Coke County Commissioners' Court acting on petitions presented Monday, has called a \$200,000 bond election for Feb. 26. Purpose of the proposed bond issue is for repairing, maintaining and operating of paved streets in Bronte and Robert Lee and other county owned roads.

The election will determine whether or not bonds of Coke County shall be issued in the amount of \$200,000 to bear interest at a rate not to exceed 5 1/2 per cent per annum and to mature over a period not to exceed 30 years. County Judge W. W. Thetford said the commissioners are considering either a 10 or 15 year period for retirement of the bonds.

Absentee voting will be at the county clerk's office in the courthouse. Flu Prevalent In Bronte Area

Supt. C. B. Barbee said Wednesday that absenteeism is much heavier than usual, due to illnesses of students. Approximately 90 per cent of the enrollment was present Monday, but by Wednesday it had dropped to 80 per cent. Barbee said the usual attendance is about 96 per cent. He added that school officials have no plans for dismissing classes because of illnesses unless there is a considerable increase.

Dr. Harris urged everyone to exercise as much care as possible in avoiding the flu.

"As it looks from here"

Washington — The President was not expected to recommend new taxes in his State of the Union Address to the Congress last week. It possibly could come later but, of course, recommending new taxes in an election year is not the usual order of business.

On down the line we may be hearing more of the "value added tax." The letters VAT will identify this new approach for raising revenues.

Actually the added value tax is a sales tax slightly less painful because, if sometime adopted, it will be buried in the price the con-

sumer pays for goods. The tax starts with the manufacturers. In each step of the process until the final item is ready for sale, a tax is added for increased value.

The concept is not new. Neither is the tax itself new in application since many European countries have had it for a number of years. The tax in foreign countries works against our exports since the tax is added above the price paid for goods.

If this type of tax is proposed, it will probably be related to raising revenue for a specific purpose. Since the courts in California and Texas have ruled that the property tax works inequality in school districts, the tax could be proposed to fund Federal contributions to public schools instead of the personal property tax. This, naturally, would make such a tax more palatable if it were an exchange for the property tax.

Such a substitution would brighten the hearts of property owners dizzy from the escalation of real estate taxes. Likely it would partly solve the dilemmas of mayors and school boards and inspire builders to respond to the housing shortage.

It is estimated that each one per cent of tax levied by this method would produce \$4 billion. It follows that if five per cent were levied, \$20 billion would be produced, even excepting from the tax certain essentials now exempt from most state sales taxes.

It is estimated that \$20 billion raised in this manner would meet approximately 30 per cent of the cost of the nation's schools.

This type of tax has been studied by our Treasury officials for 20 years or more without any proposal for its enactment but since State Supreme Courts have ruled that school systems funded from property taxes are unequal and unconstitutional a great deal of impetus has been given to it. These decisions and the unhappiness of property owners build up pressures to further this idea of a new tax system.

There are arguments pro and con on this method of taxation. Eventually they will all be voiced and the development of any such idea will come slowly. The fact that states are in such a bind for ways to support public schools necessitates some answers not yet available. Since there is no choice but to look for other ways of financing schools, some way will have to be found to raise the money.

Some have already labeled such a system as a regressive tax since everyone would pay something, just as everyone has to pay sales taxes. These would argue that since it is not based on the ability to pay, it is not as fair as the income tax. Remember the income tax is more often referred to as a progressive tax.

There are two valid arguments against such an approach, as it involves public schools. One is that the Federal Government with this method of contribution would further control our public schools. A second concern is the fact that like the sales tax the VAT would be easy to increase each time more tax revenues were needed.

To say the least, if such a tax is proposed, it will be a long and drawn out controversy.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS BORROW \$14.3 MILLION

Farmers and ranchers from an 11 county area borrowed more than \$14.3 million from Texas Production Credit Association in 1971, according to Phil H. Lane, the association's president. This figure represents loans to 219 members, he said.

