

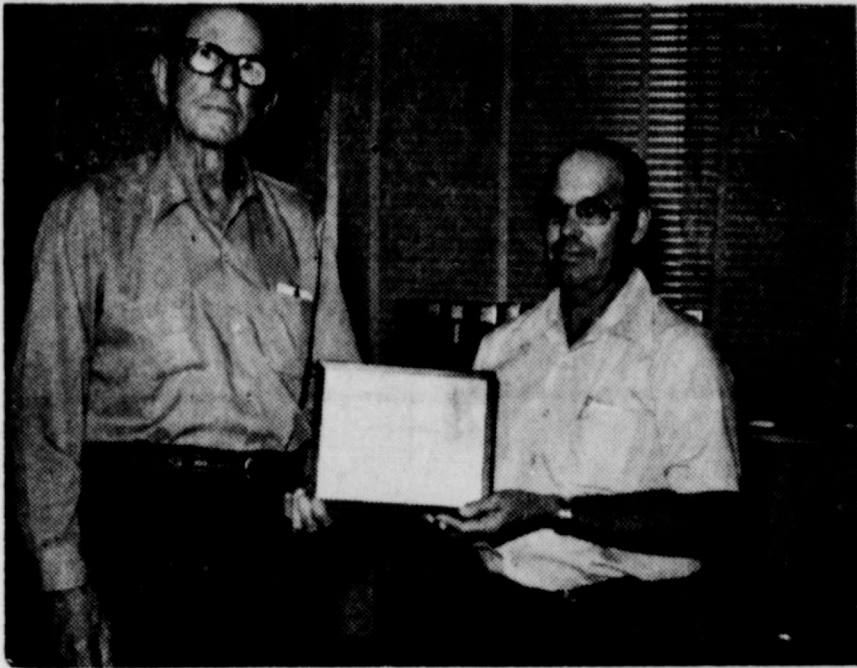

4.3 Inches Rain Here Past Week

Bronte has received more than 4 inches of rain during the past week, with about half of it falling Wednesday night and early Thursday morning. The rainy spell started last week when a front moved in on Tuesday and continued through the week as the dissipating Hurricane Delia moved into West Texas. The Wednesday night rain came with a wicked looking cloud, high winds and a brilliant electrical display. A couple more showers during the night came with more high wind, thunder and lightning.

Dave Seibold's gauge showed a total of 4.3 inches for the week,

as follows: Sept. 7, 1.4 inches; Sept. 8, .5 inch; Sept. 10, .3 inch; Sept. 11, .1 inch; and Sept. 12, 2 inches.

Pete Nutter recorded 4 inches since last Thursday.

Tennyson had 1.8 inches Wednesday night, with a total of 5.2 inches since Tuesday of last week. On the Clark place east of Tennyson 3.2 inches fell Wednesday night, while 3.6 inches was reported on the Green place on the river.

The week's total on the A. N. Rawlings Ranch southwest of Bronte was 6 inches, with 2.9 inches falling Wednesday night.

Austin — An executive order has been issued by Gov. Dolph Briscoe creating the Division of Rural Community Services in the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Governor Briscoe, who has listed rural development as one of the priorities of his administration, created the new division in response to what he termed "the urgent needs of rural areas."

In announcing the new rural services office, Governor Briscoe said the role of the Texas De-

partment of Community Affairs is to make all state resources available and accessible to local communities as they strive to help themselves.

The Rural Community Services Division will provide information and technical assistance to rural communities and will assist in development of a state policy for rural development, the Governor said.

The new office will serve as a clearing house and will be a central state office that rural communities can go to for help, said Briscoe.

Raymond L. Prewett, executive director of the Texas Rural Development Commission, has been named to head up the Division of Rural Community Services.

A major part of his new duties, said the Governor, will be to assist rural communities in their relations with state and federal agencies and to direct communities with specific problems to the appropriate agencies.

Along the same line, the Governor has acted to expand the Texas Industrial Commission to include three members from rural areas. In the past, membership on the Commission has been two employers of labor, two employees or laborers and five members from the general public.

The Texas Industrial commission is responsible for planning, organizing and operating a pro-

gram for attracting and locating new industries and to promote the expansion of existing industries in Texas.

REVISION COMMISSION REVERSES ITSELF — The Texas Constitutional Revision Commission reversed its Aug. 25 decision — that the Texas Legislature should meet annually — and voted that the proposed new Constitution should require the legislature to meet once every two years. But the time and duration of session or sessions would be set by the lawmakers themselves.

POT LAW RULING DUE—The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals is expected to rule later this fall on an amendment to the state's criminal code to allow resentencing of persons previously convicted of possession of marijuana.

Travis County Dist. Atty. Bob Smith, who argues against implementation of the resentencing provision, claims it amounts to commutation of sentence, a power which the constitution gives only to the governor.

