Coke County voters, in large numbers, went along with the rest of the state in cleaning house in Austin in the primary election last Saturday. A total of 1421 voters cast their ballots in this county.

Statewide, sweeping ahead in a field of seven to reach the runoff for governor were Uvalde rancher-banker Dolph Briscoe and Mrs. Frances Farenthold, liberal Texas House member from Corpus Christi.

In Coke County Briscoe led the ticket with 711 votes, followed by Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes with 191; Farenthold, 113; Preston Smith 91.

Runoff will also be necessary in the Democratic races for lieutenant governor, comptroller, and U. S. senator.

The runoff in the nomination for lieutenant governor will pitch Houston newspaper executive Bill Hobby against Sen. Wayne Connally of Floresville.

In the battle for comptroller incumbent Robert S. Calvert will face Jim Wilson.

Barefoot Sanders will face Ralph Yarborough in a runoff for the U. S. Senate.

Outright winners in statewide races were: Treasurer Jesse James; Agriculture Commissioner John White; and John Hill, who unseated incumbent Crawford Martin for attorney general.

Coke Vote

In commissioners races in Precincts 1 and 3, Albert N. (Bob) Fields and Jett Hodd led the respective tickets. Hood won the Precinct 3 post with 140 votes. Fred H. McCabe Jr., had 80 and Elmo Bell had 52, giving the nomination to Hood.

Fields led the race for the Precinct 1 job with 195 votes. A runoff developed when Wilson Bryan got 107; Roy Casey 77; and Larry Jameson 48, pitting Fields and Bryan in a runoff.

However, early this week Bryan announced early this week that he is withdrawing from the race

West Side Calls Beer Election

Coke County Commissioners' Court Monday called a wet-dry election for Justice of the Peace precincts 1 and 3 for June 6. The proposition calls for a vote on legalizing the sale of beer for off premises consumption.

Eight petitions bearing 177 names were filed with the Court asking that the election be called; however, 24 names were stricken because signatures did not meet legal requirements. The 153 names remaining were enough

to warrant the election.

Commissioners called the election to coincide with the one on June 6 to elect a replacement for State Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford, who resigned. However, there was some question if it would be legal to hold the local option election in connection with the special senate election.

The petitions calling the election were filed in the County Clerk's office on April 26.

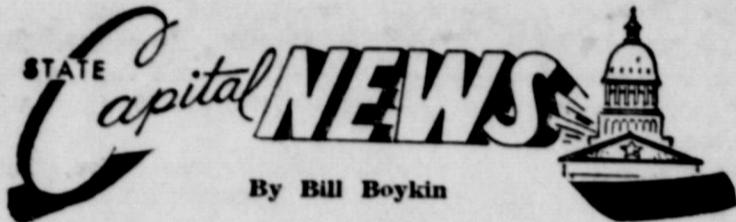

Austin — The spiraling cost of down for the first time in a decade, and expenditures for 1973 may be less than in 1972, the Governor said.

Smith's reports indicated the cost of programs in fiscal 1973 may be \$75 million less than the \$347 million estimated a year ago.

Due to a state constitutional ceiling on general revenue state expenditures for welfare assistance, a reduction in grants beginning Sept. 1 has been regarded as unavoidable.

Main reason for the slowdown in welfare's climb is a decline in old age assistance rolls and the fact that the increase in Aid to Families with Dependent children eligibility has not been as large as anticipated.

AFDC rolls, expected to expand by 10,000 a month, actually grew about 5,000 monthly.

"There is still much work that needs to be done, but for the first time in recent years, I believe we now have a handle on the problems and have finally brought them under control," Smith said.

He credited these factors as contributing to the cost leveling: New controls over medical assistance expenses, improved management techniques, a program

utilization review, more effective use of electronic data processing and a reduction of program abuse. STARTS ALL OVER AGAIN — With the hard fought first primary election just behind them, some candidates plunged right into the June 3 runoff campaign.

Of one thing they can be sure: the cost of campaigning, like everything else, is rising.

A hasty total of first primary expense-contribution reports indicates spending by the statewide candidates in contested races totaled more than \$5 million. There is no telling how many millions were spent by congressional, legislative and local end county candidates in the rush to be first at the ballot box.

For most of the candidates, the race is over, but for a few the big one is just starting.

INSURANCE PLAN SUBMITTED — A personal injury protection plan for the motorist is proposed by State Insurance Board Chairman Larry Teaver as an alternative to controversial no-fault auto insurance.

