Weekend Rains Fine For Area

More rains fell in the county and area last weekend, with the immediate Bronte area mostly reporting about 2 inches. The Blackwell area received up to 4 inches of rain and Oak Creek

gained about a foot of water. Heavy rains fell in northern Coke County and southern Mitchell County, resulting in a good runoff for Lake Spence, which gained about 2,000 acre feet of water. The heaviest rain reported was at the Harvey Reid place east of Sano where 7 inches fell during the weekend. Robert Lee had 1.33 inches and Brookshire community reported 2 to 5 inches in that area. Silver had only a trace.

Thunderstorms, high humidity and heat remained in the weather forecasts through Thursday.

HE Teacher Compiles UNIPAC

Mrs. Royce Fancher, Bronte School homemaking teachers, attended the first workshop of its kind in the United States last week in Midland. The meeting was held to work out units of individualized instruction in the field of home economics at high school level. A unit is called a UNIPAC and may deal with any one of hundreds of subjects of interest to high school home economics girls.

The Area II meeting was supervised by five experts from over the United States, each of whom had to approve the work submitted by the teachers who had been requested to work up material.

Mrs. Fancher, along with two other area teachers, prepared a UNIPAC on Teenage Dieting. The instruction package contains all types of instructional material available on the subject, including textbooks, reference library items, transparencies, tapes, magazine articles, etc.

Mrs. Fancher explained that if

a student is interested in some subject, she will be given a pre-test, which is part of the unit, and if she makes 100 per cent on the pre-test, she can know she already is well versed in the subject and can pass on to some other item of interest.

If the student scores less than 100 per cent, she may use the UNIPAC on the subject until she thinks she has mastered the material. Then she will be given a post-test to determine just how well she has done.

The Bronte teacher said the UNIPAC system is not a new concept in learning, but use of the system in home economics instruction is new. "This will be a wonderful thing," she said, "especially for those students who are fast learners. They will be able to do their regular classroom work, and go on to other subjects just as fast as they can learn the material."

Austin — Major changes in election laws for voters and candidates were approved by the 62nd Legislature. All are contingent on final federal court action upholding lower court decisions invalidating old requirements.

Gov. Preston Smith has signed into law a new voter registration act and filing fee bill.

Earlier the Texas Legislature enacted a resolution ratifying the federal constitutional amendment extending full voting rights to 18 year olds. Federal amendment may not be finally cleared in time for the 1972 elections, but young voters can participate in presidential and congressional voting and the national nominating convention series.

New voter registration provides for year around sign up (with temporary cutoff 30 days before any election) and automatic renewal for three years by voting in any primary or general election. First registration under the new system will

begin Oct. 1. March 1, 1972, is the earliest voting date for new registrants. Voters will continue using present registration certificates for elections through next February.

A federal court invalidated the old Texas annual registration requirement, which was unique in the nation. Texas' new automatic registration law would be repealed if appellate courts reinstate annual registration.

Under a bill passed by the 62nd Legislature, in response to another federal ruling that present filing fees are excessive, candidates would pay a maximum of four per cent of the term of office salaries to get on the ballot.

Bill also permits "filing by affidavit" stating that the candidate cannot pay the prescribed fee, or by a "petition" signed by 10 per cent of the voters in the last general election within the area (state, county, precinct) served by the office sought. If the Supreme Court invalidates this act, a special legislative session may be necessary to provide a method of paying primary election costs in 1972.

IMMUNIZATION REQUIRED — Texas students must begin an immunization program by Jan. 1, 1972, under legislation just signed into law, says the Texas Department of Health.

Students will be allowed to enter schools during the summer and fall terms with provi-

sion that their immunizations against at least six diseases will be started by Jan. 1 and completed as soon as medically possible.

Required immunization for grade school level youngsters includes diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, rubella and smallpox. Measles immunization is not required if there is a history of measles illness.

Exceptions may be granted on religious grounds or to those who may be harmed by immunization (on written certification by a physician). However, exemptions would not be permitted in time of emergency or epidemic, the Health Department adds.

AUTO RATE HEARINGS SET — Hearings are set for 9 a.m. June 30 here to consider new auto rates to replace the controversial schedule put into effect Jan. 1.

State Board of Insurance is expected to hear usual cross recommendations to raise and lower rates. Hearing will be conducted in the State Highway Department auditorium on casualty and physical damage rates, rating plans and rules.

All those who wish to have subject matter placed on the agenda were advised by the Board to contact its automobile office here by June 23 and provide written statements in quadruplicate.

Rate revisions will be effective on and after Sept. 1 under present indications.

After hearings last year the Board increased rates an average of 14 per cent, statewide. This raised an angry reaction from many insurance purchasers. Insurance companies, which urged a 27.7 per cent increase, were equally unhappy.

