### ATTEND WATER MEETING

Bill Luckett, water superintendent for Bronte, and Otis Smith attended the Fort Crocco Water Utilities Association meeting at Eden last week. Luckett is president of the association this year.

He reported to The Enterprise that Oak Creek Lake is now 12 feet below the spillway and is approximately half full.

Bronte City Council has passed an ordinance creating a municipal and disaster relief committee to serve the residents of this community.

Mayor Martin Lee was designated as chairman of the committee and Fred Alley will be the assistant director. Active members will be members of the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department and all citizens of Bronte were named honorary members.

The committee was set up for the purpose of united effort in cases of unusual weather conditions, or civil or criminal emergencies which might arise within the area.

Any person who sights an unusual weather condition should call the Bronte Hospital, and state the name and location of the trouble area. In case a tornado is sighted, three short blasts will be sounded on the fire siren. For civil or criminal trouble conditions, law officers should be called: Sheriff Melvin Childress, Deputy Grady Coulter or Highway Patrolman Bobby Hart.

This committee is also empowered to cooperate and work out agreements with other cities and counties authorizing cooperative and mutual aid agreements.

## Pecan Casebearers Found in County

The pecan nut casebearer is making an appearance in Coke County. Sterling Lindsey, Coke County Extension agent, said pecan tree owners desiring to institute control measures need to do so this week.

The first casebearer larvae were found in nutlets in pecan trees in Bronte Tuesday, May 25. The larvae were 24 to 48 hours old. No larvae were sighted in inspections made in Robert Lee last Monday.

The egg lay is light in Robert Lee to date and is greater in the Bronte area. Statewide, the casebearer is predicted to be present in greater numbers than last year.

Based on findings, the peak egg hatch should occur between May 27-30. Spraying should coincide with the peak hatch period. Zinc sulfate should be included in the spray to help control rosette, Lindsey said.

A second insecticide application, made five days after the first one, will usually insure a better control of the costly insect.

In spraying large trees, 200 to 400 pounds pressure is desired. Insecticide must be placed on the nut cluster to obtain the desired results.

Most of the insecticides formerly recommended for casebearer control can no longer be recommended. Malathion is still recommended. For this spray, persons should use 1 1/4 pints to 100 gallons of water or 3 tablespoons in 5 gallons of water, using normal strength Malathion. Recommendations and precautions on the insecticide container should always be checked.

The COG serves to coordinate city and county governments, with all joining together to accomplish projects which one government unit alone might not accomplish.

Thetford told the group, "We are beginning to get our feet on the ground, and I also believe we still have a lot ahead of us to be done."

Several revisions in the bylaws of CVCOC were approved at the meeting.

### Frito Salad

### Mirrors Are News

Mirrors are creating exciting new illusions.

The new trend, showing itself especially in West Coast homes, reflects the 30's tradition when fireplace walls, ceilings and even whole rooms were mirrored in lavishness and splendor.

But the 70's way with mirrors has a different look. Mirrors are being used in more unique ways, decorative in both design and purpose.

As an example, use mirrors as columns or ribbons of brightness on patterned wood or painted walls. Not only will they add a pattern of their own, but they will also give bright visual relief.

Or, if you need a focal point, use a large structural mirror.

Try putting mirrors on the ceiling; they can add double interest and even change the perspective in a room. For instance, consider the added sparkle from crystal, china and silver reflected by a mirror placed above the center of a dining area.

And if you really are innovative, you might cover an end wall with mirrors, topped by lattice framing, to bring the garden indoors.

### Cues on Fabric Flammability

If the clothes you're wearing suddenly caught fire, would they flare before you had a chance to smother the flames? Or is the fabric fire retardant or slow to burn?

Fire hazard to clothes is something most consumers don't consider.

Consumers tend to take safety of apparel for granted and often fail to use precautions around flames. For this reason, government and industry have stepped in to help.

In working with flame resistant fibers, researchers in government and industry have isolated four factors that determine the flammability of wearing apparel and textiles:

A napped fabric will ignite much more readily than a smooth surface.

Weight and weave of the fabric. Tightly woven, heavy fabrics will burn more slowly than sheer, lightweight, loosely wov-

en fabrics.

Some fibers are by nature resistant to fire, such as wool, glass fibers and modacrylics. Cotton and rayon are highly flammable, but can be chemically treated to be more flame retardant.

Garment design. Close fitting garments are less hazardous than loose fitting ones.

Because children and elderly persons are most often victims of fire accidents, the consumer should consider several points when selecting their clothes. Choose fabrics that burn slowly; select garments that have been treated with flame retardant finishes, such as children's treated flannel sleepwear; and teach your child, plus remind the elderly, about fire prevention and safety.

### Sewing with Denim

Denim is no longer just the blue fabric that's rugged, coarse and dependable. For spring 1971, it's been refined.

The fabric is now found in cotton or cotton-polyester blends or woven or knitted designs in a wide range of colors. And permanent press finishes make its care an easy job.

With its new personality, denim dresses, rainwear, shirts, jeans and pants all express the popular fashion moods of earthiness and naturalness.

The total denim look is sporty. So elect patterns with topstitching flat felled seams, patch pockets and front closings to emphasize the denim look.

Denim is especially popular with home sewers because the fabric is easy to handle and requires no special sewing equipment. But a few sewing hints can be helpful.

Work from the right side of the garment when topstitching, lengthen the stitch to eight stitches per inch, and sew about one-fourth inch away from the seam edge. Topstitching is best along side seams, at the hem, around edges of collars, cuffs, pockets and down front openings.

An almost straight seam requires flat fell, the specialist advises. To sew a flat felled finish, first reverse the normal seam by stitching it with the right sides out, wrong sides together. After pressing the seam open, press it again with both seams in one direction. Trim away the under seam allowance to one-eighth inch, then fold in the top seam allowance to half its width. Stitch to the garment along the folded edge.

