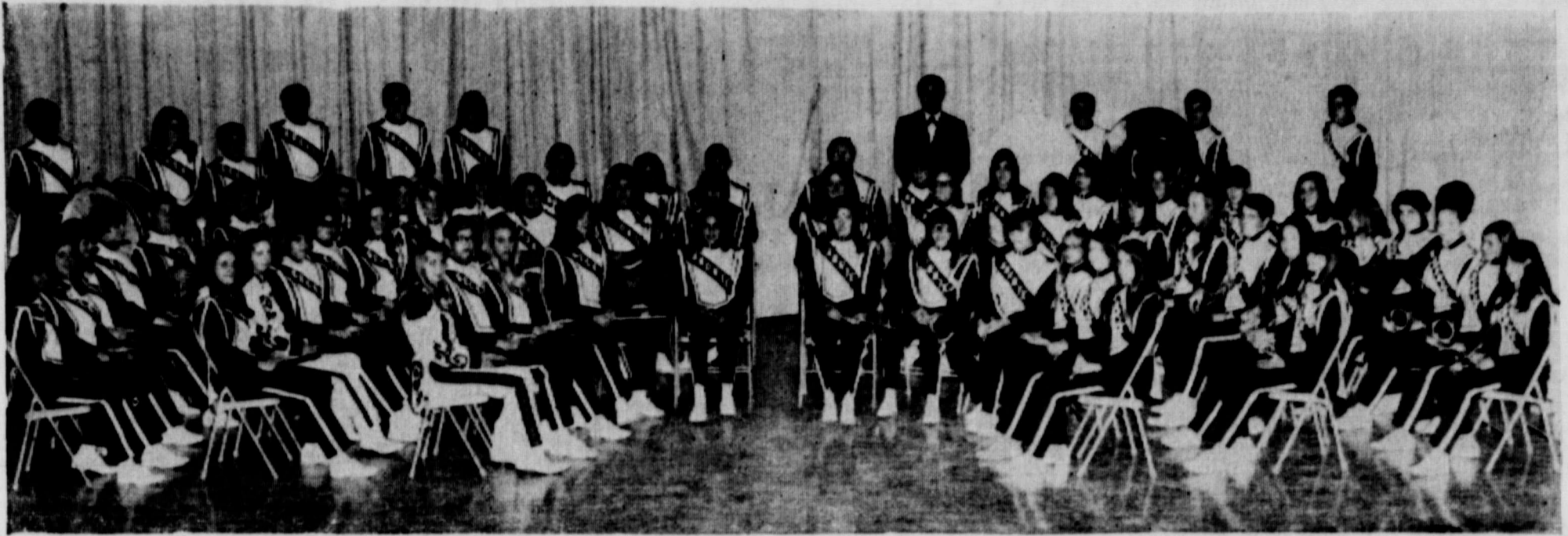

## 'Victory Dollars' To Be Given Out

A brand new Eisenhower silver dollar will be given to each student attending this afternoon's pep rally at Bronte School. This announcement was made by E. F. Glenn, president of First National Bank, donors of the dollars. Glenn said the bank had received a special shipment of the dollars this week, that they will be collectors' items and the bank will not receive any more of the silver dollars very soon.

The pep rally will precede tonight's game with the No. 1 rated Wall Hawks, and today the silver dollars will be designated as "Victory Dollars." They will be given away at the conclusion of the pep rally.

Supt. C. B. Barbee, when contacted by The Enterprise, said, "We deem it a privilege to serve

in a community where any organization, including First National Bank, is willing to share with our students such a historical event as the issuance of the Eisenhower silver dollars. The school is deeply appreciative of the bank's gesture."

A limited number of the dollars were coined in commemoration of the former President and World War II five star general, Dwight D. Eisenhower.

### SHORTHORNS PLAY LAST GAME OF SEASON

Bronte Shorthorns were scheduled to play Lawn Thursday night on the local field. It was their last game of the season. The Shorthorns were downed by the Dogies of Robert Lee, 21-0, last Thursday night.

Tonight's the big one for the Bronte Longhorns when they meet the Wall Hawks, the No. 1 rated Class B team in the state. After being idle last Friday night, the Horns have been working hard all this week with their coaches to prepare for tonight's game.

In district play the Longhorns and Wall are tied for the lead with 1-0 records, but in season play Wall has the edge with a record of 7-0 to Bronte's 5-2.

But it will be Homecoming night for Bronte, and spirit has been high this week among students at the local school and among fans. Many persons feel the Longhorns can "pull it off." Students have painted signs all over town this week in a display of school spirit.

