Mr. Eubanks died at his home in Bronte Tuesday at 5:45 p.m., apparently from a heart attack.

He was born Aug. 22, 1887, in Brown County and came to Coke County with his parents in 1890 when he was four years old. He married Ora Ivey in June 1911 in Bronte, where they have made their home continuously since that time.

Mr. Eubanks was a stock farmer and a Baptist.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Ivey O. Eubanks of Robert Lee and W. O. Eubanks of Sweetwater; one daughter, Mrs. Walter Gilles of Comstock; seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

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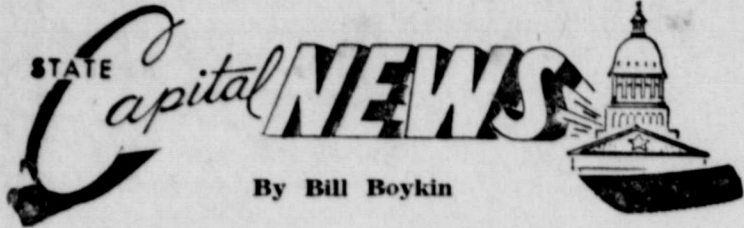

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Austin — Leaders of both Democratic and Republican state parties will meet March 13 for major decisions as well as routine housekeeping duties.

Texas law requires executive committees of political parties on that date to certify statewide candidates, set ratios for state convention delegate selection, fix hours and sites for June 13 and Sept. 19 state conventions and select a place to canvass May 6 primary returns.

National GOP Committeeman Peter O'Donnell Jr. gave Republicans something else to think about when he unexpectedly submitted his resignation, the vacancy to be filled at the statutory R. E. C. meeting in Austin.

State Rep. Fred Agnich of Dallas is the overwhelming choice to succeed O'Donnell as committeeman, and may get the job unopposed.

Time is also getting close for

Republicans to adopt a formal set of written rules for operation of party conventions and regular operations, although that is considered no great problem for the GOP.

Rules writing is a problem of major proportions for Democrats. April 6 is the deadline under new state law for the parties to submit their rules drafts to the secretary of state.

Democrats are expected to make a choice at the March 13 meeting between a set of reform rules drawn under direction of William R. Anderson Jr. of Corpus Christi and a watered down draft which opponents claim perpetuates the winner-take-all system of convention operations.

Supporters of the Anderson rules claim a majority of the State Democratic Executive Committee will adopt them in preference to the alternative which has SDEC rules sub-committee approval.

Rumors persist that SDEC Chairman Roy Orr of DeSoto may resign his post at the Austin meeting. Gov. Preston Smith is backing Anderson to succeed him. Orr early this year became a Dallas County commissioner, and questions have been raised about his holding both positions.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Supreme Court has agreed to decide whether party primary election costs can be paid from state funds with special legislative authorization.

The High Court heard arguments in the historic case Monday (March 6). Secretary of State Bob Bullock claims he has power to make rules for conduct and financing of the May and June primaries. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin maintains only the legislature can provide the money—in this case via special session. Martin tried unsuccessfully to prevent Bullock from bringing the mandamus action against Comptroller Robert S. Calvert to force payment of two minor preliminary election bills.

Court of Criminal Appeals has held that probation cannot be revoked for association with disreputable persons unless it can be shown the probationer knew of the reputation of his friends.

SALES TAX LOSS TOLD — A Senate committee's staff report that at least \$12 million a year is being lost by the state in uncollected sales taxes due to alleged faulty administration by the state comptroller's office is figuring in three campaigns.

Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso, chairman of the senate committee, is talking about it in his race for lieutenant governor. Randy Pendleton of Andrews, a candidate for comptroller, blames the loss on Comptroller Robert S. Cal-

vert and Attorney General candidate John Hill of Houston claims Attorney General Martin should be more diligent in filing tax collection suits.

AG OPINIONS — In a flood of recent opinions, Attorney General Martin concluded:

\* Parks and Wildlife Department is not authorized to appoint any game warden, salaried or non-salaried, other than those permitted under the current state appropriations act.

\* Wichita Falls city officials can collect Wichita Falls Independent School District delinquent taxes at a penalty rate of 10 per cent.

\* A court has discretion whether criminal case judgments and sentences will be announced orally and subsequently entered by the clerk or prepared in writing by the clerk and signed before being entered.

