Water is becoming a problem in Bronte, according to an announcement this week by the City Council. Plans have been made to divide the city into two parts for watering of yards and gardens and a booster pump is being plan-

Good Rains Fall Here Saturday

Good rains fell in the Bronte area late last Saturday. Measurements in the city limits of Bronte showed from .9 to an inch.

Other measurements reported to The Enterprise were: Jim Mackey, northeast of town .6; Edward Cumbie, north, .5; Lam Lasswell, north, .6; Imogene Griffin, south, 1.2; L. W. Duncan, northwest, .85; Hamp Thomas, Tennyson, 1.6.

Bronte and surrounding vicinity missed the storm which accompanied the rain in several places. San Angelo was hard hit by hail and tornado winds. Damage in the Concho City has been estimated in excess of \$10 million. Some damage was reported at Colorado City, also.

The weather this week has been muggy and hot, with Wednesday's temperature nearing the 100 degree mark.

Did you know that your money needs to be at home?

Banks, particularly small ones, have a money shortage. The demand in the form of loans simply is exceeding the supply.

Banks like First National in Bronte have pretty stiff competition from other agencies which take deposits and pay interest. The local bank is paying the maximum amount allowed by law on savings (compounding and all) but competition for any surplus cash is still rough.

For example, savings and loan associations have the advantage of being able to pay one-half of one per cent more on savings accounts than banks are allowed to pay. This doesn't amount to much but it does serve as a lure to take money away from Bronte and put it in a bigger city.

The advantages of this small additional per cent paid on savings does not make as much money for savers as one might think. For instance, if you purchase a \$10,000 certificate of deposit from a savings and loan association, it will make you \$50 more over a period of a year than the same purchase from your local bank would net.

When one stops to consider the many advantages of having banks in small towns such as Bronte, the small additional earning avail-

Trash Hauling Policies Given

City fathers said this week that they have been having problems in connection with Bronte's trash collection. Once again they listed items which may be placed in barrels for hauling.

Kitchen garbage, including cans and bottles will be picked up. Other waste material that will burn may be placed in the barrels. All waste material must be burned, they said.

It is not permissible to place things like rocks, bricks, dirt and other heavy objects that will not burn in barrels.

Raymond Sanchez, who is in charge of trash hauling in Bronte, ordinarily will do special hauling of the unallowed items. Special arrangements for this service have to be made with him personally, as the city has no part in this outside work which Sanchez does.

Mayor R. T. Caperton asked the cooperation of everyone in following the rules.

Swimming Pool To Open Saturday

The swimming pool in Bronte County Park will open Saturday. Hours for pool operation will be from 2:30 to 6 p.m. daily.

Admission price to the pool is 15 cents, or swimmers may purchase season tickets for \$5.00.

Dick Cooper, park caretaker, said no bikinis will be allowed in the pool, nor will swimmers be admitted who are wearing T-shirts or other clothing with beer ads printed on them.

Cooper said arrangements are being made to have swimming lessons at the pool later in the summer.

Saturday, June 1, is the day for the second Democratic Primary election or "runoff" in Coke County and all of Texas.

U. S. Rep. O. C. Fisher is vacating the 21st Congressional District seat and Renal B. Rosson did not seek reelection for the 63rd Legislative District seat.

Voting boxes and election judges

are: Precinct 1, Recreation Hall in Coke County Park at Robert Lee, Golda Smith as election judge; Precinct 2, Bronte City Hall, Royce Fancher; Precinct 3, Coke County Courthouse, Bob Large; Precinct 4, Bronte Depot, Noah Pruitt Sr.

Precinct 9 voters will vote at the County Courthouse as there will not be an election held at the Green Mountain Community Center for this primary.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Absentee voting closed Tuesday, May 28, at 5 p.m. with a total of nine casting absentee ballots.

All eligible voters are urged to VOTE SATURDAY.

"Bronte Beautification Month" will begin Saturday, June 1, and continue through June 30. The beautification project and a general cleanup of the city is being sponsored by the Bronte City Council.

Everyone is asked to put forth a special effort to beautify property, including residential commercial, vacant lots, rental property, etc.

A special committee will tour the city later in the month and award the first place winner \$10.00 and a "Bronte Beautification Award" yard plaque; second place winner will receive a \$7.50 cash award and third place winner will receive \$5.00.