Harris Schoolboy ratings show Wall has a 19.8 edge, with the Hawks rated 98.7, and Bronte 78.9.

Other district action tonight has Hawley at Jim Ned. Wall defeated Hawley 21-0 last Friday night. Comparatively, Bronte beat Haw-

ley 18-0 on the Friday night before.

Bronte's Bobby Skelton is second in district scoring with 44 points; Mike Arrott is third with 36. Wall's Holik leads with 68.

## Service Held Thursday for Osmo Black, Area Rancher and Drowning Victim

Funeral services for Osmo Black, 55, were conducted at 3 p.m. Thursday in First United Methodist Church here with the pastor, the Rev. Fred Brown, officiating. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Mr. Black was found drowned in a stock tank on his ranch east of Bronte Tuesday night. His body was recovered about 10:30 p.m. after it had been discovered 45 minutes before by Marvin Landers and Jesse Parker. The tank was newly constructed and about 20 feet deep.

Mrs. Black became alarmed when he did not return home at the usual time and called the local men for assistance. Jimmy Ed Mackey and Royce Fancher also aided in the search. Justice of the Peace Cecil Kemp was also called to the scene, as was an

ambulance with George Newby and his assistant, Joseph W. Yates, pastor of Pecan Baptist Church near Robert Lee.

Mr. Black was born June 8, 1916, in Runnels County and was a graduate of Bronte High School. He had lived in the Marie community all of his life and ranched in Runnels and Coke Counties.

He attended Howard Payne College in Brownwood and married Kathleen Stanley on Sept. 5, 1940, in Brownwood.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Mickey Black of Pampa; a granddaughter of Pampa; and one sister, Mrs. Frank Flynt of Ballinger.

## Coke County Put In Snelson's 25th Senatorial District

As a result of the recent redistricting of the Texas Senate, Coke County finds itself placed in a new district.

Coke will be in the state's 25th Senatorial District. The newly-defined district, represented by W. E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland, will not officially take effect until Jan. 1, 1973. Coke County is currently in the 24th Senatorial District, represented by Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford.

The 25th Senatorial District will have 35 counties, covering some 60,000 square miles, and will be the largest senatorial district in

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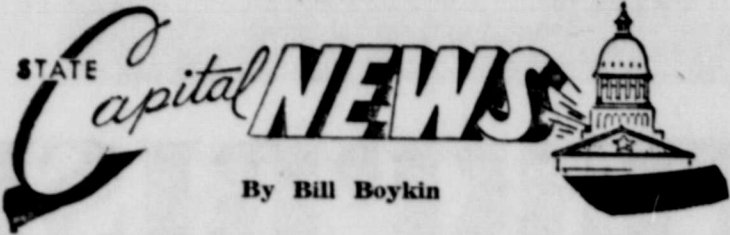

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Austin — The Texas Highway Commission remains convinced its new \$20 million state headquarters building should be located near the capitol and the governor's mansion.

A re-evaluation study of the controversial site, ordered by the Legislature was delivered last week to Gov. Preston Smith.

Legislators suggested the site southwest of the capitol and across the street from the governor's mansion should be developed as a park, parking lot and tourist information center. They recommended moving the new highway building far from the downtown Austin area.

The Commission, on review of its plans, concluded the massive building, rising to 10 stories at its tallest point, would "enhance the beauty and interest of the capitol complex."

At least, observed the report, the structure will be the most attractive thing ever located on the barren block, now given over largely to a parking lot and the remains of old buildings.

The historic Lundberg Bakery still on the site will be preserved, incorporated into the new building and used as a tourist center and Texana museum for artifacts uncovered in excavation. The temporary state capitol once stood on the block.

North and east portions of the highway building are planned at two story level to maintain scale with the governor's mansion and preserve the view of the capitol from there. Maximum height of 10 stories will be reached at the south edge of the block. Architects plan a public plaza with pools, greenery and shaded walkways along 11th St. nearest the capitol. Landscaping will comprise about 50 per cent of the block if plans are finally approved. The building will be by far the largest of many new state structures in the capitol area.

**BUSINESS GEARS FOR POLITICAL YEAR** — Organized labor announced its political priorities three weeks ago, and last week in Houston business leaders in Texas looked at their "public affairs" programs for 1972.

At the 49th annual Conference of Texas Industry by the Texas Manufacturers Association, representatives of the business community heard: Sen. John Tower ask for labor law reform.

Richard Armstrong, Washington, D. C., challenge businesses to develop public affairs departments.

