## Commissioners Discuss Street Paving Project

Another step was taken toward getting a street and road improvement project underway in Coke County when the Commissioners Court met Monday. Present to meet with Judge W. W. Thetford and Commissioners Fern Havins, Jesse Parker, Floyd Harmon and Jack Corley were Gordon Charlton of San Angelo, representative of Columbian Securities Corp., and Harvey W. Schmidt, Amarillo who was retained to check out the cost of needed work.

Main item in the project is sealcoating streets in Robert Lee and Bronte. However, some additional paving, bridge building and sealcoating of paved roads in the rural areas are included. Schmidt's estimate of the cost of the entire project amounts to nearly \$200,000. Commissioners say the only way the work can be financed is with a bond issue. Consequently, they requested Charlton to draw necessary petitions to call a bond election. Charlton, who has been handling financial arrangements for the county for many years, said

he should have the necessary papers drawn up in a few days and ready for circulation among citizens of the county.

Judge Thetford said that a 10 cents per \$100 tax would retire a \$200,000 bond issue in 10 years, at present county valuations. He pointed out that a simple majority can carry the election.

Interested citizens have been promoting this project for several months, pointing out that the tremendous investment in paving in both Bronte and Robert Lee is in danger if repair work is not done soon.

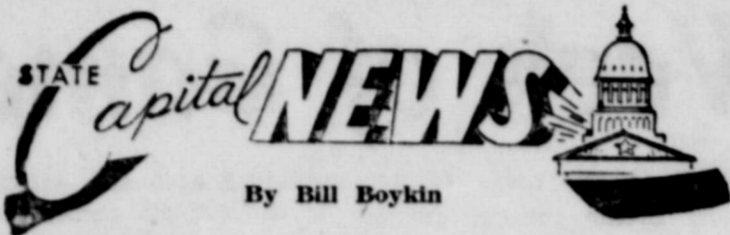

Austin — Insurance bounced back into the news on three fronts here last week.

State Board of Insurance Chairman Larry Teaver promised, after a public hearing, to review all aspects of the new catastrophe pool for windstorm coverage in high risk coastal areas.

Agents and property owners complained of price gouging and of companies' allegedly unloading on the pool properties which should be insured at standard rates. Companies denied the charges.

Board also took under consideration an Allstate Insurance Company proposal to cut auto coverage rates up to 20 per cent for new model cars equipped with shock absorbing bumpers.

All 1973 and later cars must have bumpers which can withstand a five miles an hour front crash and a two and a half miles per hour rear end wallop without damage.

Allstate proposed to allow dis-

counts to become effective with 1972 model cars equipped at owners expense with the tested shock absorbing bumpers.

Initial reduction would be 10 per cent in premiums for the five mph front, two and a half mph rear safety protection. The cut would reach 20 per cent for cars which can be crashed at five mph into a test barrier, front and rear, with no damage to the vehicle.

Board members heard support and opposition for proposed new rules to curb arbitrary cancellations and non-renewals on property and casualty insurance. Under the regulations, auto insurance in effect 60 days could be cancelled only for failure to pay premiums or where driver's licenses have been suspended or revoked. Companies could cancel coverage at annual expiration dates by giving 30 days written notice.

Teaver advised a rule prohibiting cancellations for "age alone."

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Supreme Court ordered Cooke County district court trial of a teenager's suit against his father for alleged negligence on the job which led to serious permanent injury.

Case was the first in which the state's top court had considered whether parents should be immune to actions brought by their children due to events outside the normal family relationship.

AG OPINIONS — Laws prohibiting dumping of refuse within 300 yards of public highways and anti-dumping statutes pertaining to public and private properties and public waters are both valid and can be harmonized, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

\* Texas Water Rights Commission can test any claim of a right to use water under water code provisions by the legal requirement of past beneficial use of water without a formal adjudication of all claims on the stream.

\* Legislators are entitled to 16 cents per highway mile for use of personally owned airplanes on official business trips.

\* Authority exists for establishing a central services account for Texas Tech University and Texas Tech University School of Medicine.

LAND BIDS ACCEPTED — Bonus bids of more than \$1.7 million on oil and gas leases were accepted by the School Land Board for the permanent school fund.

Seventy-six bids covered 39,843 acres of state owned lands and averaged \$44.77 an acre.

PARTY RULES COMPLY — New state Democratic party rules on delegate selection comply with national and statutory requirements, Texas National Committeewoman Mrs. Carrin Patman of Ganado reported.

The rules for selection of convention delegations will soon go to the State Democratic Executive Committee for consideration. SDEC Chairman Roy Orr indicated a meeting will be held in mid-January to act on them following a public hearing.

12,000 GET RAISES — Retroactive pay raises have been cleared for 12,000 (of 63,000) state employees who get \$2 or less an hour.

Raises were approved for the low pay workers back to Sept. 1 in line with a federal Pay Board definition of "severe inequity" permitting retroactivity for those paid less than the minimum wage before and after the August freeze.

