School officials reported that absenteeism is running about 15 percent or more among students. A check of absences Thursday revealed that 21 students were absent in grades kindergarten through six and 27 were absent in grades seven through 12 for a total of 48. Bronte School attendance normally runs 96 or 97 percent.

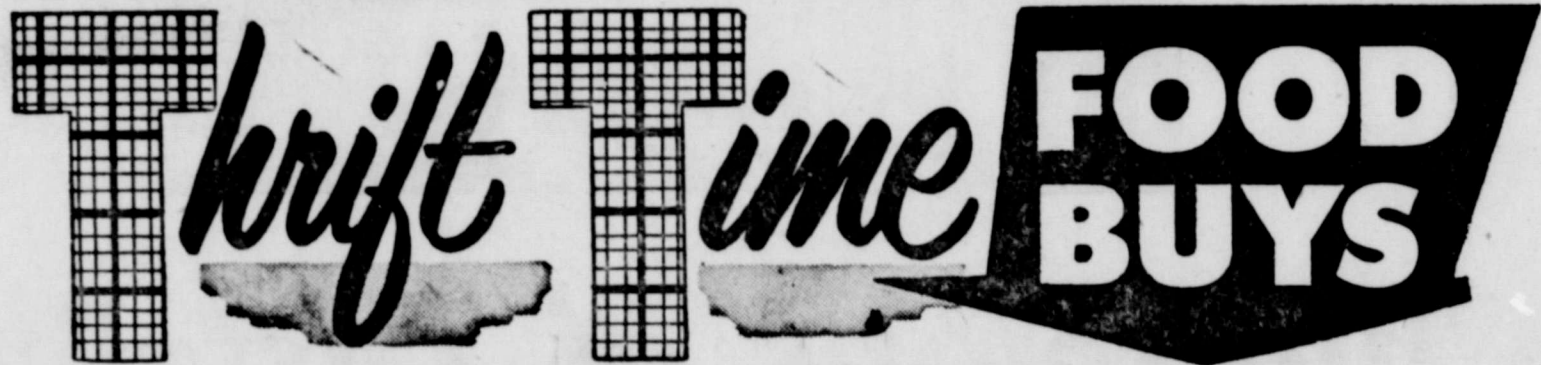
