Amendment Vote Set for Tuesday

Coke County citizens will join with fellow Texans next Tuesday when they will go to the polls and vote on nine amendments to the Texas Constitution.

County Clerk Mrs. Winnie Waldrop said Wednesday morning that no absentee ballots had been cast. Friday is the last day for absentee voting and anyone who is going to be away next Tuesday should cast his ballot before the deadline Friday at 5 p.m.

No. 1 on the ballot provides for annual sessions of the legislature and raises pay to \$15,000 a year.

No. 2 provides homestead protection for single adults and provides that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

No. 3 would extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.

No. 4 would establish certain requirements relative to the creation of conservation and reclamation districts.

No. 5 would authorize counties and cities bordering the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters.

No. 6 would change the jurisdiction of probate courts to include district courts.

No. 7 would provide an additional \$100 million in bonds for the Veterans Land Fund.

No. 8 would authorize cities to levy taxes sufficient to pay the principal and interest on general obligations.

No. 9 would allow the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property of nonprofit water suppliers.

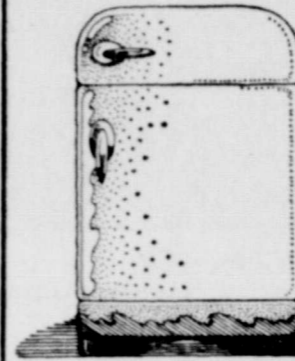

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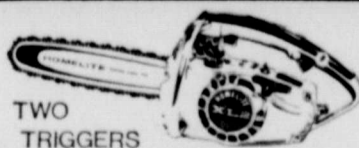

Fire Rules For The Aged

- The aftermath of fire too often leaves the elderly as a tragic statistic. However, this can be prevented if they are informed of a few basic rules. To help protect the elderly, Underwriters Laboratories Inc., an independent, not for profit organization testing for public safety, offers the following fire rules for the aged.
 - The aged should be familiar with all exits and know two plans of escape. If possible, they should sleep on the first floor or near an easy way out.
 - All stairways should be clear of objects to prevent falling.
 - The elderly should be instructed to never smoke in bed.
 - The aged should wear fire-safe clothing when around an open flame.
 - They should have easy access to a telephone, with emergency numbers at hand.
 - Appropriate UL Listed fire extinguishers should be available, and the elderly should be shown how to use them.
- Also, the elderly can help themselves by planning ahead; others can help by developing emergency plans for them.

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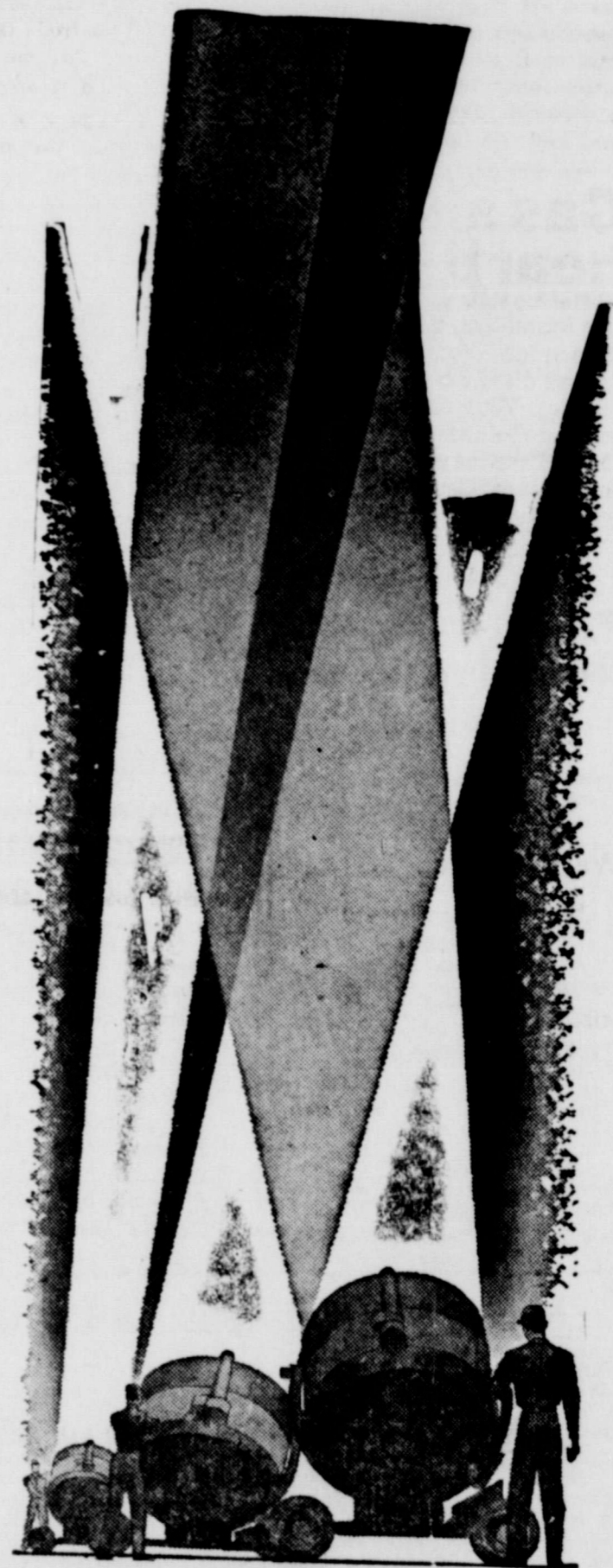

