Mr. Fields died at 6:45 p.m. Friday in Big Spring Veterans Hospital after a long illness.

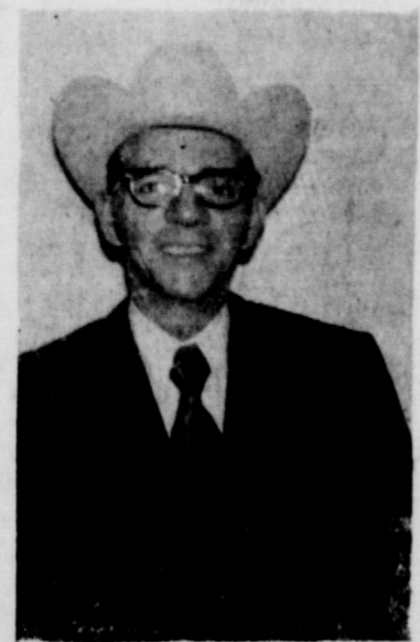

Should the United States help rebuild North Vietnam? U. S. economic aid has been proposed. Personally, I would oppose any American assistance for the North. Peking and Moscow financed and equipped the aggressors, which resulted in vast damage to both the North and South. A safe bet would be that the Soviets and Red China will offer no reconstruction help for South Vietnam.

Now that the war in Vietnam is over, casualty assessments are being made and property damage estimated.

From the Communist standpoint, their war of aggression against South Vietnam has been a dismal flop. Supported from the beginning by Moscow and Peking, Hanoi's legions suffered an estimated 921,350 killed and immense property damage.

The South was ravished by brutal attacks, many villages destroyed, and nearly a half million civilians slaughtered. It is estimated 180,676 of the defending troops were killed.

The tragic U. S. involvement, which cost 46,928 killed and a number of others unaccounted for, blundered grievously by depriving the military of strategy and decision making actions which experts believe could have won that war long ago.

It was not until Haiphong harbor was mined, interdiction of enemy supply lines stepped up, and intensive bombing unleashed against the crucial Hanoi-Haiphong military complex in December, that the coup de grace occurred which brought about a settlement and the release of American prisoners.

Surely, the United States will never again allow itself to become involved in another Vietnam-type war.

### 4-H GIRLS MAKE PLANS FOR FOOD SHOW SUNDAY

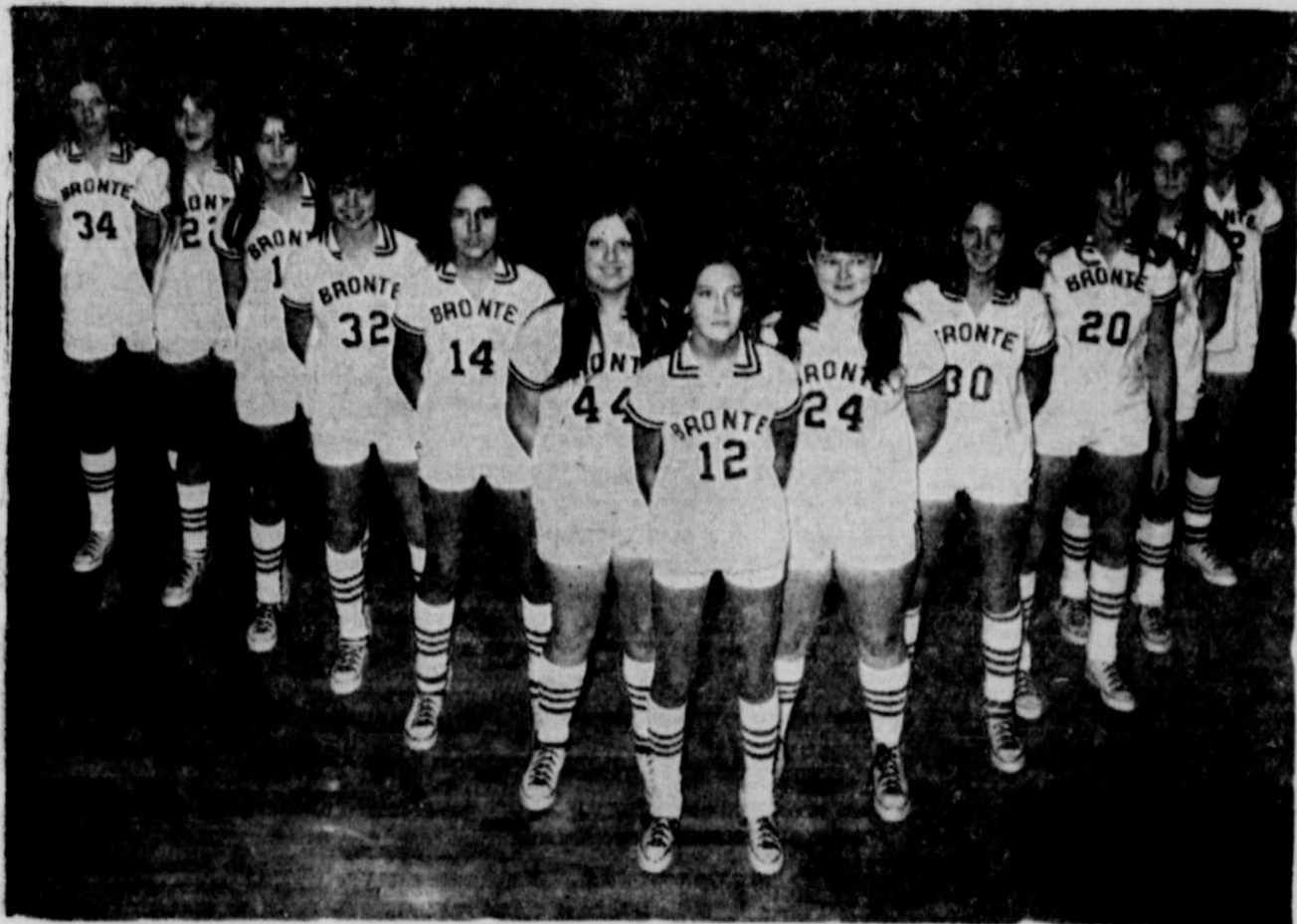
Mrs. Fay C. Roe, County Extension Agent, met Monday night with a group of Bronte 4-H girls.
