Nursing Home Gets Top Rating

Bronte Nursing Home rated tops in a recent inspection by Dr. David B. Connery, medical director of the State Department of Welfare.

The local nursing home was rated tops in a 36 county area containing 49 nursing homes. It scored excellent in all phases of operations. The inspection was Dr. Connery's first at Bronte Nursing Home.

L. O. Clark, administrator, stated that he was well pleased with the performance of all departments. The home is operating at 100 per cent capacity but continues to take resident applications for future placement.

Turner Funeral Held in Ballinger

Funeral services for D. W. Turner Jr., 66, of Ballinger were held Monday afternoon in Ballinger First Methodist Church with burial in Evergreen Cemetery under direction of Allen DeWitts Funeral Home.

Mr. Turner died at 9 p.m. Saturday apparently of a heart attack in Ballinger Memorial Hospital.

He was born Dec. 21, 1907, in Itasca and came to Runnels County in 1908 from Hill County. He married Mary Edna Clark Nov. 10, 1934, in Bronte. They lived in the Norton area until 1950, when they moved to Ballinger. He was a Massey-Harris dealer in Ballinger.

Coke County Oil Play Shows Big Increase

Location for a proposed 7,000 foot wildcat has been staked eight miles south of Silver. The venture is Mann Rankin and Campana Petroleum Co. of Midland No. 2 Harris Estate-Sadie.

Site is on an 80 acre lease, spotting 1,330 feet from the north and 467 feet from the east lines of Winfield Scott Survey 12. It is one quarter mile northwest of their No. 1 Harris Estate-Sadie, the field opener.

Bill H. McWilliams of Midland No. 1 R. H. Harris Estate, assured fifth producer and a location west and northwest extension to the Lygay (Canyon) Field, flowed 60 barrels of oil in 24 hours.

The test was taken through a 12-64 inch choke and perforations at 5,817-22 feet. Earlier, after being acidized with 250 gallons, and fracture treated with 1,400 gallons and 1,400 pounds, it flowed

90 barrels of load oil in nine hours.

On a two hour and 30 minute drillstem test at 5,738-60 feet it recovered 4,200 feet of gas in the whipple, 60 feet of gas cut mud and 10 feet of oil and gas cut mud. On a one hour and 15 minute test at 5,820-53 feet, it recovered 218 feet of gas, 732 feet of gas cut mud and 244 feet of slightly oil and gas cut mud.

Located 18 miles northwest of Robert Lee, it spots 1,980 feet from the southwest and 467 feet from the northwest lines of V. Homman Survey 522.

Sixth producer and a northeast extension to the Lygay Field has been assured at Bill H. McWilliams No. 1 Central National Bank. It flowed 20 barrels of oil per hour. Flow was through a 24-64 inch choke and perforations at 5,816-832 feet, which had been

fractured with 15,000 gallons and 9,000 pounds of sand.

The new producer is 18 miles northwest of Robert Lee in Joseph Laemüller Survey No. 523.

Daily potential was gagged at 192 barrels of 44 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 1,288-1.

Shenandoah Oil Corp. of Fort Worth No. 1 Masonic Home recovered five feet of free 40 gravity oil, 30 feet of slightly gas and heavily oil cut mud and 160 feet of salt water on a drillstem test at 4,769-95 feet.

A scheduled 6,300 foot wildcat, the test is 1 1/4 miles southeast of the depleted one well Tennyson (Ellenburger) Field. Location is 990 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of Section 13, Henry B. Martin Survey, A-530, 10 miles southwest of Bronte.

At last report the project was drilling ahead.

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2. A routine service inspection by a qualified service man is advisable prior to the heating season. Follow the manufacturers recommendations on this. Clean filters keep the heating unit operating at maximum efficiency and economy. Filters are the most neglected part of any forced-air heating system.
3. A wood burning fireplace should be equipped with an efficient damper. Be sure to keep the damper closed when not in use. A chimney with the damper open carries warm air out the house, wasting heat.
4. To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extremely cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
5. Some wall heaters have fan-forced circulation. To clean, turn the unit "OFF". Blow dust out of unit with vacuum exhaust attachment. Clean the grill cover with a vacuum or warm detergent water.
6. Proper insulation and weather stripping will make your home more comfortable. It will help keep dust and dirt from blowing in, and will help to eliminate cold drafts in the winter time, thus saving money on your heating bill.

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Funeral Service Held Saturday For Hawley Allen, Pioneer Lawman

Funeral services for Hawley Allen Sr., 96, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in the Robert Lee Baptist Church with the Rev. Taylor Henley of San Angelo and the Rev. Roy Epperson, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery under direction of Robert Massie Funeral Home.

