

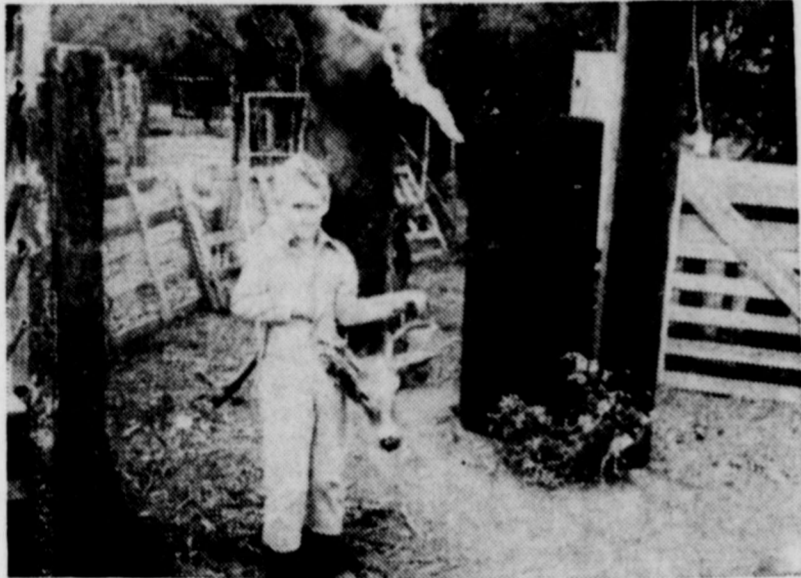

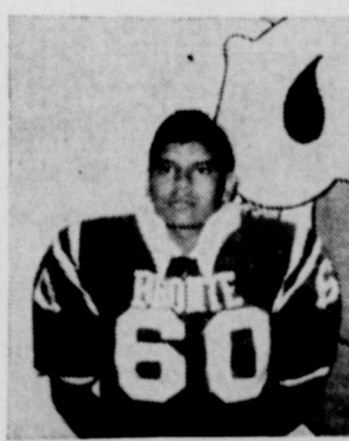

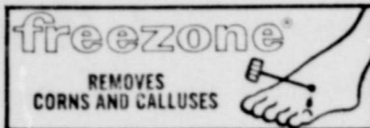

### DR. JERRY DEAN SPEAKS TO MUSIC SOCIETY

Dr. Jerry Dean, professor of music at the University of Texas at Austin, returned last week from Chicago where he spoke at a national meeting of The American Musicological Society, an organization of which he is a member.

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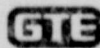

### Snipe Conley, Texas League Pitcher, Elected to Texas Sports Hall of Fame

J. P. "Snipe" Conley, 81, a former Texas League pitcher, has been elected to the Texas Sports Hall of Fame and will be inducted into the elite group in the latter part of December.

Others named by a 13 man Texas Sports Writers Association committee were Lew Jenkins, who was light-heavyweight boxing champion; Abb Curtis, who was an All-American basketball player and Southwest Conference official; the late Frank Bridges, collegiate coach at Baylor; Dusty Boggess, umpire in the National League; and Boody Johnson, great high school runner and drop-kicker from Waco.

The six will be honored at the annual Hall of Fame luncheon in Dallas Dec. 31. This has long been a highlight of Cotton Bowl week. The luncheon is co-sponsored by the Texas Sports Writers Association, which governs the Hall of Fame, and the Salesmanship Club of Dallas.

Snipe, famous spit ball pitcher in the Texas League, won 19 consecutive games in 1919 for Dallas including a no-hit, no-run game. His 19 straight victories still stand as a record. He pitched on Dallas' winning team of 1917 and 1918 and managed Dallas to a pennant in 1926.

Conley lost a game to Wichita Falls in 1922. Dallas protested because creosote was left on the baseball and Conley, being a spit ball pitcher, was left with a blistered mouth.

He quit baseball in 1927 but returned to pitch twice for Dallas, once in 1942 when he was 50, and again in 1958 against Tulsa. He won both games.

Since leaving professional baseball, Snipe has maintained an interest in baseball and sports at all levels. For many years he was active in playing, coaching and encouraging semi-pro and amateur ball in West Texas. Since moving to Robert Lee, he has

done much toward developing young baseball players, from the Little League program up. He is still an avid sports fan and enjoys watching basketball and football at Robert Lee High School as well as TV sports.

Snipe takes great pride in recalling his experiences in sports and displaying photos, scrapbooks, trophies and mementos of the time when he rubbed elbows with some of the all time "greats." To all his friends, visitors, and the nurses at West Coke Nursing Home, he is ever ready with a cheery quip and greeting. Not only that but he's likely to "pitch" you a piece of peppermint candy which he keeps constantly for that purpose.

Conley was born April 25, 1892, in Pennsylvania. He lived in Texas for some 28 years where he was employed by Plymouth Oil Company. He and his wife moved to Robert Lee after his retirement in 1957 and stayed here three years before moving to Phoenix, Ariz., in 1960. After his wife died he moved back here in 1966 and has lived here since.

He suffered a fractured left hip in March of 1971 from a fall, and after being in the hospital, he was admitted to the West Coke County Nursing Home April 7, 1971, where he still resides. He has recovered from the fractured hip.

He has two sons, John of Wichita Falls who works for Perkins, Prothro, and Stewart of Hartford, Conn., who works for an airline. He also has nine grandchildren.

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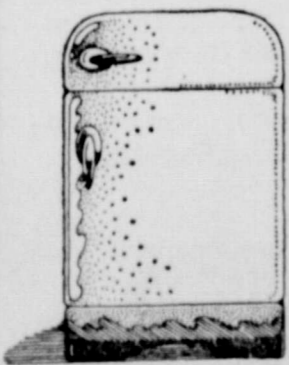

## FISHING REPORT from Lake Spence



Black bass fishermen at Lake Spence are resorting to winter-time tactics and the switch in "battle plan" is paying off in some respectable strings of fish. Blacks are holed up along the deep water ledges and anglers are going after them with grubs and spoons.

