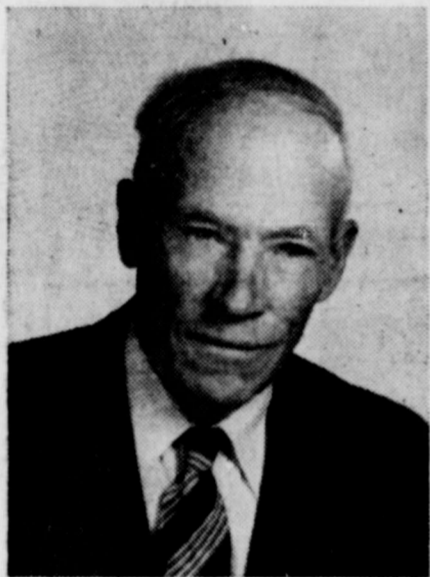

Funeral services for James I. (Jim) Adair, 84, were held Tuesday at 4 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church. The pastor, the Rev. Russell Heaner, officiated, assisted by the Rev. M. E. Patterson, pastor of Central Baptist Church, and the Rev. Harry Morris, pastor of First Baptist Church. Mr. Adair died Sunday night in Bronte Nursing Home following an illness of several weeks.

He was born Nov. 21, 1888, in Jack County. He moved to Coke County in 1905 and had lived here since. He was a Methodist and a member of the Bronte Masonic Lodge. His 50 year pin as a Mason was received recently.

He was married to Nellie Ruthertford Sept. 3, 1916, in Crabtree, Ark. He was a retired farmer, but in later years was engaged in painting and carpenter work.

Survivors include his wife of Bronte; two sons Tolbert Adair and Doyle Adair, both of Houston; three daughters, Mrs. Lois Baker and Mrs. Charlie Phillips, both of San Angelo, and Mrs. George Faulk of Midland; 13 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

(Editor's note: This newspaper was in error last week on some of the facts concerning Judge W. W. Thetford's report on possible expenditure of federal revenue sharing money. We hope that we have been able to get the facts straight this week. But it isn't easy.)

The postcard poll recently taken by the commissioners' court on how citizens of Coke County want to spend federal money received through the President's revenue sharing idea went like this:

The water district to provide water in rural areas received the most No. 1 votes. In spite of the fact that the water project received

the highest priority from Coke County citizens, it will have to be pushed aside for the time being at least, because its ultimate cost is out of line with what the county can expect from the federal revenue sharing program.

It is expected that enough of the county's money will be spent to bring up to date the county's water and sewer plans which were drawn up six years ago. In case federal grants again become available, the county would then be ready to apply immediately for assistance in developing a county wide water plan.

Receiving most No. 2 votes in the poll from the west side of Coke County was a new stock show barn, while citizens of the east side voted No. 2 for a recreation center at Bronte.

In view of all aspects of the situation, it appears that the commissioners' court will spend the federal money available for these two projects.

The county is required before June 30 to publish a legal notice on how the federal money is to be spent, and building either a rec hall at Bronte or a show barn in Robert Lee would well take care of the \$34,000 which must be reported on before the end of this month. The official notice on the matter says that the county will spend \$34,000 on "recreation-culture" for the citizens of this county.

The poll showed that No. 3 in the minds of Coke County citizens was new fire fighting equipment at Bronte and library services at Robert Lee.

The county has \$60,000 to spend but it does not have to be reported on until later. It is anticipated, said Judge Thetford, that part of this sum will be spent to build

covered wagon and mules to Brewster County. Mrs. Arrott was a telephone switchboard operator at Marathon and was working at the time Plameho Villa was making raids into Texas. During one such raid, she blacked the town out to protect the citizens.

The Arrott family moved to Coke County in 1924. During the depression years, Mrs. Arrott and her family made saddle blankets and girls with a spinning wheel and looms, using mohair they had raised and could sell for only five to eight cents a pound.

She moved to San Angelo in 1950.

What's wrong with America's health knowledge? ... More than 100 million adult Americans believe that vitamin pills give added pep and energy, 90 million say that a bowel movement every day is necessary for good health, and almost 13 million think that over-the-counter "diet pills" really work.

Except for those suffering from an extremely poor diet or for others in special medical situations (such as pregnancy, nursing, and recuperation from a long illness), there is no sound evidence that extra vitamins do anything at all to improve health — although in most cases they do no harm, says Philip L. White, Sc.D., of the American Medical Association.

What about regularity? TH talked with several gastroenterologists and all agreed about one thing: Americans are much too concerned about this problem, and for no very good reason. There is no single standard of "regularity" that can be applied to whole populations.

and may miss a more serious problem, underlying the need for laxatives.

Beside those Americans who worry about being healthy and regular, are those who worry about being fat. Most of the 17 million people who have used appetite suppression drugs have been under a doctor's care, but many have simply wasted their money on over-the-counter diet preparations.