Mr. Allen died about 1:20 a.m. Friday in Shannon Hospital after surgery earlier last week for a broken hip.

His death ended a long and colorful career as a law enforcement officer, rancher and business man.

He was born Nov. 29, 1877, in Salado and moved to Coke County in 1889 with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Allen. He attended school at Hayrick and was married to Amelia Caraway June 15, 1900.

The couple homesteaded seven sections of ranchland in Irion County in 1901. Before the turn of the century Mr. Allen worked for the Baker & Hagelstein ranch in Schleicher County for \$25 a month. He accumulated a few head of cattle, forming the basis for his ranching operation. He sold the Irion County ranch years ago and bought four sections in Coke County, which he still owned at the time of his death.

Mr. Allen was sheriff of Tom Green County for 10 years and filled the same office in Coke County for three years. He began his law officer career as a constable in 1908, served as Tom Green County sheriff from 1910 to 1920 and served as a deputy in Tom Green County. During his career as an officer, Mr. Allen made more than 3,000 arrests.

In addition to his law officer and ranching careers he operated a pharmacy in Robert Lee for several years.

He served as a director of Coke County Hospital, as a director for the Federal Land Bank and as a director of West Texas Boys Ranch. He was a member of the Coke County parole board at one time. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias, Macabees, Woodmen of the World and Hayrick Masonic Lodge.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Gerald Allen and Frank V. Allen of Robert Lee and Hawley Allen Jr. of San Angelo; two grandchildren, Bill Allen of Robert Lee and Lisa Allen of San Angelo; two great-grandchildren, Clay and Sterling Allen of Robert Lee.

Pallbearers were Bill Tom Roach, Calvin Wallace, Melvin Childress, H. L. Scott, Cumbie Ivey Sr., J. O. Rudd, S. E. Adams and Fern Havins.

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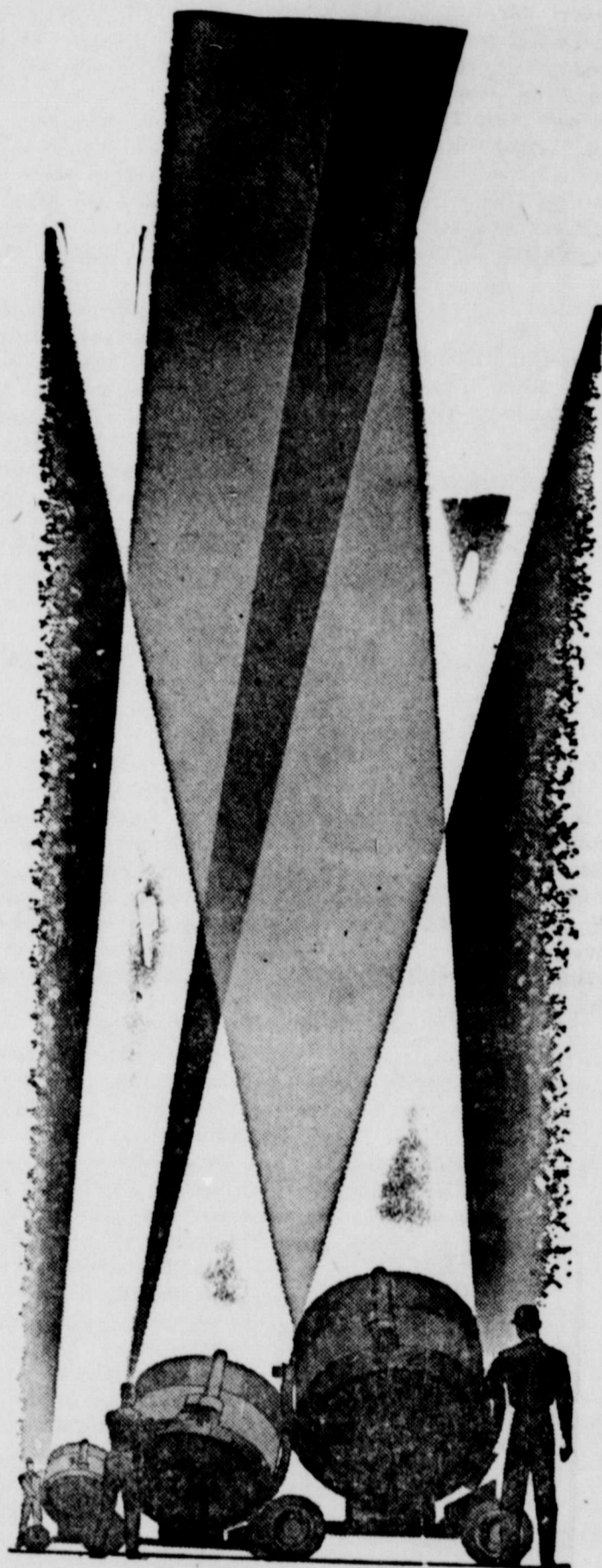

