After the Department determines the level of care required for the patient, payment is made to the nursing home for that level of care by the Department of Public Welfare for the patient. Nursing homes are classified as Skilled, Intermediate III or Intermediate II.

The programs of Texas Medicaid benefit the aged, the blind, the disabled and the children. They help make it possible for these needy people to meet the basic requirements of daily life. They also provide medical care for them when it is needed.







ologists say the stripens were growing slowly in Spence Reservoir because of the drouth con-

ditions in West Texas and the consequent low level of the lake The biologists say the big striper must be one which was large enough and hungry enough to keep abreast of the shad spawn, growing as the shad grew and finally ending up slightly larger than the other stripers released at the same time.
