"Bronte Beautifíication Week" officially begins today and will continue through next Friday, July 13. Purpose of the project is to clean-up, fix-up, paint-up and, in general, to improve the looks of the residential and business sections of the city.

The project is being sponsored

by the Bronte City Council, with Councilman L. O. Clark serving as chairman. Mayor Martin Lee issued a proclamation last week declaring July 6-13 as "Beautifíication Week" and called on all citizens to cooperate in making the period a time to beautify the city.

Everyone is requested to put forth a special effort to beautify his property, including residential, commercial, vacant lots, rental property, etc.

Residents of the city are asked to gather up all trash and junk and place it in alleys in containers, as no loose trash will be picked up. "Pick Up Day" will be held after July 13.

Clark said several boys will be needed to assist with the trucks to remove trash. Interested boys who want temporary employment should contact him.

Special awards will be given for homes considered to be best groomed or most beautiful. A special committee will tour Bronte Friday morning, July 13, and award the first place winner \$10.00 and a "Bronte Beautifíication Award" yard plaque; second place winner will receive a \$7.50 cash award and third place winner will receive \$5.00.

Clark and other members of the City Council urged everyone to cooperate and make everything look as nice as possible.

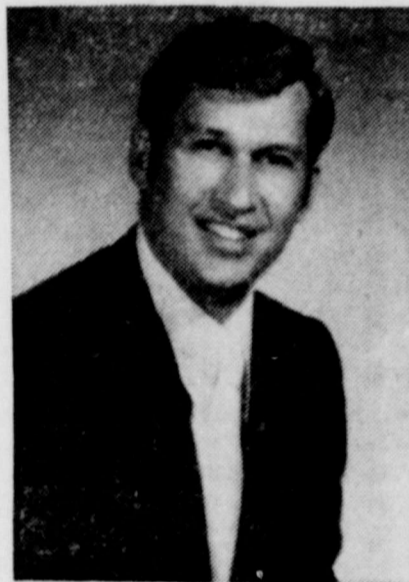
The Rev. Harry K. Morris, pastor, said that everyone is invited and urged to attend the revival services. "Everyone will receive a warm welcome," he said.

Interest on Savings May Be Increased

E. F. Glenn, president of First National Bank, said Thursday that they had heard rumors of reports that the Federal Reserve Board has approved a one-half of one per cent increase in the interest rate which can be paid on savings accounts.

He added that bank officials have received no official word on the increase and until they do they can pay no higher rate of interest on savings and time deposits.

However, Glenn said, if and when official approval is given to an interest rate increase, First National will begin paying it immediately.

School Board Has Meeting

Bronte School's board of trustees met June 14 for its regular monthly meeting.

The board reviewed the school's contract with the firm which was

More Medicare benefits . . . This year the federal government will spend an estimated \$24.2 billion to keep Americans healthy. Medicare alone will account for nearly \$12 billion — 26 percent more than last year. Much of the money will be used to pay hospital and doctor bills of the nearly 1.5 million disabled workers who are newly eligible for coverage. Previously, only those who had reached age 65 were covered. Beginning this month, however, all disabled workers, regardless of age, who have been receiving Social Security or Railroad Disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more, now qualify for Medicare.
 The new coverage includes the following:
 1. Disabled workers.
 2. Disabled widows and widowers between 50 and 65.
 3. Mothers, 50 and older, who became disabled in the last two years and have not sought disability payments because they collect benefits as the mothers of young or disabled children in their care.
 Persons under 65 who need kidney transplants, or dialysis, are also covered, provided they worked at least one-and-a-half years or long enough to be in-

ured (depending on birth date). Similar treatment will also be provided for insured workers' wives or husbands and dependent children.
 A booklet, "A Brief Explanation of Medicare," describing the expanded coverage is available at any Social Security office.
Acne and Vitamin E . . . Will rubbing vitamin E on the skin help my acne, asks a reader, or should I take vitamin E capsules to help clear up the condition? Neither, says Linda Schoen, Today's Health beauty adviser. Acne is not caused by any vitamin deficiency, and there is no scientific evidence to support claims that vitamin E is helpful for acne or acne scarring.
 If you have acne that does not respond to routine skin care, such as frequent cleansing and use of non-prescription products, consult a dermatologist for treatment. "There is no cure for acne," says Ms. Schoen, "but proper treatment can help minimize the severity of the condition and subsequent scarring."

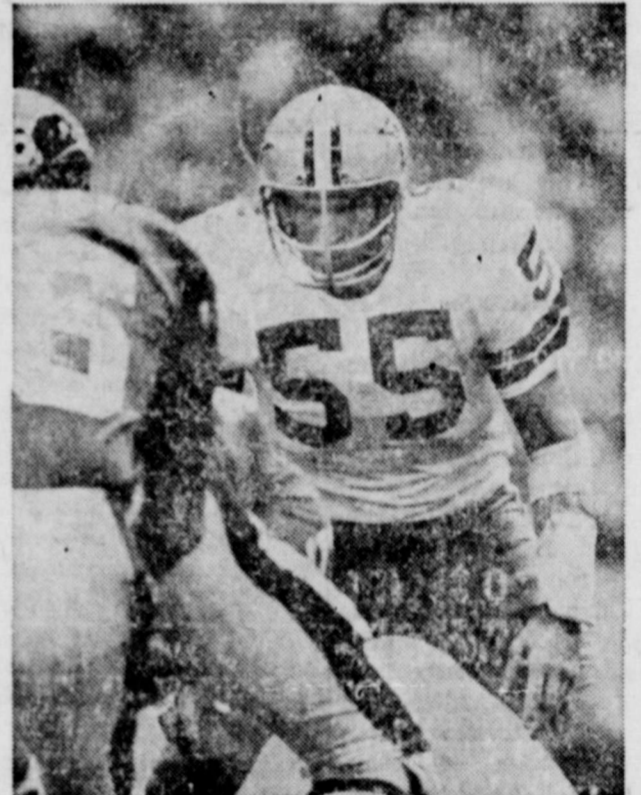
