Bronte, Robert Lee to Play

Coke County Pavement Needs Sealcoating Job

(Editor's Note: The following story was taken from the Robert Lee Observer and concerns remarks made at this week's meeting of the BCD by Commissioner Fern Havins of Precinct 1. The commissioner's ideas are of vital interest to citizens of Bronte as well as Robert Lee and need to be given some serious thought.)

A problem which is facing all the residents of Robert Lee and Bronte, and to a lesser degree, all the rural residents of the county, was brought up at Tuesday's meeting of the BCD. The problem is keeping the paved streets of Robert Lee and Bronte in a good state of repair.

Commissioner Fern Havins told BCD members that paved streets in both Robert Lee and Bronte are going to have to re-

ceive some care in the near future if they are to survive the weather and traffic hazards to which they are subjected.

The commissioner said the only answer to the problem is to have all the streets in both towns sealcoated as soon as possible. He predicted that unless this action is taken in the near future, the pavement investment in both towns will be beyond reclaiming within three years.

Commissioner Havins, who is the dean of the commissioners' court of Coke County, said the streets in the two towns were last sealcoated in 1959, some 12 years ago.

Havins said that about 90 percent of the streets in both towns are paved and the almost complete paving of them is a source of pride to local citizens and a factor in bringing new residents to live in both towns.

The commissioner pointed out, however, that there is a problem in preventing the loss of the pavement—a method of financing sealcoating. The only answer Havins could see to this problem was for the citizens of Coke County who are interested in preserving the paved streets to vote a bond issue to provide the money.

Havins said the 1959 sealcoating job was done without a bond issue but a 1971 job of the same kind was not possible without voting the money. The 1959 job was done with the help of some money left over from the original paving bond issues and with a sizeable amount of gravel al-

ready on hand. Neither of these backlogs still exist.

Havins pointed out that he is only interested in the best interests of Coke County, and that he has only one more year to serve as a member of the commissioners' court. He indicated, however, that he would like very much for the people of this county to act affirmatively in an effort to keep up the fine improvements which have come with the paving of streets in both Bronte and Robert Lee.

Adult Classes Will Here Begin Oct. 5

A second Adult Basic Education Course will be offered at Bronte School this fall. The classes will begin at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 5, and will meet each Tuesday and Thursday night through Feb. 17, 1972. Supt. C. B. Barbee said that the course may be continued beyond that date if more funds are available.

The course will be taught at three levels by Mrs. C. B. Barbee, Mrs. Jerry Lawhon and Mrs. James Golson, and will include language arts, writing, math, social studies and literature.

Any interested adult may receive more information in Barbee's office. Adults taking the course last year were given GED tests, and all passed the tests, which are recognized as the equivalent of a high school diploma.

The unofficial Coke County Championship is at stake tonight (Friday) when the Bronte Longhorns host the Robert Lee Steers in the Bronte stadium. Game time is 8 p.m. and a large crowd is expected for the annual battle.

He ranched in Sterling and Coke counties and in the Blackwell area for 60 years. He had lived most of his life in the Blackwell area. He was a member of the Farm Bureau and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

Survivors include his wife of Blackwell; two sons, M. C. Hendry of Silver and James Hendry of San Angelo; one daughter, Mrs. Bobby Sanderson of Blackwell, and six grandchildren.

Pallbearers were T. J. Oden, J. B. Buckner, Therrell Burwick, Walter Sanders, Elmer Jordan and John Hipp, all of Blackwell.

Hornets Down Wildcats; Try Christoval Tonight

Blackwell Hornets won a hard-fought game over the Water Valley Wildcats Friday night at Blackwell. The first quarter ended with neither team scoring, but about the middle of the second quarter Zane McNeill went over on a 5 yard run and Jim Bob Watts kicked the extra point. The half ended with the Blackwell team in front 8-0.

Blackwell received the kickoff after the half and marched to the 10 yard line where Tommy Bledsoe scored on a pass from Matt Clark. Watts failed on the extra point try and at the end of the third quarter the score was 14-0, Blackwell.

Don Boyd opened the scoring early in the fourth quarter on a 5 yard run but the extra point failed. After recovering a Water Valley fumble on the Hornet 30 yard line, McNeill found pay dirt on a 60 yard end sweep. Watts kicked the EP to make the score 28-0 with four minutes left in the 4th quarter.

The Wildcats fought back hard and made the final touchdown of the night with 1:30 left on the clock.

After a shaky start the Fighting Hornets shaped up and moved the ball well. Blackwell had 13 first downs and seven penetrations against three first downs and one penetration for Water Valley, but at first Blackwell had trouble scoring when in good position.

