Sept. 13-15 has been set as the dates for the 1974 Coke County Fair. The event will be held in the new Coke County Recreation Show Center in Robert Lee. Last year's fair was a success and it is expected the new facilities of the Show Center will make this year's show even bigger and better.

Fair catalogs have been completed and will be mailed to all boxholders in Coke County. Cata-

logs contain general rules and regulations; divisions of the Adult and Youth Departments; division chairmen and co-chairmen and other information. Mrs. Fay C. Roe, County Extension Agent, asks that everyone watch their mail for the catalogs.

Mr. and Mrs. T. K. Whiteside have been named general chairmen of the fair with Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Bradley to serve as co-chairmen.

All Coke County residents are eligible to enter the fair in any or all departments. No entry fee will be charged except to firms or individuals engaged in business. Business firms or individuals desiring to have booths or exhibits will be charged \$1.00 per front foot. Sept. 2 will be the deadline for reservations.

The exhibit hall will be open to the public from 4 to 7:30 p.m. on the opening day, Sept. 13; from 9 a.m. until ?? on Saturday, Sept. 14; and from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 15.

An "Old Time Jamboree" will be held Saturday night with music, square dancing, bubble blowing contest and other events.

Another added feature this year will be the crowning of a Coke County Belle and Beau, chosen from Bronte and Robert Lee High Schools. County Extension Agents Fay C. Roe and Sterling Lindsey are working on the fair and urge the cooperation and participation of everyone in making it a success.

Sandusky said the large number of players will necessitate the creation of a B team, and he is already trying to match some B team games.

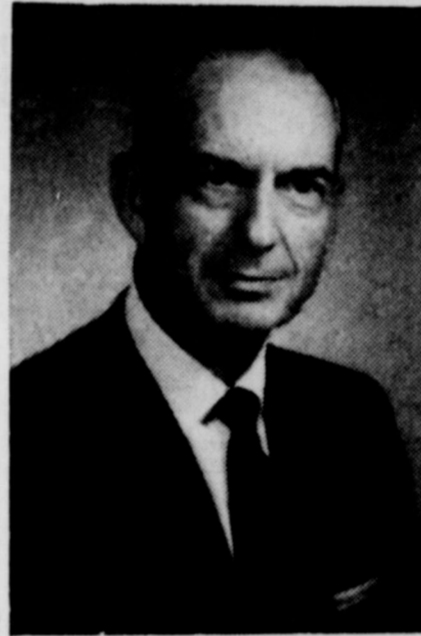
Scrimmages Set

Mr. and Mrs. Clark Glenn visited last weekend in Houston with their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. David Glenn.

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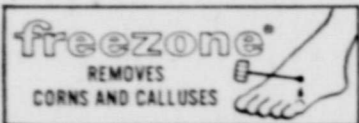
Our Newsletter

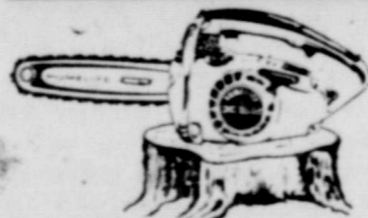

Plan Ahead
Sort clothes according to type of fabric, colorfastness, degree of soil and garment construction. You'll save both hot water and electricity by doing similar items together. Accumulate a full load before running your washer.

Use the least amount of detergent that will get your clothes clean—most loads require only an ounce or less! Overloading causes extra strain and wear on your equipment; check the manufacturer's recommendations for load weight. Balance your load by alternating small and large items.

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Ben:

The purpose of creating the East Coke County Hospital District by the Texas Legislature and by a vote of the people of the district was primarily to establish a way and means to provide a nursing home. Under State and Federal standards any person, age 16 and over, is eligible for short or long term nursing and convalescent care in this facility.

At the present time funds received from taxes and patient services are budgeted to the liquidation of the indebtedness of the home. The home is operating at 100 per cent capacity and is well on the road to recovery. Since the bond issue of \$250,000 was well short of the original cost of approximately \$300,000 for the building, furniture, fixtures, supplies and an addition of eight beds, it has been necessary to use all excess funds derived from taxation and patient revenue. The bonds will mature in 1985.

