### Coke Highway Work Scheduled

Projects in Coke County are included in a \$40.7 million program to increase safety and improve sections of non-Interstate highways in Texas.

District Engineer J. A. Snell of San Angelo said work to be performed under the annual program includes such things as widening of pavements and structures, reconditioning, resurfacing, providing additional surfacing, sodding and improvement of shoulders and other miscellaneous work.

Projects in Coke County are: State Hwy. 158, from State 208 in Robert Lee, to U. S. Hwy. 277 in Bronte-Seal Coat.

State Hwy. 158, from Robert Lee west city limits, west 7.7 miles—Seal Coat.

State Hwy. 70, from 2.0 miles south of Nolan County line, south 2.0 miles — Reconstruct Grading, Structures and Surfacing.

Statewide, the 1974 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement Program includes work on 5,095.2 miles of US and State numbered highways and Farm to Market Roads. The program includes 810 individual projects in 209 counties of the state.

Fifty-seven per cent of the work statewide will be on US and State numbered highways and 41 per cent on Farm to Market Roads with two per cent reserved for later assignment.

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**Mrs. Roe Attends Food Stamp Meet**

Teaching local Food Stamp recipients "how to make the most of their stamps" was the subject of a two day meeting recently in Brudy attended by Mrs. Fay C. Roe, Coke County Extension Agent.

More than 22 county Extension agents from throughout the area heard federal and state government agency representatives discuss food buying and nutrition, said Mrs. Roe.

"Representatives from the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service explained how food stamp recipients can buy the nutritious foods necessary for a balanced diet without having to supplement their food stamp allotments.

"They also discussed the retailer role in the food stamp program," the agent said.

A Texas Department of Public Welfare representative told agents how the food stamp program is administered in Texas and outlined its operation as well as the requirements for obtaining food stamps.

Foods and nutrition specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, detailed food buying principles and demonstrated the preparation of nutritious, low cost foods, Mrs. Roe said.

Commenting on the Food Stamp program, the agent noted that prior to a year ago, some Texas counties, including Coke County, did not have Food Stamp programs. The program will become effective here Nov. 1.

"The Food Stamp program soon to start in Coke County includes plans for the educational phase to begin during late October," Mrs. Roe said.

"The educational phase—subject of the two day meeting—is designed to help limited income people utilize resources," she explained.

**ASC Regulations Changed in Coke**

Consolidation into a one-community county has been announced by the Coke County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committee for the election of farmer committeemen and administration of federal farm programs by the committee members.

Commenting that it is essential to keep the farmer-elected committee system viable and responsive to needs, ASC county committee chairman James Allen said that the consolidation will provide several benefits, including the direct election of ASC county committeemen by farmers and ranchers.

Until this year, Coke County farmers voted for community committeemen, who in turn elected the county committee members. The county ASC committee has direct responsibility for administration of farm programs in Coke County.

Now three communities will be consolidated so that the county becomes, for ASC purposes, a one - community county. Coke County farmers will elect in a mail election in November one ASC committeeman and two alternates instead of three community committeemen and two alternates as in the past. Nominations for county committeemen are being accepted, beginning Oct. 4.

County ASC committeemen serve three year terms, with one committeeman elected each year. Alternates serve one year terms.

Allen pointed out that the community committee system in the county has gradually become obsolete as travel and communication facilities have improved, farm programs have been simplified and the number of farms reduced. The 1973 legislation in particular calls for far less administrative involvement in programs, and much ASCS business is now handled by mail.

"With fewer program regulations to explain and discuss with farmers handling their own decision making, the county committee will give farmers the same direct communication they have always had with their farm program agency," Allen said.

"I want to emphasize that consolidation into a one-community county strengthens the farmer-elected committee system here in Coke County," he added.

**H D Agent's News Dept.**

Numerous calls have come in to the office lately on ways to pickle jalapeno peppers. This recipe works well for me—we enjoy them all year in casseroles and as a pickle even though they are hot!

**Pickled Jalapenos**

Wash and pack tightly into hot jars the jalapeno peppers.

Combine in saucepan:

- 1 cup vinegar
- ¼ cup water
- ¼ cup olive oil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon mixed pickling spice

Bring to boil. Cover peppers with boiling hot liquid leaving ½ inch head space. Close jars and process in boiling water bath 10 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as water returns to boiling.

To can in a water bath use tall container with lid and rack to keep jars off bottom of canner or pot. Seal jars, put into container of hot water, fill to ½ inch to 1 inch above top of jars. Bring to a full boil and boil as indicated in recipe. Remove jars with tongs and cool on table away from draft.