"Just because you call a horse a cow doesn't make it a cow," Smith told the Criminal Appeals Court. "Just because they (the Legislature) call it a resentence doesn't mean it's not a commutation," Smith said.

Lawyers on the other side of the question claim the resentencing provision is an authorization for the courts to review sentences, upon request from the defendant, and amend them, if justified.

About 800 persons serving terms in Texas could be affected by the outcome of the ruling. Conviction of possession of marijuana carried possible sentence of up to life imprisonment prior to revision by the 63rd Legislature to reduce first possession penalties.

WARM UP THE WEDDING BELLS — It's a December wedding in the Governor's Mansion for Janey, daughter of Gov. and Mrs. Dolph Briscoe. The Dec. 29 wedding date was set as Gov. and Mrs. Briscoe announced Janey's engagement to Edward Vaughan of Hillsboro.

The groom-to-be is a junior law student at St. Mary's University in San Antonio. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Vaughan III of Hillsboro.

Short Snorts

U. S. Sen. John Tower reports the Environmental Protection Agency will award a \$2,150,348 grant to the Texas Air Control Board to enable the state agency to continue its air pollution program.

Governor Briscoe spent a week in Japan encouraging Japanese investors to consider building mills in Texas to process cotton fiber at its source before exporting to Japan.

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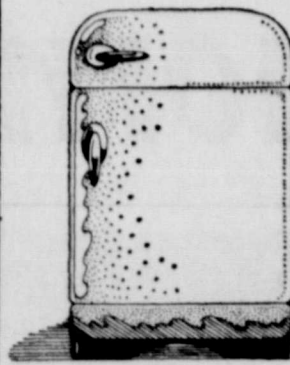


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Our Newsletter

The Senate Watergate hearing is to be resumed soon, and is, according to Senator Ervin, to be concluded about six weeks later. Considerable rumbling has developed about continued TV coverage, and a good many are saying the "show" should be shut down, that it has served its purpose, and it's time to let the courts perform.

While exposure of any form of skullduggery may be useful, there is serious danger that excessive publicity may jeopardize the ability of the Department of Justice to successfully prosecute any Watergate culprits who may be indicted. Many prospective

jurors become opinionated and courts have reversed convictions where excessive publicity made fair trials improbable.

Repatriation of U. S. blacks to Africa? A New York Times reporter recently wrote a feature story entitled "U. S. blacks build new life in Africa," in which he told how pleased "a few thousand black Americans living permanently in Africa" are with what one immigrant described as the "ageless, rhythmic vibrations" of the dark continent.

How extensive this repatriation move may be remains to be seen. Not long ago Rep. Robert Nix, a black congressman from Phila-

delphia, introduced a bill to authorize our government to negotiate with African states for undeveloped land where U. S. repatriates would be settled. The African nations would be well compensated. Free transportation would be offered along with other benefits—a sort of foreign aid for the countries involved.

This plan is really nothing new. The idea was advanced by Thomas Jefferson, later by Abraham Lincoln, and some Negro leaders have proposed in the past that repatriation to the fatherland be sponsored by our government. But unless more interested is manifested it is not likely that anything will be done to promote repatriation, other than voluntary moves such as was described in the New York Times article.

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FILM ON RIVER MINISTRY TO BE SHOWN ON KTXS-TV

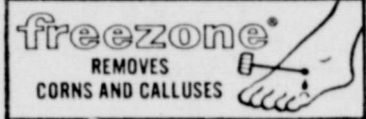

Longhorns Down Newcastle In Season Opener, 39-6

The Bronte Longhorns looked good in their season opener last Friday night when they downed the Newcastle Bobcats 39-6.

Alan Barbee provided most of the scoring power with his four touchdowns and kicked three extra points. The other counters came on pass plays from Quarterback Nelson Coulter to Bub Waldrop and Jim Dan Raughton.

First Quarter

Bronte won the toss and Raughton took Choate's kickoff. He was nailed on the 37. Barbee carried three times for almost 10 yards and Coulter kept on 4th down for a 1st on the 50. Barbee went 18 for a 1st on the 32, then moved to the 27 on two tries. Coulter passed to Raughton on the 19 for the 1st down. Wayne Alexander ran for a yard and David Chapman added 4 more before Barbee went to the 9 for the 1st. Barbee carried twice to the 1 and then ran over the right side for the counter. The kick was blocked and the score was 6-0.

