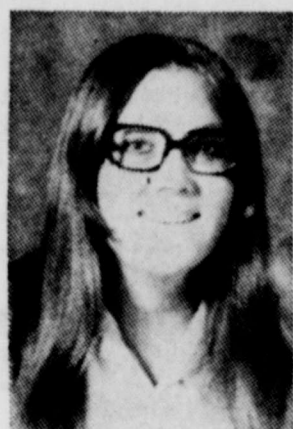

There will be a Scotch tournament at the local golf course Sunday, starting at 1:30 p.m. All golfers are invited to participate.

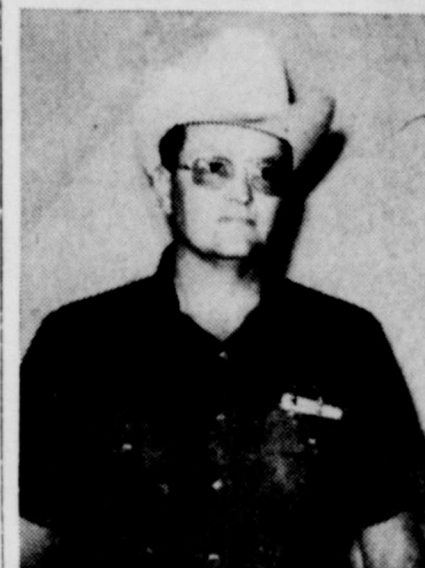
BRONTE FFA ELECTS OFFICERS FOR YEAR

Justice Not Served By Pardon

(An Editorial)

During the past month that Gerald Ford has been President of the United States, he has received immense public and congressional support from both Republicans and Democrats in what looked like a sincere effort to pull this nation out of the cesspool of stinking murky filth that Richard Nixon had led us into during the past two years—and probably longer.

Hopes were running high that this country's constitutional provisions for equal treatment under the law would be able to clean off the slime and dirt and again fly high and bright. Last Sunday, Gerald Ford shot down once again our hopes for equal justice, when he signed a "free, full and absolute" pardon for any criminal activities committed by Richard Nixon while he was president of the United

States.

It was so premature. Nixon had not been indicted for any crime; he had not been convicted of any crime. His guilt, it's true, was clearly established by his own sloppy conduct of his office and the recording of criminal activities on tapes. His guilt was further established by his resignation from office, which never would have been done had he thought he had any chance to survive the accusations against him.

This placing of the presidency above the law by President Ford (as Nixon tried so hard to do) wreaks of inequities in our system. The hogwash Ford put out about how much Nixon and his family had already suffered is invalid and without logical or legal base. All criminals and their families suffer when they

are caught and have to face the music.

President Ford might have done an act of mercy Sunday, but he sure split his britches as being the country's chief executor of laws and justice.

Even Nixon got a raw deal out of his pardon. Even Richard Nixon, a dangerous man to have in high office, deserves his day in court. He should be allowed to and made to relate his side to the American people. Now, the whole sordid affair probably will never be made public.

Gerald Ford's do-goodness completely stepped over the bounds of reason, propriety and justice. This country again has been left in a limbo of continued wrongdoing and injustice, and people must be developing fuzzy ideas of what's right and what's wrong.

CREATING **AGENCY, TEXAS**

The right to vote is one of the most important rights guaranteed under our Federal and State Constitutions.

The rights and privileges of citizenship cannot be properly exercised unless each qualified voter accepts the responsibility to be a part of the decision-making process of our government.

Tuesday, November 5, is the date of the next General Election in Texas, and on this date the citizens of Texas will, by their vote, determine who shall hold their state, local and federal offices.

In order to be eligible to exercise the right to vote in the next General Election, Texans first must register to vote with the Registrar (Tax Assessor-Collector) in their county of residence.



To this end I am directing the Chief Elections Officer of the State of Texas, Secretary of State, Mark W. Walker, Jr., to work with all organizations, groups, and individuals to endeavor to have all eligible voters register, and

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of September 16, 1974 - September 21, 1974, as

VOTER REGISTRATION WEEK

In Texas, and all other states, citizens who have not done so, should register to vote in an effort to insure maximum citizen participation in the selection of officers of state, local and federal government.

In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 13th day of September, 1974.

Voter Registration Week Sept. 16-21

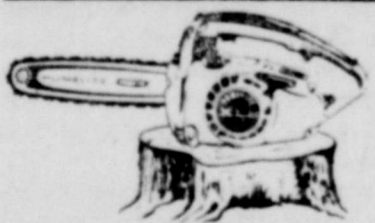
Gov. Dolph Briscoe this week signed proclamations denoting the week of Sept. 16-21 as Voter Registration Week and designating Tuesday, Nov. 5, 1974, as the date for the state wide General Election. A copy of the Voter Registration proclamation accompanies this story.

