Students at Bronte School and employees of First National Bank will have a holiday Monday.

School will be dismissed in order for teachers to attend a district convention in Brownwood. Classes will resume at the regular time Tuesday morning.

Robert Lee Lad Killed In Gunshot Accident

Funeral services for Coy Darwin Long, 11, were held Monday at 3 p.m. in Robert Lee Baptist Church. Kenneth Green, minister of Northside Church of Christ, officiated and burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Young Long was killed Saturday afternoon in a shooting accident northwest of Robert Lee. He was pronounced dead upon arrival at West Coke County Hospital about 5:30 p.m.

Justice of the Peace Roy P. Ross ruled death due to accidental gunshot wounds. Judge Ross told the Observer that the youth had been hunting with his uncle, Martin Roy Long of Lubbock. They were on the old Sanco road about three miles east of Sanco when the accident occurred. The two got into the Pontiac automobile in which they were riding and the youth placed the single

shot .22 rifle he was carrying butt-down on the car floor board. Long then asked his uncle what time it was and was told he didn't have a watch. The lad then

asked what was wrong with the car's clock and leaned over to check it. When he leaned over the gun fired. Judge Ross said the bullet entered the left side of his chest, came out under his shoulder blade and lodged in the top of the car. The elder Long rushed him to the hospital, but he was dead on arrival.

Long was born June 6, 1962, in San Angelo and was a fifth grade student in Robert Lee Elementary School.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Otho Long of Robert Lee; three brothers, Richard Long of San Angelo and Kyle Long and Randy Long of Robert Lee; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Wojtek of Robert Lee and Mrs. Woody Long of Lubbock.

Pallbearers were Bobby Baker, Jesse Eads, Jimmy Killam, Roy Tinkler and R. L. Flanagan, all of Robert Lee, and Robert Teschendorf of Bronte.

Blackwell Services For Joe A. Smith

Funeral services for Joe Anders Smith, 68, were held in Blackwell Cemetery Saturday morning with the Rev. Kay Corley officiating. Newby Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

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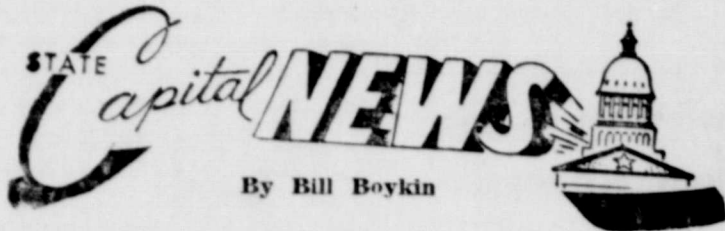

Austin — The chairman of the State Railroad Commission has issued a grim warning that natural gas shortages will hit Texans hard this winter.

In a speech to Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association at Dallas, Chairman Jim Langdon said:

* Propane already is in short supply due to stockpiling to offset the natural gas shortage.

* As much as 500,000 barrels daily of distillate fuel oil will be needed from November to March.

* If distillate use is as high as predicted in the state, three to five times above normal, shipments to out of state consumers may have to be cut 50 per cent.

* Out of state commitments, mandatory federal allocations and other factors may require that

Texans share proportionally in shortages.

"This means that Texas might be denied access to its total distillate needs, but that access to its normal requirements could be cut," said Langdon. "The gasoline supply-demand situation, as well as every other petroleum products, will experience shortages this winter. As in the case of natural gas, a shortage in any type of fuel which results in an unsatisfied demand will exert pressure on available supplies of other fuels, setting up a domino like effect."

Langdon recommended early construction of offshore deep water ports to accommodate super tankers from foreign countries and stepped up development of domestic reserves of oil and gas

(including shale oil) and increased use of coal.

Meanwhile, only one major customer of Lo-Vuca Gathering Company, Lone Star Gas Company of Dallas, rejected a Railroad Commission temporary increase — to 29.55 cents per 1,000 cubic feet — on natural gas delivered by the big Houston based company to its customers around the state.