COURTS SPEAK — Third Court of Civil Appeals has ruled that the Ector County Commissioners Court had no authority to spend county funds to purchase a 280 acre tract as the site for the University of Texas of Permian Basin, Odessa. Court decision said the rest of the campus tract, 308 acres, was properly acquired for the new state university as a gift.

On July 7 arguments will be heard by the Supreme Court as to whether a minister can be held in contempt of court for refusing to move his church.

U. S. Supreme Court vacated a three judge federal court finding in San Antonio that the Texas safety responsibility act is valid and sent the case back for reconsideration in view of an earlier ruling that a Georgia law provides no proper method of determining fault of drivers in accidents.

PRESIDENTIAL DINNER PLANNED — All major Democratic candidates for presidential nomination are expected to receive invitations to a \$50 a plate dinner in Austin during mid-January.

Funds raised at the dinner will go to meet 1971-72 State Democratic Executive Committee budget of \$81,000.

A sub-committee was named to check candidates to determine the most convenient day for the dinner.

Short Snorts — Governor Smith is still pressing his demand for a presidential drought disaster area proclamation covering Texas.

Highway Department is re-evaluating its plans for a new \$20 million office building near the state capitol and the governor's mansion, in view of a legislative directive.

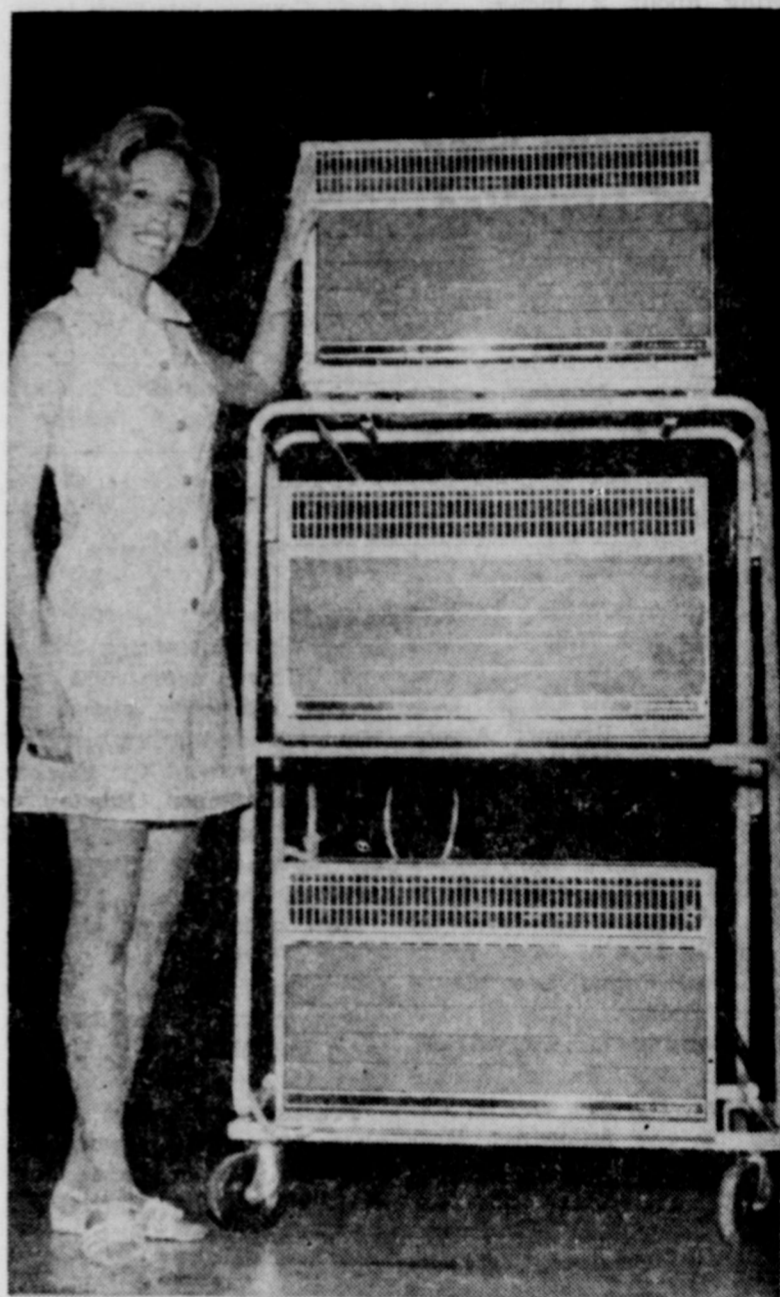

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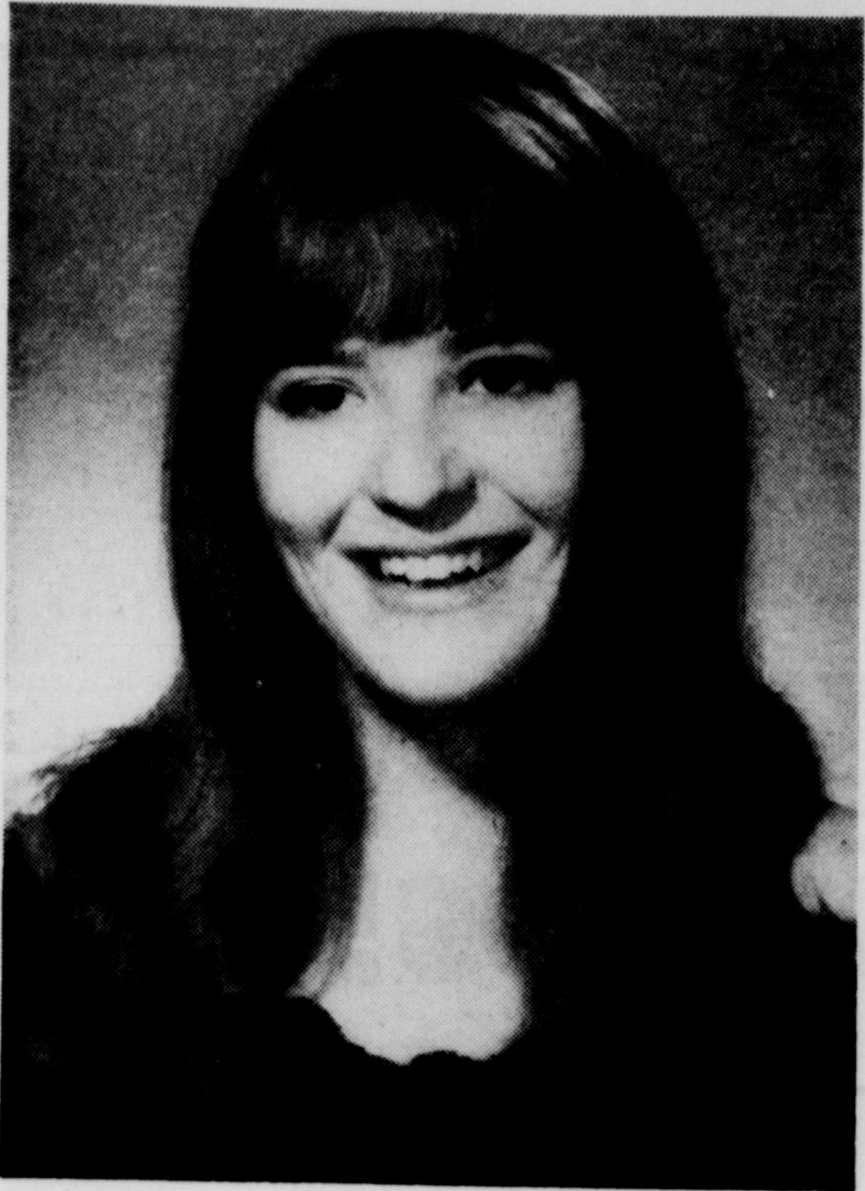

- * Approved a depository pledge contract with First National Bank of Bronte.

- * Heard a report that the value of lunchroom commodities received last year was \$3,694.31.

- * Heard a review of the 1970-71 budget, expenses and revenues.

