Present plans call for clearing the structures off the land and making it into a parking lot. Supt. C. B. Barbee said the school plans to do considerable work on the property, including some landscaping. The addition of the three lots will give the school the entire half block across from the campus for use as parking area.

E. F. Glenn, president of First National Bank, said the decision of the bank's directors to purchase the land was in line with their policy of assisting the school in any way possible, particularly with facilities which are not available through the use of tax money, but which are needed.

Supt. Barbee said the bank has donated almost \$7,000 toward improving school facilities in the last few years. He mentioned a new water cooler which cost \$400; the scoreboard-clock in the gymnasium at a cost of \$1600; a universal gym for the P. E. Department which cost \$2200; and the Good property at \$2500.

Barbee said he realizes that the school is a good customer of the bank, but he pointed out that the generosity of the directors has gone beyond favorable treatment generally afforded a good customer. "I feel that all of us who were connected with the school, both students and teachers, owe a lot of gratitude for their kindness. What they have done is good for the school and good for the community."

Fair Dates Re-set For Mid-October

It has been decided to postpone the annual Coke County Fair in order to be assured that the new facilities of the Coke County Recreation Show Center in Robert Lee will be completed in time for the exhibition. New dates for the fair are Oct. 18, 19 and 20, changed from Sept. 13, 14 and 15.

Deadline for commercial exhib-

its will be Oct. 7 and deadline for entries in the fair will be Oct. 11.

All the information listed in the catalogs which have been sent out and that which was published in this newspaper remains in effect, except for the dates.

Some difficulties have developed in completion of the new building which will house this year's fair, and those in charge wanted to be sure completion would be effected in time for Coke Countians to have the new facilities for their use at this year's fair.

Those in charge of the event believe the postponement will allow ample time to work out the difficulties and have the new center ready by the new Oct. 18-20 dates.

OIL NEWS

Mann Rankin of Midland has completed No. 2 Cargile in the Arledge field, 12 miles north of Robert Lee, for a daily flowing potential of 106 barrels of 42 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,650-1. Flow was through a 14-64 inch choke and perforations at 5,325-42 feet.

The new producer is 1,650 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of Section 300, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey.

A Cambrian discovery has been completed in northeast Coke County. It is Triton Oil & Gas Corp. of Dallas No. 1 Riley Hendry, et al, three miles southeast of Blackwell.

The well pumped 16 barrels of oil plus 21 barrels of water per day, from perforations at 5,796-812 feet. Location is 997 feet from the northeast and 561 feet from the northwest lines of Joel Holeman Survey No. 305.

Operator suggested field designation Hendry Point (Cambrian).
