Food Stamp Program to Start

The new statewide food stamp program will start operation Nov. 1 in Coke County.

This was announced recently by Archie Morris of Brady, acting supervisor, State Department of Public Welfare.

"The statewide food stamp program will replace the commodity foods program currently operating in this county," Morris explained. "The statewide program was made possible when the 1973 Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a state administered, state financed statewide food stamp program."

The State Department of Public

Welfare will administer the new program and the United States Department of Agriculture will provide the food stamps and bonus stamps.

Eligible households pay a determined amount for food stamps and are then given bonus stamps based on size of household and their total net income. Bonus stamps make up the difference between what a household can pay for food and what is necessary for a nutritious diet.

Also, bonus stamps mean many dollars of new business for the community. Bonus stamps represent money that low income households would not otherwise have to spend at local grocery stores.

Food Stamps will be issued at the U. S. Post Office in Bronte, according to Postmaster Noah L. Pruitt Jr. They will also be issued in Robert Lee as soon as some minor repair work is done on the post office building.

Households are certified eligible for food stamps at the food stamp office at the City Hall conference room in Bronte. Certified households will then receive Authorization to Purchase (ATP) cards in the mail at the beginning of each month which will tell them how many stamps they are eligible for and how much money, if any, they must pay for them.

Participating grocers will accept food stamps for the purchase of most foods and food products. Food stamps cannot be used to buy alcoholic beverages, tobacco, paper goods or non-edible items.

Bronte stores participating in the program are Sims Food Store, Quick-Shop Food Store, Spencer's Grocery & Station and Minnick's Country Store.

Participation in the food stamp program is voluntary and does not prevent the household from

Absentee Voting On Amendments

Absentee voting is underway on nine Constitutional Amendments which will be voted on Nov. 6.

Anyone who will not be able to get to the polls on Nov. 6 may cast his ballot now in the office of County Clerk, Mrs. Winnie Waldrop.

Anyone who is unable to go to her office may write for a ballot and necessary forms.

The amendments will affect a diversified variety of subjects.

No. 1 provides for annual legislative sessions and an annual salary of \$15,000.

No. 2 extends homestead protection of real property to single adults.

No. 3 extends the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to homesteads of unmarried adults.

No. 4 establishes certain requirements relative to laws creating conservation and reclamation districts.

No. 5 allows counties and cities on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds for the construction of sea walls.

No. 6 provides for some changes in the jurisdiction of county and district courts.

No. 7 provides for the issuance of an additional \$100 million in bonds for the Veterans' Land Program.

No. 8 provides for cities to levy taxes to pay principal and interest on bonds.

No. 9 authorizes the legislature to exempt from taxes certain property used by nonprofit water suppliers.

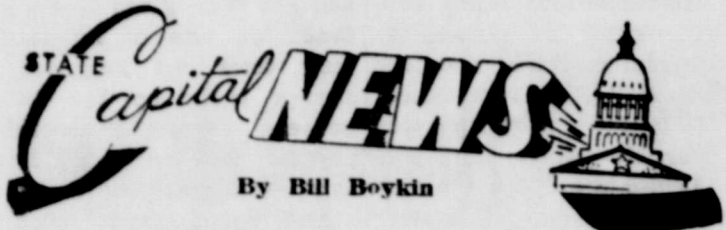

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Austin — Future development of major Texas water projects will come to a halt unless new standards laid down by the National Water Resources Council are reversed, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby says.

Unless this policy is reversed," said Hobby. "Texas stands to be harmed very substantially." The new principles and standards for planning water and related land resources are effective Oct. 25.

While acknowledging that they have merit, Hobby said, they would destroy "the long established partnership between federal and state governments for development of water resources. . . . For all practical purposes, the thrust of "principles and stand-

ards' wipes out the present day mechanics for use and control of water, and falls short of practical substitutes."

A proposed "discount rate" feature, claimed Hobby, precludes federal participation in traditional development of water projects. The standards, he maintained, would further force impractical planning for projects on an in-state basis.

In the last five years, more than \$850 million have been invested by the local, state and federal governments in Texas water projects. About a fourth of that was federal money.