\* A county is not required to pay out of its funds any portion of court costs due the criminal justice planning fund which are served out in jail by a convicted defendant. If a defendant pays part of the total court costs and serves out the remainder in jail, money collected is to be pro-rated among various costs including that due the Criminal Justice Planning Fund. No cost has priority over another.

\* Accrued vacation time of state employees is a vested right of those employees and of their estates.

\* Combination of a "port-a-lift" (towing device) coupled to a vehicle and towed by a passenger car falls within the statutory ban on a passenger car's being coupled with more than one other vehicle.

\* Only minors who have been granted adult status legally may receive blind and disabled welfare payments directly from the welfare department.

HORSE OWNERS WARNED — Horse owners have been warned to have their animals immunized for protection against another Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) outbreak this spring and summer.

A Texas Veterinary Medical Association spokesman said foals born since the 1971 epidemic and horses vaccinated under six months of age during the epidemic or afterwards are prime targets for exposure.

CROP INSURANCE CHANGED — New changes in the crop hail insurance program aimed at savings on premium costs to farmers were reported by the State Board of Insurance last week.

The new "stepladder policy" will enable cotton growers, for example, to buy insurance after July 1 at a drastically reduced rate. Value of the coverage increases as the crop grows in value. Policies are cheaper after July 1 because hail usually ends with May and June.

Short Snorts

A qualified 18 year old voter can run for municipal office in Midland where there is no statutory or legal barrier, Secretary of State Bullock held.

Former State Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo is campaigning for tougher parole eligibility regulations in the prison system.

Texas Highway Commission approved a \$240 million, two year program for development of almost 2,000 miles of highways.

A Democratic Senate candidate, Thomas M. Cartledge, plans a 300 mile walking tour to dramatize the high cost of campaigning.

The Texas oil pumping output is 100,000 barrels a day less than a year ago, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Byron Tunnell.

New workmen's compensation insurance rates in effect April 1 will save employers more than \$7.7 million, the State Board of Insurance reports.

## An Old Fashion RECIPE

### BUTTER IN HASTE

From Winter Cream, or from the milk of one Cow.

Take milk fresh from the cow, strain it into clean pans, set it over a gentle fire until it is scalding hot; do not let it boil; then set it aside; when it is cold skim off the cream; the milk will still be fit for any ordinary use; when you have enough cream, put it into a clean earthen basin; beat it with a wooden spoon until the butter is made, which will not be long; then take it from the milk and work with a little cold water, until it is free from milk, then drain off the water, put a small tablespoon of fine salt to each pound of butter, and work it in. A small teaspoon of fine white sugar, worked in with the salt, will be found an improvement — sugar is a great preservative. Make the butter in a roll; cover with a bit of muslin, and keep it in a cool place.

This receipt was obtained from one who practiced it for several winters.

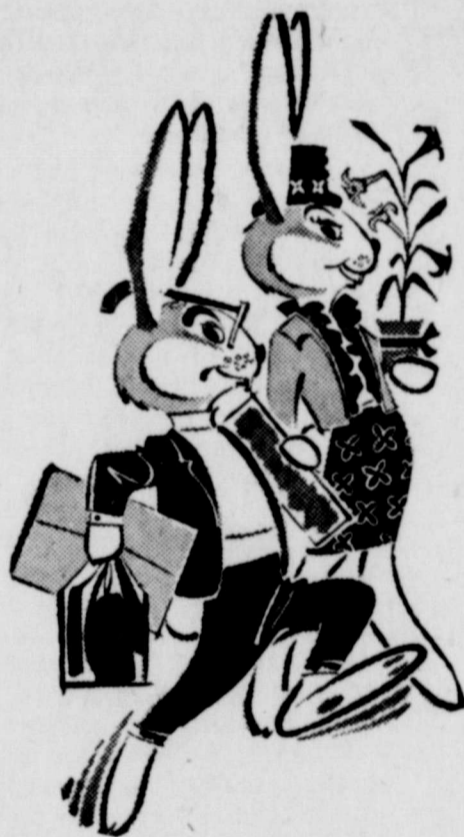

### Baptist Meeting Set at Bronte

The 1972 statewide missions thrust projected by the 1.9 million member Baptist General Convention of Texas will be felt locally when the churches of Runnels Baptist Association meet together Thursday night, March 16, for their Missions - Stewardship Youth Conference.

The conference will begin at 7 p.m. in First Baptist Church in Bronte.

