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Steers Down Longhorns In Annual Battle, 28-0

The Bronte Longhorns looked good the first half of their annual battle last Friday night with Robert Lee. However, the more experienced and heavier Steer team came through in the second half to overpower the Horns, 28-0. The spunky lads held their visitors to six points during the first two periods of the game.

First Quarter

Bobby Skelton kicked off to Bill Rowoldt to start the contest. He was downed on his 46. After three tries, the Steers had to punt. Bobby Mumford's kick went to Bronte's 15. Kim Barrett made 2, then a fumble lost 5 yards, and Mike Arrott ran for 9. A punt was in order, so Arrott booted it to Rowoldt on the Steer 43. The Longhorns held on the next series and Mumford kicked on a 4th and 7 to the Bronte 21.

Robert Lee was penalized 5, Skelton made 3 and Barrett went for the first 1st down of the ball game on his 33. The Horns drew two 5 yard fines before they got off a play and were faced with a 1st and 20. Quarterback Alan Barbee decided a pass was needed to get out of the hole, so he unleashed one. It was all for naught, as Johnny Wolfe intercepted for the Steers and ran to the 20 yard line.

Robert Lee's efforts were wiped out after a couple of plays when a fumble was recovered for the Horns on the 12 by Louis Martinez. Barbee kept for a big 10 and Arrott took the ball to the 23 for the 1st down. Arrott picked up 5 and the Steers were penalized 5; then Barrett went for the 1st down on the Bronte 37. After a couple of short gains, Skelton took the ball on a reverse and went more than 20 yards to the Robert Lee 41. However, the ball was brought back and Bronte was given a 15 yard clipping penalty, making it 3rd and 16. Barrett was able to make 5 on 3rd down as the first quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Arrott punted the ball to Wolfe who ran to the Bronte 45. From there the Steers started on their first good march of the game. They made 1st downs on the Bronte 34 and 21. The Horns defense tightened on the next series and, faced with a 4th and 11, Rudy Abalos tried a field goal, but it was no good, and the Horns took over on the 20.

Skelton went 11 yards for a 1st on the 31 but the Horns couldn't go any further, so Arrott quick kicked a 45 yarder which was killed on the Robert Lee 20 by Gary Skelton. The Steers moved the ball to the Bronte 34 before they bogged down and the Horns took over. Once again the local lads had

hard luck as Rowoldt intercepted another pass and ran it to the Bronte 20.

Mumford carried twice for 11 yards to make it 1st and goal at the 9. Percifull made 3, then carried again for 6 and the TD. Extra point try failed and the score was 6-0.

Arrott took Doug Herford's kickoff and got a big gainer on his return to the Steer 46. Skelton caught a pass from Barbee for 7 yards as the half ended.

Third Quarter

Barrett took the kickoff and was tackled on his 38. After a couple of unsuccesses, Arrott quick kicked to the Steer 38. The Steers went straight to work, and moved the ball steadily until they had a 1st on the Bronte 10. Abalos drove for 3 and Mumford picked up the needed 7 for the counter. Abalos kicked the EP. Score: 13-0.

Arrott was downed on his 31 after the kickoff. A long pass was missed but interference was called on the Steers. Next play gave the ball back to the Steers when Wolfe intercepted and ran

to the Bronte 46. Bronte drew a 15 yard penalty on face mask violation and the Steers had a 1st on the Bronte 30. A reverse play gave the ball to Abalos who went the entire distance. Abalos caught a pass for 2 more, making the scoreboard read 21-0.

Skelton took the kickoff and with the help of a penalty Bronte had the ball on their own 49. Barbee kept for 4 but a penalty next play wiped it out. Barrett made 3 on two plays, bringing up 4th and 8. Arrott's punt gave the ball to the Steers on their 27. After a couple of plays, Lynn Lawhon intercepted a pass on the Bronte 48.

Barrett made 7 and Jerry Graves picked up the 1st on the Steer 42. The going got sticky on the next series and Arrott's aim was perfect as he kicked the ball out of bounds on the 3 yard line. Percifull went for 8 yards to end the third quarter.

Fourth Quarter

Mumford and Percifull took turns as they carried the ball for long yardage, down to the Bronte 34. It was from there that

Rowoldt turned loose a fine pass to Randy Flanagan who went the entire distance without being touched. Herford kicked the EP. Score: 28-0.

Barrett took the kickoff to the 38. Skelton made a 1st at the 50, and then Bronte lost the ball on a fumble. The Steers moved down to the Bronte 10 where a fumble was recovered by Tony Mackey, putting the ball on the

12. Skelton went for a 1st and a personal foul against Robert Lee placed the ball on the 34. Robert Lee recovered a fumble on the 36. On this final series of downs, with a 3rd and 11, Abalos skirted left end and almost made another counter for the Steers. He was forced out of bounds about the 1 yard line. Final score was 28-0.