City officials urged everyone to get into the spirit of this project and help make Bronte more beautiful.

Funeral Held Here For Mrs. Gilreath

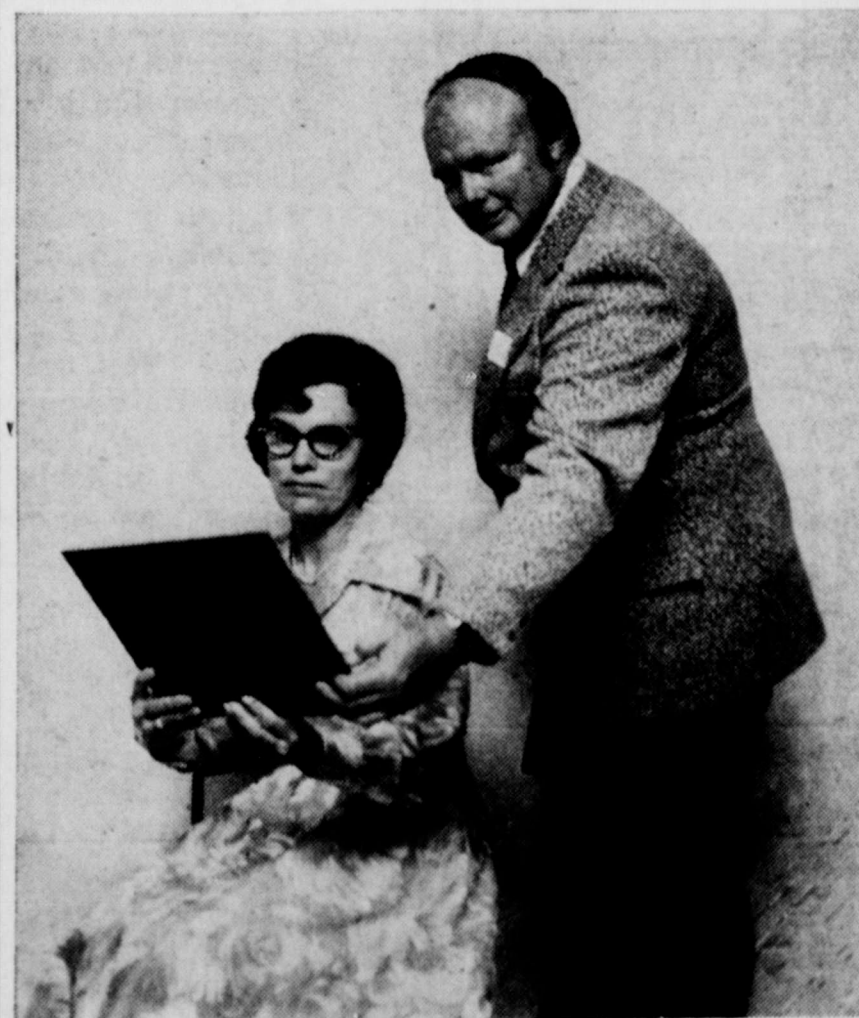

Tornado Season Is Here

Tornado season has arrived in Texas, and certain precautions can save lives.

Tornadoes are violent wind storms that usually grow out of threatening clouds. In Texas, the peak tornado season is during the months of April, May and June, but tornadoes may occur anytime.

Although tornadoes may occur at any hour of the day or night, they are most frequent during the warmer hours of the day.

When the possibility of a tornado exists, the National Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City, Mo., sends out a tornado watch to the threatened area. The mes-

sage is teletyped to radio, television and National Weather Service stations in the area.

A "tornado watch" alerts people to the possibility of a tornado.

When a watch is announced for our area, there is no need to interrupt normal activities except to listen for weather advisories and watch for threatening weather. Be sure a battery powered radio is available in case power is lost.

A tornado watch identifies a specific time and area, but everyone in the general area should be alert for threatening conditions.

When a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar, a "tornado warning" is issued. The warning tells where and when a tornado was sighted, the direction it is likely to move, and the time it is expected to move through the warned area.

If a tornado warning is issued

for your area move immediately to a cellar, basement or civil defense shelter. If you are in a home or other building with no basement, go to the lowest level in the center of the house or other building. Take shelter in a small room or closet or under heavy furniture.