One of more than 100 similar meetings being held across Texas, the meeting will feature leaders from the Mission and Stewardship Divisions of the Baptist General Convention of Texas and state leadership who are involved with the various mission programs of the convention.

The meeting will include a session to acquaint church leadership with the challenge of Biblical stewardship and the resources available for designing a program of Stewardship Development. "There is a bold challenge for growth in Christian giving which is equal to the new potential made possible by prosperity," said Dr. Cecil Ray, director of the Stewardship Division of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. "Greatness in giving is the key note and such greatness in giving is necessary if Baptists are to be equal to their mission task in the 70's," Ray added.

The meeting will also include a conference on missions and personal involvement in mission ministries. The purpose of this conference is to acquaint the churches with mission projects and the available resources for doing their work. "During 1972," said Charles Lee Williamson, director of the BGCT Missions Division, "Texas Baptists will be giving priority attention to churches in crisis, metropolitan center, and to youth."

The opportunity of today's church centers in its ability to demonstrate its love for people. The message of the church is heard best when the church is involved in ministering to the needs of the people in its community," Williamson continued.

An added thrust of the meeting will be a youth rally which will confront youth with the Biblical concept of stewardship and missions designed to motivate their personal commitment and involvement.

John LaNove will be the speaker for the closing service.

"As it looks from here"

Washington—Last week's hometown Lions Club bulletin ("The Bull-etin") ends up with this quip: "We know how it is, so tell us like it ought to be."

Starting with this idea, we are reminded of a sign in the museum at the head office of the Union Pacific Railroad in Omaha, Neb. A faded photo of the sign stuck up along the right-of-way in Nebraska or Wyoming about a century ago reads: "NOTIS, trespassers will be persecuted to the full extent of 2 mungrel dogs which never was over sochible to strangers and 1 dubble brl shot gun which ain't loaded with sofa pillers. Damn if I ain't gettin tired of this hell raisin on my place. B. Griscom."

Of course, Mr. Griscom has long departed this life but he leaves a simplicity needed in our gobbledy gookish language of today, found particularly in government.

Good advice—state your position—make it plain; don't try to be elegant.

Some time ago, a certain city hired a consultant firm to make a survey on which to base an application for federal funds for urban renewal. The report cost \$12,000 in municipal tax money and it appears not to contain much

more than could have been gathered by looking out the window of a 10 story building.

The document contains all the bureaucratic references dearly loved by those to whom it is directed. Someone in Washington will nod over it approvingly, throw it on a stack where it will remain until the congressman from the area calls up and wants to know what the heck happened to it.

What it essentially says is "the core area of the city is suffering from disinvestment and needs to be looked at in the broad picture. If prompt actions are implemented within the suggested parameters, meaningful and relevant objectives may be finalized." This for 12,000 Bucks!

Of course, this is common to about everything else in our public life. New ones pop up every day. Until recently not many parents ever heard of "sibling rivalries" but they did know that healthy brothers and sisters squabbled and sometimes fought, tooth and toenail, and often got the seat of their pants warmed for doing so.

The Bible has a way of making things pretty clear. "Go to the ant, thou sluggard," says Proverbs. Sluggards are now "under-achievers." No one cheats any more. Rather he is "ethically disoriented."

Genesis says that the people of Sodom "were wicked and sinners before the Lord exceedingly." This is pretty tough talk, so modern sociologists prefer to describe the sodomites as having a deviate life style, a confused behavioral pattern and maybe an alcoholic subculture.

Restraints and refinements are desirable but they were a little less observed in the 19th century when Senator Beveridge was told that a corrupt politician should at least be given credit for gracious manners and a brilliant mind. His response was, "Yes, and like a dead mackerel in the moonlight, he shines and stinks and stinks and shines." Senator Huey Long in his day made quite a few similar applications in describing some of his colleagues with whom he

violently disagreed.

Another good one we often hear now is an "unmet need" which means anything a public official wants to spend money for. People who demand things they are not willing to work for and gain for themselves are exhibiting "rising expectations."

On and on it goes. The kfd who hangs around a tough gang is now suffering from "an identity crisis and driven to seek the supportive approval of his peer group." This often excuses him from looting coin boxes, swiping cars and maybe right on up to robbing the First National Bank.

There used to be hobos and bums. Hobos drew the distinction that they would work when they were hungry but bums would not. In modern reference hobos are "itinerants" and bums are people suffering from "motivational deficiencies due to deprivation."

Maybe we can get along without the rough edges of Senator Beveridge but Mr. Griscom could make a real contribution if he were still around. He might even be elected President.