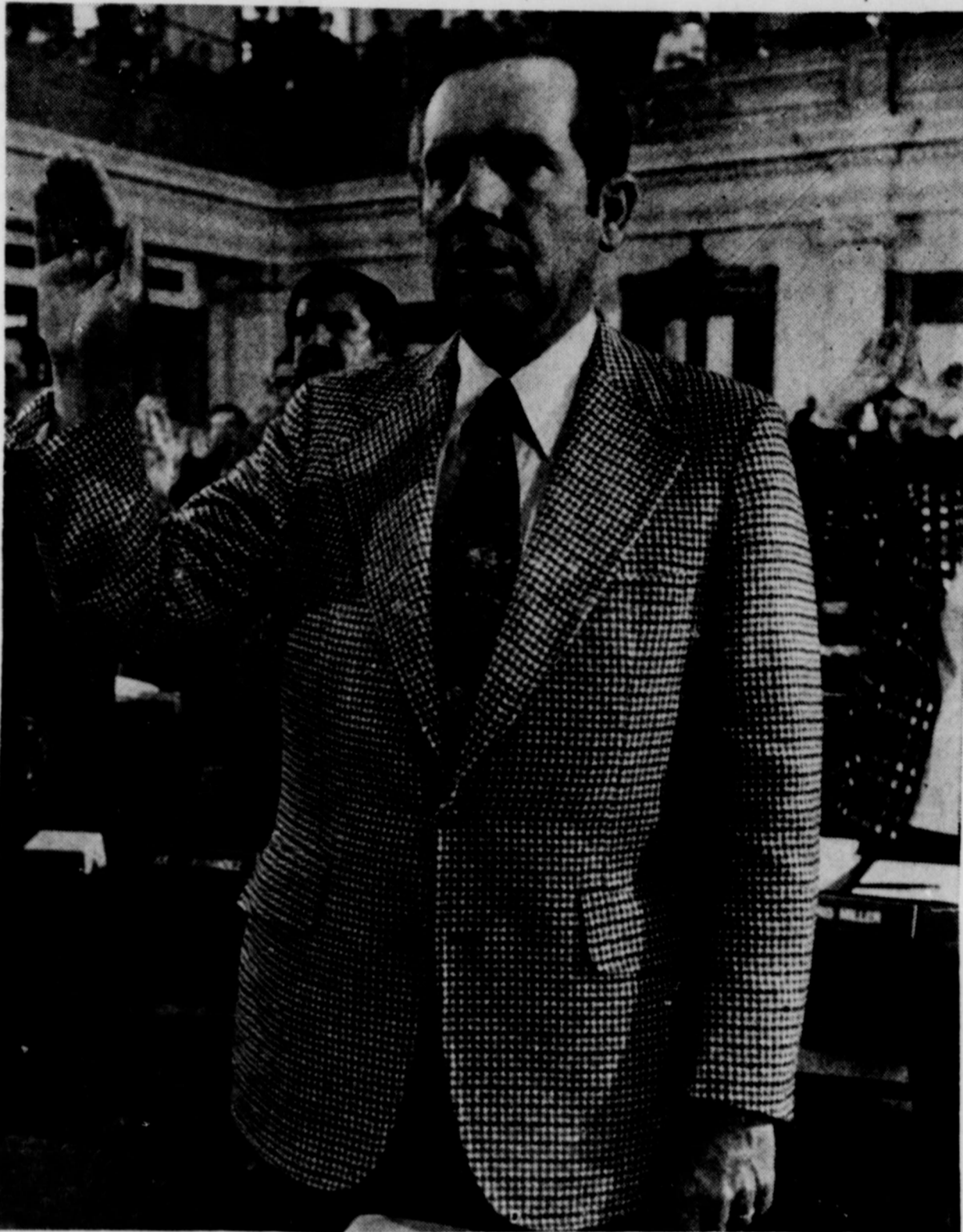

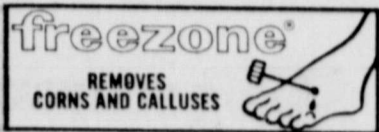

ALIEN ADDRESS INFO DECLARED CONFIDENTIAL

According to Joe F. Staley of the San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any post office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them.

The card should have an 8 cents stamp affixed and placed in the mail.

Parents or guardians of aliens under 14 years of age submit reports for such children.
