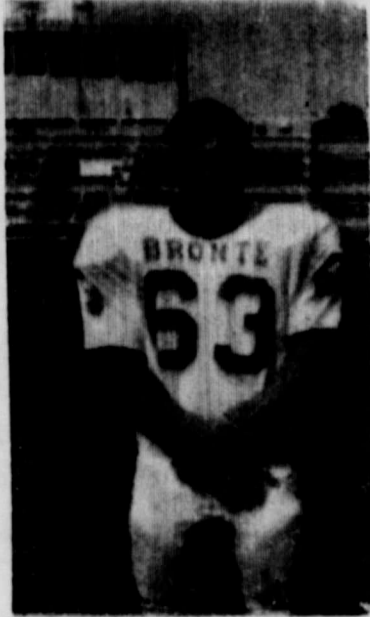

## Three Longhorns Make 6-B All-District Team

Three Bronte Longhorns were named to the 6-B All District team with Mike Arrott being selected to both the offensive and defensive units. Arrott was a unanimous choice for running back on the offensive team and linebacker on defense.

Jerry Graves was a unanimous choice for end and Bobby Skelton was selected for the secondary on the defensive squad.

Because of ties, the coaches, in a meeting here, named two quarterbacks and four backs, giving the offensive first team 13 players and the defensive team 15 players. Coaches did not vote for their own team members.

District champion Wall had the most players named to the mythical team with six each on defense and offense.

## Glenn, Pentecost To Make Arizona Conservation Tour

Nolan Pentecost of Sanco and D. K. Glenn of Bronte will leave Saturday, Dec. 11, on an expense paid trip to Litchfield Park, Ariz. The men represent the Cooke County Soil and Water Conservation District, which won first place in one of the three judging districts in Texas. The trip will be made by plane and the men will return Dec. 15.

Contests in all 50 states are sponsored by Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. and this year's grand prize tour climaxes the 25th year of the Goodyear Conservation Awards Program.

The grand prize tour will begin at Litchfield Park Saturday with the arrival of the 106 winning

conservationists from all parts of the country.

Participants in the four day, vacation-study program represent the 53 first place districts in the annual contest among 3,000 member districts of the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD). Winners will come from 47 states and Puerto Rico.

The group will include the year's outstanding cooperators and a board member from each of the award winning districts in the program sponsored by Goodyear.

Robert C. Baum, Portland, Ore., Pacific program adviser for NACD, and representatives of the press, radio and TV also will be on hand.

Tours of the 10,000 acre Good-year Farms, a proving ground for agricultural machinery and methods since 1917, and the scenic and historic sites of Arizona are on the schedule. Headquarters will be The Wigwam, country club resort.

Purpose of the competition, conducted on a statewide basis, with a few exceptions, is to provide an incentive to conservation districts and to alert the public to the need for protecting land and water resources in urban as well as rural areas.

Since the awards program was begun in 1947, more than 2,100 conservationists have been Good-year's guests here as representatives of first place districts.

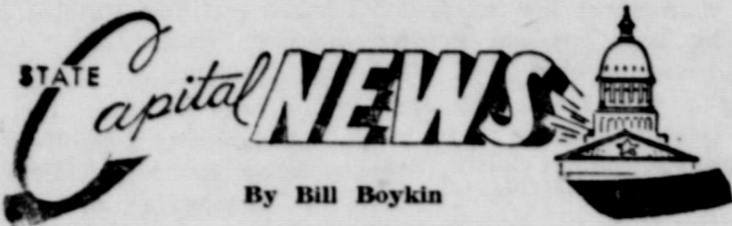

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Austin — House Speaker Gus Mutscher's bribery trial site switched abruptly from Austin to Abilene, with February or March now the expected date.

With both the defense and state filing rival motions for change of venue, Austin District Judge Tom Blackwell concluded extensive publicity in the capital city area made a transfer of the case advisable.

He sent it to the 104th district court of Judge J. Neil Daniel in Taylor County, along with indictments of co-defendants Rep. Thomas C. Shannon of Fort Worth and S. Rush McGinty of Austin, a Mutscher aide.

