The 1974 Coke County Livestock Show will be held at the show barn in Robert Lee Park Monday, Jan. 7. The 1974 edition will be one of the largest ever, with 69 4-H Club and FFA Chapter mem-

bers competing for top honors in the various divisions.

A total of 200 animals have been entered with 69 young people competing for the some 200 ribbons and rosettes, 21 trophies and showmanship awards and \$700 in prize money.

The sale to follow the completion of the showing is expected to gross \$2500 in premium money for the exhibitors. Each exhibitor will be allowed to sell one animal in the premium sale.

The show will get underway Monday at 9 a.m. with the showing of breeding swine. Market swine, market lambs, breeding sheep, market steers and breeding cattle will follow in the order listed. The auction is scheduled to begin at 3 p.m., immediately after the completion of the show and awarding of trophies.

Judge for the 1974 show will be Bobby Lee, vocational agriculture teacher at Wilson High School. He will be assisted in the ring by the county show directors, serving as division superintendents. D. J. Walker Jr., chairman of the show association board of directors, will be announcer for the show.

Jerry Gibbs, Robert Lee High School principal, will serve as show clerk. The sale will be under the direction of J. T. Henry.

That the polls shall be open for such election at the City Hall in the City of Bronte, Texas, located in said district from 8:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. on the day of election; and the following officer to hold said election hereby is appointed, to-wit, Noah Pruitt, Presiding Judge. Said Presiding Judge is hereby given authority to hold said election. No person shall vote at such election unless he is a resident voter of said district and also a qualified voter under the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas. All votes of such election shall be by ballot, and voters desiring to vote for Directors of the District shall vote for two persons each of whom shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age, a resident of said District and an owner of taxable property in the District.

On or before the fifth day after such election, the officers holding such election shall make due returns, in triplicate, of all the votes cast for Directors of said District, and deliver one (1) return to the President of the District and one (1) to the Secretary.

Public notice of this Order shall be given by publication thereof in The Bronte Enterprise, a newspaper of general circulation, published in Coke County, Texas, the publication of this Order being once a week for two consecutive weeks, with the first publication being at least twenty (20) days prior to the election and not more than thirty-five (35) days prior thereto.
