Thomas D. Humphrey Oil Properties, Ltd., Dallas, will drill a 6,000 foot wildcat in southeast Coke County, four miles southwest of Tennyson and 3 1/2 miles east and slightly south of the one-well Schuch (Caddo) Field. It is the No. 1 J. P. Arrott.

Location is 2,080 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 19-EL&RR, Abst. 143.

It is 1/2 mile south of Great Western Drilling Co. No. 1 Arrott, a 5,800 foot failure abandoned Aug. 24; and 3/4 mile east-southeast of Champion & Gregory No. 1 Arrott, a 5,607 foot wildcat re-entry, abandoned on June 5, 1970.

Bank deposits at First National Bank in Bronte continued to increase this past quarter, according to the bank call at the end of September. A tremendous gain also has been registered over figures released at a call nearly a year ago, on Oct. 28, 1970.

The bank had \$3,508,061.51 on deposit Sept. 30, as compared to

\$3,241,807.97 on June 30, an increase of about \$266,254. The latest figure is \$426,159.27 above the \$3,071,902.24 on deposit a year ago.

Liabilities were down slightly with \$1,404,172.57 out Sept. 30, compared to \$1,615,948.29 on June 30 and \$1,433,804.86 on Oct. 28, 1970.

Capital accounts of the Bronte Sept. 30, up from \$516,500 at the bank climbed to \$526,234.09 on end of June and up from \$490,897.23 last October.

Total assets of the bank on Sept. 30 amounted to \$4,034,295.69, compared to \$3,758,307.97 on June 30, an increase of \$285,987.63. When compared to the total on Oct. 28, 1970, of \$3,562,799.47, an increase of \$471,496.13 is indicated a jump approaching the half million dollar mark.

Longhorns Scalp Lake View JV

The Bronte Longhorns blasted the Lake View Junior Varsity Little Chiefs, 26-7, in a contest held here last Thursday night. The Bronte lads didn't waste any time getting on the scoreboard after receiving the opening kickoff. On second play from scrimmage Quarterback Alan Barbee pitched out to Bobby Skelton who ran behind some key blocks for 57 yards and a TD. Lake View scored in the second quarter after blocking a Bronte punt and taking the ball on the 3 yard line. The second Bronte counter came early in the 4th quarter when Barbee pitched to B. Skelton who then passed to Jim Dan Raughton who went over the goal line. The third counter came on a fine run by Mike Arrott who broke several tackles to cover 29 yards and make 6 points. Arrott also made the final TD when he went over the right side from the 2 yard line.

First Quarter

Billy Blasingame kicked off to start the game, with Gary Skelton taking it to the 43. Arrott went for 5, then Bronte was penalized 5. With 2nd and 10, Barbee pitched to B. Skelton who brought the crowd to their feet as he sped for a 57 yard touchdown run. EP kick was wide and the score was 6-0.

Lake View couldn't move the ball after the kickoff and got off a short punt which gave the Horns the ball on their 45. They couldn't go either, so Arrott punted into the end zone. After 3 tries the Little Chiefs punted, with the ball going straight up and coming down on the LV 34. Arrott picked up good yardage but a penalty nullified the gain. Next play saw Gary Gilbert pick off a pass for the Chiefs on his 18. Three tries and then a punt gave the ball to the Horns on their 47. Kim Barrett and Skelton went for a 1st on the LV 41 and Arrott moved 8 on the next series to make it 4th and 2 as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Lake View drew a 15 yard penalty between quarters and Bronte had a 1st and 10 on the 17. Short gains and a penalty brought up 4th and 9 and an incomplete pass gave the ball to Lake View on the 15.

The Horns drove the Chiefs back to the 10 and they punted out on their 30 yard line. On 1st down Jimmy Ynostrosa recovered a Bronte fumble on his 34 yard line. Danny Carper hit Larry Balkum hard on a pass attempt and he fumbled but Lake View recovered. Bronte was penalized 15 and the visitors had a 1st on their 45. The Chiefs moved the ball on a long run by Don Hall to the Bronte 29. However, the Bronte defense tightened up and the ball went over on the 23. The Horns couldn't make their 1st and the punt was blocked with Lake View taking over on the 3. Balkum kept on the 1st down and went in for the score. Blasingame's kick was good and the Little Chiefs led 7-6.

