

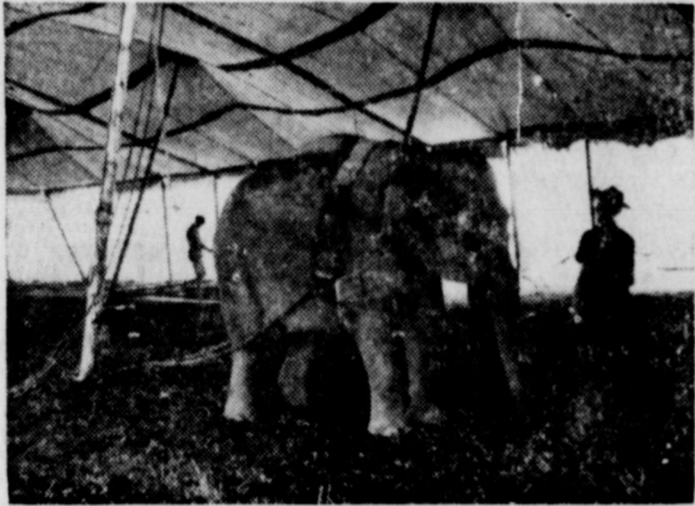

Robertson was born and lived in the Friendship community northwest of Robert Lee until he was grown. He graduated from Robert Lee High School in 1959. He attended the game warden school at Texas A&M in 1961 and served as a game warden with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department at Pecos from September 1961 until March 1964, when he transferred to the Department of Public Safety.

Deputy Ensor is a life long resident of the Bronte area. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hollis Ensor, and lives in Bronte with his wife and children. His wife is a teacher in Bronte School. He was employed by the Texas Highway Department before taking the deputy job.

Mrs. W. E. Jacoby is the only member of the Sheriff's Department left from the previous administration. She remains as the office deputy.

Upon taking his present position, Robertson issued the following statement to the citizens of Coke County:

