "foods", a plant continually produces more leaf material or forage as it is more commonly thought of.

Man, through his harvesting machines, can collect one-half of that year's growth without affecting the plant—something that is given to us free of charge. By harvesting greater amounts, though, the plant is unable to collect its necessary food and it becomes low in vigor and finally it will disappear.

WHY WORRY about it? There is always another plant there to take its place. This, of course, is mother nature's way of protecting her land from erosion. But what she puts there will be much less palatable to livestock than the one

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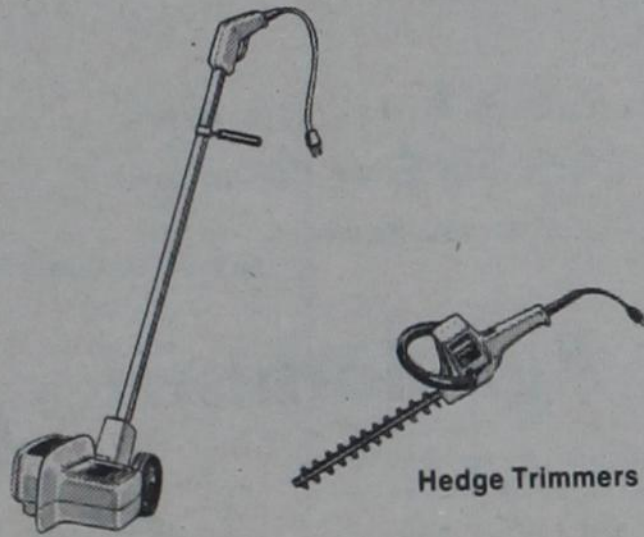
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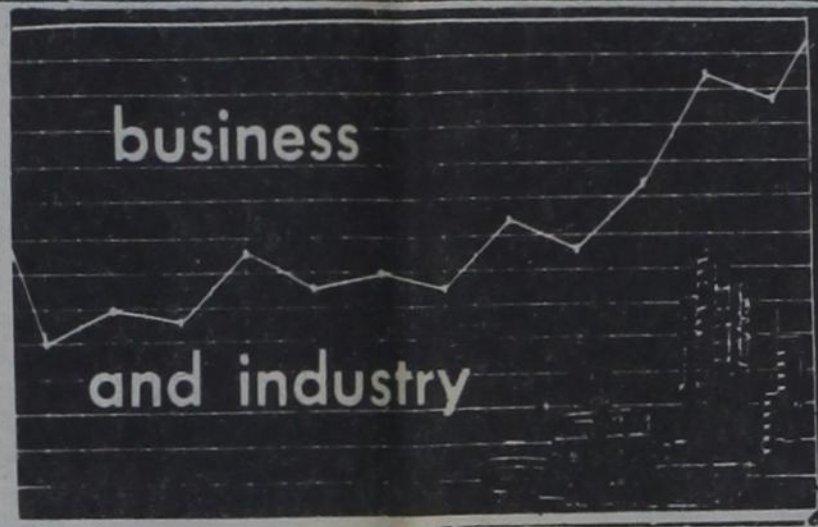

before. Cattle are as smart as we are—they will eat their ice cream before their spinach when given the chance. The ice cream plants are easy to abuse because they are selected first. Then the value of the grasses deteriorates. What can we do about it? Management of our native grasses is the key.

We must rotate our livestock thus giving the grass a chance to rest and produce more forage material. Through proper management, we will not only have better grasses but more grass at a minimum of cost—that cost being the time it took to move livestock. I still cannot think of a cheaper way to feed, can you?

The Running Water Soil and Water Conservation District is interested in your farm. We want to see future generations enjoying the natural resources given to us for our use. Trained personnel are available to inventory the grass potential on your farm or ranch. Contact your local Soil Conservation Service office.

## Applications accepted on cost-share practices

**1975 AGRICULTURAL CONSERVATION PROGRAM**  
We will begin accepting applications for the following cost-share practices June 9, 1975:

- RE-1 - Establishing a permanent vegetative cover.
- RE-7 - Terraces, Standard and Parallel.
- RE-8 - Diversion Terraces.
- RE-12 - Establishment of sediment, chemical or water runoff control measures.
- RE-14 - Reorganizing irrigation systems, land levelling, and the installation of tailwater recovery systems.

Requests for cost-share practices will be considered by the County Committee at their regular committee meetings each month. The applications will not be considered on a first come, first served basis.