The flat felled seam is especially useful to prevent raveling.

Use other details to add interest to denim. At neck facings or under edges of hem, sleeves or pockets, face with one of the prairie prints.

Select decorative zippers, sporty buttons or decorative gripper snaps for closings. Or, add an Indian or peasant print braid.

### Buying Cantaloupes

Cool, juicy melons — they're a summertime treat, especially cantaloupes.

When selecting quality cantaloupes in the food market, look for a coarse, corky outstanding netting on the rind and a slight yellow cast. A fragrant sweet odor denotes ripeness along with a fine textured, orange colored flesh.

Cantaloupes should be ripened at room temperature. For proper home care of ripe melons, wrap in waxed paper or a plastic bag before storing in the refrigerator to prevent the odor from mingling with other foods.

Cantaloupes can be served in numerous interesting ways. Try a low calorie lunch of cantaloupe wedge and broiled ground beef. Or summerize tuna, chicken, corned beef or seafood salads by putting it in a melon ring or serving in a melon half.

Another suggestion is a quar-

ter of cantaloupe with sliced fresh mushrooms, broiled bacon strips and a dash of cracked pepper.

Change the familiar vanilla or tapioca puddings by garnishing with melon balls. And try a mixture of melon balls with a scoop of lime or lemon sherbet touched off with toasted coconut.

### Iodized Salt

Have you ever thought about the salt you sprinkle on your food or you buy at the grocery store? Are you familiar with iodized salt?

Chances are you are just like millions of other Americans, assuming all salt is iodized.

However, that is not the case; regular salt is found along with iodized salt in the market. Unless you read the labels, you may not be getting iodized salt.

Iodized salt was invented about 50 years ago to combat goiter in the U. S. Once the salt hit the market, the disease was almost completely eliminated, but now is on the rise again. In a recent Texas survey, five per cent of the persons examined had goiter—a visible enlargement of the thyroid gland.

Goiter is a thyroid condition due to lack of iodine. But the disease can be prevented, simply by including iodized salt in your diet.

Iodized salt, or salt to which iodine has been added, tastes just like regular salt and costs the same. Only four cents worth of iodized salt a year will prevent goiter.

If you're not using iodized salt for your family, make an effort to buy it the next time you go to the grocery store.

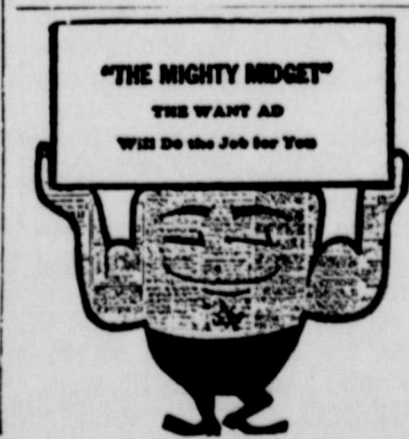

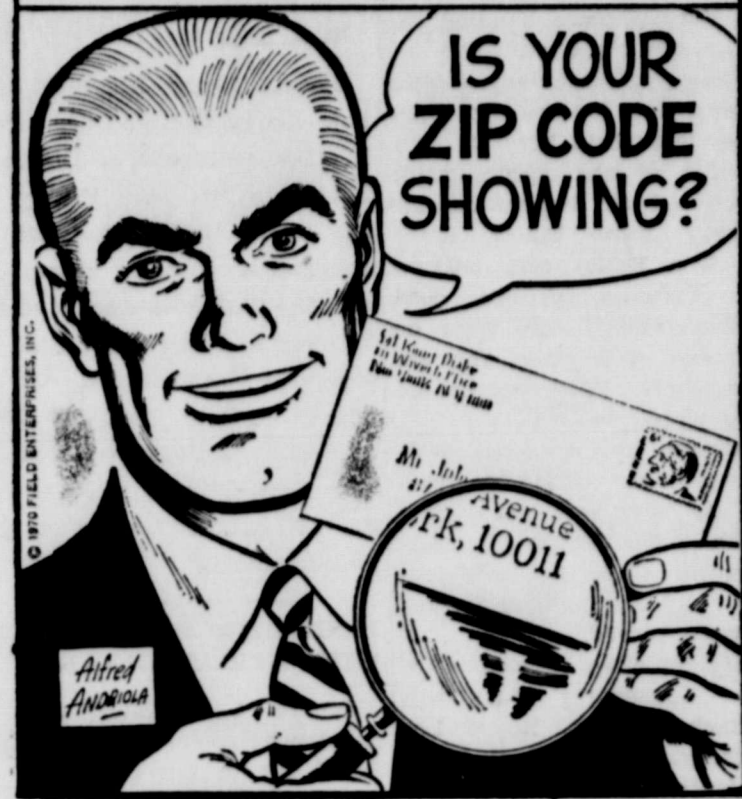

# Lake Spence Bass Are Doing Well

Spence Reservoir near Robert Lee is low on water, but the striped bass there stocked experimentally by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department are holding their own, according to Bill Follis, fisheries biologist for the department.

Follis said test nets which caught six of the stripers stocked two years ago show the fish are growing more slowly in Spence Reservoir than they are in Navarro Mills Reservoir near Corsicana. But he said the slow growth rate can probably be attributed to poor food production as a result of the drought and that the fish might possibly double their growth rate under ideal conditions.

Striped bass, resembling the more common white bass, are actually salt water fish which have the ability to live in fresh water. They reach 70 pounds on the East Coast and 55 pounds on the West Coast. Lakes in other states have produced these transplants weighing more than 15 pounds.

There has been no evidence of reproduction in Spence Reservoir, according to Follis, but this was not really expected so soon after stocking.