- * Shared a report on property values handled by Thomas Y. Pickett Co. for the next budget year, showing a loss of approximately \$45,000.

- * Agreed to look deeper into the legal ownership of the Juniper School property.

- * Completed revision of student policies.

- * Reviewed a memorandum from Dr. J. W. Edgar, state education commissioner, concerning the school district's obligation under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the 14th amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

- * Agreed to reserve only 100 seats in the football stadium this fall. They will be \$9.00 for six home games, will go on sale Aug. 23, and will be sold on a "first come" basis.

- * Approved the bus service schedule for 1971-72.

OIL NEWS

In the first oil activity in Coke County in several months, the county drew locations for three wildcats. Operator J. Frank Stringer of San Angelo announced the locations.

The No. 1 Ruth G. Featherston, a 6,600 foot venture, is 10 miles west of Robert Lee, two miles south of the I.A.B. multipay field, three miles east of the marginal Millican (Strawn reef gas) field and 2¼ miles northeast of the depleted Edita (Canyon and Strawn) field, and separated from all by deep failures. Location is 2,550 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines 184-2-H&TC.

Second of the ventures is the No. 1 H. L. Hooper, projected for 6,700 feet, 11 miles southwest of Robert Lee and a southeast offset to the depleted re-opener of Canyon production is, the Edita field. Location is 1,980 feet from the north and 1,550 feet from the west lines of 239-2-H&TC. The depleted re-opener, King Resources Co., Midland, No. 1 Hooper, was finaled in 1969 to pump 15 barrels of oil, plus 46 barrels of water, through perforations at 6,194-6,200 feet.