There are many residents in Coke County, under either the West Coke or East Coke County Hospital District, who are in need of medical care. They are not aware of the responsibilities of the administrators of the districts, which are charged by the state to furnish hospital and medical care to residents of the districts, or cause the services to be rendered through other federal or state agencies, depending upon the need and financial abilities of the residents.

Many medical needs are unmet for the simple reason that the individual does not know how to apply for services to members of a family. Many school children become drop-outs because of lack of medical attention. The inability to hear or see, and malnutrition can affect the ability to learn. Many childhood health problems are hidden and can lead to serious illnesses. But if the problems are discovered and treated before they get too bad, chances are greater for a healthy and happy life.

Free health check-ups and treatment for eligible children are being offered by the State Department of Public Welfare and the State Health Department. Most services take little time and include complete physical exam—eye, ear, nose and throat exam, test for heart trouble, TB test, anemia test, some dental work including diagnosis and treatment as needed. Persons should contact the welfare office in Ballinger or San Angelo for details.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the Social Security Administration and other agencies have been allocated funds for states to implement programs to provide medical as well as food for needy persons.

As administrator of East Coke County Hospital District, I can direct and assist any individual in applying to these agencies for these services.

Many residents in nursing homes receive total care without any cost to them; some contribute according to their ability to pay; and some are not eligible for any assistance due to their ability to provide for themselves.

If any medical need of any resident of the East Coke County Hospital District is unmet because of inability, ways and means can be found through the aid and counsel of my office.

Another note of importance to the people of this area is that Bronte nursing Home and many other places are employing people and have been in constant need of personnel. The needs of some families in our community may be met by applying for work

at Bronte Nursing Home where jobs in various departments are available today.

OIL NEWS

Oil activity in Coke County has continued good the past week. A completion has been recorded in Pearson-Sibert Oil Co. of Texas, c/o Midland No. 1-PS Millican Reef Unit in the Millican (Strawn Reef) Field 12 miles west of Robert Lee.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of Section 158, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Absolute, open flow was 2,200,000 cu. feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 5,575 to 5,961 feet. The pay was treated with 5,000 gallons of acid. Total depth was 6,240 feet, plugged back to 6,038 feet.

Another gas well, a plug back, is Exxon Corp. No. 67-F Sallie Odom, Account 2. Location is four miles south of Blackwell in the Fort Chadbourne, West (Gardner, South) Field.

It spots 3,641 feet from the southeast and 2,650 feet from the southwest lines of Seth Clark Survey 475.

Absolute, open flow was 506,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 5,306-324 feet treated with 1,500 gallons of acid.

Wildcat Staked

Staughan Oil Interests, Fort Worth, will drill a 3,700 foot Cisco wildcat eight miles southwest of (Bronte). No. 1 Hickman Estate is ½ mile north of the depleted one well Wendkirk North Field and ½ mile northwest of the firm's No. 1 J. R. Smith, 3,772 foot failure.

Location is 1,230 feet from the north and 8,800 feet from the east lines of William A. Betes No. 1, Abst. 1731.

Mann Rankin of Midland will re-enter and clean out to 6,868 feet for recompletion attempt of a well that was depleted in 1949. It is the No. 2 Lassiter, located in the depleted San Benito (Strawn) Field, 12 miles north-northwest of Robert Lee.

