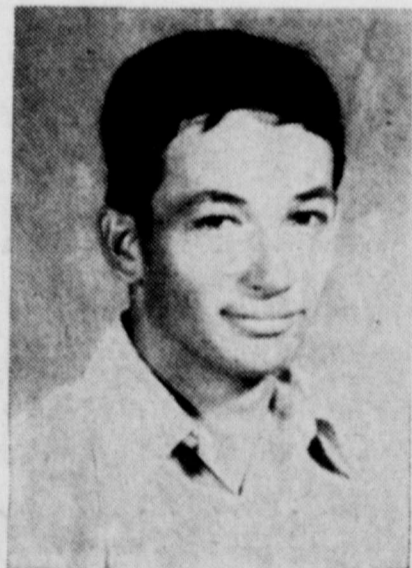

The second Democratic Primary Election will be held Saturday, June 1. Coke Countians will have two runoff races on their ballot. No local races are to be decided.

Vying for the 21st Congressional seat being vacated by O. C. Fisher will be Robert (Bob) Krueger of New Braunfels and State Sen-

ator Nelson Wolff of San Antonio. In the first primary, Krueger carried Coke County 297 to 235, but Wolff led over the entire district.

In the 63rd Legislative race, Borden County Judge Glenn Toombs will face Michael H. Ezzell, Snyder School counselor. Winner of the runoff will face Re-

publican candidate John R. (Rich) Anderson, Borden County rancher, in November. Renal B. Rosson did not seek reelection.

In Coke County's first primary, Toombs received 412 votes, Ezzell 338 and Mary Thomas 75.

Tuesday, May 28, will be the last day for absentee voting.
