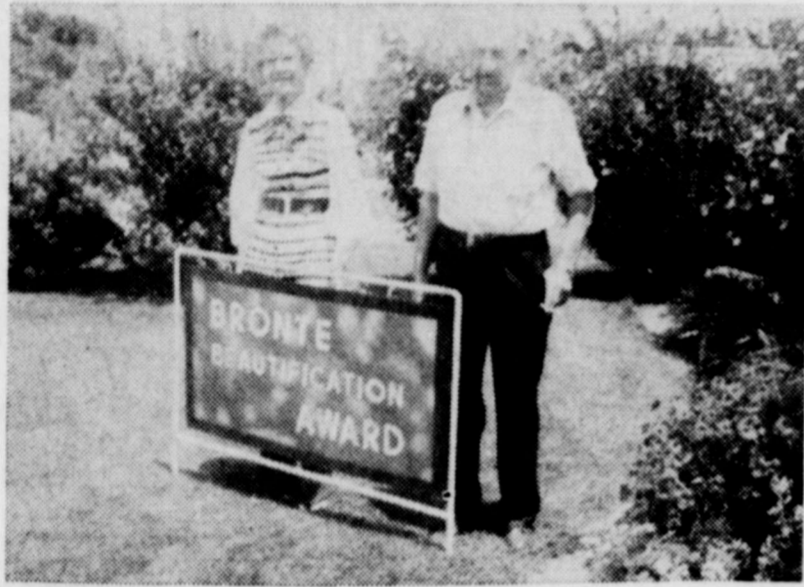

Riding Club Tells Plans for the Year

The Coke County Riding Club held a business meeting Tuesday night in the Vocational Agriculture Building in Bronte and made some important decisions for the remainder of this year.

One important decision was that the Riding Club will sponsor a 4-H

Horse Unit for Coke County.

Playday events which have been held in the past will continue as before with one exception. The poles will be run according to state 4-H rules. Anyone who is not familiar with the new pole pattern and who will be competing needs to talk with someone who attended the meeting or secure a booklet with the state 4-H rules from the County Agent's office.

The Riding Club will sponsor a 4-H horse show on Saturday, Aug. 31, at the Bronte arena. Events will include showing at halter, western pleasure, western horsemanship, reining, barrels and pole bending. There will be practice sessions held on dates to be announced, to familiarize everyone with these new events. All these events are explained fully in the booklet on state 4-H horse shows.

The next regular Coke County Playday will be Monday, July 8, at 8 p.m.

A committee meeting will be held Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the vocational ag building at Bronte to make plans for the forthcoming horse show.

The pump is here and as soon as it can be installed, Bronte residents should be able to water their yards and gardens in a normal fashion again.

City officials said late Wednesday that they did not know if the contractor and his crew would work before Monday. They are hopeful that the job can be done Friday, but it is doubtful.

Everything is ready at the site for the pump installation. Electricity has been run to and a con-

crete slab poured at the place of installation.

Water Supt. Billy Joe Luckett brought out that the city needs 100 per cent cooperation in conserving water during the time the pump is being installed. He said that members of the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department will be asked to assist in getting the word around as to when the pump will be installed. Then the firemen probably will be asked to make regular surveys of the city to see that nobody is watering yards and gardens. Only water which is in the city's storage tanks will be available for use during the installation period, and it is imperative that no one use more water than is absolutely necessary.

Until the pump is installed and in operation the same rules concerning watering will remain in effect. Thirty minutes every other day has to be the limit, city officials say. Those who live east of Washington Street may use their 30 minutes on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, while those who live west of Washington Street may water for 30 minutes on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

City officials hope to bring in an additional 100,000 gallons a day with the new pump, and they believe this amount will take care of Bronte's needs this summer.

100 Year Families to Be Recognized

Farmers and ranchers in Coke County whose families have held the same land since 1874 or before will be honored by the Texas Department of Agriculture's "Family Land Heritage Program," according to Commissioner John C. White.

The program, which was initiated July 1, will "pay tribute to those families who have proved their respect for and dedication to the land," White said.

This county has some of the oldest establishments in the state, with a long history of dedicated service to the agricultural community and I hope that every qualified family will take this opportunity to be recognized by the people they have served, White said.

Applications and rules for the program may be obtained by writing Commissioner White, P. O. Box 12847, Austin 78711.

Any family who is certified by

Judge W. W. Thetford will qualify for the honor. Any applicant need only show a continuous family relationship between the founder of the homestead and the present owner.

The land must have been in use for agriculture by the family since 1874 or before, must be at least 10 acres and producing \$50 or more from agricultural products.

Those who do qualify by Aug. 31 will be recognized in a special ceremony at the State Fair this year and a short history of their family and land will be published in a land heritage directory. In addition, local recognition will be provided to the families for their long dedication to agriculture.