In signing the proclamation the Governor urged all eligible Texas citizens to register to vote in or-

der to insure maximum citizen participation in this year's important elections. He pointed out that the voters will be selecting all state officials, many members of the U. S. Congress and numerous county and local officials. Coke County citizens will vote on their next U. S. Congressman and representative to the Legislature.

"Only 30 per cent of the registered voters cast their ballots in the May primaries," Governor Briscoe said. "I certainly hope that many more of our citizens will participate in the November elections and vote for the candidates of their choice. The right to vote is one of our greatest constitutional privileges, and I urge all Texans to exercise this right on Nov. 5."

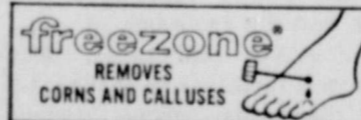

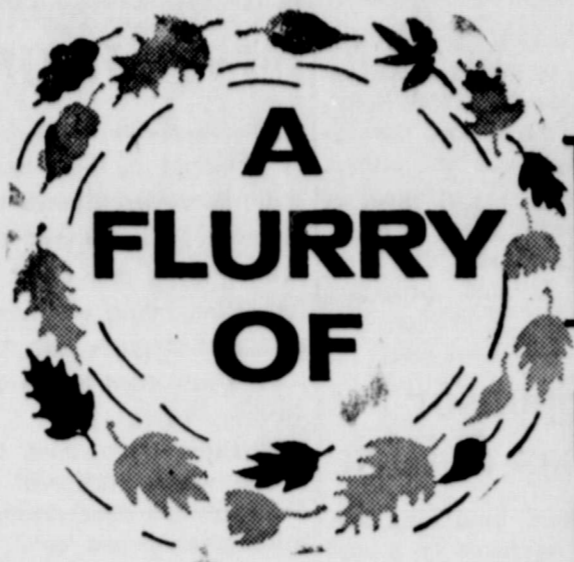

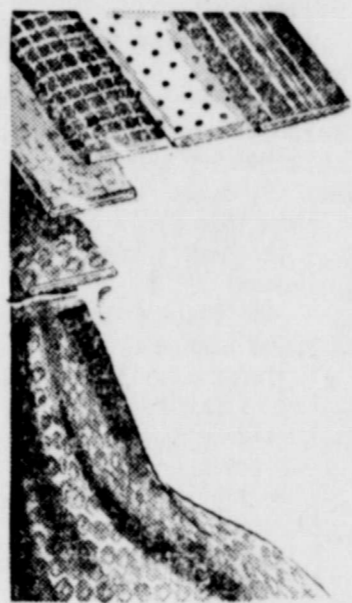

Our office has had numerous requests for pickles, canning peppers, and relish recipes. I am including some recipes I hope will be helpful to you in preserving your peppers.

Pickled Sweet Red Peppers

Wash outside of peppers and wipe dry. Cut slice from stem end and remove seeds. Cut into thin strips, or into long ribbons, working around and around the pepper. Soak well, then drop into ice water to crisp. Drain. Put the peppers in hot jars; fill with hot syrup made in the proportion of 1 cup sugar to 2 cups vinegar.

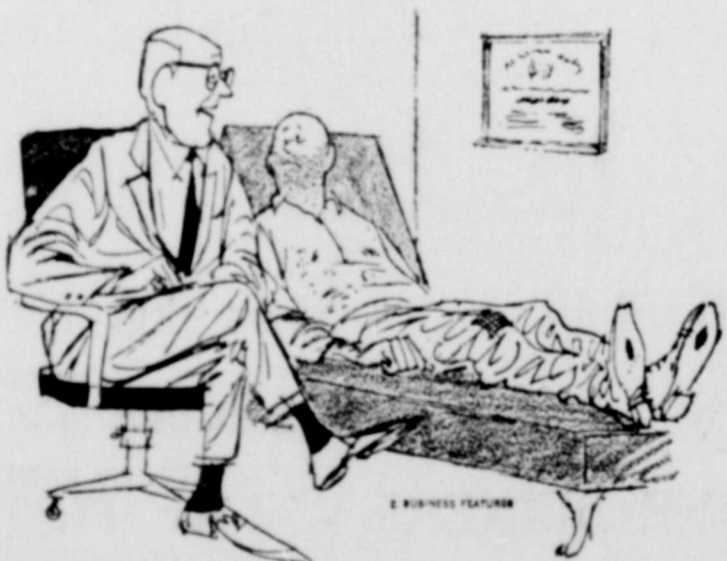

Close. Process in boiling water 5 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as water in canner returns to boiling.

Pickled Jalapenos

Wash jalapeno peppers. Pack tightly in hot jars. For each cup of vinegar, use ¼ cup water and ¼ cup olive oil, 1 teaspoon salt and 1 teaspoon pickling spices. Heat mixture to boiling. Pour over peppers. Close jars. Process 10 minutes in boiling water bath. Start to count processing time as soon as water in canner returns to boiling.