Here is a list of other safety precautions:

At home, open a few windows to allow for sudden air pressure changes. Then find shelter.

Stay away from windows and buildings with wide, free span roofs.

In open country, escape by

moving at a right angle to the tornado's path.

If there is no time to escape, lie flat in a ditch or ravine but do not stay in your car.

Get far enough away from a trailer or mobile home to avoid injury if it is overturned.

When you observe a tornado, report it promptly to the nearest law officer or National Weather Service Office. Otherwise, do not make calls so that lines can be kept open for emergency information.

After a tornado, always wear shoes and gloves in cleanup operations and damage inspections.

Watch for hazards like broken or downed electrical wires and broken gas pipes. When entering a storm damaged building, watch for ceilings and walls that may be ready to fall.

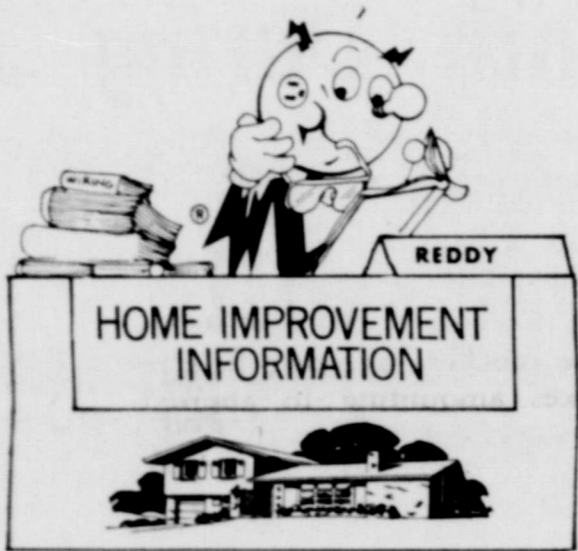
Never light a match, smoke or carry open flames into a building until you are sure there are no gas leaks.

Do not sight see in disaster areas. Your presence will only hamper rescue and cleanup operations.

Our military posture was given a boost when the House last week approved our annual military pro-

urement bill. The measure covers all military hardware, like tanks, planes, guns, ships, research and development, and a multitude of related items. Total costs for the next fiscal year runs about \$22.5 billion.

As happens each year when this annual authorization bill is debated, a number of amendments to cut back and weaken its provisions were offered by critics of the military. But each amendment was soundly defeated this year.

This procurement bill now goes to the Senate where a somewhat similar measure will be approved. Differences between the two versions will then be compromised and resolved by a conference committee.

By a majority of 52 to 31 the Senate last week defeated a crucial amendment to a food stamp extension bill. The amendment would have denied food stamps to people on strike.

The argument for this amendment contended that it is unfair for the government to take sides in a labor dispute. For the government to show any sign of favoritism to either side is nonmal-

ly frowned upon.

The Food Stamp program, which began in 1964 at an annual cost of \$200 million is now costing around \$2½ billion a year, and is being expanded under terms of the Senate bill. It is gradually becoming one of the nation's most expensive single super welfare programs.

The Senate bill will soon be considered in the House, where a show down vote will probably be taken on the issue of allowing those who choose to stop work and strike, to be favored with food stamps.

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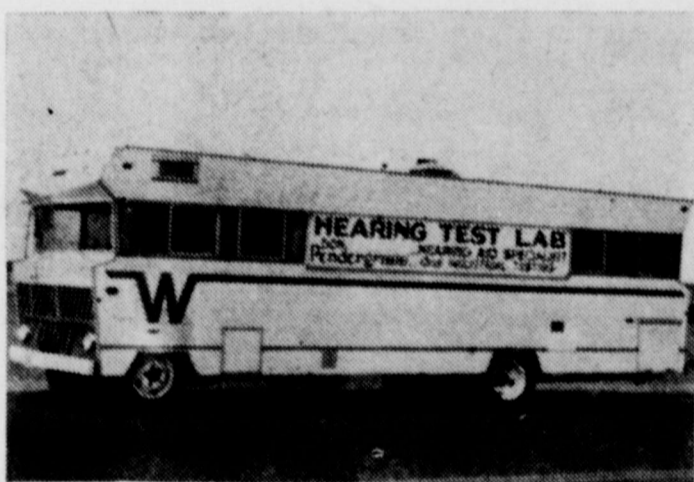

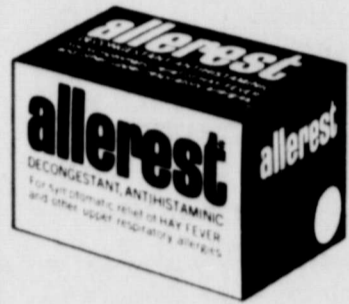

able from outside institutions fades into insignificance.

