### Junior Girls Win

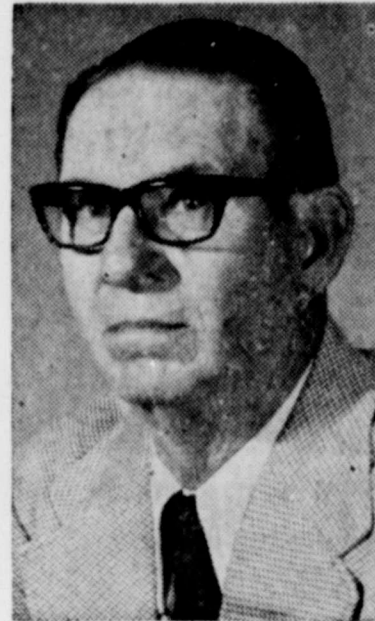
The junior high girls took an easy 48-15 win from Lake View Monday night. Leading scorers

### Ledbetter to Retire As WTU District Manager; Braymer Gets Promotion

H. C. Ledbetter, district manager for West Texas Utilities Company's Ballinger District since 1971, will retire Dec. 1 with more than 38 years active service.

W. M. Braymer Jr., assistant district manager for Ballinger District since May, will be promoted to district manager.

The announcement was made by

Durwood Chalker of Abilene, WTU vice president in charge of District operations.

Ledbetter's service with WTU began in Abilene in 1935. During the next eight years, he worked as a merchandise bookkeeper, a meter reader and collector.

In 1943 Ledbetter was promoted to assistant district auditor and five years later was transferred to Marfa as district auditor for the Big Bend District. He was promoted to district manager of the Big Bend District in 1957.

Ledbetter was born in Palo Pinto County but later moved to Abilene with his family. He graduated from Abilene High School in 1930 and went on to attend Abilene Christian College.

Mrs. Ledbetter is the former Mrs. Edythe Cruze of El Paso. They were married in El Paso in 1970. She has a son, Ralph Thomas Cruz of El Paso, and Ledbetter has a daughter, Mrs. Alan E. Rompel of New Braunfels.

While in Marfa, Ledbetter served as a member of the School Board, the Marfa Chamber of Commerce and as chairman of the Industrial Committee. He also served as president of the Marfa Rotary Club and as chairman of the Big Bend National Park Development Committee.

Braymer joined WTU in the Abilene District Office in 1966 as a management trainee and two years later was promoted to credit manager.

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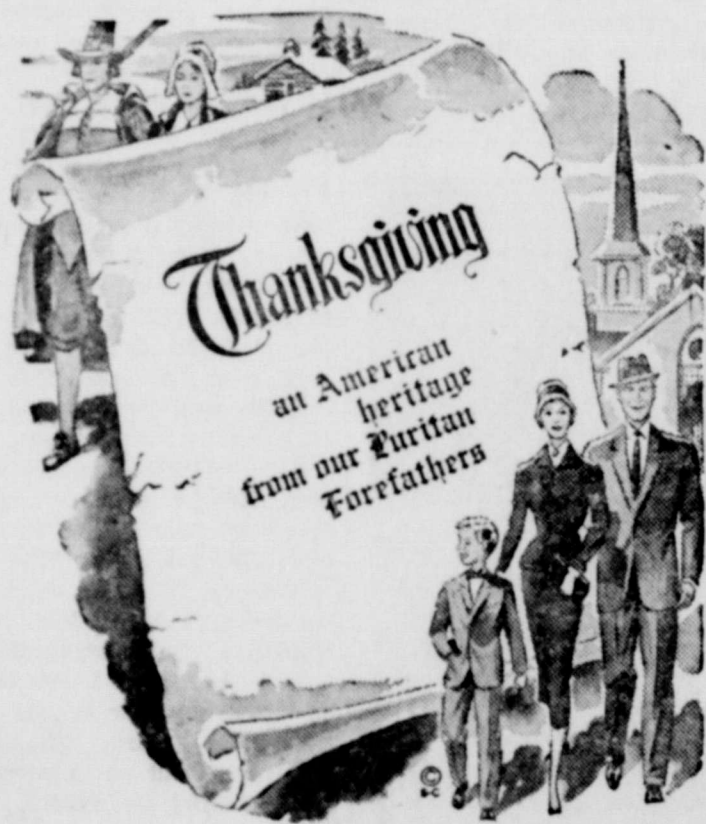

## Agriculture Is Big Business in Texas

"Texans are invited to take a close look at the agricultural industry of their state during the month of November, which has been designated as 'Food and Fiber Appreciation Month.' It's a fitting tribute to an industry that serves as the lifeblood of humanity," points out Charles Baker, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Texas should be proud of their agricultural industry which contributes more than \$10 billion to the state's economy each year and employs about 30 per cent of the state's labor force. Of the state's 168 million acres of land area, 142 million are devoted to agriculture," Baker said.

What are some of the facts and figures that make Texas an agricultural giant?

Here are a few:

- \* Texas ranks third nationally to only California and Iowa in total agricultural income.

- \* Texas leads the nation in producing cotton, grain sorghum and rice.

- \* It is the top cattle producer and also leads in the production of sheep and wool, goats and mohair.

- \* Texas ranks third among agricultural exporting states and is the leading exporting state in rice, cotton, hides, tallow and cottonseed oil. About 21 per cent of the state's 1972 cash receipts from agriculture came from exports.

- \* Texas is second only to Georgia in peanut production and is a major producer of other oilseed crops such as cottonseed, soybeans, flaxseed and castors.

- \* Texas is the third leading vegetable producing state behind California and Florida. It ranks first in cabbage, watermelon and spinach productions and second in onions, carrots and cantaloupes.

- \* The state is second in producing grapefruit and third in oranges.