Defense attorneys had contended widespread news coverage made a fair trial of the speaker in the Central Texas area impossible. The indictment grew out of Mutscher's and co-defendants' 1969 profits on National Bankers Life Insurance Company stock. State alleges he received the stock tips and loans for purchases in exchange for helping pass bank deposit insurance legislation favored by Houston banker Frank Sharp.

Travis County District Attorney Robert O. Smith turned the defense argument around. He said Mutscher has so much power in Austin, where many citizens work for the state, that finding a jury free to give the state's case open consideration there may be difficult.

Blackwell didn't buy either argument entirely, but conceded Austin newspapers, radio and television stations had covered the

case rather enthusiastically since last January. Further, he stated the coverage blanketed counties surrounding the capital city.

Mutscher said he was satisfied with Abilene as the trial site.

"The only thing that we have ever asked is that we be afforded a fair trial," Mutscher commented after the brief court hearing. "I feel that the citizens of Taylor County will afford us an ample opportunity to establish my innocence."

Along to Daniel went a stack of defense pre-trial motions, including one to quash the indictment. Mutscher's attorney predicted a February or March trial date. Jan. 10 had been set originally.

DRUG REFUNDS DUE — Texans who filed valid claims under an anti-trust case may receive up to 60 per cent refunds on purchases of broad spectrum antibiotic drugs purchased during 1954-66.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin said refunds will be made probably no later than March 1972.

Tax supported hospital and other state agencies which bought the antibiotics will share in the \$4.6 million recovery against five large drug companies named in the anti-trust suit. The U. S. Supreme Court denied the companies' last appeal Oct. 12.

Martin and his staff are working on an allocation formula. A New York federal court will hold a hearing after notice to all claimants, hopefully in January.

The drug case is the pioneer "treble damage" anti-trust case allowing individual consumers to

be represented by the attorney general and recover damages for overcharges paid as a result of price fixing conspiracies.

LEGAL OPINIONS — Candidates who moved into new districts before Nov. 7 (a year prior to the 1972 general election) are eligible to run for House and Senate seats in those districts, Secretary of State Bob Bullock held in an opinion prepared as chief state election officer.

SPANISH TREASURE APPRAISED — Appraisers have completed the preliminary process of putting a value on treasure recovered from four centuries old shipwrecks off Padre Island.

Final reports will go to Federal District Judge Reynaldo Garza of Brownsville who directed the appraisal be made as the result of a lawsuit.

Platoro Inc., the Indiana firm which recovered the treasure in 1967, seeks title to at least half the artifacts. The state claims all of them, and has threatened to take its case for possession to the U. S. Supreme Court.

POLITICAL FIELD EXPANDS — Dallas attorney Barefoot Sanders stepped into the U. S. Senate race, slugging from the opening bell at Republican Sen. John Tower.

Sanders, 46 year old former federal district attorney, U. S. assistant attorney general and White House aide, is the first Democrat to announce for the Senate.

W. L. (Bill) Jones Jr., Odessa businessman, entered the Democratic primary for lieutenant governor and set up campaign headquarters here.

 Conservationists called for a minimum 100,000 acre Big Thicket National Park in East Texas.

State Banking Board approved nine "phantom" bank charters (multi-bank holding companies) in Waco, Longview and Houston, despite protests.

Sen. W. E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland took over the governor's job — for a day — Dec. 4.

This year will be "an exceptionally good" one for construction, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Pictures Made Of County Scenes

Ted Powers and Marsha Jackson, employees of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee of Austin, spent several hours making pictures of historical sites in Coke County last Monday.

They were accompanied by Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, president of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee.

They followed the historical route through Hayrick and the Kickapoo Mountains to the ghost town of Fort Chadbourne. W. D. Burns assisted them in finding the old half dugout that used to house the Fort Chadbourne post office.

From there they went to the Wylie Ranch where many pictures were made of the Fort Chadbourne ruins and they also visited the Indian rock shelter on the bank of Oak Creek.

The Austin people praised the beauty of Coke County, particularly in the rugged mountain country and at the Lake Spence site.