Perhaps the greatest advantage of patronizing your local bank lies in the fact that you can still get a loan and pay some 8 to 9 per cent interest, while in many big towns you would have to pay 11 per cent or more.

Bronte's friendly banker tells me that they are doing their very best to hold down interest rates on loans and at the same time pay today's excessive costs of operations and give stockholders a fair return on their investment.

Most of us usually think of our bank as having a vault full of money which is available to us if we can only convince the banker we need it and will pay it back. That may be true, within certain limits, but it's becoming less true all the time. Money is like any other commodity—you can't sell or lend more of it than you have. And, as we stated above, the demand is beginning to get higher than the supply.

This would not be a problem in Coke County if the savings of all Coke Counties were invested in the county's two banks, instead of outside. The people of this area have the money to up bank deposits a great deal, but the problem is getting them to bring their money home where it can be used to help other local people and our community.

This article is not meant at all to say or imply that the local bank is in bad shape. That's not true. But it is to say that there is a good chance that sometime in the future you may have to repay a loan you had expected to renew, or you may not be able to get a loan that would have been possible a few years ago.

Bank President E. F. Glenn told me that the Bronte bank is going to continue to serve its customers just as generously and helpfully as it always has, insofar as it is possible, but he added that it sure would help if some of the outside money was brought home.

Your local bank needs your support and your business just as your

local newspaper, grocery store, dry goods store or any other business needs it.

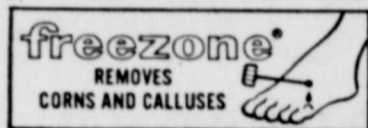

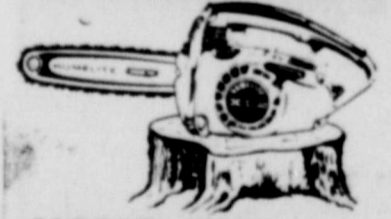

FmHA Offers Low Interest Financing For Home Improvement in Rural Areas

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has initiated a program to further encourage the use of existing housing and provide better homes for low income rural families through low interest home improvement loans.

The agency can now provide "interest credits" to reduce the effective interest rate on loans made to rehabilitate or repair a dwelling that a borrower already owns, and either lives in or will live in once it is brought up to standard.

Loans of up to \$7,000 will be made for repairs that will improve and modernize substandard dwellings, so as to provide adequate homes in rural areas. Terms for repayment of the loan may be as long as 25 years.

To be eligible for a FmHA home improvement loan with interest credit, the housing must be located in rural countryside or a rural town of not more than 10,000 people. The loans are designed especially for low income families.

Under this program, interest credits can reduce the effective interest rate paid by a borrower to 1 per cent if the adjusted fami-

ly income is less than \$3,000. If the adjusted family income is more than \$3,000 but less than \$5,000, the interest rate will be 2 per cent. If the adjusted family income is between \$5,000 and \$7,000, interest will be 3 per cent.

The policy of making interest credit and repair and rehabilitation loans is another method of utilizing the existing supply of housing to improve living conditions for low income rural people.

Farmers Home Administration is the Department of Agriculture's rural credit agency for family-farm agriculture, town and country housing, community facilities and business enterprise supportive of rural community development. Loans are made through 1,785 county offices throughout the country. Local persons interested in a loan of this type should contact Alton R. Pyburn, county supervisor for Coke and Nolan Counties, Box 406, Sweetwater.

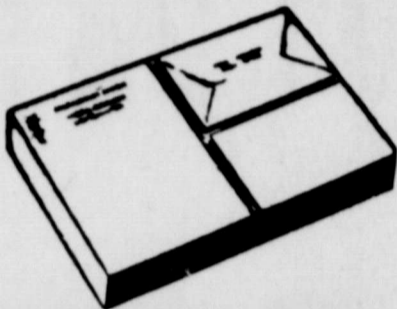