Horns Rally Falls Short; Lose to Loraine, 34-29

The Bronte Longhorns were attacked by a bunch of fired-up Bulldogs in Bulldog territory last Saturday night and lost an important district game to Loraine, 34-29.

First Quarter

The Longhorns chose to receive and Alan Barbee took Loraine's kickoff back to the 47. Barbee picked up 2 and 3 yards but an incompleting pass forced a punt. Loraine ran four plays before the fastest man in Class B football, Michael Jones, broke for 60 yards and 6 points. Ron Crawford converted and the Bulldogs went out

front to stay, with one exception, front to stay except for a time when the score was tied. Only 1:59 was gone off the clock.

Jim Dan Raughton returned the kickoff to the 35 and one running play and two pass attempts later, the Longhorns were punting again. The Bulldogs picked up three 1st downs before they were forced to punt. The Longhorns began to move with the biggest play being a 56 yard pass from Quarterback Nelson Coulter to Raughton.

Second Quarter

On the first play of the second quarter Barbee went in from the 1 and kicked the extra point to tie it up 7-7.

Kim Barrett kicked off and Jones was stopped on the 29. Four 1st downs later Jones ran in from the 4. His run for extra points failed. It was Loraine 13, Bronte 7.

Bronte could not move the ball but Loraine could and did all the way to the Bronte 5 before a fumble recovery by Coulter gave the ball back to the Longhorns. Barbee got 8, 3 and 5, Barrett caught a 10 yard pass and ran 4 yards, then miscues brought on another punt.

Loraine could not move and the half caught Bronte in possession of the ball.

Third Quarter

Barrett kicked off and in two plays the Bulldogs moved to their 46. Sylvester Rose then exploded for 54 yards and 6 points. Merket threw to Crawford for 2 points and it was 21-7.

Barbee took the kickoff to the 35 and picked up 11 and 4 yards

before a Longhorn fumble gave the ball to Loraine on the Bronte 47. Three plays later Jones went 39 yards and Crawford again kicked the conversion. Loraine 28, Bronte 7.

Barbee returned the kickoff to the Bronte 46. Two plays later Jones intercepted a Bronte aerial. Loraine picked up two 1st downs before fumbling at the Bronte 15. Again the Longhorns had three chances before punting the ball.

Fourth Quarter

Loraine moved the ball to the 12 yard line where a 4th down Crawford field goal missed. From the 20 the Longhorns really took to the air, the best strikes being a 25 yarder to Wayne Alexander and a 25 yarder to Raughton. The big one, however, was a 34 yarder caught by Bobby Bailey in the end zone. Coulter ran the conversion and it was Loraine 28, Bronte 15.

Loraine took the kickoff, ran five plays, then sent Jones down the middle for a long 54 yard pass and 6 points. Merket threw to Crawford for the conversion. Loraine 34, Bronte 15.

A short kickoff went to Alexander who was downed near midfield. Going to the air again the Horns moved the ball, with a big gainer from Coulter to Barrett placing it inside the 10 yard line. The Bronte counter came on a 4 yard pass to Raughton in the end zone. He took another aerial for 2 extra points and the score was 34-23.

Loraine took the kickoff but had to punt when the necessary yardage wasn't made. 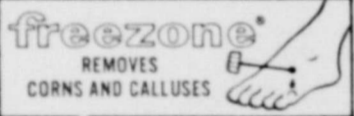


Black bass fishing has picked up to a large degree at Lake Spence, with most of the good catches being picked up with top water baits.