Third prospector is a 7,000 foot test, No. 1 C. J. Millican. It was spotted 13 miles southwest of Robert Lee and 5/8 mile south-southwest of the Millican field. Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of 230-2-H&TC.

All the projects are on 640 acre leases. Name of the contractor was not announced.

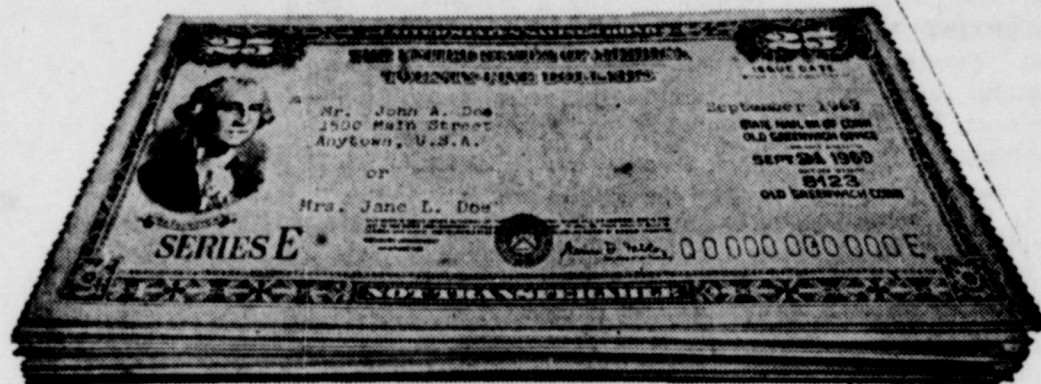

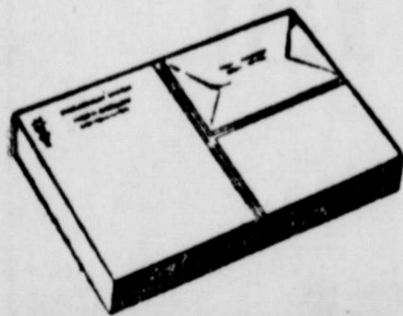

Washington — The announcement last week by President Nixon, removing trade restrictions with Communist China, made headline news. It was not entirely unexpected since the matter had been under consideration for a considerable period of time.

What also makes news but less headline was the President's action in removing the requirement that 50 per cent of shipments of grains and other commodities to China and communist countries behind the Iron Curtain be delivered by American ships. Since 1964 exporters of goods to foreign countries must use American ships for at least one-half of their transportation. The action of the President is highly significant since it is about impossible for nations to buy our grains at the added shipment costs.

Since 1964 our sales of grain have dropped more than half simply because American shipowners must charge rates far in excess of going world rates because of greater expenses, largely in wage.

After the 1964 decision, it cost \$18 to \$20 a ton to move wheat to Russia in American ships. It cost as little as \$8 a ton in foreign ships. Obviously this made American wheat less competitive with the other large exporters, such as Canada, Argentina and Australia.

In 1964 Russia had a great shortage of grain and offered to buy about 4 million tons from the United States. The result was that even in its desperate situation the Soviet Union bought only about a million and a half tons.

Just three weeks ago, reports showed that Canada contracted to supply Moscow with \$225 million worth of wheat. The U. S. shipments of everything amounted to only \$125 million, all because of the expenses in shipping. Certainly, if American traders are going to deal with the communist countries, they should have a better break. Our imbalance of foreign exchange is in serious condition at this time and, if we are going to trade with communist nations, exporters should have the opportunity at more fair competition.

Russian feed grain requirements have risen steeply because of their effort to build up livestock herds and make the country more self-sufficient in meat. Reports indicate that the Russians have diverted large acreage formerly producing wheat to feed grains, making necessary a greater demand for wheat. Whatever the demands for grain from Red China and the eastern communist - block nations may be in the future, the removal of the cargo preference will give American traders greater opportunity to export feed grains and wheat.

There is no indication that China will turn to the United States for any part of its supply of wheat and other grains but since the embargo of more than 20 years has been lifted, then there may be a chance for disposing of surplus grain by American producers and shippers.

Powerful forces, particularly the International Longshoremen's Union, vigorously oppose the lifting of the 50 per cent requirement; in fact that was the rea-

son for the policy in the first place. In some bulk commodity shipments, American ships carry only about 10 per cent of our exports. Before the 50 per cent rule was applied United States flagships carried upwards of 65 to 70 per cent of the same exports. Records indicate that the 50 per cent requirements has not succeeded in creating a single seafaring job or business for American shipowners but only cost American farmers by denying a source of foreign sales.