CREDIT INSURANCE CUT UNCERTAIN — Credit life insurance rates, which haven't been cut since 1968 in spite of reductions in losses, are going down, but it isn't certain how much.

The subject caused a minor hassle between State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie and Marcom Shockley, Board life insurance division head, at a hearing on credit insurance.

Shockley recommended a 23 per cent cut in single premium reducing term rates and 10 per cent reduction in rates for a level term coverage based on a three year experience factor.

Christie wanted to figure on the basis of 1972 losses only, which would cut reducing term rates 25.3 per cent and level term rates 18.6 per cent. The chairman later told newsmen Shockley had recommended the larger reduction during Board conferences.

Board statistics point to \$15 million to \$18 million overcharges annually.

TASK FORCE CREATED—Gov. Dolph Briscoe set up a multi-agency task force on youth care and rehabilitation to coordinate efforts at problem solving in the area.

Said Briscoe: There is too much duplication of effort and overlapping of service; too much emphasis on institutionalization and not enough on prevention; not enough inter-lay between governmental agencies; not enough study to determine how to correct deficiencies; and to many cases of child abuse and neglect.

COURTS SPEAK — The Court of Criminal Appeals held unconstitutional a resentencing provision of the new law reducing marijuana penalties, designed to permit lighter sentences for those convicted under old statutes.

U. S. District Judge Jack Roberts directed the federal government to spend the entire \$11 billion appropriated by Congress to build water treatment plants. He granted a summary judgment sought by Texas.

The State Supreme Court agreed to review a case involving the amount of recoveries under uninsured motorist insurance policies.

The U. S. Supreme Court held Texas cannot hold back on giving prisoners credit for good behavior until their appeals are final. The decision affirmed lower court findings that the system rewards some prisoner while denying time credit to others.

Short Snorts Texas Safety Association launched a campaign to eliminate 'booby traps' on 187,000 miles of county roads and city streets.

Rep. Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi asked an investigation of 38 deaths in state mental institutions during the last two years.

A manpower policy report to the Governor recommends eliminating all discrimination in state hiring and creation of a Texas Fair Employment Practices Commission.

The Governor has asked for federal disaster aid in flood damaged Guadalupe, Hidalgo and Wilson counties.

Texas is the first state in a single year to rehabilitate more than 25,000 through vocational retraining programs.

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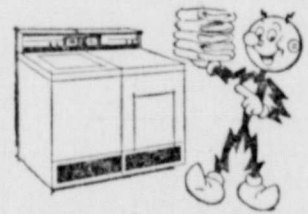

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Horns Slaughter Mustangs, 69-0

The Bronte Longhorns had an easy time of it last Friday night when they swamped the Sands Mustangs 69-0 in a District 3-B encounter.

Alan Barbee scored an unbelievable 41 points. Nelson Coulter ran for a TD, then passed to Jim Dan Raughton accounted for two and Mark Lee returned a pass interception for a TD. Wayne Coalson and Kim Barrett made two point conversions each and Barbee kicked the ball for the other EP tries, missing only two.

First Quarter

Barbee took the opening kickoff to the 22 then made 16 for a 1st on the 46. Barrett made 4 and Wayne Alexander went for 11 and a 1st on the Sands 39. Barbee rambled 15 and 14 yards for 1st downs on the 24 and 10. Barrett went for 4 and Coulter kept for 6 and the TD. EP try failed and it was 6-0 with 2 minutes and 14 seconds gone.

Barbee kicked off to Rodriguez who was downed on the 20. A couple of plays netted 2 yards, then the Mustangs fumbled and Bronte recovered on the 24.

Alexander went 9 yards. Barrett added 10 for a 1st on the 5 yard line and Barbee went around left end for the TD. His kick was good and the score was 13-0.