The spoon dabblers and casters are also picking up some good sized striped bass while spoon fishing.

The vast majority of all large stripers caught at Spence lately have been the results of trotline fishing, but bait casters are beginning to break the ice with the large salties. Some of the recent catches which were reported to The Observer were:

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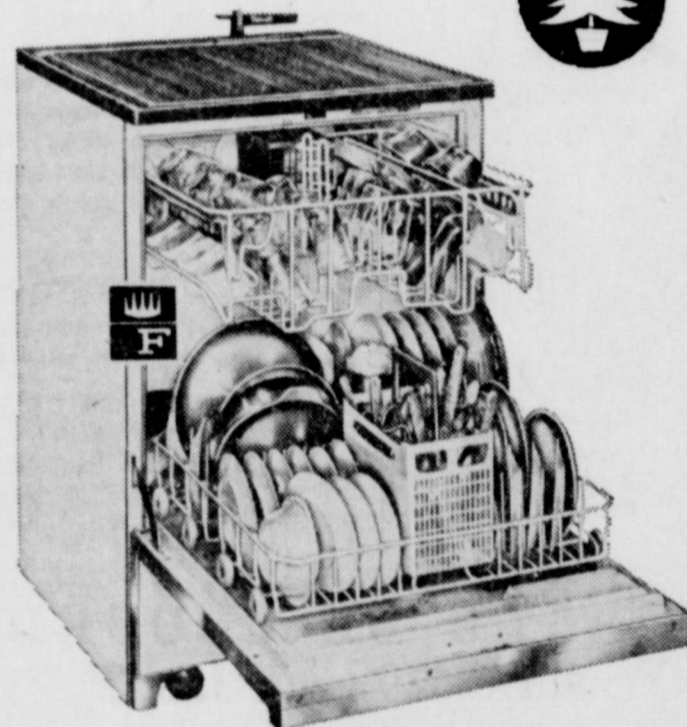
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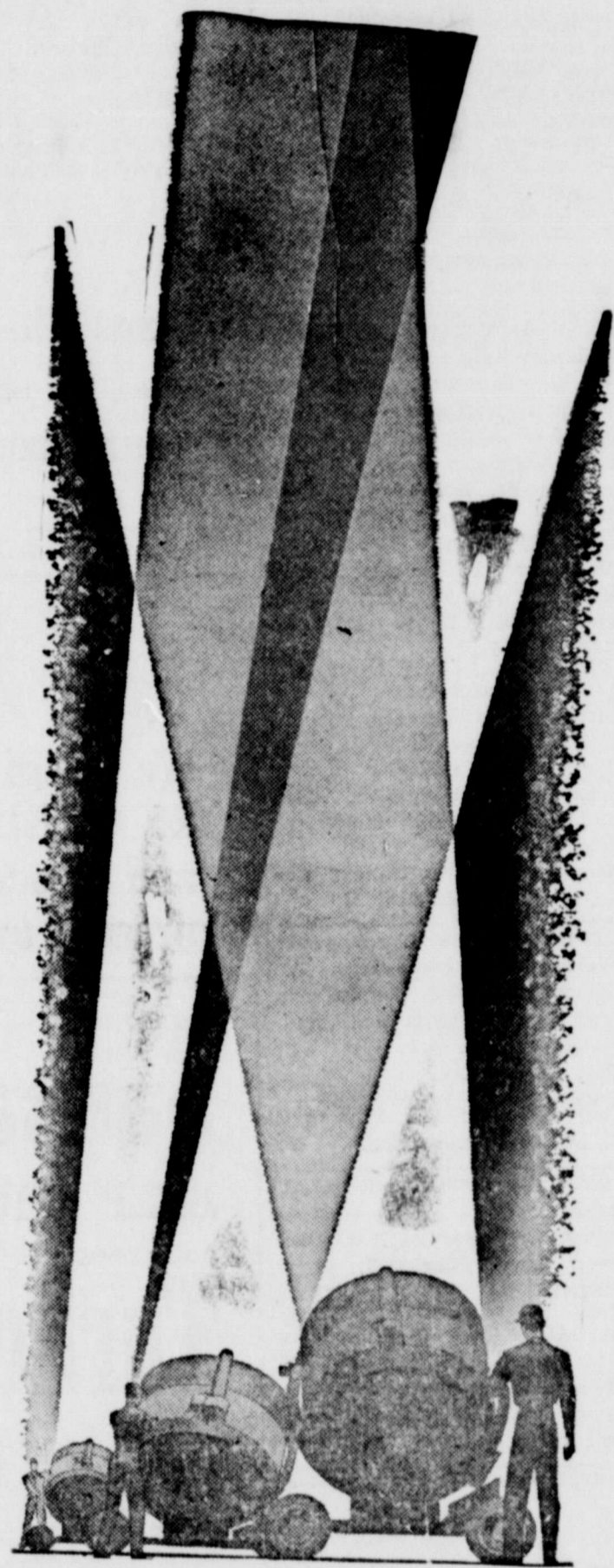
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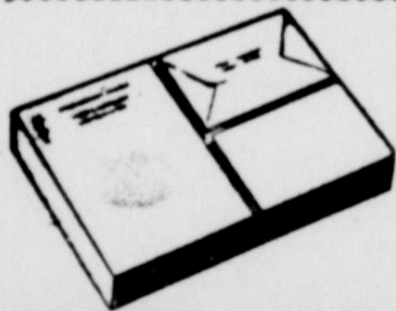