Lawton took the kickoff and was tripped on his 35. The Horns ran their series and Lake View got off 3 plays before the clock ran out. Score: 7-6.

Third Quarter

Skelton kicked to Hall to start the 2nd half. He was downed on the 20. Gilbert carried 3 times but it was short of 10 yards and the punt carried the ball to the Bronte 40. The Horns got a good drive going with Barrett, Skelton, Arrott and Barbee carrying.

They made 1st downs on the LV 46, the 31 and the 20. The visitors were hitting hard and jarred the ball loose and recovered at the 6 yard line to stop the drive.

Lake View moved to the 20 for a 1st but that was about it and the punt went to Arrott who was stopped on LV's 40. The locals moved the ball to the 29 yard line before a pass interception gave it to the Chiefs. A couple of plays ended the third quarter.

Fourth Quarter

One play and the LV bunch had to punt. It went to the Bronte 27 yard line. A penalty moved the ball out to the 38. It was from there that B. Skelton got loose and went up the sideline all the way to the goal line. However, officials ruled that he stepped out on the Lake View 24. Barrett made 5 and Skelton went for 2 more. On 4th down, Barbee pitched to Skelton who tossed a pass to Raughton for a big score. On the conversion try Skelton was set to kick but things went awry. Skelton picked up the ball and ran it over for 2 points. Score: 14-7.

The Lake View lads were unable to make much gain after the kickoff, so the punt gave the ball to Bronte on their 48. Arrott made 2 and Barrett broke some tackles and went 11 for the 1st on the 39. Skelton made 10 for a 1st on the 29. That spot apparently was what Arrott needed, for he wound his way through the defense for a touchdown. PAT failed and the score was 20-7.

After taking the kickoff to the 40, the Chiefs tried 3 passes and the last one was intercepted by B. Skelton who was tackled on the LV 31. The Horns drew a penalty on the next series and couldn't make up for it, so Lake View took over on their 25. After 2 plays, they threw a pass and Barbee intercepted for the Horns and made a nice run to the 30. A penalty moved it on to the 15. B. Skelton made 9 and Barrett added 4 to move the ball for a 1st at the 2 yard line. On first try Arrott went over the right side for the counter. EP try failed and the score was 26-7.

The Horns kicked off, the Chiefs ran a series of downs, and the Horns controlled the ball the remaining minute or so left on the clock. Final score: 26-7.

A newcomer to Robert Lee is Miss Diane Durrett, Extension Assistant, who is training under the supervision of Mrs. Fay C. Roe and Sterling Lindsey, Coke County Extension Agents. Screwworm Case Found in County

Coke County has sustained a confirmed case of screwworms, its first in approximately two years. A sample submitted by Donald Mauldin, taken from a baby calf on his place south of Robert Lee, was confirmed as being screwworms.

All Coke County operators are encouraged to be on the lookout for possible worm cases, said County Agent Sterling Lindsey, and to take precautionary steps to prevent a screwworm outbreak.

The recent weather conditions have produced growth conditions favorable to screwworms. Also, confirmation of this case was delayed several days. Regular checks on all livestock could help prevent additional cases showing up in our area, Lindsey said.

The county agent said he would like to mention one other possibility. Conditions for small grain grazing this fall looks very good. These same conditions make the possibility of a fall army worm outbreak very possible. Everyone needs to be on guard for the insect.

"Normally one of the first signs if you do not see the worm," Lindsey said, "is a pale and/or yellowish to brown spot will show up in the pasture or field. If the worms are thick enough, they will cut off the leaves, leaving the stalk or stem usually. A heavy outbreak can reduce the grazing capacity considerably." Lindsey added: "Should you need to spray a small grain field, sevin, methyl parathion, parathion and toxaphene are the insecticides recommended to be used. Be sure to follow the controls and directions listed on the insecticide label."