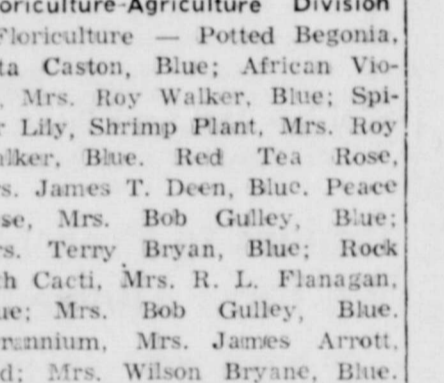

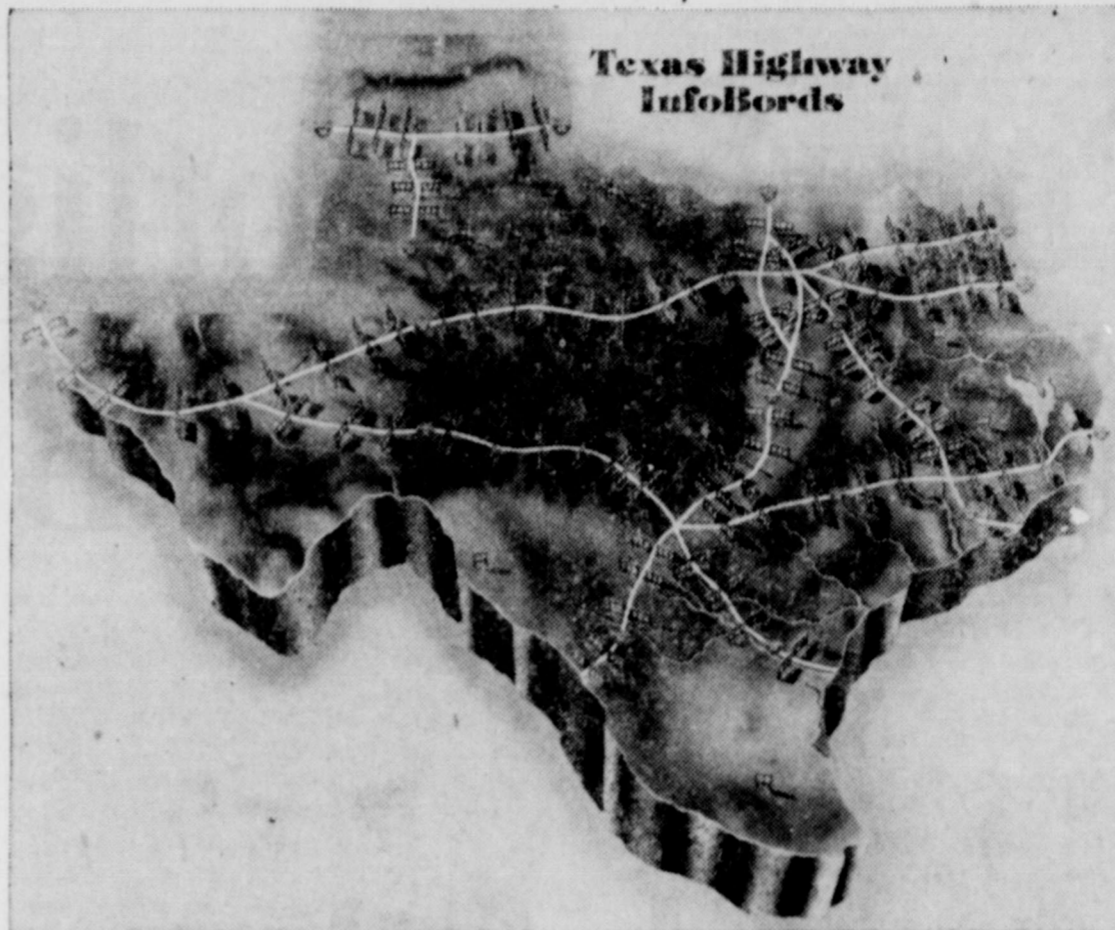

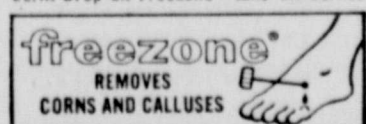

# Longhorns Stampede Over Menard, 41-8

The Bronte Longhorns warmed up for district play by defeating Class A Menard 41-8 in a game played there last Friday night. The contest was close in first downs, 14 to 13; in passes thrown, 22 to 24; and in total yards rushing, 200 to 186. However, the local lads gained 156 yards in the air lanes to the opponents' 51.

Jim Dan Raughton scored two touchdowns on pass receptions of 20 yards and 13 yards, and he caught a total of six passes for 91 yards. Alan Barbee scored on

runs of 32 yards and 20 yards, kicked a 32 yard field goal and kicked two extra points. He carried 17 times for 102 yards. Kyle Lee recovered a Menard fumble in the end zone and Wayne Alexander rounded out the scoring with a 4 yard run.

## First Quarter

Barbee kicked off to the Menard 10. Menard picked up two 1st downs, then punted to the Bronte 20. A fumble, a short gain and an incomplete pass forced a punt that Barbee zoomed to the Menard 40.

The Yellowjackets couldn't move and after the punt, the Longhorns picked up their first 1st down on a Coulter to Raughton completion. Alexander got 3, Coulter 5, and Raughton a big 25 on a pass from Coulter. Three running plays and an incomplete pass caused the Longhorns to cough up the ball on the Menard 20. The Jackets ran one play, fumbled, and the Longhorns recovered, via Mike Gonzales, on the 35. Barbee got 10 and Raughton 1 before the quarter ended.

## Second Quarter

On the first play of the second quarter Barbee hit Raughton for 20 yards and 6 points. Barbee kicked the extra point. Score: 7-0.

Barbee kicked off to the 10. Five running plays, two penalties and an incompletion forced a Menard punt that was taken by Raughton on the Bronte 40 and returned to the Menard 43. Barbee got a big 23 and Coulter 12 before two incompletions set up a field goal situation which Barbee used to make 3 points from the 32. Score: 10-0.

After the kickoff Menard picked up a 1st down before pass plays were broken up by Raughton and Barbee. Raughton returned the punt to the Menard 28. Barbee got 6, Coulter 3, and Barbee 1 for a 1st on the 18. When two running plays netted only 1 yard and a pass fell incomplete in the end zone, the Horns tried another field goal. This one was blocked and Menard took over on the 21.

Paul Cervenka broke up a Menard pass, another fell incomplete, and a partially blocked punt set up Bronte's next touchdown from the 31. Coulter hit Raughton for 18 yards and 13 yards to put the Longhorns out front 16-0. Barbee's conversion kick was blocked.

Following the kickoff Menard took to the air but Nelson Coulter and Marvin Waldrop defended well and the Longhorns took over on the 33. Coulter threw to Barbee for 25, Barbee got 4, and Alexander went in from the 4. Barbee converted and the score was 23-0.

When Menard took to the air again Raughton broke up one pass and Barbee intercepted one that he returned to Bronte's 45. Coulter hit Raughton for 15 as the first half ended.

## Third Quarter

After Menard kicked off to Bronte, the roof fell in. Two penalties, short runs and a short quick kick gave the Yellowjackets the ball on Bronte's 35. Menard picked up two 1st downs before Ray Williamson sneaked over from the 1. David Millican ran the conversion and the gap was closed to 23-8.

Bronte took the kickoff, ran two plays and lost a fumble. Then Coulter recovered a Menard fumble. He then hit Bobby Bailey with a big 25 yarder. Two 1st downs moved the ball to the 20 where Barbee broke over the middle for pay dirt. A pass attempt conversion failed and the score was 29-8.

The rest of the quarter saw Menard making two first downs, one on a fake punt.

## Fourth Quarter

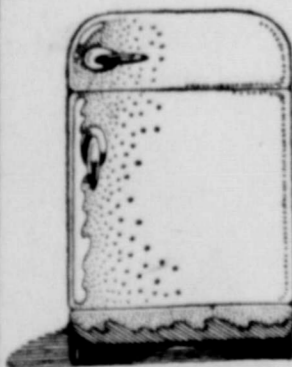