Irving Shapiro, vice president, E. I. duPont de Nemours & Co., ask business to work with labor to develop new national objectives — with everybody sharing the gains.

TMA also passed resolutions asking state legislators to require 10 year budget projections for all "new" state programs approved by the next legislature.

Senator Tower laid the blame on the nation's existing economic ills on "existing labor laws that are in dire need to reform."

Both Tower and TMA leaders spoke out in opposition of laws which permit strikers to receive food stamps and other state and federal aid programs while on strike.

"Labor unions should be placed under existing anti-trust laws," Tower added, and pointed out that he had sponsored legislation to establish a Commission on Labor Law Reform.

**NEW SPEAKER CANDIDATE URGED** — More than 30 legislators last week picked Rep. Jim Nugent of Kerrville as their choice for House speaker.

Most of the group were previously aligned closely with Speaker Gus Mutscher who now says he may not even be a candidate for re-election to the House. (Mutscher, under bribery indict-

ment, says he has three options: running for re-election and a third term as speaker, seeking another term in the House but not the speakership and retiring.)

Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine says the lawmakers, meeting in San Antonio, were mainly trying to stop his own drive for speaker. Price claims 70 pledges of support in the 150 member House, and adds the Nugent endorsement means nothing to his candidacy. Opponents maintain Price has no more than 42 firm supporters.

Nugent finished first in the straw voting at San Antonio over (in order) Reps. Dean Cobb of Dumas, John Traeger of Seguin, James Slider of Naples, David Finney of Fort Worth and Joe Salem of Corpus Christi. Traeger, Slider and Salem indicated they will go along with Nugent, 48, who will reveal soon whether he will actually make a race.

**REDISTRICTING CHALLENGED** — An unexpected lawsuit in Dallas federal district court challenged constitutionality of the congressional reapportionment by the Legislature this year.

Another suit has been promised attacking state House of Representatives redistricting.

The Dallas class action lawsuit maintains the new congressional district lineup does not meet federal requirements that 24 congressional districts be "compact, contiguous and as nearly equal in population as practicable."

Plaintiffs offered the court a plan of their own, which they said would create districts which vary only .1 per cent in population.

**COURTS SPEAK** — State Supreme Court upheld lower court decisions barring Sun Oil Co. from using fresh water from the Ogallala formation beneath a Hockley County farmer's land for injections to build pressure in company oil wells.

High Court set a Dec. 15 hearing on whether private non-profit water supply corporations must pay school taxes.

State laws banning LSD sale or possession were upheld by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

**Short Snorts**  
Texas Public Employees Association will seek a 10.2 per cent pay raise for state workers in a special legislative session next year.

The sixth annual governor's conference on tourist development is scheduled for the Inn of the Six Flags at Arlington, Nov. 10-11.

Texas' state governmental planning efforts won a national merit award at the American Institute of Planners conference in San Francisco.

Supreme Court memorial services were held last week for the late former Associate Justice Clyde E. Smith of Woodville who died this year at age 73.

Railroad Commission will hold a Nov. 22 hearing to determine whether Dillard Creek is being polluted by brine from Trinity oil field in Houston County.

The Texas Public Welfare Board was informed by budget experts that a welfare reform bill approved by the U. S. House of Representatives would add 750,000 more to aid rolls, raise the cost \$153.4 million, and impose \$170.9 million in medical aid costs.

Ed Grisham, formerly of Olney, was named director of the the governor's office division of planning coordination, succeeding Dan S. Petty who became Governor Smith's top assistant.

## Distinguished Award for Coke

Kudos for an outstanding local history preservation program were recently bestowed upon the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, headed by Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough of Robert Lee.

At the Oct. 29-30 annual meeting of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee in Del Rio, 35 county survey committees received the Distinguished Service Award for organizing progressive and well rounded local history programs during the past year. Mrs. Yarbrough and Mrs. Ruth Clift of Robert Lee attended the meeting.

Among the rigorous requirements for the Distinguished Service Award are that the local survey committee (1) sponsor at least four official historical markers or spend \$600 for markers during the year, (2) present at least six talks on local history to other civic groups, (3) conduct at least three historical tours in the county, (4) publish a pamphlet, brochure, etc., showing sites of local historical interest, (5) sponsor at least one annual history appreciation observance, (6) secure at least \$100 in investments in the Texas Historical Foundation (private affiliate of the Survey Committee), and (7) publish a county committee newsletter at least quarterly.