Teaver will unveil his plan officially at the board's annual hearing on auto insurance in July. It would eliminate uninsured motorist coverage and medical payment sections of standard auto policies. It would substitute a provision giving policyholders, without regard to fault in accidents, unlimited medical expenses, life insurance in event of fatal accidents and income replacement guarantees.

Governor Smith, meanwhile, called on Teaver to intensify efforts to bring about lower insurance rates for responsible young and elderly drivers. A reduction in rates for drivers under 25 would encourage them to drive safely and curb the accident toll, Smith contended.

DEATH RATE LOWER — Department of Public Safety reports the death rate from auto accidents last year was the lowest since 1962.

The number of deaths per 100 million travel miles was 5.1. This is the best figure since 1962's 4.9 per 100 million miles.

Still, 4,594 died in traffic accidents in 1971. Ninety-five per cent, DPS noted, wore no safety belts.

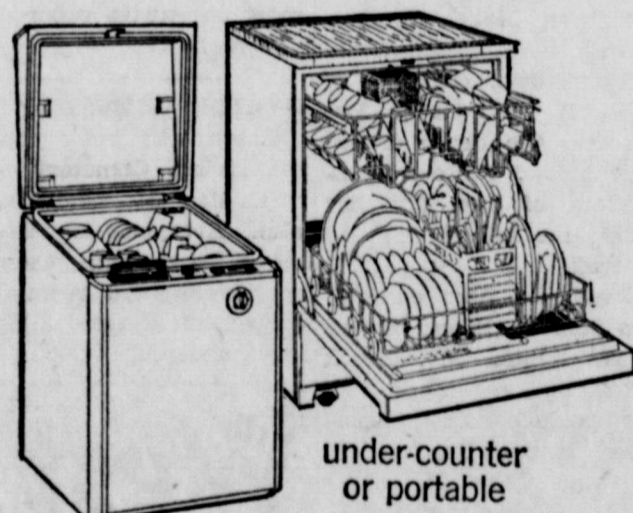

Doyle Caulder, Robert Lee, came in with a string of 17 channel cat weighing up to four

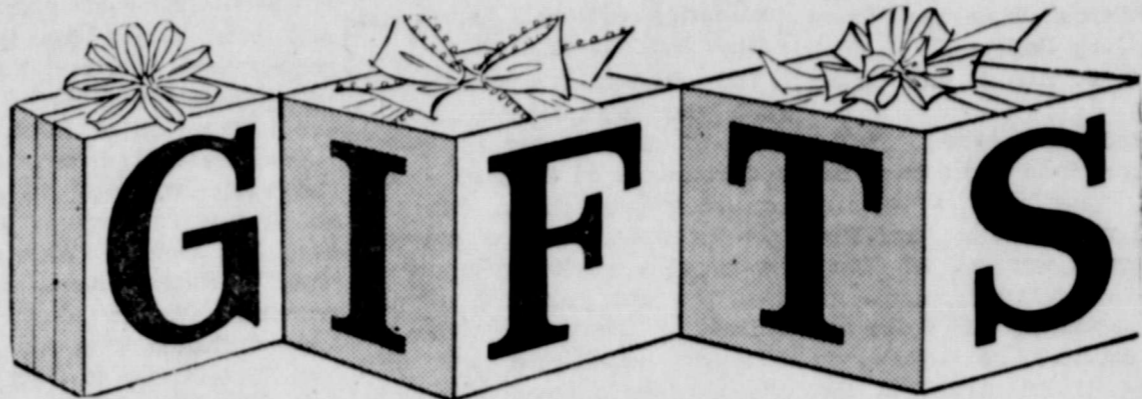
pounds, and James Jennings, Odessa, also reported catching 17 channel cat ranging up to two pounds.

Sprays Mean Ironing Convenience

One of the advantages of aerosol packaged products is convenience. Take spray starch and spray fabric finishes. An entire garment, damp or dry, can be sprayed and pressed on the spot. Or the sprays can be used for added crispness on collars, cuffs, and trims. And, if a first coating isn't enough, a quick respray and ironing again will add more body.

Both starch and fabric earn their keep by improving the appearance and feel of many items and restoring body lost in washing. Though both can be used on either damp or dry washable fabrics, they are made of different substances. Starch gives firm body or crispness while fabric finish provides light body. Also, fabric finish is especially suitable for synthetics, permanent press, and blends because it responds well with the lower iron temperature settings recommended for these fabrics.