**1975 FINAL PLANTING DATES**  
The Final Planting Dates in Castro County are: Cotton, June 1; Grain Sorghum, June 20. These dates mean you must plant or replant crops until the dates specified. You may plant later if you wish. If you were prevented from planting your cotton due to a natural disaster then you must file with the ASCS Office within 15 days from the final planting date for prevented planting credit under the Disaster Program. This will also apply to grain sorghum.

**SWEET SORGHUM**  
Sweet sorghum for silage is no longer considered a feed grain and will not be eligible for payment under the disaster provisions of the feed grain program.

**ACREAGE CERTIFICATION FOR 1975**  
Certification of wheat and feed grain acres (grain sorghum, corn and barley) are not a requirement for 1975, except under disaster conditions. Cotton acres MUST be reported by

Aug. 1, 1975 to be eligible for deficiency payment.

The acreage you report must be measured acreage and accuracy is a must. We will be required to spot-check a number of farms again this year.

**1975 DISASTER PROVISIONS**  
If, for any reason, you are planning to destroy a crop lost due to natural disaster, please come by and check with us prior to disposition of the crop or other use of the land. If you harvest a damaged program crop, such as wheat, you must report the acreage while evidence of the crop is apparent, but not later than 15 days after it is harvested.

### CROP REPORTS FROM FARMERS NEEDED

During the last half of May and during early June Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will conduct the first survey designed to measure actual plantings according to Mr. Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician in charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail.

## On Wall Street

How about a new house with only 1,200 sq. ft. to 1,400 sq. ft. of space, no garage or carport, no screened porch, no built-ins (such as dishwashers, refrigerators and other extras) and six inch lower ceilings than the average house? That's the name of the game that many US home builders are playing. And those houses are selling like hotcakes.

THE REASON is simple enough. The Congressional Joint Economic Committee finds that the median price for a new home in this country is \$41,300 which is far above the reach of 85% of US families.

The big buying spurge in the no-frills housing is coming at a time when the housing industry is in one of the worst slumps since the depression. In fact, the economy house is the only bright spot in a deeply troubled housing industry which is looking more and more to Washington for help.

Community fears of trashy-looking housing after just a few years of the current trend are stirring resistance to the whole idea of minimum cost housing. One Georgia county is allowing a drop in minimum square footage requirements from 1,400 to 1,200 sq. ft., but it

permits only two-thirds of the homes in a development to be this small.

A big factor in housing is land. Land costs went up almost 74% from early 1971 to the end of 1974, topped only by construction financing costs, which soared over 148% during the same period. With the small size house, developers can get five or six houses on an acre of land.

MOST OF the shoppers for the new cheaper type of home seem to be young marrieds trying to escape the soaring bills of all-electric apartments. The other side of the soaring energy rates coin, however, is the luxury housing some coal executives are buying in Florida. One private club sold five homes to top executives in the coal industry in the last 30 days.