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McNeill ran for three touchdowns in the third period. Joe Tubb added another TD on a 25 yard pass, and Watts kicked two conversions.

Final TD's for Blackwell came on a 44 yard pass play caught by Don Boyd, and another pass caught by Watts and netting 15 yards.

Blackwell was ahead 20-6 at the end of the first quarter and 28-12 going into the halftime.

### McCaulley Here Tonight

McCaulley comes to Blackwell tonight for another district encounter. They stand fourth in district ratings with a 2-2 district record and a 3-4 season record. The McCaulley team lost to Highland last week, 44-4. The Hornets' season record is the same 3-4.

In other action last week Trent downed Hermleigh, 60-18, and Ira tromped Hobbs, 35-14.

This week's schedule includes Trent at Fluvanna; Hermleigh at Hobbs; and Highland at Ira.

Highland continues to lead in district play with a 5-0 district record and an 8-0 season record.

## Engineer Hired To Study Paving

Harvey W. Schmidt, independent engineer of Amarillo, was hired Monday to do the preliminary work to determine a cost estimate on the proposed sealcoating and other work needed on county maintained paved streets and roads. He is expected to go to work in the near future on a per diem basis.

County commissioners have been receiving petitions and other indications of interest from Coke County citizens asking that the study be made.

Indications are that after Schmidt makes the estimate of the cost to do the work, the commissioners' court will call a bond election, if there is sufficient public support to give it a good chance of carrying. The commissioners have reported all along that a bond issue would be the only feasible way to finance the project, which would include many miles of paving in Robert Lee, Bronte and rural areas.

### SUNDAY LAST DAY IN CBC ROUNDUP

Sunday, Nov. 7, will be the last Sunday in the roundup of members at Central Baptist Church. Rev. Pete Patterson said that average attendance in Sunday School during October was 81, a substantial gain. He said, "We will have a recap Sunday of the roundup and give the Lord the praise for what has been done."

## FB Gives Program On Safe Driving

Safe driving must be made a personal habit of every motorist if the slaughter on America's highways is to be curbed, Ben Bullard, assistant safety director, Texas Farm Bureau, declared Tuesday as he spoke prior to conducting driving tests at Bronte High School.

"Excessive speed is the greatest single cause of automobile accidents," Bullard aid. In the demonstration which followed, he pointed out the conditions under which even 20, 30 or 40 miles per hour can be excessive.

A film on traffic safety was shown to the students, teachers and guests.

Students and teachers took part in the tests which were conducted in a specially equipped car. The test driver was signalled to stop by an electrically controlled detonator. As the shell was fired, the street was marked with yellow paint. A second bullet was fired as brakes were applied and a third after the car came to a complete stop. Distances between the spots were carefully measured to determine in feet and inches how far the car traveled before the driver applied the brakes, or the reaction distance, and how far it traveled after the brakes were applied, or the braking distance.

Bullard emphasized the fact that a driver who observes the speed laws carefully is not a safe driver if he neglects many other items such as proper signalling for turns, approaching an intersection in the proper lane for a turn, the proper way to turn around, and many other things which are essential for safe driving.

The safety demonstration which was brought to Bronte under the sponsorship of the Coke County Farm Bureau is part of a long range program of traffic safety conducted since 1957 by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department.

Taking part in the special traffic safety program were Bobby Skelton and Susan Arrott, each driving the specially equipped car at 20 mph; Wayne King, driving 30 mph; and Highway Patrolman Bobby Hart, driving 40 mph.

Stopping distance for the participants were: Skelton, 23' 3"; Miss Arrott, 34' 0"; King, 70' 10"; Hart, 119' 8".

Also assisting with the program were Debbie Bryant, Ann Ivey, Lynn Lawhon, Mike Arrott and Jerry Graves, who measured and recorded stopping distance and handed out materials.

### Food Shopping Hints

Shop with a grocery list and make food buying "cents."

A key to making a thrifty list is checking newspaper ads. Find out what meats, fresh produce, frozen foods and staples are on special, then work them into your weekly menu.

Make the menu as complete as possible so it serves as a guide when planning a shopping list. On the list jot items by departments to save steps in the store.

At the market, learn to recognize economical specials, then how to take advantage of them. If an item that you use often or one that keeps well is on special, it is a good food investment. But buy according to home storage space. For example, family size bags of frozen foods are economical, but only if you have a freezer to store them. Keeping frozen foods in the ice cube compartment of a refrigerator will not maintain their quality, since the compartment does not provide the zero degree temperature necessary for prolonged frozen storage.

