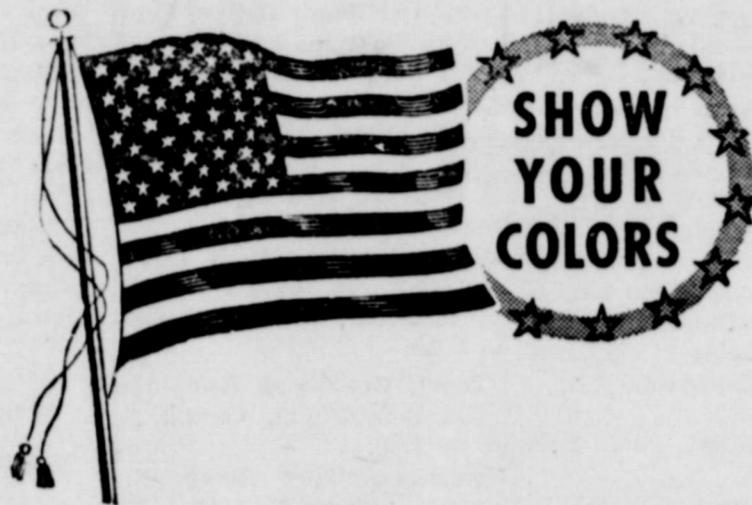

Tennyson P. O. Has 80th Birthday

Seventy-nine persons registered Wednesday when the 80th anniversary of the Tennyson Post Office was observed with an all day open house.

Mrs. W. T. Green, immediate past postmaster, served coffee, doughnuts and soft drinks to guests all during the day and sandwiches were served at noon.

The Tennyson Post Office was established June 26, 1894 with Sarah Kiser first postmaster.

Other postmasters and the dates they began are: Jane M. Byrd, Sept. 21, 1899; John T. Daniel, Feb. 26, 1909; Emory A. Bell, June 1, 1920; Joseph L. Howell, April 30, 1921; Mrs. Gladys Vandandt, Aug. 21, 1937.

Mrs. Betty P. Green was sworn in as clerk Dec. 15, 1942 and became acting postmaster Jan. 3, 1943 and received her commission March 31, 1943.

Present postmaster William J. "Bill" Green was named officer in charge July 1, 1972, and received his commission Jan. 20, 1973.

Bronte to Observe July 4th Holidays

Bronte will be pretty well closed next Thursday in observance of the Fourth of July. Some businesses along the highways will stay open, but the majority of local stores will be closed.

The Bronte Post Office, City Hall and First National Bank will be closed. Everyone is asked to keep the closing date in mind and transact any urgent business before next Thursday.

The observance will mark the 198th birthday of the United States. It was on July 4, 1776, that delegates from the 13 colonies met in Philadelphia, and declared their independence from Great Britain.

So far as The Enterprise has learned there will be no special celebration or program in Bronte in honor of the occasion. Most local residents probably will spend a quiet holiday at home. However, there a number of holiday celebrations planned in cities within easy driving distance of here.

All Bronte residents who own flags are urged to fly them on July 4.

pump immediately and in as short a time as possible. They believe the additional pump will exert enough pressure to allow pumping about 100,000 gallons above the amount now possible.

Mayor Caperton said during the time the pump is being installed the city will have to curtail all pumping from Oak Creek Lake. "That will leave us with no water except what's in our storage tank," he said, "and it will be necessary for everybody to be as conservative as possible."

Caperton said city officials are hopeful the pump can be installed in a short time with no serious problems. A power line to the installation site is being built this week.

Until the new pump is installed and in operation, citizens are requested to continue observing limited watering times. Those who live east of Washington Street are allowed to water for 30 minutes on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Residents who live west of Washington Street are permitted 30 minutes of watering time on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. No watering is allowed on Sundays.

City officials are hopeful that the new pump will solve the city's water problems, at least for this summer.

Boating Safety Week Proclaimed

Gov. Dolph Briscoe has proclaimed the week of June 30 through July 6 Safe Boating Week in Texas.

The Texas Safety Association, along with boating groups across the state, urged Texans to pay special attention to boating safety during the July Fourth holiday when water traffic is always heavy.

The official proclamation pointed out that there are now 432,558 boats registered in Texas. "This increase in recreational craft greatly intensifies the water safety problem," reads the proclamation. "It is imperative that all boatmen observe the basic rules of boating safety if we are going to keep loss of life and property at a minimum."

In 1973 there were 74 boating deaths in Texas. Sixty-five of these contributed to drownings. Deaths like these can be prevented, according to TSA officials, if boaters will take the simple precautions of wearing a personal flotation device.