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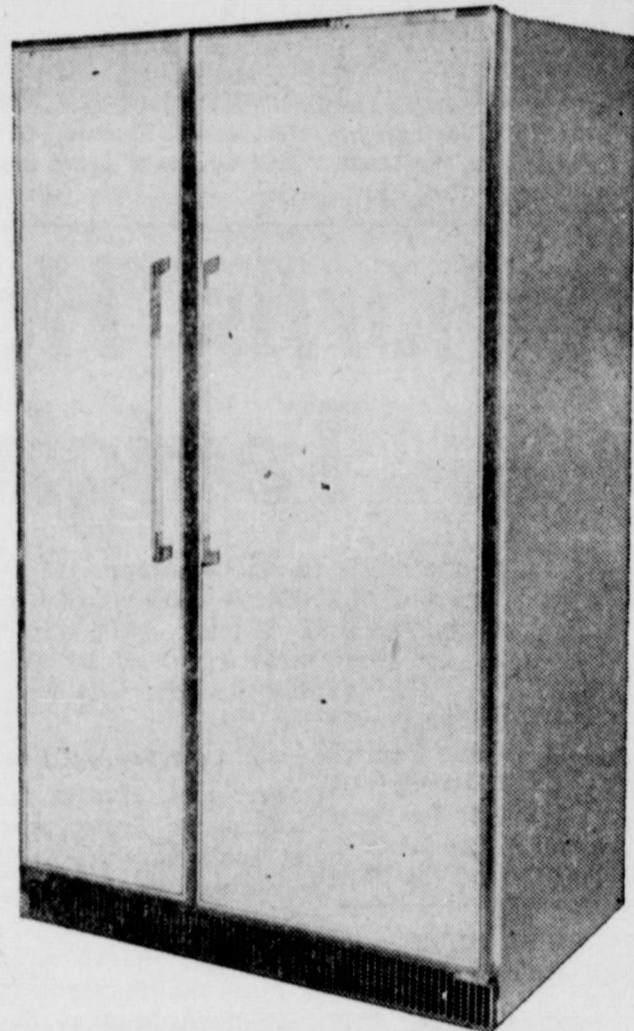

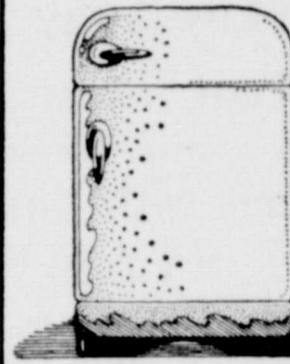

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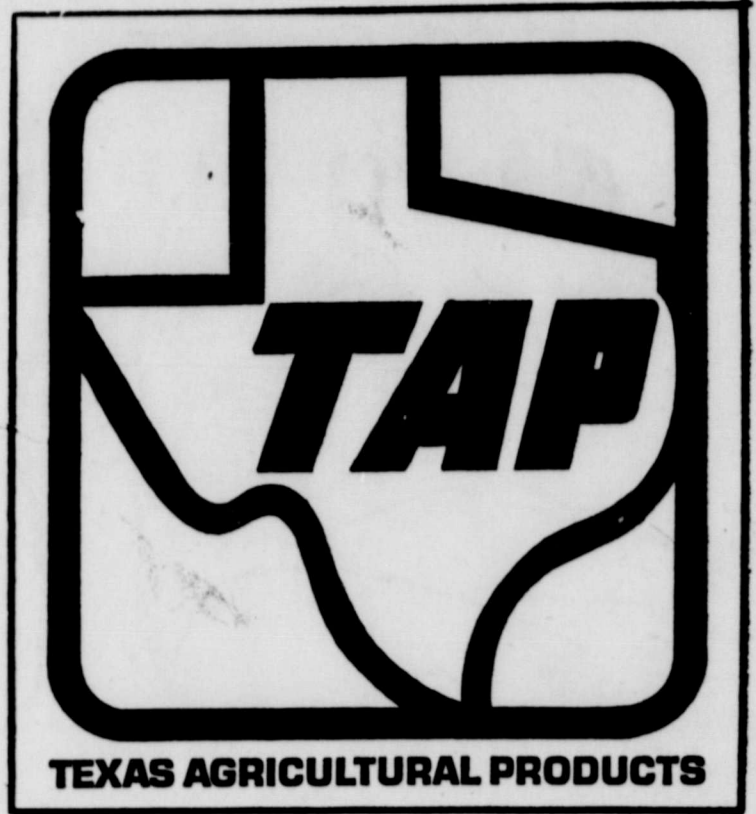

# Longhorns Squeak By Hawley, 14-8

A tough goal line stand late in the 4th quarter saved the ball game Friday night for the Bronte Longhorns. The defense held at the 1 yard line to give the local lads a 14-8 win in their district play opener with the Hawley Bearcats.

