### School Board

James Arnold Tidwell is the only current member of the school board who is running for reelection. New candidates are Grady Louis Coulter, Bill Jackson, James O. Koenig, Mrs. Nick (Susan) Arrott, Ernest Aguero, James W. Lee and A. D. McCarty.

Mrs. Eddie (Earlene) Alexander was petitioned to run for school trustee but she declined.

Outgoing board members are Wayne Arrott and Billy Joe Luckett. Luckett's term was not up, but he resigned several weeks ago when he entered the race for Precinct 2 commissioner. Holdover board members are Glenn Skelton, Russell Carlton, Delbert Coalson and Dale Thompson.

Funeral services for R. E. "Bert" Douglas, 90, of Lubbock were held Monday in Asbury United Methodist Church there with graveside services in the afternoon in Silverton Cemetery.

Mr. Douglas, a native of Fort Chadbourne, died last Friday in University Hospital in Lubbock following a long illness.