At least half of the recreational drowning victims in the United States last year never intended going into the water in the first place. Either they were involved in a boat sinking or they slipped, tripped or fell into the water. Most of the "surprise victims" were not wearing a flotation device — and none was handy.

Keeping personal flotation devices handy not only makes good sense safetywise, but Texas law requires that on recreational boats 16 feet and longer, there must be

a Coast Guard approved wearable device for each person aboard. In addition, one throwable device must be carried.

For smaller boats and all canoes and kayaks, one buoyant cushion is required for each person on board. However, the Coast Guard recommends use of wearable devices.

TSA also urged Fourth of July boaters to begin thinking safety on the way to the water. Familiarize yourself with the basic rules of boat trailing, buckle your safety belt, observe the 55 mph speed limit and have a good holiday, says the safety group.



FISHING REPORT from Lake Spence

It was good news this week for striped bass fans, for 50,000 fingerlings were deposited last week in Lake Spence. The baby fish were spawned in Lake Spence and then taken to the San Angelo

Bill Follis, biologist of San Angelo, and his Parks and Wildlife Fish Hatchery for development. Department crew raised over 2 1/2 million young striped bass from eggs taken from adult stripers at Spence this year.

The process of hatching the baby stripers under laboratory conditions has been developed since the exotic stripers were introduced a few years ago into Lake Spence.

Fishermen are catching the beautiful stripers up to 15 pounds now, and experts say the stripers may reach 35 pounds within a few years.

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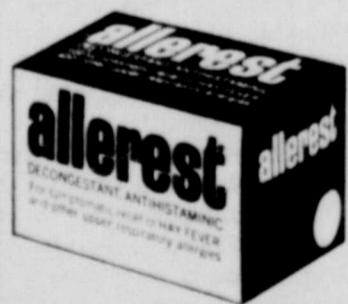

Safety Urged During Holiday

According to the Texas Safety Association, nationwide traffic fatality projections for the July Fourth Holiday are the lowest in almost 25 years.

TSA President Edwin B. Locke today noted that Texas motorists can help keep the toll at a minimum by buckling their safety belts, observing speed limits and paying attention to some of the hazards which accompany the energy shortage.

"While the decline of highway death and injury which has accompanied the lowering of speed limits has received wide publicity," Locke said, "some of the hazards created by the energy shortage have not attracted much attention."

He specified the increase of small cars on the highways. According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, the occupants of smaller cars involved in crashes tend to sustain more severe injuries than the occupants of larger cars.

"Small car drivers should be aware of the extra hazards they face," Locke said. "While we urge all drivers to buckle up and drive defensively, drivers of sub-compact should be doubly cautious."

Locke also noted the sharp increase in the presence of gas saving motorcycles on the road today and the corresponding increase in cycle-car accidents. He urged drivers to be on the lookout for two wheeled vehicles, and to accord them the normal driving courtesies.

