Deferred Grazing Plans Can Help Coke Ranchmen to Improve Pasture Picture

Coke County livestock producers have found by using a system of deferments they can improve their rangeland. Deferments during the growing season will promote plant improvement, reproduction, and provide a feed reserve for fall and winter grazing or emergency use.

Livestock should be kept out of pastures being rested for at least a three or four month period between April 1 and Nov. 1 for warm season grasses. This minimum de-

ferment will allow growth and seed production of grass plants. Longer deferments may be needed in pastures that are in poor condition.

Due to below average rainfall since last fall, grass production was below normal. Now would be a good time for fall deferment since the rains that came during the first part of August. If more moisture is received this month and September, deferments should provide winter grazing.

One of the primary things to consider when planning deferments is to have the ranch properly stocked. The benefits in resting each pasture will not be gained if the other pastures are overgrazed. By being flexible and keeping livestock in balance with forage produced livestock producers can work out a grazing system that will allow deferments of rangeland each year.

Thieves Steal Pot From Courthouse

Burglars broke into the Coke County courthouse early Monday morning and made off with 11½ pounds of the marijuana which was confiscated the Monday before by officers in a raid on a ranch five miles west of Tennyson.

The illegal weed was stored in the basement of the courthouse, and burglars gained entry by prying off a lock and breaking a window. According to information from the office of Sheriff Doug Robertson, the remainder of the marijuana, which was being kept for evidence, has been moved to DPS headquarters in Midland for safekeeping. It was noted that there is no place in the Coke County courthouse for the sheriff to have security for storing evidence of this type.

The sheriff checked out the situation at midnight Sunday night and the burglary was discovered by Bob Large Monday morning when he opened the courthouse.

Street value of the stolen grass was estimated at \$1200.

DOVE SEASON OPENS SUNDAY

Dove season will open Sunday, Sept. 1, and continue through Oct. 30.

Game Warden R. L. Flanagan said Wednesday that hours for hunting are from 12 noon until sunset. Daily bag limit is 10 and possession bag limit is 20.

Flanagan noted that the Sunday season opening does not include anything but doves—no quail, turkey or deer yet. He also pointed out that those hunting on property of other persons without permission are subject to prosecution for trespassing.

The dove hunting picture does not look too bright due to the summer drouth and resulting shortage of feed for the birds.

Cooler Weather, Rain Welcomed

Cooler weather has been evident this week, resulting from generally cloudy weather much of the time and several rain showers. The rain has been very spotted, with a variation in Bronte from one-half to one inch.

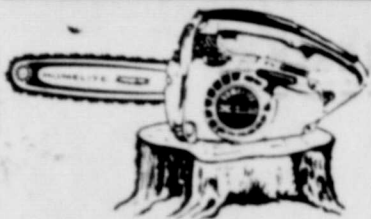
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Rotan Man Drowns In Lake Spence

Survivors include his wife, three sons, one daughter, a sister, and five grandchildren.

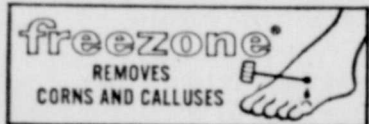

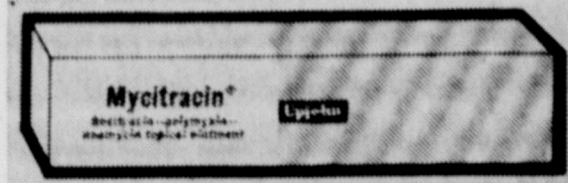