Refusal by the federal government to finance in the future "nonreimbursable" features" such as fish and wildlife, recreational benefits and flood control provisions would ban parts of water projects that "tend to enhance the environment," said Hobby.

DOUBLE HEADER CONVENTION PLANNED — Legislators

are being polled on a proposal to split next year's constitutional convention into two sessions — one from Jan. 8 to April 6 and the second after mid-June.

Sen. Bill Meier of Euless offered the suggestion, contending that the convention may be poorly attended just before May and June primary elections. Many legislators, who are delegates to the convention, will face opponents for reelection.

The recess, as proposed by Meier, would give legislators nearly a month to campaign before the May primary and another month after the June runoff.

Meanwhile, House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. urged lawmakers to set a 90-day flexible and extendable timetable for the convention and try to finish the job of rewriting the constitution by early April. He said legislators can do it by making use of the research of the Constitutional Revision Commission as a beginning point. Daniel said taxpayers will be saved nearly \$2 million if the convention winds up in 90 days rather than extending over the full 170 days allowed.

ALLOWABLE STILL AT 100 PER CENT — For the 20th straight month, the Texas Railroad Commission set the November statewide oil allowable at 100 per cent.

Uncertainty of supplies for winter months and possible cuts in imports from the Middle East were cited by Chairman Jim Langdon.

AG OPINIONS — Counties may use federal revenue sharing funds to contract with private non-profit corporations to construct recreational facilities for the aged, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

* The state comptroller must pay statutory witness fees for out of state witnesses into the court registry on certification by the judge that fees are necessary to compel attendance. A county can advance funds and be reimbursed by the state.

* A State Insurance Board order authorizing companies to set un-

usual risk rates subject to later board approval is not authorized.

* Status of an area from dry to wet can only be accomplished by a "for" vote on a legalizing proposition, and transformation of a wet area to a dry area can only be accomplished by an "against" vote on a prohibitory proposition. A city prohibitory election which does not result in a vote unfavorable to the sale of alcoholic beverages has no effect at all upon the city or any part.

COURTS SPEAK — A three judge federal court in Dallas adopted the so-called "Plan B" for Texas congressional reapportionment, which will require some readjustment of existing boundaries. Attorney General Hill said he has no plans for further appeals. Motions to intervene in the case were rejected as not "timely."

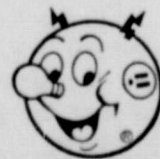

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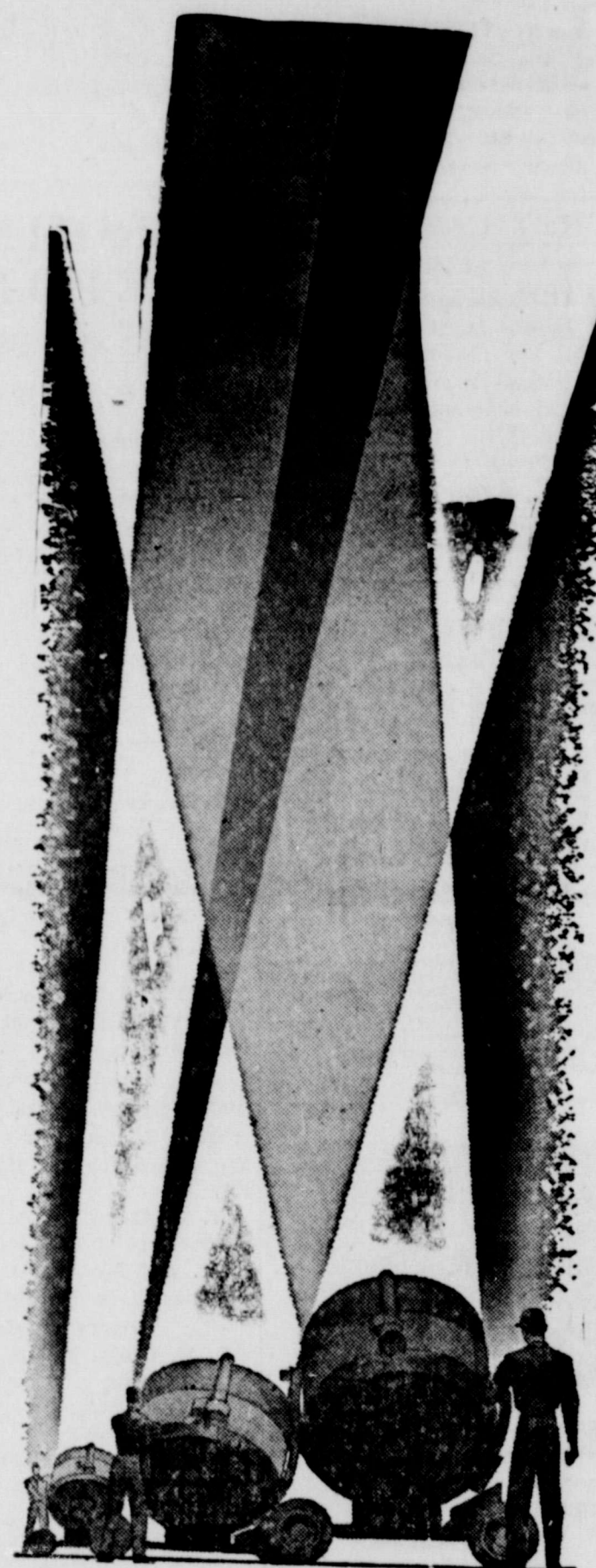