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AN ACT**

relating to the recording and re-recording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six

months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in re-registering brands shall comply with Articles 6890 through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484, 1485, and 1486 of the Penal Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this legislation and the crowded con-

dition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

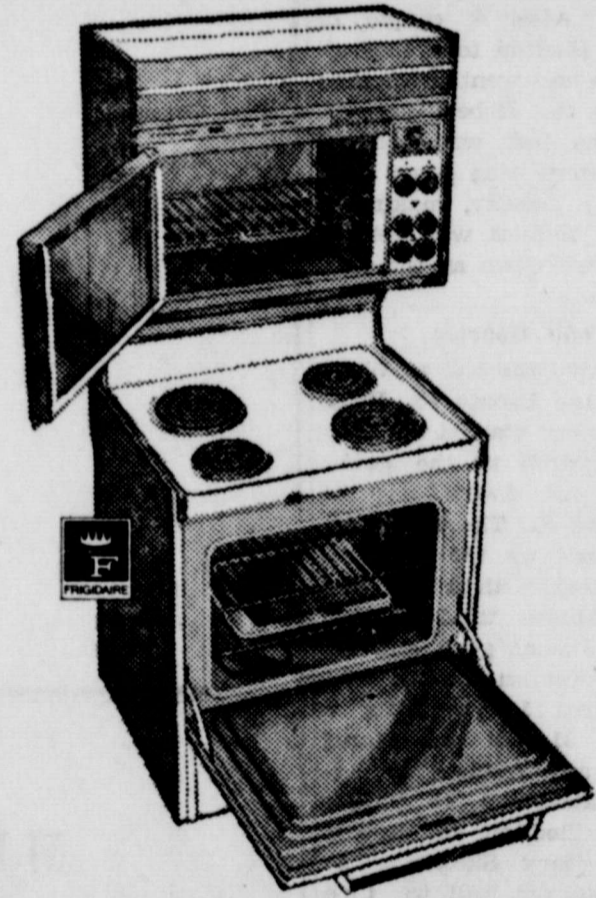

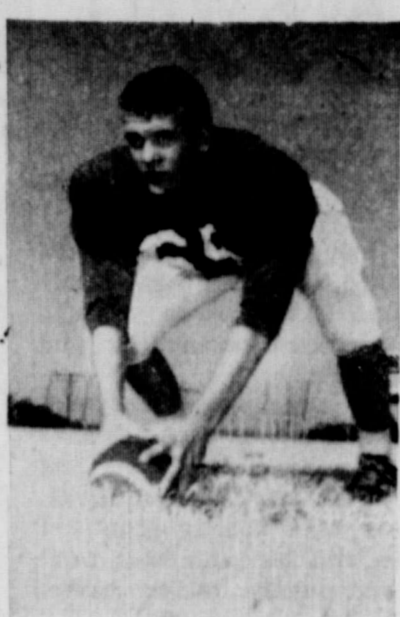

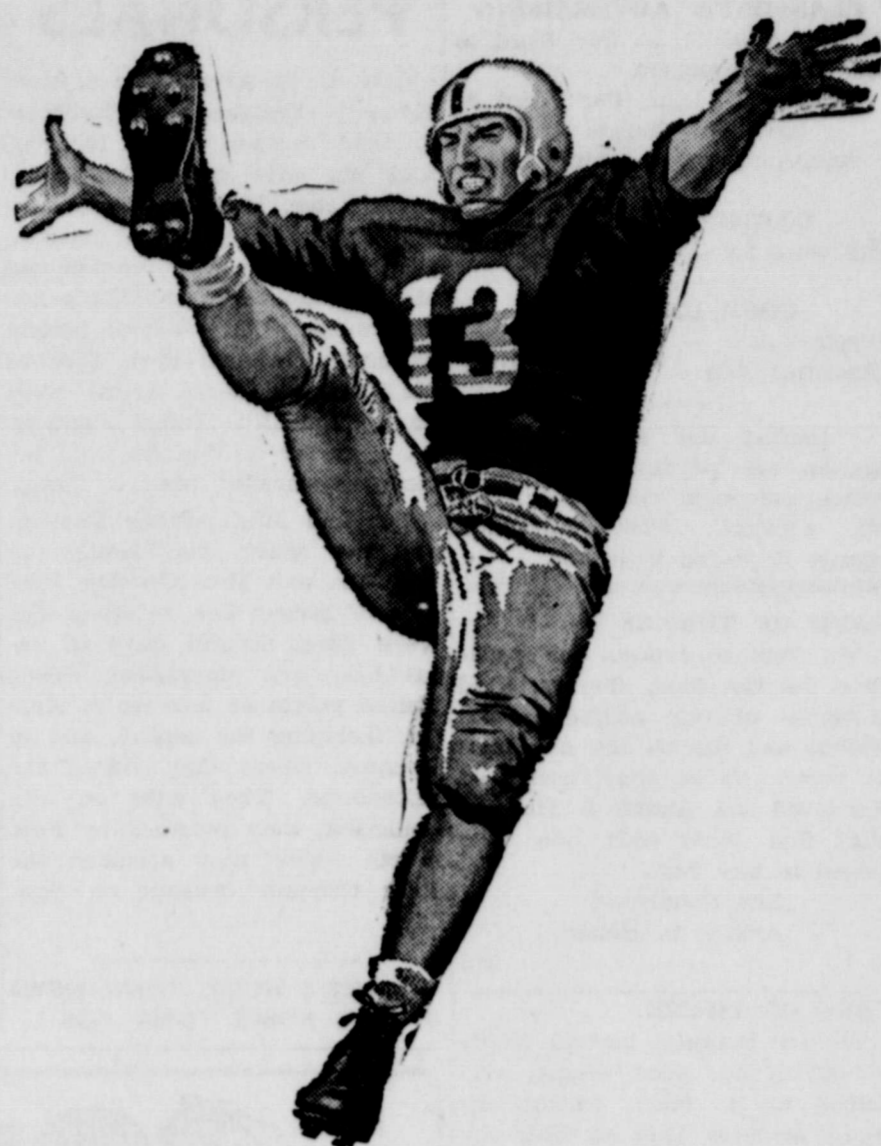