Short Snorts

A. C. Turner, chairman of the State Board of Pardons and Paroles, will retire Feb. 1.

It will cost more to prove you were born after Jan. 1. Certified birth certificates will go up to

\$2, from \$1.50. Death certificates will also cost \$2.

A House committee will study state medical welfare program costs.

State Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso became the sixth Democratic entry in the lieutenant governor's race.

Suits challenging House redistricting have been lumped together and assigned Dallas Fed-

eral Judge Joe Estes.

Texas Air Control Board staff members proposed a program to reduce air pollution from autos 20 per cent. Monitoring stations were suggested for Corpus Christi, Houston, Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, El Paso and San Antonio.

Changes in production rules in East Texas oil fields were recommended to the Railroad Commission by independent operators.

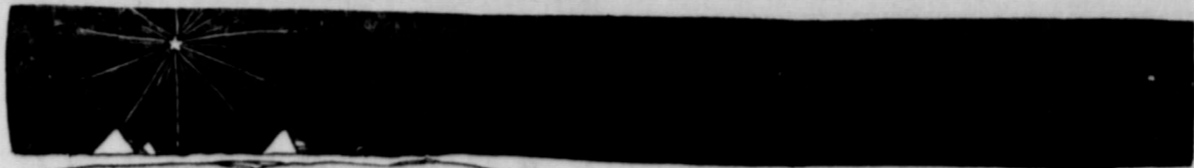

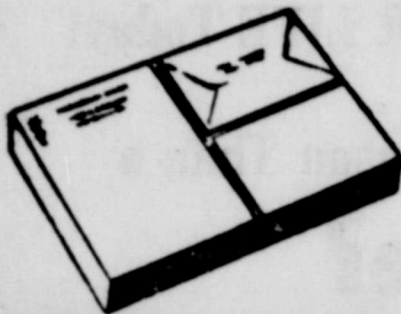

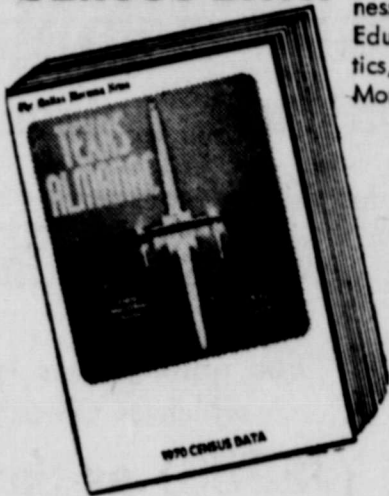

### Turkey Stuffings

The holiday season kindles memories of fathers and sons watching football games, and mom in the kitchen preparing the traditional family feast of turkey and stuffing.

Most families consider stuffings for the bird as important as the turkey itself. Family favorites include many different stuffings, such as bread, cornmeal, oyster, cranberry, nut, Hawaiian and sausage stuffing. Some even combine stuffings with scoops of one type in front of the turkey, and scoops of another behind it.

Whether or not you put stuffing in the bird or cook it separately is again an individual choice. The birds cook faster if it is unstuffed, but many people enjoy the flavor of stuffed turkeys.

If you do stuff the bird, esti-

mate about one half cup of stuffing per pound of bird. The bird should be stuffed just before roasting. Fill the body cavity lightly so stuffing will have room to expand. Extra stuffing can be baked in a separate pan for about an hour.

Remember, bacteria grow when food is neither very hot nor very cold, so put the turkey in the oven immediately after stuffing.

Cook the stuffed bird until the stuffing temperature reaches at least 165 degrees. The internal temperature of the thigh should be between 180 and 185 degrees F., whether or not the cavity is stuffed.

It is very important that leftover stuffing be removed from the turkey first before being refrigerated or frozen. Cooked poultry may be safely frozen in a home freezer at zero degree F. for up to six months. Use cooked poultry and stuffing in the refrigerator within one to two days; flavor deteriorates in poultry if held under poor storage conditions for too long a time.

### New Look in Wigs

Holiday festivities spark the imagination to try something new, and what better way to don a new look than with a wig?

The wig industry has provided several new products to inspire women to do away with the "one seasonal hairstyle." One new type is a completely restyable synthetic wig that allows use of heated rollers and hair dryers. The new modacrylic fiber is heat resistant up to 340 degrees F. Temporary rinses may also be applied to the hair fiber.

A vinyl based hair fiber is another development produced by withstand indirect heat. Heated curlers and hair dryers can be used without causing frizzing with this type wig, also. But labels should be read carefully. Only wigs with instructions that specifically permit use of heat can be exposed to heat without damage.

The wig industry is also altering construction techniques of wigs. Instead of the solid mesh cap, a stretch framework has been developed, in which soft bands hold together free floating strips of the fiber. Every strand of hair can thus be brushed in any direction and parts placed anywhere. And the wearer's own hair can be pulled through to blend with the synthetic fiber.

These new developments, then allow the wearer to completely restyle her wig and to combine natural and synthetic hair fibers for creative holiday styles.