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**Dyess Planes Fly  
Low Over Area**

Coke County is one of the "big country" counties over which Dyess AFB planes are flying on a daily basis. The world wide commitments of the 516th Tactical Airlift Wing (TAW) at Dyess require continuous low level flying training. The highest possible degree of proficiency must be maintained and the 516th TAW aircrews must be current in all modes of aerial delivery. As a result, C-130 Hercules and C-7A Caribou aircraft are making the flights over this area.

These low level flights may be scheduled between 8 a.m. and midnight Monday through Friday, and less frequently on weekends. Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the terrain while night low level activities are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle, man made or geographic, within three miles of prescribed track of the aircraft. Airspeeds will vary from 115 to 290 miles per hour.

All flights are made along specific routes which are approved by Tactical Air Command. Minimum disturbances of farms, ranches and communities is the primary consideration in selecting low level routes. Towns, local airports, resorts, hatcheries and stocker pens are avoided when planning the routes and will not be overflown by C-130 and C-7A aircraft under any normal circumstance. 516th officials would like to emphasize that, even though training must be conducted at low level and high airspeed in order to be realistic, all possible precautions are taken to prevent disruption of local agriculture and community activities.

In addition to Coke County the flights will occur over the following counties: Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Baylor, Garza, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Runnels, Coleman, Brown and Tom Green.

## Firemen Ask For Cooperation

The Bronte Volunteer Fire Department would like to call your attention to the following items of which we feel the public should be made aware!

1. In order for the property owners of Bronte to continue to have their present rates on fire insurance, there must be at least 17 members of the Fire Department present at every meeting. It is becoming increasingly hard to meet this standard. It is also extremely important that we have enough trained firemen to handle any emergency that might arise.

2. We feel the public also should be reminded that in order for the Fire Department to function as it should, it is necessary that the public not come to the fire station, call the hospital fire phone, or follow the fire truck when there is a fire or when the fire siren sounds. It is a hazard to the firemen and their equipment as well as the public if there are vehicles and spectators in the way of the firemen and equipment.

3. Since it is the Christmas Season, we urge each of you to be extremely careful with Christmas trees and decorations. More fires probably occur at this time of year than any other because of dry trees, shorts in electrical lights, etc. Be careful and let's have a safe, fire-free Christmas.

If there are any men in the community who are interested in joining the Fire Department, we urge you to come to the next fire meeting. The meetings are every second and fourth Monday at 7 p.m. If you are a member of the Fire Department at this time, we also urge you to make every meeting and help build a better Fire Department for our community. 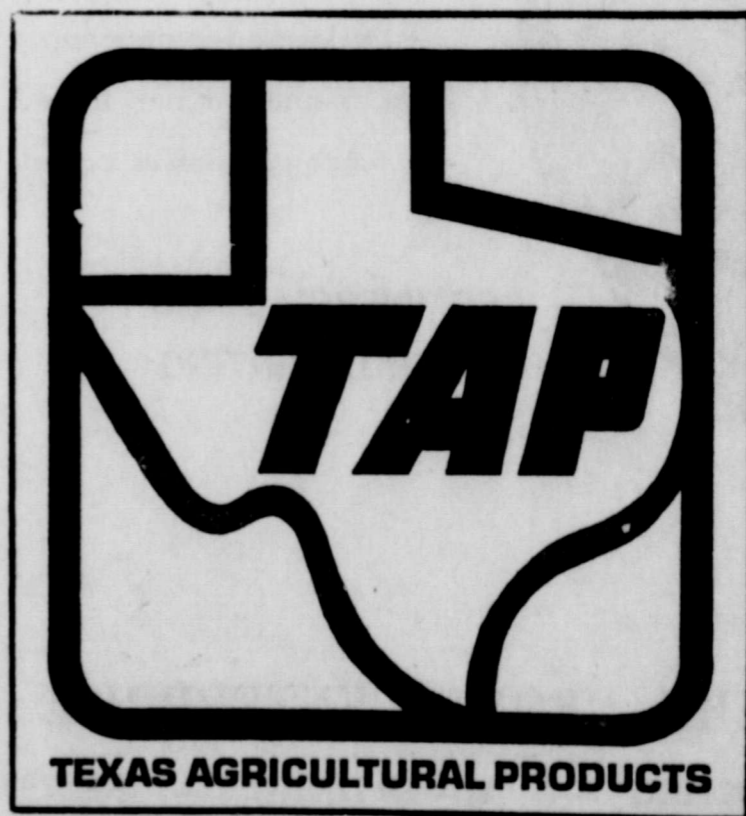