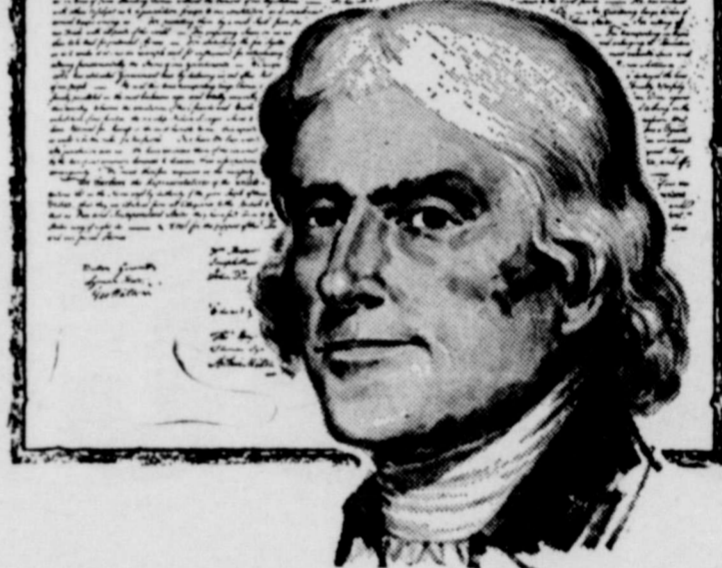

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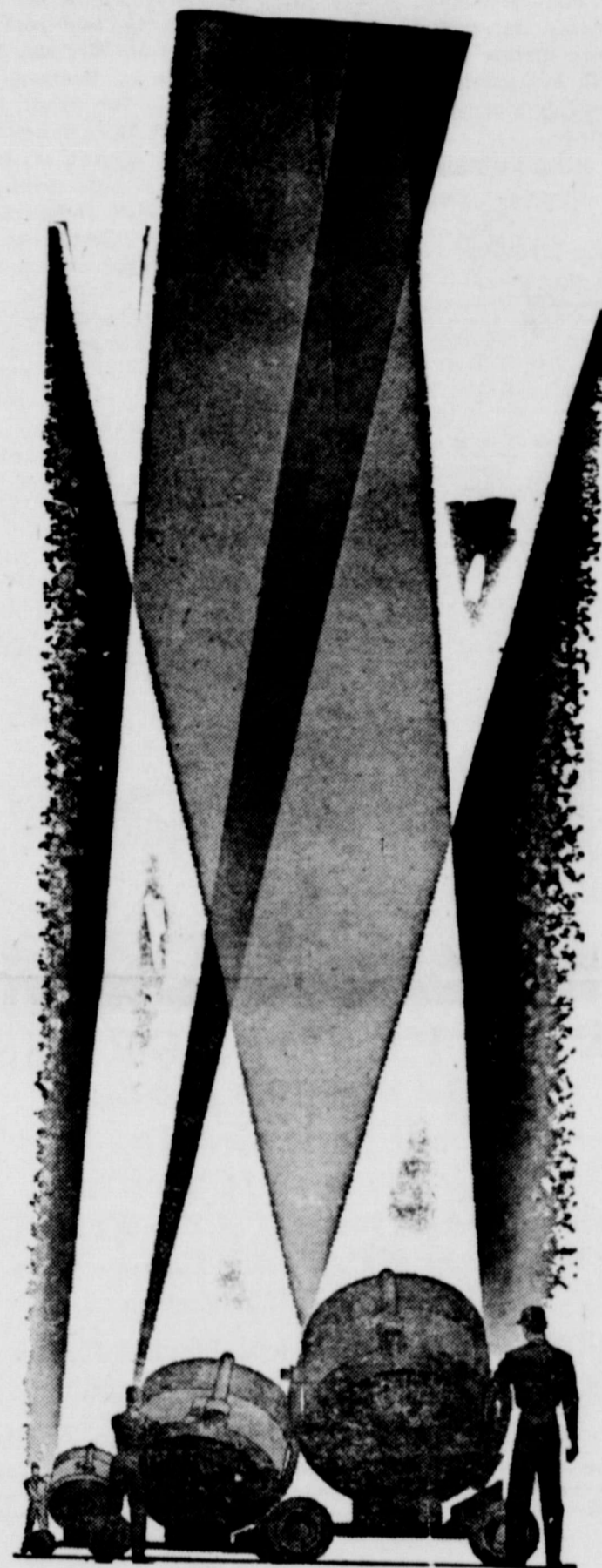

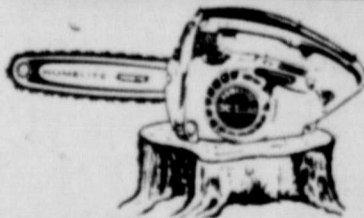

Survey Made Of Coke Shelters

Two weeks of work in Robert Lee and Bronte by Army Reservists will be culminated Friday with the presentation of a Civil Defense survey to Coke County officials.

The published survey will show Civil Defense officials at a glance the sheltering available to Coke Countians in the event of a natural disaster such as a tornado. These shelters range in size from the basements of public buildings to private storm cellars.

In an emergency, rooms under the concrete stands at the Robert Lee High School gymnasium could provide shelter for nearly 300 persons, making it the largest shelter in Robert Lee, the survey will show.

The survey will include a complete listing of all the shelters which the Reservists were able to find in their foot surveys of the two towns. The Reservists joined Civil Defense directors Bob Large of Robert Lee and Frederick Alley of Bronte in expressing their thanks to the public for assistance in locating and giving information about the shelters for the survey.

"We would like to think that the shelters will never be needed, but we know better than that," said Capt. Allen Clendennen of Robert Lee, officer in charge of the survey.

"Emergencies which always seem to happen elsewhere could very well happen here," he continued. "If disaster does occur, we think this survey will be invaluable in locating shelter, not only from the storm, but to those persons who are displaced by having their homes destroyed by a storm."

The survey will also include a complete listing of all communications systems, public and private (except telephone) in the county. A diagram will show how a network of Citizens Band radios

could be utilized in the event telephone communications were interrupted by a storm.

The survey was conducted by members of the 490th Civil Affairs Company, U. S. Army Reserve headquartered in Abilene, as one of the requirements of their two weeks of annual active duty.