Ranchers Attend Menard Field Day

A Brush Control and Range Improvement Research Annual Field Day was attended last Thursday by three Coke County ranchers, Weldon Fikes, C. E. Arrott and L. B. Menielle. Also attending was Rex Brand of the Soil Conservation Service. The tour was conducted on the Gene Whitehead ranch at Menard.

The field day was sponsored jointly by Texas A&M University, Texas Brush Control and Range Improvement Association, Soil Conservation Service, Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Texas Society of Range Improvement and private industry, in cooperation with the Whitehead ranch.

Many different types of brush control and range seeding research were observed. Latest information was received on control of mesquite, shinnery oak, live oak, latebush, juniper, algerita, Texas persimmon and other undesirable shrubs and plants. Different techniques for range seeding were also noted. Methods of chemical control were discussed, including evaluation of promising experimental chemicals, and new techniques for aerial application. Benefits of brush control, including livestock gains, ease of handling, forage production and wildlife behavior were discussed.

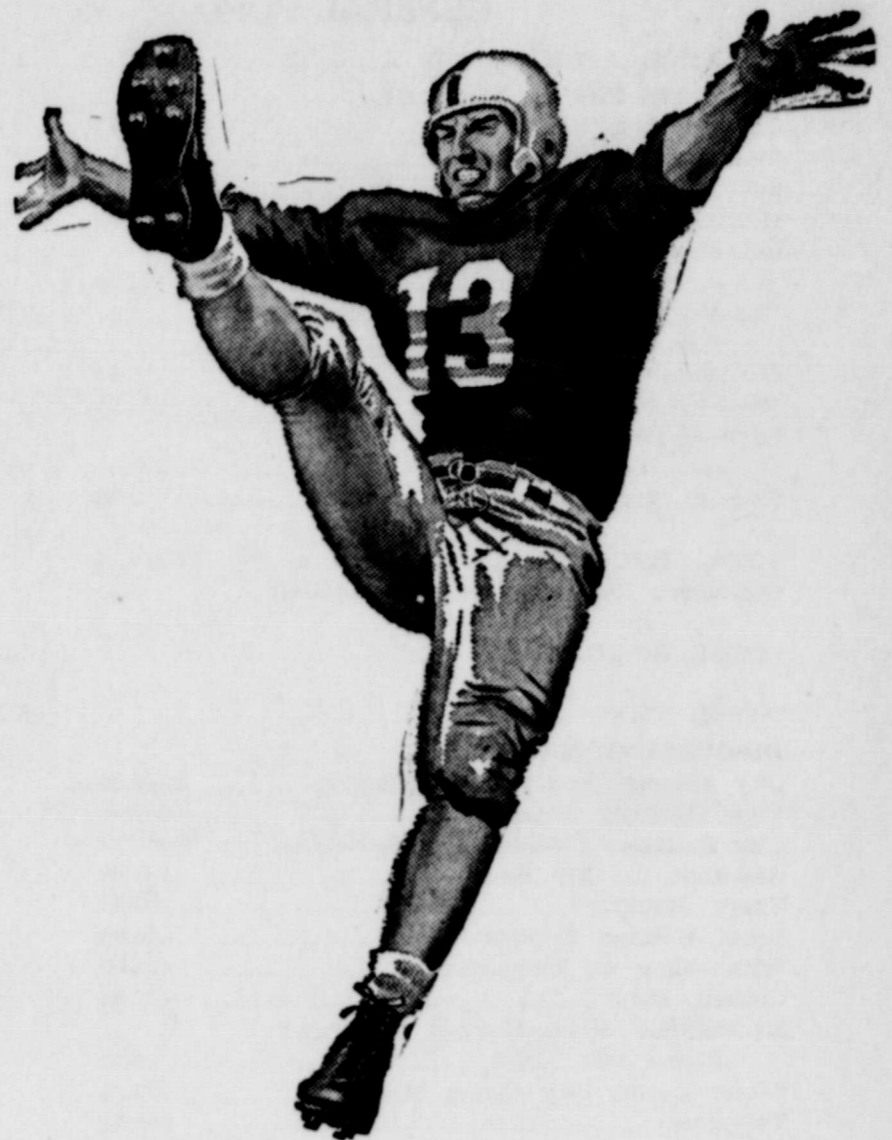