The survey of 2,800 representative Americans, commissioned by the Food and Drug Administration of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) and part of a six-year federal study, also showed that:

*One in eight adults admitted that he or she would self-medicate, without seeing a doctor, for longer than two weeks for such common ailments as sore throat, hay fever, upset or acid stomach and sinus trouble.

*One fourth of all adult Americans claim to have arthritis, rheumatism, or a similar disease. Half of them have never had the condition diagnosed by a doctor, and half have never been treated by a doctor.

"I don't know but I advise you to cancel."

"Well," I implored, "I'm the

luncheon speaker at the convention of the Reserve Officers Association in Las Vegas on June 15. It's really a big event, and I want very much to attend. I hear I'm to receive a national honor."

My two doctors consulted a moment and said, "You've had no heart attack, but you need to get some rest. You've been pushing too hard. You should get some rest and get away from this place for awhile—too much tension!"

"Well, you're the doctors," was all I could think of to say. You know, when he starts talking about your heart you don't argue with a doctor.

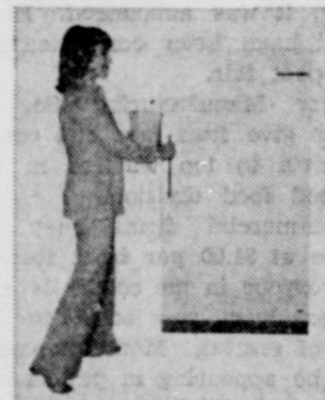
COKE IN AIR FORCE FLY OVER AREA

Some areas of Coke County are in the path of high speed, low level routes for intensive training of tactical air reconnaissance aircraft, according to a news release from Bergstrom AFB.

Fashion Follies

Fashion plates beware! Those wide, swiny palazzo pants and high, still like platform shoes which have become standard parts of your wardrobe have something else in common besides their attractiveness. They can turn you into a walking accident!

Pants with wide, loose cuffs get caught in bus doors, car doors, revolving doors, elevator doors. They can be gobbled up by escalator teeth, swept up on bicycle chains and wheel spokes. They can catch your shoe heels as you get into them, or trip you as you climb stairs. For safety's sake, fit them properly around the waist so that they don't ride down, and hem them so that they hang no lower than the ankle bone. If you must ride a bike while wearing wide, wide pants, use a clamp on the pant legs to narrow the expanse. And be careful!

Platform shoes are a bone of contention between foot doctors and female enthusiasts. Although demand in some stores continues to be as high as some soles, there are women whose injuries give weight to the claims of many foot specialists that wearers of clogs risk a twisted ankle. If you must

wear them, watch your step. Judge each movement with your shoes in mind and allow for the deeper sole area at each step, curb, or any floor level change. Cultivate a crisp, steady gait. Platforms and pedals don't mix, and do keep a pair of normal shoes in the back seat of the car or in the bicycle carrier.

Single Knits

For one of today's major looks in fashion, soft and unstructural, the single knit may be a perfect choice of fabric.

But the pattern selection must be made carefully.

The "right" style for single knits will have simple lines, and will be suitable for medium to lightweight fabrics.

Look for gathers or soft draping, so appropriate for soft fabrics.

Avoid such features as A-line skirts, which depend on the firmness of the fabric for shaping.

Check the back of the pattern envelope for the recommended fabrics listed.

If a four inch wide strip of the knit will stretch crosswise to five inches or more, it is quite stretchy.

In this case, find a pattern designed "for knits only." These patterns are designed with less ease, fewer closures and darts. When made in a stretchable knit, the resulting effect is a satisfying one for the home seamstress.

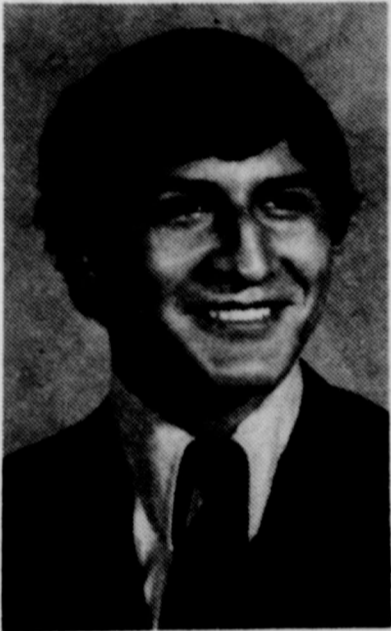

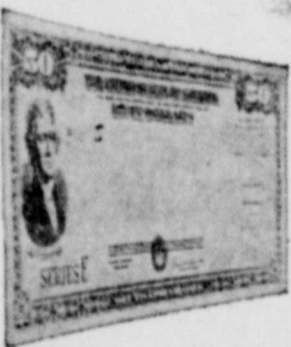