Remember, price is no measure of nutritional value of food. Even though loin steaks are pleasurable eating, other cuts such as chuck or round provide the same healthy boon at a more economical price.

Large cuts of meat on special often mean a bargain in price per pound, as well as meat for several meals.

Compare the prices of meats and poultry with the number of servings you'll get from each pound. Here's a rule of thumb—figure on four servings from a pound of boneless meat, two servings from a pound of bone-in, and one serving from a very bony choice.

Eggs are one of the biggest budget boosters. A serving of two can cost as little as 10 cents, often even less. And eggs are good alternates for meat.

When food shopping, pennies do count. Three to four cents off a 25 cent can of beans, for example, is a 10 to 15 per cent savings—not bad for just a few pennies. Applying this kind of shopping sense can save you as much as \$5 on a \$30 weekly bag of groceries. At the end of the month, that's an extra \$20 in your pocket.

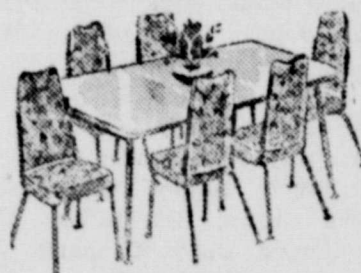

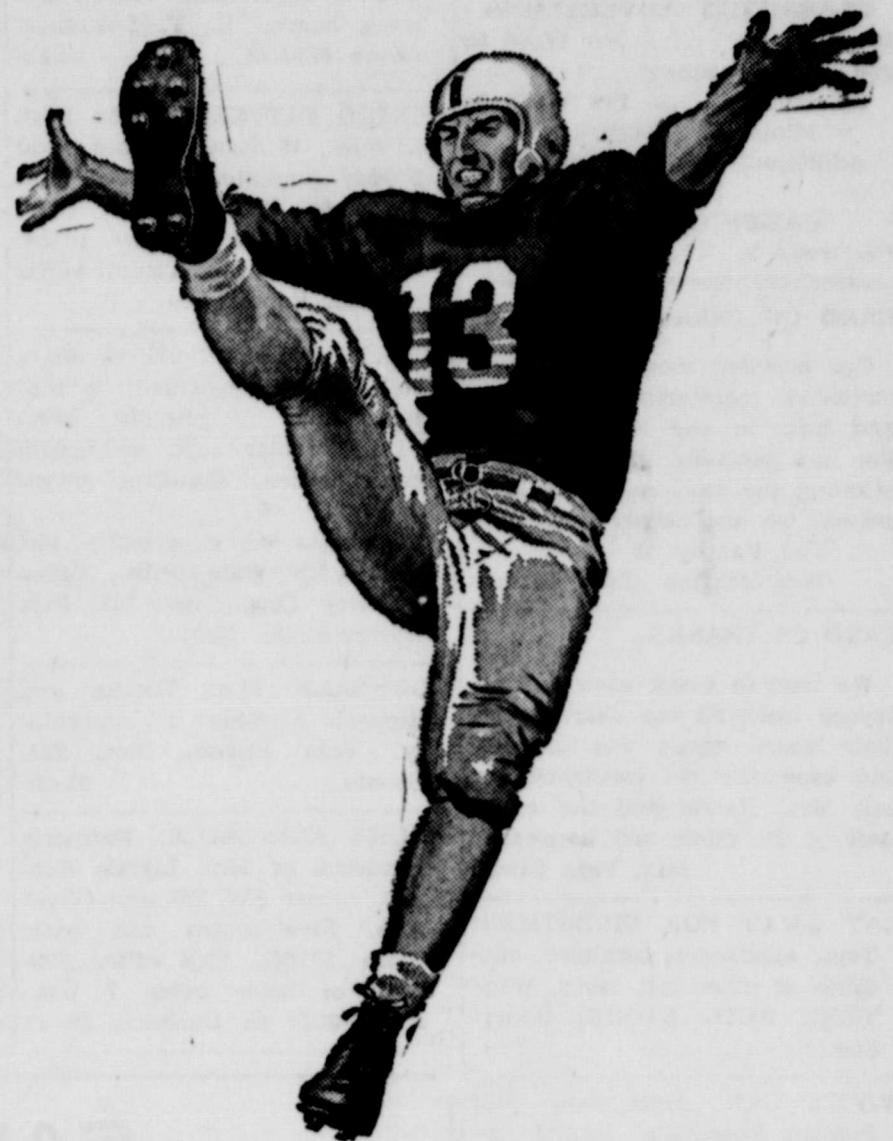