Barbee kicked to Dyer who was tackled on the 33. Sands fumbled and recovered but lost 19 yards and a pass to Floyd was completed to bring up a 4th and 15. Floyd's punt went to the Longhorn 40. The Bronte team drove to the Sands 25, making 1st downs on the Sands 37 and 23. They bogged own and the Mustangs took over on downs at their 25. It was three tries and punt with Bronte getting the ball on their 36. Barbee ran 7 yards before the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

On the first play of the new quarter Barbee got loose and rambled 57 yards for another counter, and then kicked the extra point to make it 20-0. Sands took the kickoff and stopped on their 33. Bronte was fined 15 yards on next play, moving the ball to midfield. A fumble at the 47 was recovered by Louis Martinez. Coulter tossed to Raughton on the 1st down, and the play covered 47 yards for another TD. Barbee's kick was true and it was 27-0.

After the kickoff Sands lined up at their 32 yard line. A penalty made it 1st and 15. A pass try was intercepted by Coulter giving the Horns the ball on the 36. Substitutions were going in and Donald Butler went for 5, Bobby Frazee added 1 and a pass to Raughton made a 1st on the 15. Frazee went for 4 a couple of times and Coulter made the 1st on the 4 yard line. Next play was a short pass from Coulter to Raughton for a touchdown. Barbee kicked the PAT and the score was 34-0.

Kennemer took Barbee's kick and was stopped on the 31. After three tries the Mustangs had to punt. It was a good kick and went to Raughton on the Bronte 40. Coalson made 6, Frazee added 2 and Coalson made the 1st on Sands' 49. Marvin Ensor ran the ball twice and made a 1st on the 39. Frazee made 2 and Coulter kept for 8 and a 1st at the 29. Bronte drew a 15 yarder for clipping placing the ball on the 32. Two incomplete passes and a long 3rd down completion ended the half.

Third Quarter

Martinez kicked off to Rodriguez who was stopped on the 30. Raughton intercepted a 3rd down pass on his own 45 and returned it 43 yards to the Sands 12. Barbee ran around right end for the score. The EP try failed and it was 40-0.

Rodriguez took Martinez' kick and was downed on his 38. Again a 3rd down pass was intercepted, this time by Coulter, to give the Longhorns the ball on the Sands 42. Barrett made 9, Bronte drew a 5 yard fine and Barbee made 24 yards and a 1st on the 14. Barbee went over left side for another touchdown. A pass try for extras failed and the score was 46-0.

Martinez booted an onside kick and Bobby Bailey recovered on the Sands 42. Coulter went 11 for a 1st on the 31, and Barbee went 13 yards for another on the 18. Barbee went 8 yards to the 10 then went the rest of the way for another TD. His kick was good and the scoreboard read 53-0.

Martinez kicked to Bodine who was hit on the 24. Kit Carlton intercepted a Sands pass on the 30 and returned it to the 27. A penalty against the Horns moved the ball back to the 40 and allowed Sands a 1st down. On the first play of the new series Alexander intercepted a pass on his 45 and returned it 26 yards to the Mustang 29. Sands drew a 15 yard penalty and a couple of plays later Bronte returned the favor by being caught clipping. With a 1st and 25 on the 32. Coalson, Coulter and Frazee moved for short yardage and Bronte drew a 5 yarder for delay of the game, making it 4th and 20 on the 27 as the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

An incomplete pass gave the ball to Sands on the 27. Kennemer took a pass for a 1st on his 41. Next play saw Carlton intercept at the Sands 49. Alexander went 11 yards for a 1st on the 38. Coulter made 2 and Ensor carried two times for 15 yards and a 1st on the 21. Ensor made 3 more, Coalson made 3 and then 4 for a 1st on the 11. Barbee relieved Coulter as quarterback, and kept for 7, then went around right end for a TD. Coalson ran the EP and it was 61-0.

Martinez' kickoff was carried to the 31. After being penalized 5 the Mustangs threw a pass which Mark Lee intercepted and went for another counter. Barrett ran over the right side for 2 points to make it 69-0.

After the kickoff the Mustangs punted to Raughton on the 45. He carried 17 yards to Sands 38. The Horns couldn't move and Barbee punted a beautiful high spiral into the end zone to give Sands the ball on their 20. After a couple of plays a pass was intercepted by Barbee. Butler carried for no gain and Barbee made a long run as the final gun signaled that the massacre was over. Final score 69-0.