- \* Texas leads in native pecans and is third in overall pecan production.

- \* Honey production is also big business, with Texas being third in the number of bee colonies.

- \* Texas is among the top 10 dairy states in the nation.

- \* The state is a leading producer of poultry and eggs.

Other enterprises that are important generators of agricultural income in Texas are timber, horses, fish farming and recreation. Texas is the leading state in horse numbers and is among the leading states in fish farming.

"Agriculture is indeed 'big' in Texas," notes Baker, "and it continues to grow to meet the ever-increasing demands for high quality food and fiber products."

# Longhorns End Season a Winner

The Bronte Longhorns brought the curtain down on the 1973 football season last Friday night when they struggled by the Forsan Buffs 18-6. Though playing for nothing but pride, the Horns did put enough offense together to win their seventh game of the season while losing three. The 7-3 record is the best for a Longhorn team in several years.

The win also brought the Horns' district record to 4-2, good enough for a second place tie with Roby. Jayton won District 3-B with a perfect 6-0 record. However, with only three seniors on the team, the Longhorns are looking

forward to better things next year.

### First Quarter

The first quarter was strictly a defensive game with neither team able to move the ball. Alan Barbee kicked off to the Buffs with a return to the Forsan 40. Three plays later Forsan punted dead on the Bronte 30. Short gains by Kim Barrett and Barbee brought up 4th and 3 and Barbee punted dead on the Forsan 31.

Good defensive work again brought up a 4th and 6 and the Buffs punted to Jim Dan Raughton who returned to the 35. A 15 yard clipping penalty, however, moved the ball back to the 23. Three plays later Bronte punted to the Buffalo 23 yard line. Forsan once again was forced to punt and after a clipping penalty and a 10 yard loss the Longhorns punted to the Forsan 47. The Buffs started a drive which found them on Bronte's 13 yard line as the quarter ended.

### Second Quarter

The Horns got tough and took over on their 6. They started a time consuming drive and with Barbee and Barrett doing most of the ball carrying, moved the ball 94 yards for the first score of the game, with Barbee carrying it in from the 4 yard line. The EP was blocked and with 4:44 left in the half the score was 6-0.

Barbee kicked off and Forsan took over on their 37. Forsan couldn't move and punted to Raughton on Bronte's 30. He returned it behind some good blocks to the Forsan 40. However, Bronte was penalized 15 yards for clipping and wound up with a 1st down on their own 25.

Nelson Coulter then threw passes to Bobby Bailey for 4 yards and a big 23 yard gainer to Raughton for a 1st on Forsan's 48. The Horns bogged down here and Barbee punted to the Forsan 26 where

it was fumbled with the Longhorns recovering. A 9 yard pass completion to Raughton and an incompletion brought the first half to an end with Bronte ahead 6-0.

### Third Quarter

Forsan kicked off to begin the second half to Raughton on the 5 yard line and he made a fine return to the Bronte 40. Barbee carried for 5, Barrett 3 and Barbee 6 for a 1st on Forsan's 46. The Longhorns then lost a fumbled pitchout on the Forsan 44. With the help of a 5 yard off-sides penalty on the 4th down, the Buffs picked up a 1st down on the Longhorns' 44. Then lightning struck as a lateral to the halfback and a pass back to the quarterback covered the final 31 yards for the score. The extra point failed and the score was tied at 6-6.

Raughton took the kickoff and returned to his own 29. Barbee picked up 4 but two incomplete passes brought up 4th down and Barbee punted to the Forsan 21 with no return. Three plays later the Buffs punted to the Bronte 40. The first play was for no gain and the next was a pass which was incomplete. The next play was great as Barbee made a fine catch and run of a Coulter pass for 60 yards and Bronte's second touchdown. A run for the EP was no good and the score was 12-6. Two plays following the kickoff the third quarter ended with Forsan on their own 33.

### Fourth Quarter

A pass completion brought up 4th and 4 and Forsan punted out of bounds on the Longhorn 29. A two yard gainer by Barrett and a big 34 yard scamper by Coulter brought up 1st and 19 on the Forsan 40. Then on a 4th down play from the Buffs' 20 yard line Barbee carried it in for an apparent TD, but the play was called back and the Horns were penalized for illegal motion. A 4th down pass then fell incomplete and Forsan took over on their own 25.

Forsan picked up one 1st down before a bad pass from center turned the ball over to the Longhorns on Forsan's 20. Forsan was penalized 5 for offsides and then Barrett carried it in for a TD, but it was called back and Bronte was penalized 5 for illegal procedure and another 15 yarder for unsportsmanlike conduct brought up a 1st and 30. Barbee carried for 12 and then lost 2. A 3rd down pass was incomplete but a 4th down toss from Coulter to Raughton covered 30 yards and made Bronte's third TD. A pass attempt was no good for the EP and Bronte led 18-6.

With Bronte subs dotting the lineup following the kickoff the ball exchanged hands several times before the final whistle blew, with the Longhorns on top 18-6.

Good defensive work was turned in by several Longhorns including Raughton, Barrett, Coulter, Barbee, Louis Martinez, Wayne Alexander, Kit Carlton, Bub Waldrop, Dan Brown, Mike Gonzales and Clint Porter.

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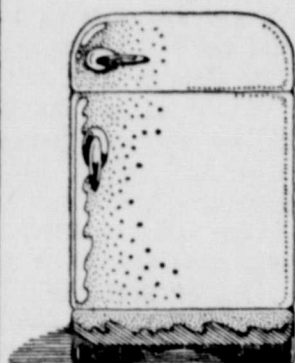

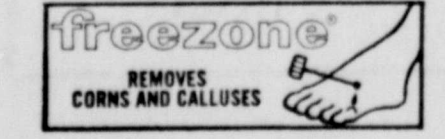