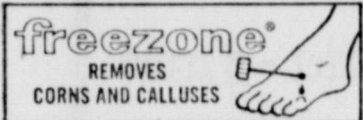

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Horns Looking Good; Down Roby, 38-20

The Bronte Longhorns played a special kind of football last Friday night before a big Homecoming crowd and thrilled the spectators with a 38-20 win over the highly rated Roby Lions.

Senior back Kim Barrett was the star of the show, making four of the six touchdowns. He was ably assisted by Alan Barbee who crossed the double stripe a couple of times and kicked two extra points.

First Quarter

Barbee kicked off to Donnie Stephens at the goal line and he went to the 15. The Lions gave the ball to the Longhorns on the first play when Clint Porter recovered a fumble about the 14. Barbee carried three times for a 1st on the 1. Barrett powered it to the 1 foot line and Barbee went around right end for the counter. Try for extra point failed and it was 6-0 with 10:02 left on the clock.

Beauchamp took Barbee's kickoff and ran it back to the Longhorn 47. The Horns held and Castor tried to punt, but it was blocked on the Roby 46. Barbee made 6, Barrett added 2 and Barbee made the 1st down on the 35. Nelson Coulter called for a pass on the next play and it was a good one to Jim Dan Raughton for 28 yards and a 1st on the 7. Coulter ground out 6 yards through the Lions' line and Barrett went through the middle for the additional yard and 6 points. EP try failed and the scoreboard read 12-0.

The Lions took the kickoff out to the 31. From there they got something going with 1st downs on their 46, the Bronte 44, the 22 and the 9. Jones carried to the 5 and a pass to Castor was good for a Roby score. Try for extras was no good and the score was

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12-6. Evers kicked off to Bronte but a fumble gave the ball to Roby on the 28. Stephens made 8 and Jones ran for a 1st on the 14 as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Roby ran two plays, then returned the football to Bronte on a fumble at the 5 yard line.

A penalty against Roby gave Bronte a 1st on the 23. Coulter made 3, Barbee ran for 2 and a 22 yard pass to Barrett made a 1st down on the 50. Barbee then made 5 and Wayne Alexander ran 8 yards and made the 1st down on the 37. Barbee carried three times for 13 yards and a 1st on the 24. Barbee made 9 and Barrett made 3 and the 1st on the 12. That was it, however, for the Bronte lads fumbled and Roby recovered on their 9 yard line.

The Longhorn defense allowed a 1st down on the 25, but that was all as the next series of downs brought up a 4th and 10. Castor punted to Raughton on the Bronte 30. Barbee carried twice for 15 yards and a 1st on the 45. Barbee then went for a 1st on the Lion 37. Alexander took a pass from Coulter for 23 yards and a 1st on the 14. Barrett went for 3, then Barbee went around right end for a touchdown. His kick was good and it was 19-6.

Roby took over the ball on the 20 following Barbee's kickoff into the end zone. The Lions ran four plays to the 35 before the first half ended.