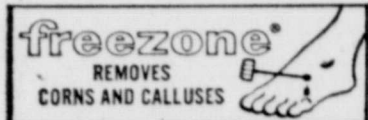

when farm prices were advancing to new record levels, very little has been said regarding recent farm price declines. Agricultural producers are well aware of price declines during the past few weeks.

Cattle prices, for example, have decreased 30 per cent during the past several weeks (the same is true for hogs). The price decline is the biggest since 1950.

It shows again that the law of supply and demand does work in agriculture. As more livestock went to market, the price declined and these downward dips to producers hopefully will result in lower prices for the consumer. Livestock prices—as is the case with all agricultural commodities—will continue to go up and then down. Prices to farmers do in fact fluctuate widely on the short range as well as the long haul. Meanwhile, production costs of farmers remain fairly static and in fact continue to increase in price even though the price that farmers receive for their food and fiber gyrates constantly.

This is one of the lessons in agricultural economics that the general public knows very little about, yet it is basic to farming and ranching.

Texas farm prices as of Sept. 15 are down two per cent below the previous month.

Beef cattle at \$47.80 per cwt. are down \$8.50 from a month ago.

Hogs at \$41.80 were \$14 below last month. Other meat and poultry prices were also below month ago levels. Sheep at \$15, for example, were down \$4.40 per cwt. from a month ago; lambs were down \$3.90. Broilers were off two cents from last month, and turkeys declined four cents per pound. Egg prices dropped six cents per dozen from a month ago.

Crops showed some price increases, the first in some time. Cotton was up nine cents from a month ago but is still more than 20 cents under parity. Grain sorghum was up 28 cents from a month ago. Wheat was up 23

cents per bushel.

DRYLOT sheep feeders with a lot capacity of 200,000 head or more had 107,000 sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter as of Sept. 1, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

This is nine per cent below the number on feed a month earlier and 10 per cent below the number on feed Oct. 1 a year ago.

Current intentions to market are: October 47,000; November 33,000, and December 27,000.

Placements during September totaled 34,000 head with a total of 10 feeders reporting 1,000 or more head on feed as of Oct. 1. Marketings during September totaled 50,000 head.

Commercial slaughter of red meats in Texas is reported to be down three per cent during August and 14 per cent below a year ago.

Cattle slaughtered totaled 290,000 head, which is 8,000 below the number slaughtered a month prior and 42,000 under a year ago.

Hog slaughter is 50,000 less than a year ago. The eight month cumulative hog kill this year totals 1,068,000.

Calves killed during August was 3,900 above last month but 1,500 less than a year ago.

LIVESTOCK producers are again reminded to continue to submit screwworm samples to the fly laboratory at Mission. Also check your herds regularly and treat wounds on livestock for screwworm control.

Horace Scott New SWCD Director

Horace L. Scott Jr. was elected to serve as director of the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District at a meeting Tuesday night, Oct. 9, at the courthouse. Scott will represent Zone 5 of the district for a period of five years.

The board of directors of the district has the responsibility for leadership of developing plans for resource conservation work within the district. This includes developing a Program and Plan of Work that sets out objectives and priorities for solving the conservation problems within the district.

J. W. Service is outgoing director. He has served as a director for Zone 5 for 10 years. Directors expressed regret at his retirement, stating that he would be greatly missed.

Directors also have the responsibility of attending monthly meetings of the board, area association functions, and to represent the district at the annual meeting of districts.

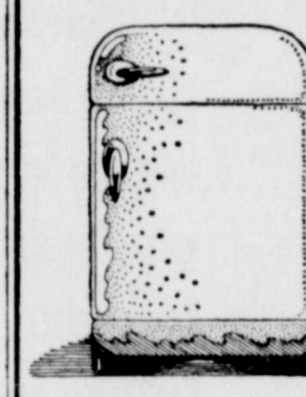