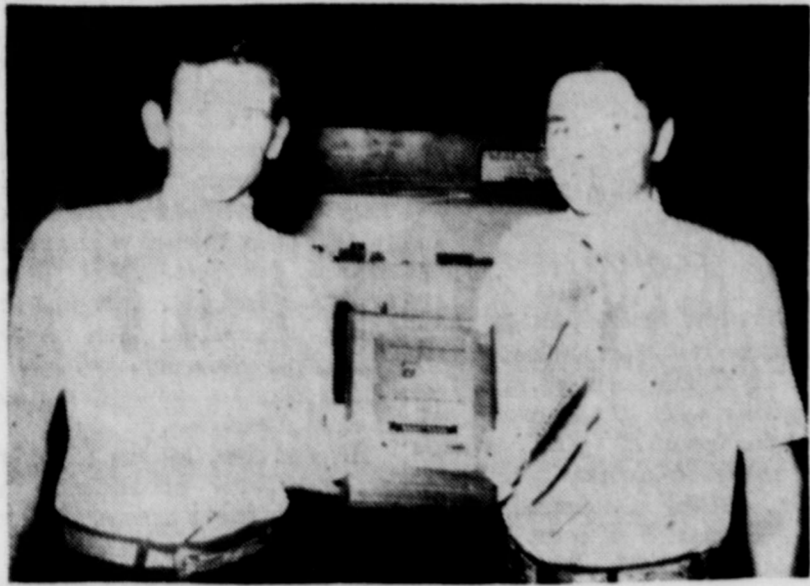

Clean Pot Makes Better Coffee

If your coffeepot makes bitter tasting coffee, it may not be caused by the brand of coffee you're using.

An oily residue from previous brews builds up inside the coffeepot causing the bitter taste.

To prevent this buildup, wash the coffeepot with detergent after each use. Rinse and dry it well.

Use a long, narrow brush to scrub the spout and basket stem.

An occasional special cleaning also helps keep the appliance from making bitter coffee.

If it is lined with aluminum, fill the pot with a solution of one tablespoon of cream of tartar for each six cups of water. Again, perk for a short period of time.

Another method of cleaning is to use a commercial coffeemaker cleaner. Follow the directions carefully and be sure to rinse the pot well after any cleaning method you use.

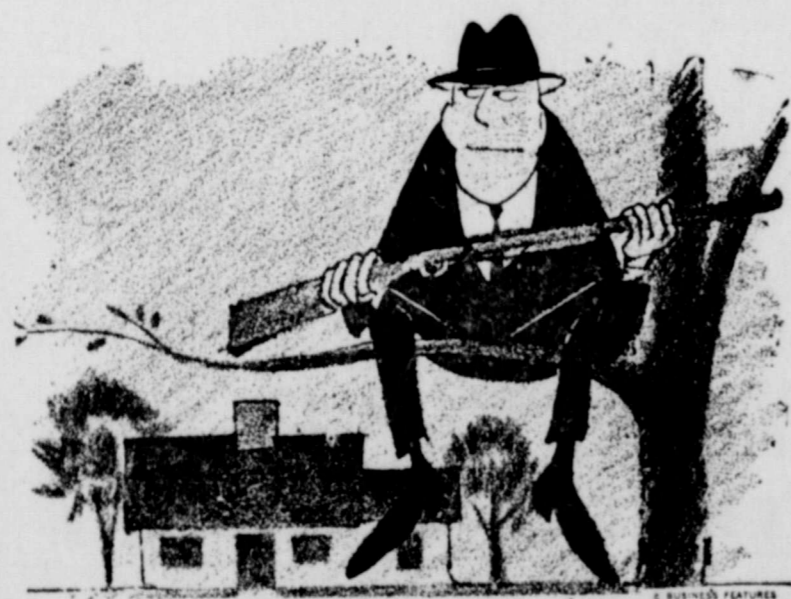

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR TRASH HAULING TO RESIDENTIAL CUSTOMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, COKE COUNTY, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, it now appearing necessary to provide extra labor at the Dump Ground to meet the Texas State Department of Health recommendations, and

WHEREAS, the current charges for trash hauling services within the City of Bronte is no longer sufficient to cover added costs, and

WHEREAS, it now appearing to this city council that it is necessary and proper to prescribe a schedule of rates or charges to be paid by inhabitants of said City for trash hauling services rendered by the City of Bronte that will meet the extra cost.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS:

Section I. Effective with the first trash hauling bills rendered after the final passage of this ordinance, the maximum charge for hauling trash for residential customers is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

a. For each residence within the City of Bronte, a charge of \$1.00 (One Dollar) per month shall be charged for trash hauling services

rendered by the City of Bronte.

b. Such charge is based on the pickup of cans, trash, or rubbish at the ground level in an alley, or from curb line of the street, so situated as to allow the pickup to be made with normal convenience.

c. Rules and Ordinance in effect as of this date shall remain in effect as to contents of barrels.

SECTION II. For this monthly charge, the customer shall expect and receive pick up service twice per month.

SECTION III. The importance of this ordinance and the immediate need for the extra fees for trash hauling creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity and requires that this ordinance shall take effect and be enforced after date of its passage and it is so ordained.

Attached rules become a part of this ordinance.