## Army Gets Big Raise in Pay

A major pay raise for members of the United States Army became effective this week according to SSgt. Joe Bates, Army recruiter for Coke County. The pay raise, which was enacted into law on Sept. 28, had been withheld temporarily as part of President Nixon's freeze on prices and wages.

Under the terms of the military pay bill, newly enlisted soldiers will receive \$268.50 per month. This compares with \$134.40 under the previous law.

The pay raise will not only include substantial increases in basic pay, but will also raise quarters and ration allowances.

The new pay scales are a giant step towards making military pay for lower ranking enlisted men and junior officers comparable with that offered by business and industry. According to U. S. government statistics, the average hourly wage in the manufacturing industry in 1970 was \$3.36. Army pay for a sergeant, E-5, by comparison, will not amount to \$3.11 per hour if the sergeant is authorized and receiving quarters and ration allowances. If the same sergeant is married, his hourly pay rate would rise to \$3.40.

Army officials state the average service time required to reach the rank of sergeant, E-5, is in the neighborhood of 22 months active service.

"When coupled with the traditional Army benefits such as free medical care, clothing, room and board and retirement benefits, the new pay increase makes Army service truly competitive as a career choice," the Army recruiter said.

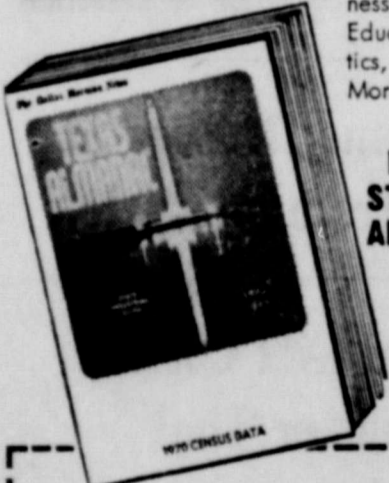

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# H D Agent's News Dept.

## The Christmas Poinsettia

Poinsettias, the favorite Christmas plant, will remain colorful and attractive throughout the holiday season with proper care.

Poinsettias do best when placed in a sunny location and protected from sudden temperature changes due to drafts, heat vents or opening doors. And night temperatures should not drop below 60 degrees. Such sudden drops in temperature can cause complete loss of leaves.

Proper watering techniques will also do much to prolong the life of the poinsettia. Water requirements for the flower are relatively high because of low humidity in homes and offices and because of the large leaf surfaces on the plant. The soil ball should not be allowed to become so dry that the leaves start to wilt.

The soil, however, should not be saturated with water. Continued saturation will cut off the oxygen supply to the roots, resulting in loss of feeder roots and loss of foliage.

Frequently, poinsettia pots come covered with attractive foil to enhance their appearance. Check if the drainage hole in the bottom of the pot is closed by the foil. If it is closed, excess moisture will not be able to drain out and the soil will remain waterlogged.

About three weeks after the plant has been received, fertilize it with a complete fertilizer, such as those recommended for African violets and other house plants. Dissolve the fertilizer in water as recommended on the container then water the plant thoroughly.

Seldom is more than one application needed. But applications may be repeated at three week intervals until the colored bracts fade and drop.

### Decorating

If you are decorating with pine cones, berries, fruit and broadleaf evergreens, to keep them fresh, dip the entire branch in liquid wax and hang stem end up to dry. Another treatment is to dip in a pan of clear varnish, lacquer, or white shellac diluted with alcohol. Any of these methods adds a luster which often emphasizes the beauty of berries and prolongs keeping qualities. While still wet sprinkle with artificial snow.