Coach Ed Poehls said, "Matt Clark, our quarterback, did an excellent job of reading the pass defense. Zane McNeill and Tom-

my Bledsoe ran hard, giving us hope that our offense will be strong. Bob Watts, Joe Tubb and Ronnie Adams were outstanding on defense. Center Rickey Conrad did a fine job of blocking on offense."

The Hornets didn't suffer any injuries in last week's game and have been having hard workouts this week getting ready for the next opponent, Christoval, described by Poehls as being a stronger team than Water Valley. He said the Hornets "are up, have a lot of spirit and are looking forward to tangling with the Cougars Friday night." The game will be at Blackwell with kickoff time at 8 p.m.

Christoval lost to Highland last week 22-0.

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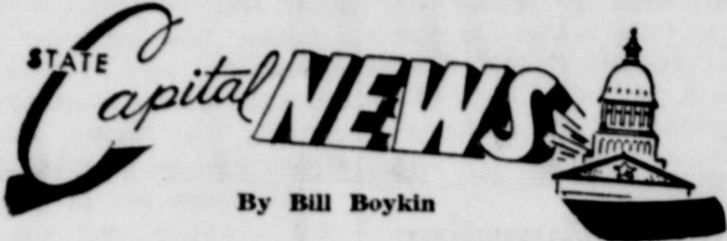

Austin—A major court decision last week left up in the air the question of how Texas is to achieve a valid reapportionment act for both houses of its legislature before next year.

State Supreme Court agreed with an Aug. 2 Austin district court finding that a House redistricting bill passed this year is unconstitutional because it unnecessarily split up 23 counties.

The decision left unanswered how the bill should be corrected or if it should be redone before 1973. Basic questions are these:

- * Should House reapportionment and state Senate redistricting (left untouched by the Legislature) be the subject of an emergency special session?

- * Should the five member constitutional Legislative Redistricting Board take on the job, since no valid reapportionment was

done by the Legislature in the first regular session after the 1970 census?

* Should the Legislature forget about reapportionment before 1972 elections and wait until the 1970 census statistics are all complete and published?

Gov. Preston Smith and Atty. General Crawford Martin once more are on opposite sides of a controversy.

Smith says the Redistricting Board has the "duly constituted responsibility" under the constitution to redistrict, and a special legislative session on reapportionment would be unnecessarily costly.

Martin stated in a brief before the Supreme Court a special session "would seem the only correct possibility, but this, too, could become the subject of litigation."

A High Court ruling in another case challenging the Redistricting Board's authority may hold the key as to whether it can proceed, whether the Legislature must take over now or check the task until 1973.

A note of urgency is injected into the issue by the fact the Board is directed by the constitution to do whatever is going to be done by late October. Furthermore, legislative candidates appear to face a Nov. 7 deadline for establishing residence in the district they choose to represent.

ANTI-POLLUTION PERMIT USED — Texas Air Control Board has put into operation a

far reaching construction permit system to help control and prevent air pollution.

Since Aug. 30, any industry that will emit air contaminants into the atmosphere must get a Board permit before starting construction. Similar permits are necessary to modify or change existing contaminant causing facilities.

Permits apply to specific, individual manufacturing processes, not entire industrial plants or complexes. Exceptions for minor contaminant causing plans will be listed later. Applicants have 60 days after construction is completed to apply for operating permits.

HEALTH STUDY ON — New studies to find ways of meeting health service, staff and facility needs of Texas' rural population will be undertaken by the Research Institute for Systems Development at Texas A & M University.

The study will be conducted in the West Central Texas area around Abilene which has both rural and urban characteristics typical of many regions.

Fewer than half of Texas' 492 hospitals meet federal medicare requirements for health and safety, so the project will focus on health facilities and services considered below medicare standards. Texas has more than twice as many qualified hospitals as any other state.

\$150 MILLION BOND ISSUE POSTPONED — University of Texas regents postponed until Oct. 22 consideration of an overall plan for marketing the first block of \$150 million in bonds authorized for new college construction.

About \$30 million in bonds apparently will be sold by December. They are backed by tuition revenues. Money will go to build new institutions of UT at San Antonio, Dallas, Houston, Odessa and El Paso. The bonds were authorized by the 62nd Legislature this year to build newly authorized institutions.

D. A. STUDY PENAL CODE — District and county attorneys have launched their own committee study of needed changes in the penal code. They fought a sweeping, controversial revision of the code during the legislative session this year.

