I. A. Bird was henored on his 90th birthday last Friday with a reception at the Robert Lee Recrelation Hall. There were 135 persons registered who called the share his birthday cake and visit him.

Mr. Bird was born Dec. 15, 1881, in Hico, Tex. His faither, Miller Bird, was a Texas Ranger and a veterian of the battile at Dove Creek near San Angelo. The family came to Coke County in the mid 1880s. He attended the first school at Sanco, two years befire Coke County was organized.

He was married to Mary Maude Cosley near Big Spring April 29, 1900. She died Jan. 6, 1968. Mr. Bird taught school at Horse Mountain, north of Sanco, a short time but most of his life has been spent as a rancher, da'itle maiser and in the oil business.







What a boon eggs are to the family during the peak of the holiday rush, because they can be prepared in a dozen tasty dishes for a quick meal or they can be prepared well in advance of their need.

Since eggs have been tagged as plentiful by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, you'll find a wide variety of sizes and grades from which to choose.

Most retailers feature USDA Grade A or better eggs in at

least three sizes. Select several sizes and use as best suited for your purposes.

For example, if your children like boiled, baked or fried eggs, but eat only half of what you serve, then use the medium or small eggs to meet their needs. If you are scrambling a large more economical to use a half dozen large eggs than a dozen small or medium eggs.

Freshness counts in the palatability of eggs in the main dish, but when you are cooking a cake, custard or casserole, use the eggs you've had the longest in the refrigerator. Your final product


will be just as tasty. A good way to plan ahead for holiday meals is to boil a dozen top quality eggs together, saving fuel and time. These hard boiled eggs will keep for a week or more in the refrigerator. You can refrigerate them in the shell. but if the shell is removed, protect the eggs with a film wrap. You can prevent dehydration and darkening of the cooked egg white by keeping the eggs in a closed container covered with waller. Hard boiled eggs are handy for

snacks for the children and as canapes to serve to unexpected guests.

For those who are watching calories, serve a smicked egg dip with fresh raw vegetables such as carrots, celery, squash, cucumber or cauliflower. For this dip you will need:

12 hard cooked eggs, riced or sieved

- 2 tablespoons soft butter or margarine
- 1½ tablespoons liquid sm/cke seasoning
- tablespoon wine vinegar
- teaspoons brown mustard teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 4 drops Tabasco
- 1 teaspoon onion salt 1 teaspoon salt



Combine all ingredients. Beat until smooth. If desired, add more seasonings. Have consistency soft enough to permit potato chips to be dipped into it easily. Refrigenate until ready to serve. About 30 minutes before serving remove platter of eggs, you may find it from refrigerator and beat or whip dip to fluff and soften it Pile into chilled bowl. (If you have a blender, use it to give

the dip even better texture.) A favorite snack in tropical countries is a hard cooked egg flavored with lemon juice. Before you take a bite of egg, you squeeze lemon juice over it, so you have an egg in one hand and a lemon in the other. Try it when you need a pick up during the holiday rush.




