Rains Fine; Lakes Gain Water

Aid May Be Available to Nursing Home Residents

Applications are now being received for resident patients of the Bronte Nursing Home by the Administrator L. O. Clark. It is anticipated that the new nursing home will be completed and ready for occupancy about Sept. 1.

Clark explained the types of care and assistance available as follows:

Bronte Nursing Home will participate under the Texas Medicaid program. Financial and medical assistance will be available to anyone who may qualify. Applications for medical assist-

ance for care in the Bronte Nursing Home may be made by the recipient himself or by someone acting in his behalf.

Forms are available at local offices of the State Department of Public Welfare, and at licensed hospitals. After an application is completed, the Department determines, usually within 30 to 60 days, if the applicant is eligible. If they become eligible for nursing home assistance they may make application to any nursing home of their choice, provided the nursing home is a licensed participating nursing home with the Department of Welfare and the Department of Health.

Basically, the Texas Medical Assistance Program provides inpatient hospital care, outpatient hospital care, physicians' services, necessary nursing home care, and laboratory and X-ray services. The Medicaid program is administered as a supplement to Medicare, the national health

care program for persons over 65.

Nursing home care is provided for money grant recipients at three levels of care. After the Department determines the level of care required for the patient, payment is made to the nursing home for that level of care by the Department of Public Welfare for the patient. Nursing homes are classified as Skilled, Intermediate III or Intermediate II.

The programs of Texas Medicaid benefit the aged, the blind, the disabled and the children. They help make it possible for these needy people to meet the basic requirements of daily life. They also provide medical care for them when it is needed.

P.O. Going Under New Management

On July 1, the United States Post Office Department will fade into history after nearly 200 years of service to the American people. Its place will be officially taken by a new organization, The United States Postal Service, an independent establishment of the government formed to meet the changing needs of the society.

Presumably, it will provide better, faster, more dependable mail service. Plans are being initiated for a major mechanization program to streamline mail processing and special delivery.

To mark the inaugural date, the Postal Service will have a limited number of souvenir envelopes available free on July 1 only. In addition, for stamp collectors, a limited number of cancelled first day covers will be made available for the cost of an 8 cent stamp.

On July 1, at ceremonies in Washington, a new 8 cent stamp will be issued. It will carry the emblem of the United States Postal Service—a stylized eagle poised for flight. The stamp will be available simultaneously at all post offices.

Widespread rainfall was received in this area Monday night and Tuesday morning. In Bronte, rains were preceded by thunder and lightning, then tapered off to a gentle rain which fell most of Monday night and on into Tuesday morning. Local rain gauges varied from 2.4 inches to 4 inches in town.

The Blackwell area also had another good rain with 3½ inches reported, resulting in more runoff for Oak Creek Lake. Robert Lee had 3.9 inches and the Hayrick community got about 5 inches of the much needed moisture. Four inches was reported at Sanco, bringing the week's total up to 11 inches in some spots of the community.

Lake Spence gained an estimated 13,000-15,000 acre feet of water for a total of 23,000-25,000 acre feet. The level of the big lake was at its all time high since construction was finished and for the first time water was standing at the intake gates. Robert Lee's Mountain Creek Lake, which has been dry for some time, gained about 250 acre feet to give that city a year's supply of water.

More than two inches was reported in the Brookshire community, southeast of town, and Aubrey Denman reported four inches at his ranch northwest of town on Hayrick road.

Farmers and ranchers said the rain was definitely beneficial. The moisture will be especially welcome to grain sorghum and forage crops, and to native pasture land.

The rains came on the official first day of summer.

Soil District State Winner

Three Texas soil and water conservation districts are first place winners in the annual Goodyear Soil Conservation Awards competition.

Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District won top honors in the southwestern section of the state; Marion-Cass Soil and Water Conservation District is eastern area winner; and Ochiltree Soil Conservation District is No. 1 among the north Texas districts.

The winning districts were selected by a committee of conservation leaders on the basis of

planning, leadership and accomplishments in resource development last year. The contest, now in its 25th year, is sponsored by The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. in cooperation with the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD).

Two representatives of each winning district will be guests of the rubber company in December on a four day visit to the 10,000 acre Goodyear Farms and The Wigwam, a desert resort, at Litchfield Park, Ariz. They will join representatives of other first place districts for the vaca-

tion study tour.

Coke County district's representatives will be N. C. Pentecost of Sanco, who was named the district's outstanding landowner-cooperator of the year, and D. K. Glenn of Bronte, member of the district's governing board.

The awards program, begun shortly after the organization of NACD, provides recognition for first and second place districts and for the outstanding cooperators of all competing districts in the 50 states and Puerto Rico.