District Attorney Tom Hanna of Beaumont was selected as chairman of the committee in the first meeting last week. Prosecutors indicated they prefer a simplified, "more responsive" new code to the version introduced in the 1971 Legislature which had been five years in the making.

Short Snorts

Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall has promised an announcement for lieutenant governor here Sept. 23.

Attorney General Martin held the State Board of Insurance can make rules for safe movement and operation of mobile gasoline service units.

Governor approved state participation in a \$3.5 million federal pilot program of bank loans for businesses and residents of poverty areas. (Houston and Laredo banks will be among the sources of loans.)

Rio Grande Valley farmers suffered a \$150,000 to \$175,000 loss on harvested cotton due to recent heavy rains, reports Texas Agriculture Department.

Grand Prairie Bank and Trust Company seeks a state bank charter.

Shoup Voting Machine Company submitted its mechanical voting device for special inspection by the Secretary of State.

Public hearings were held this week (starting Sept. 14) on \$23.3 million worth of new school textbooks.

Longhorns Demolish Forsan Buffaloes, 34-6

The Bronte Longhorns looked good in their season opener last Friday night as they whipped the Forsan Buffaloes, 34-6. Even though a number of the lads are inexperienced, they showed they were not afraid to hit. Time and again, the defense broke through and trapped the Buff quarterback for big losses.

First Quarter

Gary Daugherty kicked off to Mike Arrott to start the ball game. Arrott went to the 22. Kim Barrett and Bobby Skelton made short gains but Arrott had to punt on 4th down. The ball went to the Forsan 30 and was returned to the 43. Three tries left the Buffs with a 4th and 9, so they punted a boomer to the Bronte 7 yard line.

After a couple of tries, the Horns decided to quick kick on 3rd down, sending the ball to the Longhorn 41. Once again the defense held the visitors and a 4th down punt was blocked by

Barrett at the Forsan 46 yard line.

With Alan Barbee handling the quarterback duties, the Horns started on their first good march of the game. Skelton carried twice and made a 1st on the 30. Arrott made 4, Barrett added 3 more and Skelton went for the 1st on the 14. Arrott went for 3, but then a couple of losses didn't look too good. However, the series was saved when the Buffs were penalized 15 on a face mask infraction. With a 3rd and 5, Arrott dived for 2 and Barrett went for the 1st and goal to go. Skelton carried it over on 1st down and then kicked the extra point, to make the scoreboard read 7-0.

The kickoff went to James Ditmore. On the first play Ditmore almost got loose, but Skelton headed him off. However, the ball was called back and Forsan was penalized 15 yards. A couple of plays later the quarter ended with a 3rd and 14 for the Buffs.

Second Quarter

Quarterback Jeff Williams was thrown for a big loss on 3rd down and the Buffs had to punt. Barrett stepped into the ball and blocked the kick to give the Horns a 1st and goal on the 8 yard line. Arrott ran 6 yards of it on 1st down and Skelton carried over on 2nd down for another TD. Kick was blocked and score was 13-0.

The kickoff gave the ball to the Buffs on their 34. After two tries and major penalties against both the Buffs and the Horns, the visitors were faced with a 1st and 18. Ditmore carried twice for a 1st on the Bronte 37. After two short gains, Tommy Bomley took the ball and went 16 yards for a 1st on the Bronte 18. Williams made 5, recovered a fumble, and on 3rd down lost back to the 34 yard line. An incomplete pass gave the ball to the Horns at that point.

The local lads failed to make their 1st and had to punt, then the Buffs tried 4 times and failed to make the needed 10. Bomley intercepted a Bronte pass and was downed on the Bronte 14. Next two plays gave the Buffs a 1st and goal on the 4. Bomley went over but the play was called back and the Buffs were penalized 15 yards for holding. A couple of plays later the half ended. Score: 13-0.

Third Quarter

After the kickoff, Forsan had the ball on their 38. Joe Moreno carried to the 47 and fumbled, giving the ball to the Longhorns. A pass from Barbee to Lynn Lawhon was good for a 1st on the 30. Skelton, Arrott and Barrett carried to the 17 for another 1st and then the Bronte lads almost made another 1st but were just short, and Forsan took the ball on their 7 yard line. Williams was pushed back to the 2, and Moreno tried an end sweep, but was met by Lawhon and tackled behind his goal for a safety and 2 more Bronte points. Score: 15-0.

Skelton took Forsan's free kick and got a nice run back to the Buff 35. Jerry Graves went into the backfield as Skelton's knee was twisted on the tackle. Graves went for 5 on 1st down, Barrett added 4 and Graves ran 4 more for the 1st on the Buff 22. After a loss on 1st down, the Horns went to the air and Barbee tossed a long one to Jim Dan Raughton in the end zone for

another Bronte counter. Skelton went back in and kicked the EP. Score: 22-0.

