Coke will be in the state's 25th Senatorial District. The newlydefined district, represented by W. E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland, will not officially take effect until Jan. 1, 1973. Coke County is currently in the 24th Senatorial District, represented by Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford.


