STRETCH YOUR FOOD DOLLAR WITH NUTRITIOUS PASTA AND MEAT MAIN DISHES

Proteins, most commonly found in the meat group of foods, are the basic building blocks of nutrition. The entire family, from baby to grandpa, depends on them for bodily growth and repair. Since main dishes frequently include meat (fish and poultry are a part of the meat group) they are a principal source of protein, and because of this the wise homemaker will give them special consideration.

Three other good groups, in addition to meat, also need to be included in the daily menu. A mini daily requirement guide may help you balance your family's meals nutritionally.

Meht: Daily-2 or more servings Brend-Cereal: Daily - 4 or more servings

Vegetables-Fruit: Daily - 4 or more servings

Milk, Children under 9: Daily -2 to 3 cups Children 9 to 12: Daily-3 to 5

Adults: Daily-2 or more cups Unfortunately, the important meat group is the most expensive one in the family food budget. The average American family spends one-third of each food dollar for the meat group, according to United States Government

If, like most folks, you're fighting to keep the budget down, try pastas. Pastas, such as macaroni, spaghetti and lasagna, belong to the breat-cereal group and are both nutritious and inexpensive. They offer a thrifty way to combine good nutrition and economy because they unite well with the meat group in casseroles, stews, hearty soups and skillet dinners. Try balancing your family's budget, and your meals, with these hearty, nutritious pasta meat-extender combinations.

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ON WINTER HEATING

- For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save on energy.
- A routine service inspection by a qualified service man is advisable prior to the heating season. Follow the manufacturers recommendations on this. Clean filters keep the heating unit operating at maximum efficiency and economy. Filters are the most neglected part of any forced-air heating system.
- A wood burning fireplace should be equipped with an efficient damper. Be sure to keep the damper closed when not in use. A chimney with the damper open carries warm air out the house, wasting heat.
- To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extremely cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
- Some wall heaters have fan-forced circulation. To clean, turn the unit "OFF". Blow dust out of unit with vacuum exhaust attachment. Clean the grill cover with a vacuum or warm detergent water.
- Proper insulation and weather stripping will make your home more comfortable. It will help keep dust and dirt from blowing in, and will help to eliminate cold drafts in the winter time, thus saving money on your heating bill.



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



According to Joe F. Staley of the San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any post office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them.

The card should have an 8 cents stamp affixed and placed in the mail.

Parents or guardians of aliens under 14 years of age submit reports for such children.