The kickoff run back gave the Buffs the ball on their 32. The defense pushed them back to the 26 and then a fumble was recovered by Louis Martinez on the Forsan 23. Arrott found the hole in the Buff defense and went sailing 23 yards for another TD. EP try failed. Score: 28-0.

Moreno took the kick and was stopped on his 42. With the aid of a 15 yard penalty against the Horns, the Buffs moved the ball to the Bronte 28 for a 1st, and on to the 20 as the 3rd quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

Hagen went to the 18 for another 1st and Bomley carried twice for another 1st on the 8. Williams made 3, Bomley added 2 and it was 4th and goal on the 2. Bomley was called on for the final effort and he made the only Forsan counter of the night. PAT try failed and the score was 28-6.

Martinez was downed on the 25 after the kickoff. Arrott had a big 15 yard gainer for a 1st on the 40. Graves made 4 and Arrott went to the Buff 49 for another 1st. The next series bogged down at the 42 and Arrott's punt went straight toward the goal line flag. Lawhon outran the ball and killed it on the 1 yard line.

On the first play, Forsan fumbled in the end zone and Graves rushed in to claim the ball and make 6 points for the locals. A pass try for extras was no good. Score: 34-6.

The Buffs made a 1st down after receiving the kickoff but couldn't go on the second series of downs. A punt gave the ball to the Horns and they had two plays before the clock ran out. Final score: 34-6.

"As it looks from here"

Washington — If much of our foreign aid is not already wholly ridiculous and asinine, it has been made worse by recent action of the House of Representatives.

The Foreign Aid Authorization Bill, passed by the House and now before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, contains a section which prohibits military assistance to Greece because the country is run by a military junta considered to be a repressive dictatorship by the "liberals."

At the end of World War II and for several years thereafter, Greece was in a civil war. At least it was called that but it was obvious that it was not all Greek fighting Greek. The 300 mile northern border of Greece joins communist Albania, Yugoslavia and Bulgaria. Elements of these countries joined the Greek communists to bring that nation behind the Iron Curtain with them.

With military aid from the U. S., the non-communists of Greece were able to stand and today it is the only Balkan nation outside the Iron Curtain.

If this personal reference may be pardoned, some 23 years ago, from a front line vantage point, I saw Greeks loyal to their country defending it. Finally a stable government was established and they have been our friends through turbulent times since.

Greece is a strategic imperative in the Mediterranean. She is the anchor of NATO. While flanked by two other NATO nations, Turkey and Italy, these latter show an instability which, to say the least, is not encouraging. The ports of Greece are really the only places in the Eastern Mediterranean where our 6th Fleet can go without resentment. Recent entry by our ships into the ports of Turkey set off riots, protest bombings and crippling strikes.

Look at a map of the southern rim of the Mediterranean and our relations with those countries it touches. Except for Turkey, once a bastion on NATO's south flank, Israel, Tunisia and Morocco, there is hostility towards the United States. Even the Island of Malta, only about 60 miles below Sicily, athwart the narrow channel along the north coast of Africa, is now taking anti-NATO actions and showing strong sentiment for Soviet Russia. For 150 years Malta was a key power point for the British but like England's other diminished positions, it slipped away. A Malta oriented to the U. S. S. The same voices of condemnation of Greece are not directed against the dictatorships of Yugoslavia, the Red juntas in Algeria, Syria, Libya and others—not Red China or the Soviet Union. Strange.

Yet the House of Representatives says that no military aid should go to Greece unless the President finds it is required for America's national security. To place this onus on the President or to extend this authority, is yielding to political escape.

Washington — If much of our foreign aid is not already wholly ridiculous and asinine, it has been made worse by recent action of the House of Representatives.

The Foreign Aid Authorization Bill, passed by the House and now before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, contains a section which prohibits military assistance to Greece because the country is run by a military junta considered to be a repressive dictatorship by the "liberals."

At the end of World War II and for several years thereafter, Greece was in a civil war. At least it was called that but it was obvious that it was not all Greek fighting Greek. The 300 mile northern border of Greece joins communist Albania, Yugoslavia and Bulgaria. Elements of these countries joined the Greek communists to bring that nation behind the Iron Curtain with them.

With military aid from the U. S., the non-communists of Greece were able to stand and today it is the only Balkan nation outside the Iron Curtain.