These laundry aids make washing and ironing easier. Dirt is deposited on the coated surface rather than embedded in the fibers. Thus, soil washes out easily.

Glidability is an ironing plus. But it is important to understand that sticking can result from excess moisture or improper iron temperature setting. When this happens starch or finish can build up on the iron and under continued heating this buildup will scorch. To avoid this situation, don't overly dampen material and do use the iron setting for the type of fabric being ironed. If a low setting is needed, it may use the iron setting for the type of fabric being ironed. If a low setting is needed, it may be wise to switch from starch to fabric finish which permits smooth ironing at lower temperatures. It also helps prevent sticking or scorching on dark washables. The starch or fabric finish is sprayed on the wrong side to

eliminate shine and allowed to be absorbed by the fabric a few moments before ironing.

Fabric finish may also solve flaking problems if too much starch remains on the surface of the fabric or iron temperature is too low for starch effectiveness. Some resin treated fabrics do not absorb starch well. If this happens, turn to fabric finish, or roll up the garment for a minute until starch is absorbed.

For satisfactory and economical use of sprayer, be sure to follow instructions for use. Often a "faulty" can has not been "declogged" after use. Most can labels suggest shaking the contents before using, lining up certain markers on spray button and can, holding the can at the proper angle and, finally, cleaning the spray opening either by removing and rinsing the button, or holding the can upside down and exhausting the last residue in the "hose."

Clean Your Medicine Cabinet

For both convenience and safety, clean out a medicine cabinet regularly. Discard prescriptions and medicines no longer in use. If there are small children in your home, this method may provide a safe and easy disposal. Wrap medications in several sheets of newspaper and discard immediately. Then wash shelves, cabinet walls and doors, replace contents in an easy-to-use manner. Remember, a locked medicine cabinet is the only sure method of keeping inquisitive children from sampling toxic preparations.

Washington — More than 70 per cent of our population now lives on only 2 per cent of the land area in America. Our cities are literally falling apart. Attempts to help the large intercities with all sorts of federal programs have been about like trying to cure cancer with a Band-Aid.

The prosperity of the United States is unparalleled by any country in all history. During the early years of this nation, we were a striving country with a balanced growth. Fertile lands enabled agriculture to lead the way in our economic growth. Gradually but dramatically came industrialization which brought about fast growing towns and cities. We continue to have growing pains but of a different nature. Changes have come about by urban centralization and has ended our balanced growth.

Following the depression of the 1930's, there started a migration from the rural areas to the cities. In a quarter of a century, that is up to about 1955, a decisive turn was made away from small towns and rural life. Since the beginning of World War II more than 30 million Americans have left the farms and small communities and the migration rate continues at about 600,000 people each year. This is a slackened pace of movement but still a serious one.

Costs for providing services for city dwellers have skyrocketed and yet services received continually diminish in quality.

Small towns, once viable and productive, are having difficult times providing their own services, finding employment and the wherewithal to support the essentials of modern life.

Within a few weeks the Congress will probably enact legislation for the purpose of alleviating what is becoming a crisis in both rural areas and urban centers.

The measure is known as the Rural Development Act of 1972. Different versions of the proposal have been passed by the House and Senate. They now go to conference between the two bodies of Congress where these differences will be ironed out.

The legislation is labeled "Rural Development Act" but its intent is to "develop America." It provides a comprehensive program of investment credits and incentives for people in industry to locate or remain in rural America. A system of credit would be provided to improve community facilities and finance business enterprises. It would expand authority for the development of natural resources and conservation and would improve fire protection. It would also expand non-farm and small farm development services.

The central purpose of the legislation is to make it possible for rural communities to develop in all facets of its community life

and hopefully return to a balanced economy.

If this can be accomplished, people will no longer have to go to cities to find jobs but rather remain in smaller communities and keep our population dispersed. It will afford a better life in all of its aspects. If this could be accomplished, the results would improve conditions for a better future and a better choice of location for living and raising a family. The cities would be relieved of the tremendous pressures which have created insoluble problems and flights to suburbs, leaving dead cities behind.

It is recognized that there is a vast difference between theory and practical application but unless something is done along these lines, conditions for improvement can only worsen. People crowded together in our cities is a chief cause of crime, disease, poor schools, inadequate health care and all the other deficiencies apparent in our society. These circumstances drain the resources of the more rural areas and everyone is the victim.

Some way must be found to enable people to help themselves to reverse the trend of migration to the already partially paralyz-

ed cities. If properly administered the Rural Development Act could be a step in the right direction.