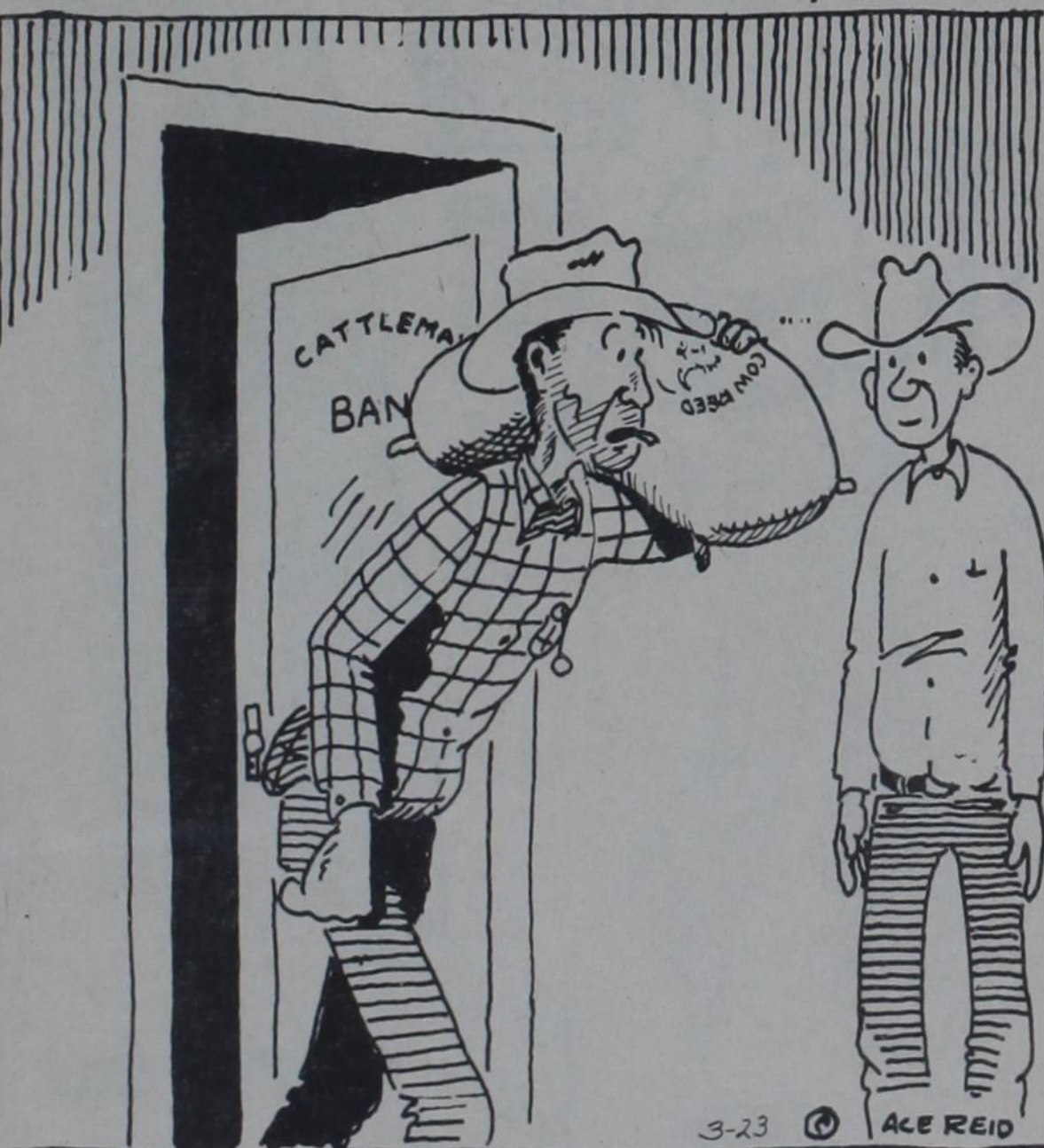

**Tips for canner care**

Remember that we have the pressure cooker gauge tester thermometers for your use, courtesy of the Home Demonstration Council. Check your gauges now before you begin to do any canning.

GAUGES which register two or three pounds "off" should

be replaced.

Coating the threads with plumber's paste is smart when replacing a gauge. A paste with an oil or graphite base is a good choice - it will not harden, so the gauge can be removed again.

If your canner has a gasket, check to see if it is allowing steam to escape. If pressure can't reach 10 pounds, buy a new gasket.

You will want to wash the bottom or kettle part of your canner - inside and out - with soapy water. If the outside is stained, you can use fine steel wool with soap as a cleaner for those other than the porcelain coated ones. To clean the inside, fill the canner half full of water and add one cup vinegar. Put it on the range. Be sure you have the rack in it so that it will be cleaned, too. Let pressure go to five pounds for 10 to 15 minutes. Slide canner from hot range unit and let cool until gauge reaches zero. Let it sit four or five minutes then open petcock and remove the lid. Pour out the vinegar water, rinse and dry canner.

DO NOT put the lid in water; this will damage the dial and may cause the petcock to become clogged. Instead, wipe the lid with a soapy cloth and then with a clean, damp one. Clean the openings in the lid by drawing a string or pipe cleaner through them. Take off removable petcock and safety valve, wash and dry thoroughly; occasionally soak these parts in vinegar and wash and dry. You can clean the ball and the socket into which it fits with a silver polish.

When you store your canner, make sure it is clean and dry. Crumple newspaper inside to absorb any moisture which might develop. Wrap the lid in paper and invert it on the canner bottom.

THE COUNTY Activities Committee would seem to be the logical planning group for Bicentennial events here. But this committee has its hands full with the annual Roundup, the Nazareth German folk Festival, Hart Days, and the various fund-raising events needed during the year to pay for the annual summer celebration. The committee includes anyone willing to work, but only seven people (four from Nazareth, two from Dimmitt, one from Hart) attended last week's planning session.