If this personal reference may be pardoned, some 23 years ago, from a front line vantage point, I saw Greeks loyal to their country defending it. Finally a stable government was established and they have been our friends through turbulent times since.

Greece is a strategic imperative in the Mediterranean. She is the anchor of NATO. While flanked by two other NATO nations, Turkey and Italy, these latter show an instability which, to say the least, is not encouraging. The ports of Greece are really the only places in the Eastern Mediterranean where our 6th Fleet can go without resentment. Recent entry by our ships into the ports of Turkey set off riots, protest bombings and crippling strikes.

Look at a map of the southern rim of the Mediterranean and our relations with those countries it touches. Except for Turkey, once a bastion on NATO's south flank, Israel, Tunisia and Morocco, there is hostility towards the United States. Even the Island of Malta, only about 60 miles below Sicily, athwart the narrow channel along the north coast of Africa, is now taking anti-NATO actions and showing strong sentiment for Soviet Russia. For 150 years Malta was a key power point for the British but like England's other diminished positions, it slipped away. A Malta oriented to the U. S. S. R. would result in the ability of the Soviets to control the crossroads of the Mediterranean as the British had historically done.

S. B. No. 249

AN ACT

relating to the recording and re-recording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in re-registering brands shall comply with Articles 6890 through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484, 1485, and 1486 of the Penal Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this

legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

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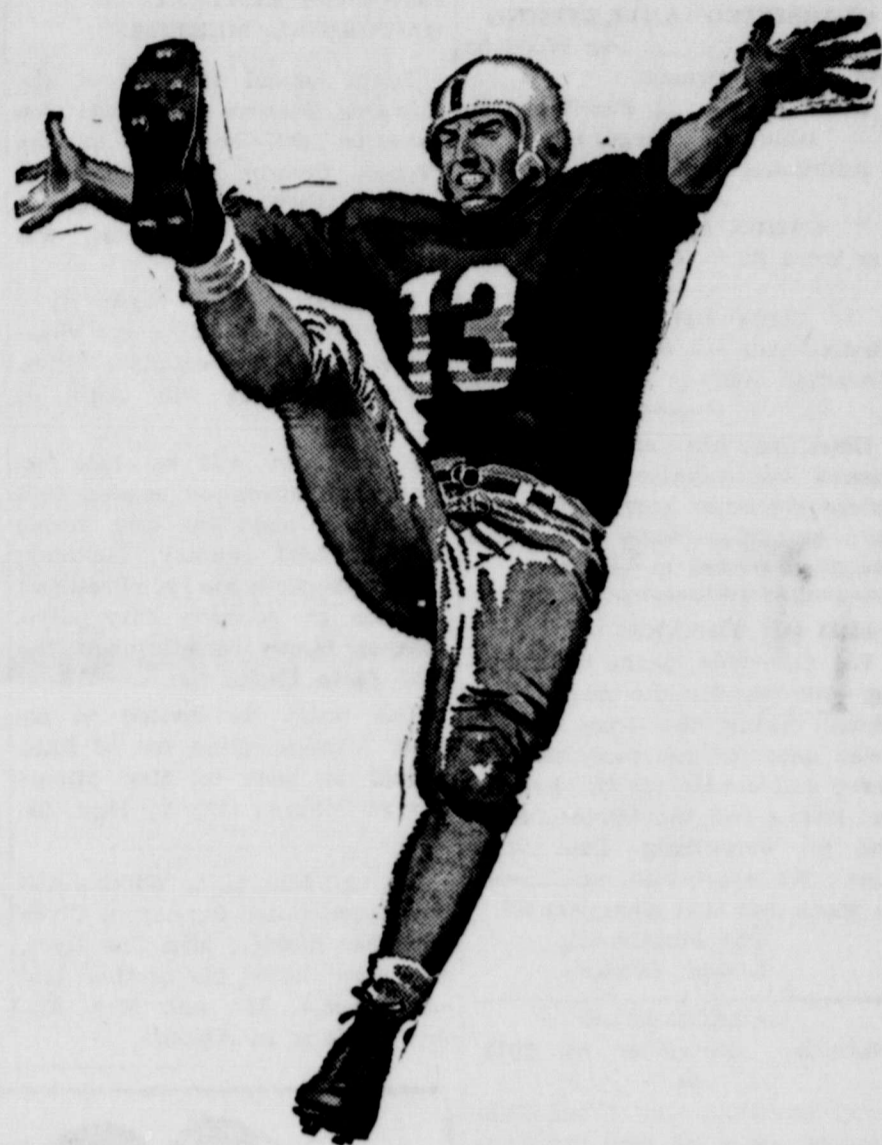