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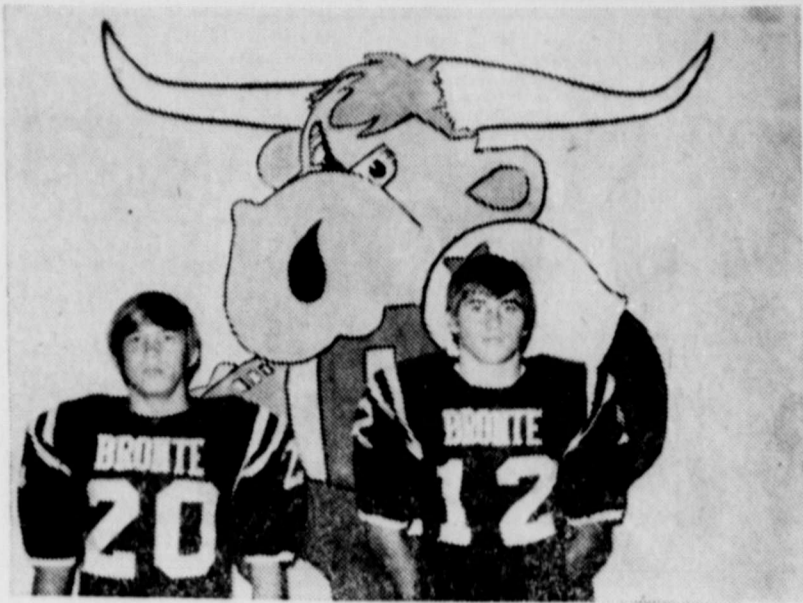
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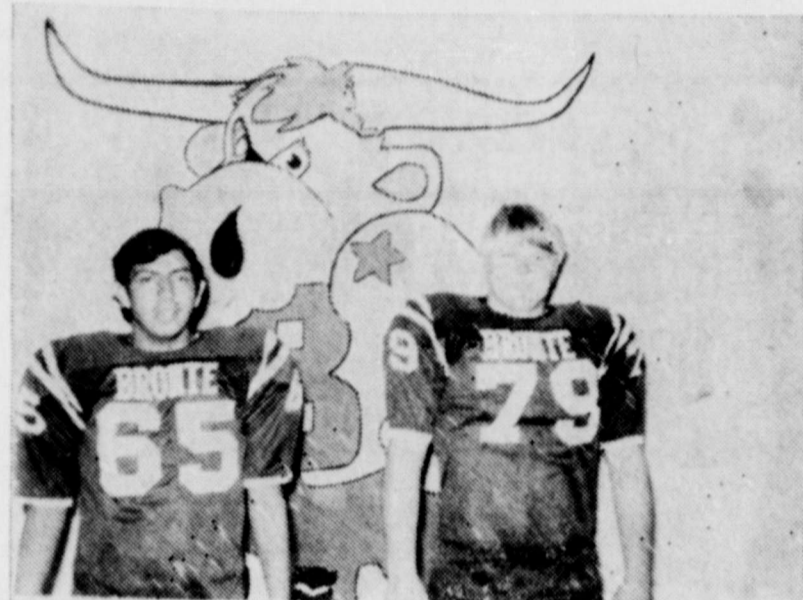




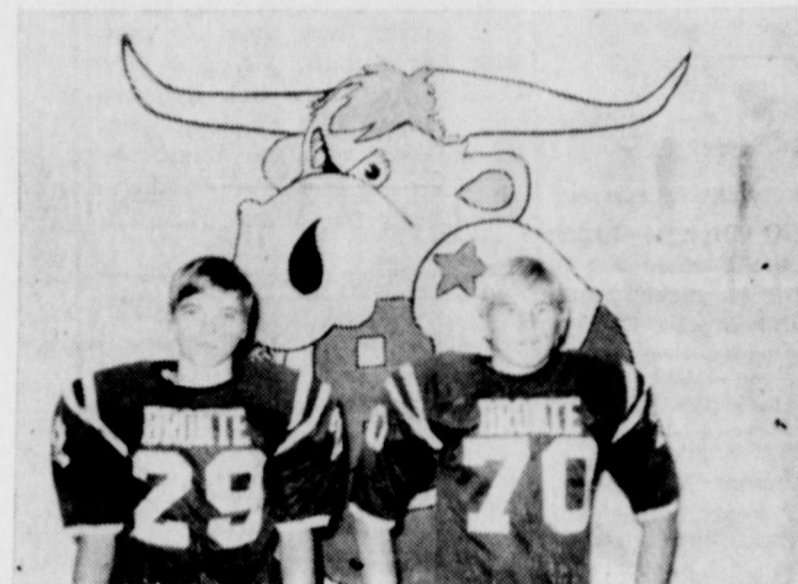