With help (and financing) from the city and county governments, the County Activities Committee might change its format for 1976, replacing the Roundup celebrations with Bicentennial observances. Many of the events could be converted easily.

Ideas are needed. If you have any, be at the County Activities Committee's next meeting - Monday night, July 7, at 8 o'clock in the courthouse community room.

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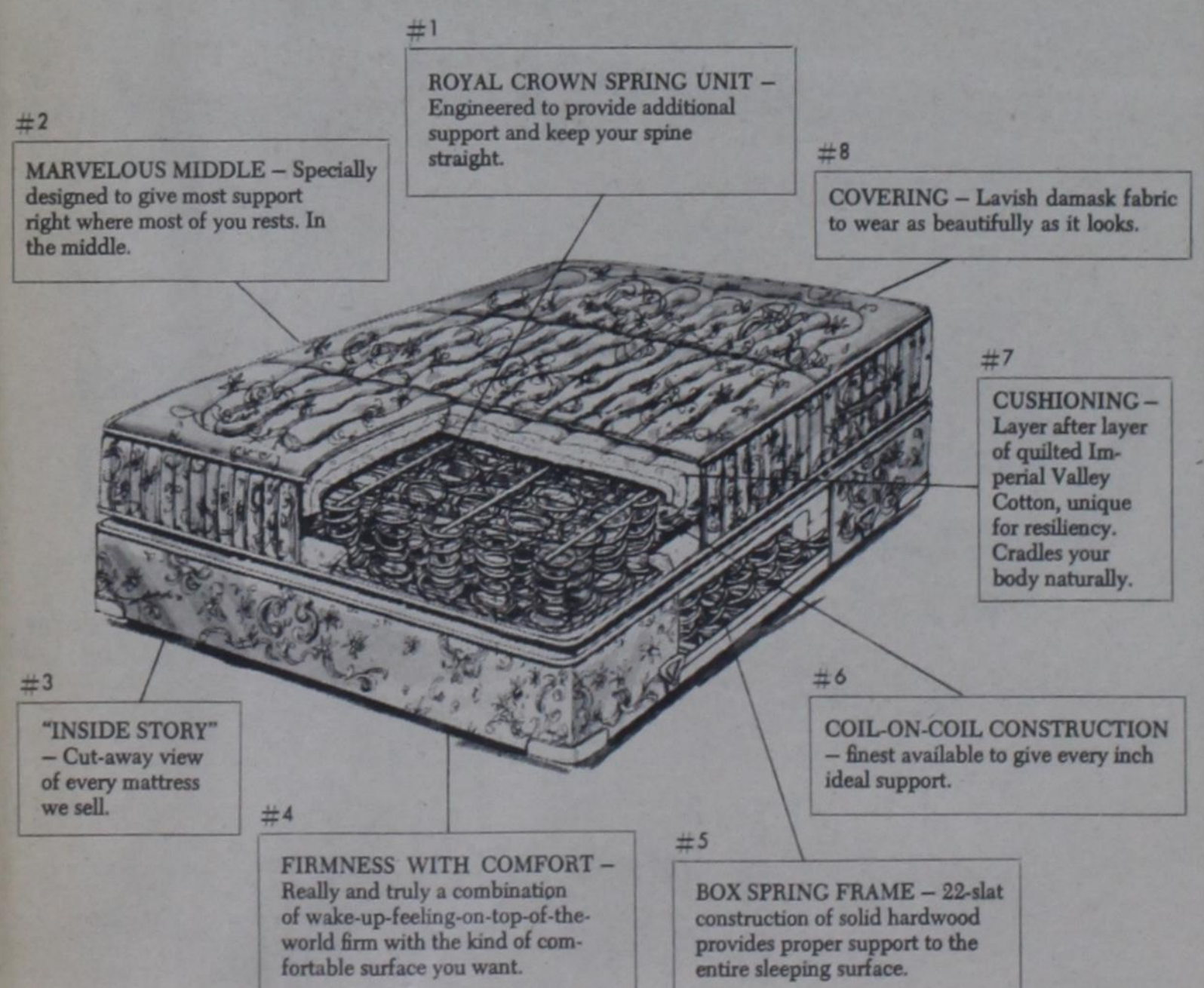