Bronte's two counters came on a 1st quarter pass from Alan Barbee to End Bobby Bailey and a 2nd quarter run by Barbee. Barbee kicked both extra points. Morris made Hawley's lone TD

and a pass play gave the Cats 2 extra points.

## First Quarter

Wayne Alexander took the opening kickoff and was pulled down on his 28. Barbee made 9 yards in two tries and Alexander made the 1st on the 40. Kim Barrett went for 4 and Nelson Coulter added 9 for another 1st on the Hawley 45. Barbee made 5 more. Coulter made 10 and a 1st on the 30. Alexander drove for 2. Barrett added 6 and Barbee made a 1st on the 18. Then Barbee took the pitch from Coulter and traveled 12 yards to the 6 and a 1st down. Barrett made 2, then a loss moved the ball back to the 10. Next play was the pass to Bailey for the TD. Barbee's kick was good and the Horns were ahead, 7-0.

Hawley speedster Tim Pack carried the kickoff to the 33 before he was pulled down. A clip set up a 2nd and 18 for the Cats. A couple of plays later the Hawley bunch fumbled and Louis Martinez recovered. The Longhorns moved the ball for 1st downs on the 26 and 11, then a fumble gave the ball to the Bearcats on their 9. The Cats ran a couple of plays, but were faced with a 3rd and 10 as the 1st quarter ended.

## Second Quarter

The Cats ran for 5 yards, then had to punt. However, a penalty against Bronte gave them a 1st down on their 21. It did them no good, as they still couldn't move and punted to their own 46 yard line.

Barbee and Coulter alternated carrying the ball and went for 1st downs on the Cat 30, then the 15, then the 3 yard line. From there Barbee went over the right side for the final 3 yards and 6 points. He kicked the extra and the score was 14-0.

Pack was downed on his 33 after taking Barbee's kickoff. Greg Morris and Pack carried for a 1st on the 50, but then the Longhorn defense decided that was enough. The punt went out on the 12 yard line. Barbee gained 8 yards, then Hawley recovered a Longhorn fumble on the 14. The Cats fumbled and recovered but lost 8 yards. After 4 tries the Cats gave up the ball on downs on the 23. Three plays later the 1st half ended.

## Third Quarter

After allowing the Longhorns to completely dominate the 1st half, the Bearcats looked like a different team as the 3rd quarter

began. Barbee kicked off to the Cats and they started from their 35 yard line. Morris and Pack did most of the ball carrying and made 1st downs on their 46 and the Bronte 42. They were stopped on the 39 and punted to the 12.

The Horns bogged down after being penalized and a quick kick was tried, but it wasn't too successful, as the Cats brought it back to the Bronte 15. Next play, Morris went through the middle for the Hawley touchdown. A fake kick wound up as a pass to give the Cats 2 extra points and to make the score 14-8.

Jim Dan Raughton returned the kickoff on his 41 yard line. The locals started a nice drive with Barrett and Barbee carrying and made a 1st on the Hawley 49. A pass to Raughton was good for another 1st on the 39. A 5 yard fine made it 1st and 15. An incomplete pass fell dead, then Barbee caught one for 7 yards, and on 3rd down the Hawley defense trapped Coulter for a loss. The punt was blocked by Morris and Hawley got the ball on the Horn 38. The Bearcats traveled to the Bronte 43 before the 3rd quarter ended.

## Fourth Quarter

After one try the Cats punted, but they drew a penalty and had to do it over. The long punt went to near the goal line to Raughton who brought it out to the 13. The Horns couldn't move, so Barbee punted. The Bearcats fumbled it and Mark Lee recovered on the 15. The Horns wound up short, however, and Barbee punted to the Hawley 35. A 15 yard fine moved it to the 48.

The Cats took over the ball game for the next few minutes and went for 1st downs on the Bronte 41, the 30, the 20 and the 9 yard lines of the Longhorns. Things were not looking at all well as the Bearcats were definitely moving and were only 9 yards from pay dirt. But the the Horns gave ground grudgingly. The Cats had a 4th and goal on the 1, but the tough Longhorn defense jarred the ball loose before the Cat carrier could get that last yard. The Horns took over on the 2 and a penalty moved the ball to the 17. Three plays later the clock ran out. Final score: 14-8.

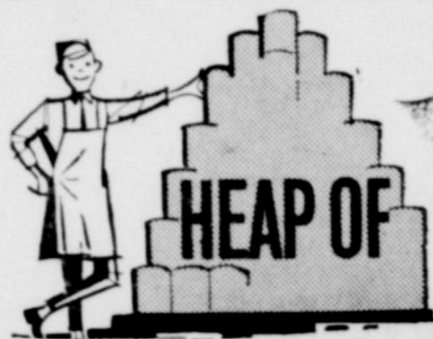
