Poinsettias, Can They Be Made To Reflower?

This question is frequently ask ed by those receiving one as a gift. There is no easy answer. If morning. one has the time and patience as well as the ability to accept disappointment it can be attempted.

Poinsettias are perhaps the most difficult flowering potted plants to rebloom in the home. try the technique, discard the must try follow the instructions carefully

After blooming, gradually withhold water. The leaves will then yellow and fall. Store the dried off plant in a cool place with tempenatures 50 to 60 degrees until spring. Water only enough to keep the roots from drying out.

In spring place the plant in a warm room, and prune the stems back to about six inches. If there is more than one plant in the pot, divide and repot them at

Before the weather becomes cool in the fall, bring the plant indoors and place it at a bright sunny south window. Night temperatures for flower development should be between 60 and 62 degrees. At higher temperatures, flower development will be poor. Day temperatures may be 70 to 75 degrees.