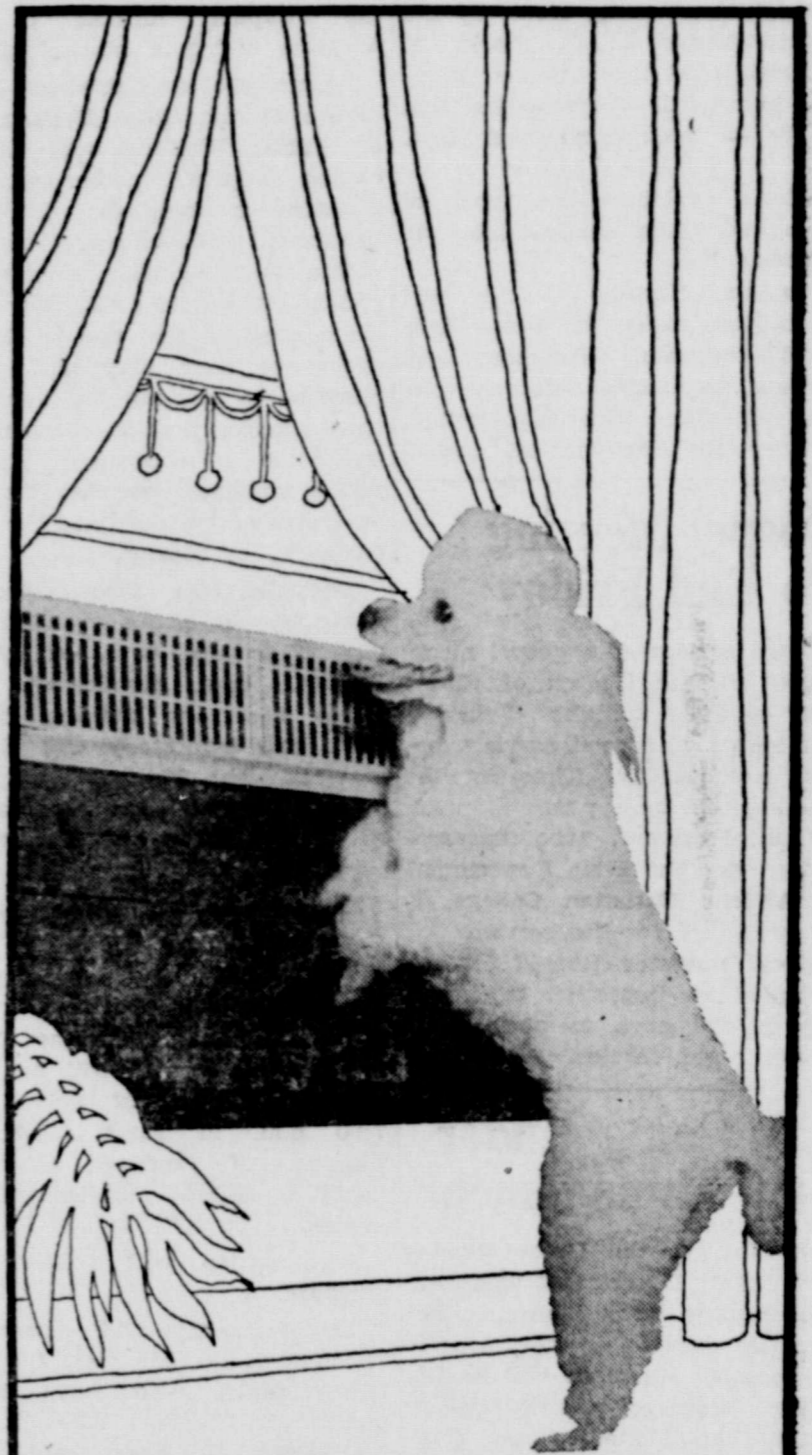

TWO POUND STRIPER CAUGHT AT LAKE SPENCE

The largest striped bass ever caught from Spence Reservoir was landed recently on a trotline baited with a minnow.

The fish, weighing almost two pounds and measuring 16 inches in length, was one of 34,500 stocked in the lake in 1969.

Texas Parks and Wildlife biologists say the stripers were growing slowly in Spence Reservoir because of the drought conditions in West Texas and the consequent low level of the lake.

The biologists say the big striper must be one which was large enough and hungry enough to keep abreast of the shad spawn, growing as the shad grew and finally ending up slightly larger than the other stripers released at the same time.

Only 3,000 stripers were released in Spence Reservoir in 1970, and the first seven inch fish of the batch was caught during a net sampling last week.

Striped bass are being stocked experimentally in several Texas

lakes in an effort to find a predator fish which can reduce the number of gizzard shad and other small fish and at the same time offer the angler some sport.

The fish are actually a salt water species resembling the more common white bass. Stripers are reportedly doing well in other inland lakes in the United States.

Game limit on the stripers is one fish.

The main feature of the construction job is the enlargement of the nursing home. However, other new facilities were added and still others remodeled and renovated.

The nursing home part of the health care complex was increased from eight patient rooms to 29. Also included in the contract were a new recreation room, lobby and a large bath room.

Included in the remodeling and enlarging were the kitchen and dining room, X-ray room and an adjacent waiting room, laboratory and special therapy room with whirlpool equipment.

The spacious patient rooms of the nursing home are tastefully furnished and decorated to make them as homey as possible. The very latest in nursing home furnishings have been provided and the equipment is suitable for patients needing any type of care. Some of the rooms have connecting baths, part of them with showers and part with tubs.

The hospital estimated the entire cost of construction and furnishing would run approximately \$326,000.

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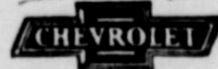