I am stationed in Cam Ranh Bay, which is relatively safe. There is enemy activity, but they don't appear to be too concerned with us here. Cam Ranh was, at one time, one of the main supply centers in Vietnam, but now is in its final stages. There are many GI's here, but most units appear to be unloading their burden on the ARVN's, or are closing out their operations. The main depot, which supplied a large area of operations, closed down three or four months ago. There is still a supply center for petroleum products, and then there is the ammunition supply center also. My company's job is primarily security of "Alpha" Ammunition Storage Area, which is the only remaining ammo storage area in Cam Ranh Bay. The diminishing of the war is obvious because there is less ammo in storage here than has ever been. Most of the ammunition is being turned over to the ARVN ammo dumps in this area, and we are training Vietnamese in the operations of this supply center. No one can predict what the Army has in plan for our unit, because when the ammo dump closes down or is turned over to the ARVN's we will either change missions or be re-deployed into other units with a security mission in this area.

Cam Ranh is a beautiful place in opposition to all stories you might hear about this country. The countryside is beautiful with vegetation, mountains, and natural beauty. We are on a peninsula with one of the best natural harbors in the country. We are on the South China Sea and the shore is really nice. Contrary to what you might think, it is too cold this time of the year to do any swimming. Also the water is too turbulent. The weather isn't anything like I expected. Granted,

it was hot when I got here last April, and stayed hot for five months, but the last four have been nice, with the nights sometimes cold (down about 65 or 70 degrees). That sounds funny I'm sure since you are having freezing weather, but when you get used to 100 degree weather with 90 per cent humidity it's quite a change.

Everyone here wishes they were home, but many of us have made good friends here, some from the areas we are from. I have a friend who will leave about thirty days after I, James Murray of San Angelo. He knows several young people in Bronte, which made it nice, although his friends are just acquaintances, being the age of my brother Ed.

Like all the other two and three year men, I'm looking forward to being a civilian again. I would gladly change my stripes for the Mr. title again. But, I am happy and proud to serve my country, even in an awkward situation as this.

I did want you to know that I do enjoy and appreciate reading your paper and keeping up with the "goings on" in Bronte. I will drop in and visit a bit when I get home.

There came on to be considered the petition of Cumbie Ivey, Jr. and 102 others asking that an election be ordered upon the proposition hereinafter stated; and

IT APPEARING TO SAID COURT that said petition is signed by resident property taxpayers of said County equivalent in number to one percent (1%) or more of the total votes cast in Coke County in the last preceding general election for Governor, so that this court is obligated and empowered to call said election; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF COKE COUNTY, TEXAS:

THAT an election be held in said County on the 26th day of February, 1972, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election in accordance with said petition the following proposition shall be submitted:

"WHETHER or not the bonds of said Coke County, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$200,000), to bear interest at a rate of not to exceed FIVE AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (5½%) per annum, and to mature serially over a period of not to exceed THIRTY (30) years from the date thereof, in conformity with the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 52 of Article III of the Constitution, as amended, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof, in Coke County, Texas; and shall ad valorem taxes be levied on all taxable property in said County subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity?"

SAID election shall be held under the provisions of the Acts of the Thirty-ninth Legislature, First Called Session, Chapter 16, as amended.

ALL RESIDENT qualified electors of the County, including those who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. That at said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such a manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the votes cast by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation).

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.S. Election Code, and printed on such ballots shall appear the following proposition:

"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear to the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST" and each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the County Clerk's Office in the Courthouse, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, V.A.T.S., Election Code.

in the original cost of streets and roads in the county, in addition to many thousands more which have been spent in maintenance during the past 15 years.

Judge Thetford said this week that figures supplied by Gordon Charlton of Columbian Securities Corp., the county fiscal advisor, indicated that a tax increase of 13 cents per \$100 valuation would be necessary to retire the bonds in 10 years, while a 10 cents per \$100 increase will be necessary to retire them in 15 years. These figures are based on 1971 valuations.

A look at the record shows that valuations have been decreasing slightly the past few years. The trend of county valuations can be seen in the following figures which have been the values here the past five years:

1971	21,340,770

Coke County has no bonded indebtedness at the present time, as all road bonds, courthouse bonds, park bonds and others were paid off some time ago. The only indebtedness of the county is \$83,763.00 for machinery warrants. Of this amount, \$21,000 will be paid next month, which will leave a debt of \$62,763.