Third Quarter

Evers kicked off to Barbee who was tripped up on the 30. Barrett and Barbee both made 5 yards and a 1st on the 40. Three plays later a Bronte fumble gave the ball to Roby on their 43 yard line. The Lions moved for a 1st on the Bronte 45. Four more plays carried to the 39 and Bronte took over on downs.

Roby drew a 5 yard fine and Barbee made 6 for a 1st on the 50. The Horns bogged down on the next series and Barbee punted out on the Roby 19. Stephens went for a 1st on the 29, then the Horns held and a punt went to the Bronte 25.

Barrett made 7, Barbee hit for 2 and Coulter went for the 1st on the 38. Barrett made 12 and a 1st down at the 50. Alexander made 6 and Barbee ran for 6 more and the 1st down on the 38. Alexander picked up 2 more, then Barrett went around left end for the remaining 36 yards for a TD. Try for extras was unsuccessful. Score: 25-6.

Stephens carried Barbee's kickoff out to the 33 and Jones made 4 as the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

Stephens went for 2 and Brown took a 30 yard pass for a 1st on

the Bronte 36. Next play Evers backed up and threw a long one to Castor who carried across for 6 points. Conversion run was no good and the score was 25-12.

Barbee brought Evers' kickoff to the 27. Barrett flew 18 yards for a 1st on the 45. Barrett went for 2 and the next play backfired as Roby intercepted and took over on the Bronte 47. Jones made a 1st down on the 35 and Stephens took a pass for another on the 16 and the Lions were moving—and making Bronte fans uncomfortable. Morton ran 8 and Evers made the 1st on the 5 yard line. Stephens went for 2, Evers threw an incomplete pass, Stephens ran 1 yard, and then he carried over for the TD and ran a 2 point conversion. Score: 25-20.

Raughton brought the kickoff to the 34 and Bronte drew a 15 yard penalty to put the ball on the 19. Barbee made 6 and Coulter added 7 for a 1st on the 32. Barrett made 5 and that was it. Barbee punted, but Roby drew a 15 yard penalty, so the Horns got to keep the ball on the Roby 48. Barrett went 4 yards and Alexander went for 1. Another try failed and Barbee punted into the end zone to give Roby the ball on the 20.

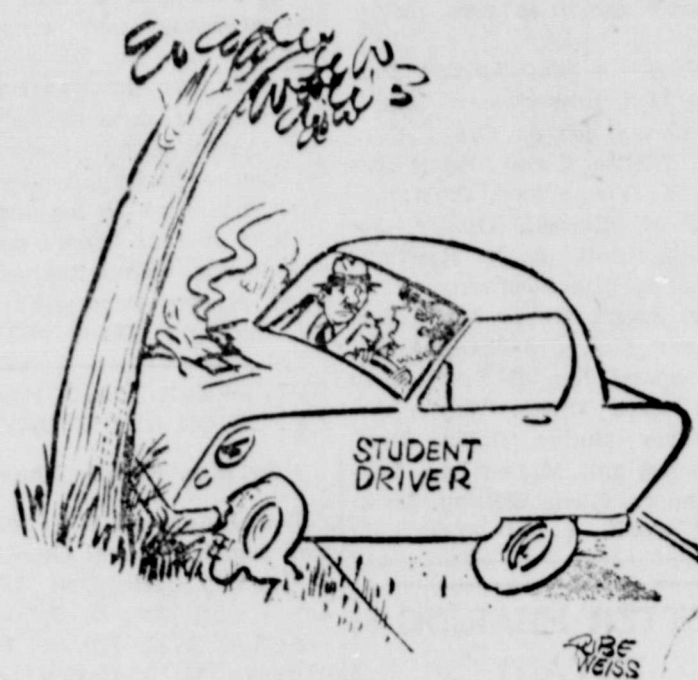

A 1st down pass play to Raughton covered 27 yards and gave the Longhorns a 1st down on the 5. Barrett went for 3 yards to the 2, then went over the right side for the touchdown. Barbee kicked the extra point, making the score 38-20. Nine seconds showed on the clock.

Stephens brought the kickoff out to the 45 to end the ball game.