Barbee sent the kickoff booming to the goal line where Casteel took it and carried out to the 16. Louis Martinez blocked a pass attempt and Raughton nailed Choate for no gain. Moody made 4 yards and the Bobcats had to kick. The Longhorns fumbled the punt, however, and Newcastle kept the ball and had a 1st down on their own 44. The Cats couldn't move and the punt went to Raughton on his 30. A clipping penalty moved the ball back to the 15. The Horns bogged down and Barbee punted. A Newcastle lad fumbled it and Raughton recovered on the Cat 43. Chapman made almost 10 and Coulter added 3 for a 1st on the 30. Bronte was penalized for being offside and had a 1st and 15 as the quarter ended. Score: 6-0.

Second Quarter

Alexander picked up 9 on the first play of the second quarter, then went for a long run, which was nullified by a clip. The next play worked out better as Coulter drew back and threw the ball to Bub Waldrop for a touchdown. Barbee kicked the EP and it was 13-0.

Barbee kicked to Casteel on the goal line and he moved out to the 15 where Chapman tackled him. Reynolds made 12 and a 1st on the 27. Choate carried three times but a penalty made it 3rd and 10. The Cats made a 1st on the next play as Claborn took a pass to the Bronte 47. After three tries, the Cats punted to Raughton on the 15 and he was downed on the 27.

A Bronte fumble was recovered by Williamson on the 27 but a penalty put the ball on the 32. Moody kept the ball on the next play and swept the left end to go all the way to pay dirt. Try for extras failed and the score was 13-6.

Barbee took Claborn's kick and was hit on the 35. Chapman went for 2, then Barbee got loose for a 24 yarder and a 1st down on the Newcastle 39. Alexander went for 5, then Coulter tossed him a short pass and he was hit before he could untrack. Bronte got its 1st down, however, as the Cats drew a 15 yard penalty. With the ball on the 14, Barbee went around the left side for a TD, but it was called back and Bronte was penalized back to the 29 for clipping.

Coulter kept for 6, then tried two passes and couldn't find an open receiver. On 4th and 16, Coulter tossed a pass to Raughton for a beautiful play and 6 points. Barbee's kick made the score 20-6.

Newcastle got off one play after Barbee kicked off. On 2nd down Barbee intercepted a pass as the horn sounded. A penalty against Newcastle allowed the

Horns one more play, and Coulter picked up good yardage as the half ended.

Third Quarter

Barbee kicked off to Choate on the 5 and Chapman nailed him on the 30. Chapman then recovered a Bobcat fumble on their 33 to give Bronte the ball. Barbee stepped off 9 yards, then Chapman went for 5 and a 1st on the 19. Next play saw Barbee sweeping the right end for the TD. Try for extras was no good and the score was 26-6.

Barbee kicked to Choate who was stopped on the 27. After three tries the Cats had to punt. It was killed on the Bronte 44. Alexander carried for short yardage, Barbee added 1 and a penalty against Newcastle gave the Longhorns a 2nd and 4. A pass to Bob-

by Bailey made 6 and a 1st on the Cat 44. Coulter ran for 9 and Chapman made the 1st on the 30. Barbee picked up a big 23 yards and a 1st on the 7. Then the local lads bogged down and lost back to the 16. A field goal try failed and Newcastle took over on the 20.

Three plays netted 7 yards and the punt went to Bronte's 46. Chapman made 6 yards, then the Horns were penalized 5. Barbee made 3 for a 3rd and 5 as the third quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

Bronte drew another 5 yard fine. Second try was a pass to Raughton for 10 and a 1st on the Cat 46. Barbee ran a yard, a pass to Bailey netted 5, then a pass to Waldrop for 21 yards and a 1st on the 19. Barbee sail-

ed around the left end for the 19 and a touchdown and then kicked EP to make the score 33-6.

Choate ran Barbee's kick back to his 44. Casteel made 6 yards but the Bobcats had to punt. It went to Raughton on his 23. The Horns tried three plays which made 2 yards and Barbee punted to Allen who was downed on the Bronte 43. The Cats lost a yard on four carries and Bronte took the ball back on the 44.

After losing 3 yards in two carries the Horns tried a pass to Bobby Bailey. It fell to the dirt but officials ruled interference so Bronte had a 1st on the Newcastle 43. Alexander ran for 9 yards, then Barbee added 5 for the 1st on the 29. Barbee went all the

way, but it was called back and Bronte was penalized back to the 34. Next play Coulter tossed a short pass to Barbee who had to run all over the field before he eluded his pursuers and made the 34 yards and a touchdown. Try for extras failed and the score was 39-6, with 52 seconds on the clock.

Barbee's kickoff went to Bullock and the Bobcats got off three plays before the gun sounded. Final score: 39-6.

Good defensive work was turned in by Raughton, Martinez, Waldrop, Chapman, Alexander, Clint Porter, Paul Cervenka, Kerwin Denton, Coulter, Dan Brown, Mike Gonzales, Kit Carlton and Mark Lee.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days;

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session;

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million;

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified;

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."