### Angelo Pipeline Has Big Blowout

A malfunctioning valve was blamed for a large hole blown in the San Angelo pipeline to Lake Spence Sunday afternoon. A hole about 3 by 4 feet was made by the break. The trouble occurred about 500 feet south of the No. 2 booster station, one of the points where pumps move water along the 30 miles from the Spence Reservoir to San Angelo's municipal water treatment plant. It is this second booster station that pushes the water over the divide between San Angelo and Robert Lee.

Pressure at this point is greater than at any point along the line, and the automatic valve regulates its flow by opening a "flapper" to allow passage of the water, then gradually closing the "flapper" to slow the water.

Water Supt. Tom Koederitz of San Angelo said that evidently this "flapper" jammed shut rather than gradually closing, thus causing the explosion and damage to the line.

One 32 foot section of the line will have to be replaced. A three weeks delay in pumping water to San Angelo is anticipated, but since the city has an ample water supply no inconvenience is expected. San Angelo is guaranteed 3,000 acre feet of water annually from Lake Spence.

Lake level Tuesday was reported at 92,605 acre feet.

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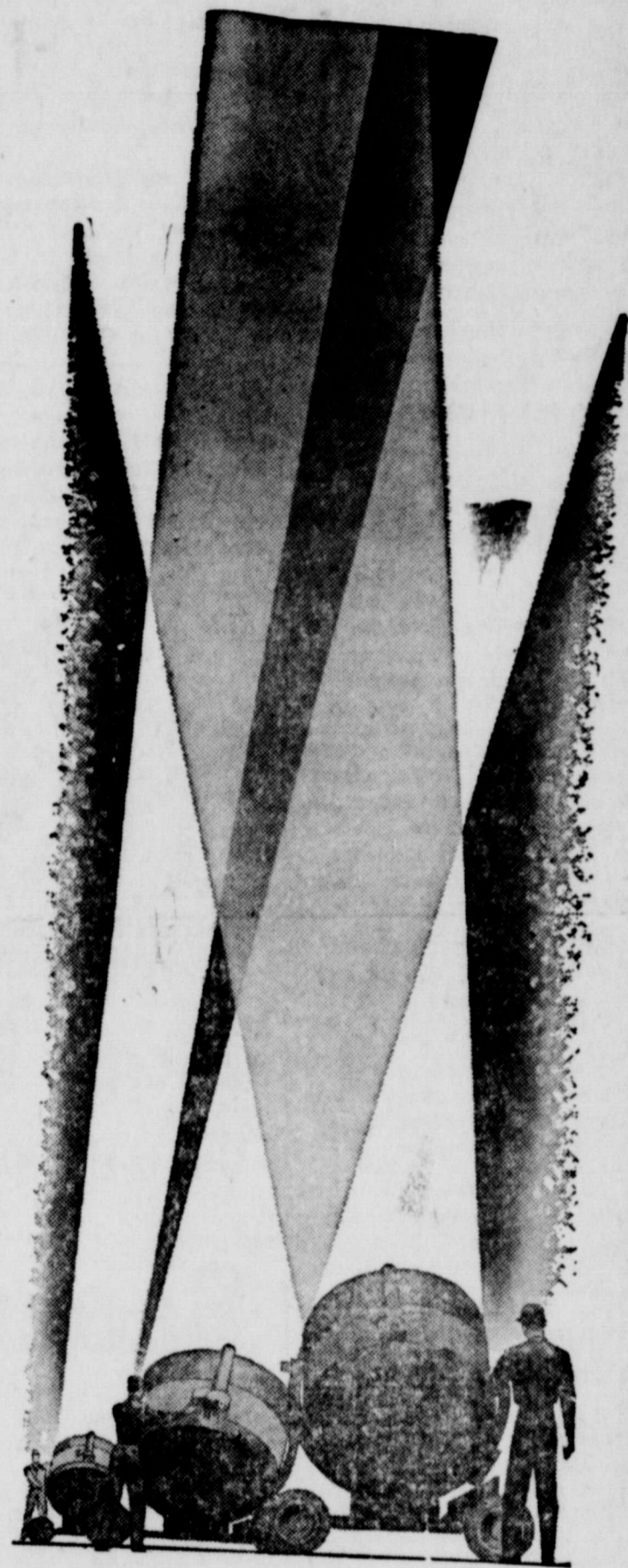