Bell Peppers

Can the sweet bell pepper with the skin on. Remove the seed pod. Boil 3 minutes and pack tightly into jars to within ½ inch of top. Add ½ teaspoon salt to each pint. Fill to within ½ inch of top of jar with precooking liquid or boiling water. Put on cap, screw band firmly tight.

In pressure cooker process pints 35 minutes at 10 pounds pressure.

Pimiento Peppers

Select ripe, sound peppers. To remove skins put whole peppers into boiling water 12 to 15 minutes, or place in a moderately hot oven for 6 to 8 minutes. Dip quickly into cold water, peel, stem and cut out seeds. Flatten. Pack in layers into pint jars to within ½ inch of top. Do not add water or oil.

Process pints 10 minutes in pressure cooker at 10 pounds pressure.

Following is a recipe that you might want to try. It is good with any kind of meat.

Fiery Hot Pepper Jelly

¾ cup bell peppers, orange or red

½ cup hot green peppers (the larger the better—large ones aren't so difficult to seed and grind)

6½ cups sugar

1 small bottle liquid pectin such as Certo

1½ cups apple cider vinegar

Seed and grind peppers, retaining juice. Add peppers to sugar and vinegar. Bring to rolling boil, stirring from time to time with a wooden spoon. Remove from heat and let cool 5 minutes. Add Certo. Let stand until mixture starts to jell, stirring now and then so peppers don't settle to bottom. Pour into glasses and seal with paraffin.

Through the trial and error method it has been found it is best to wear rubber or plastic gloves when handling the peppers. This fiery jelly is worth weeping and groaning over once you have tasted the results.

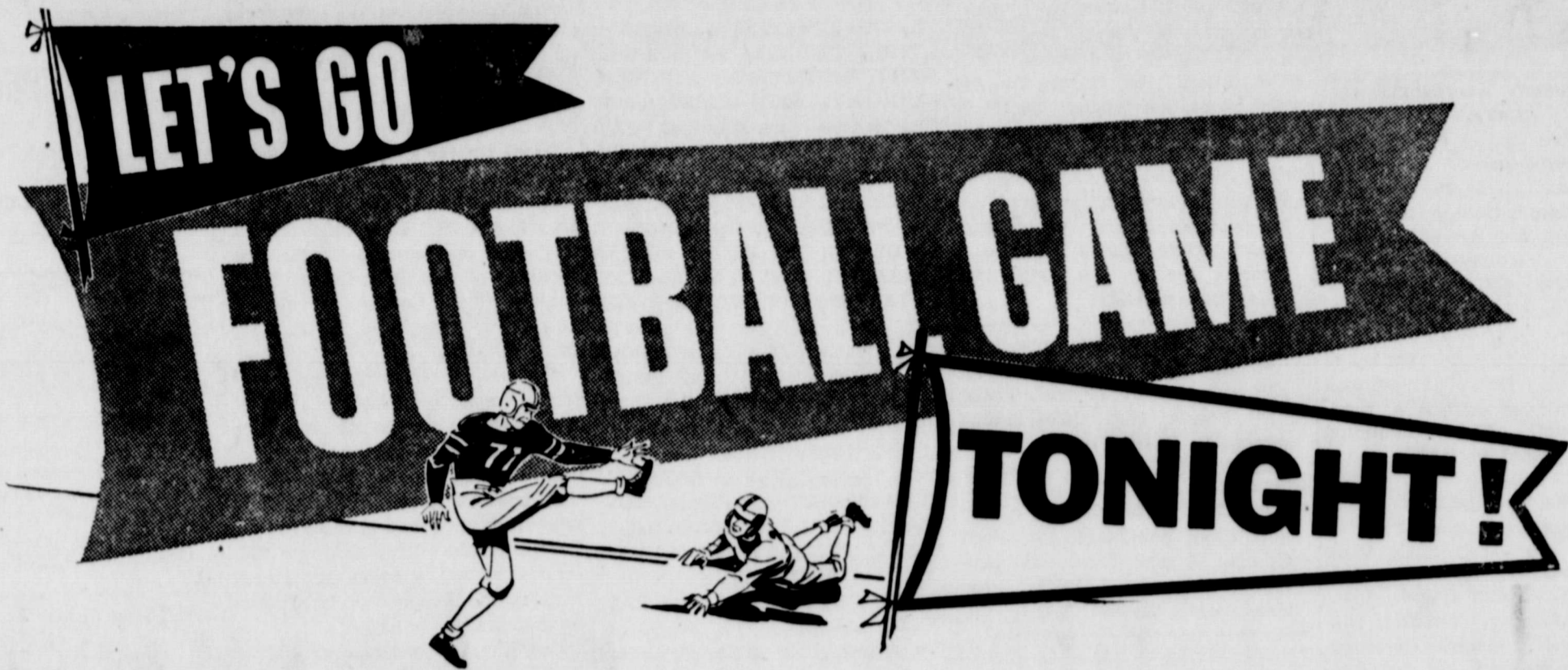

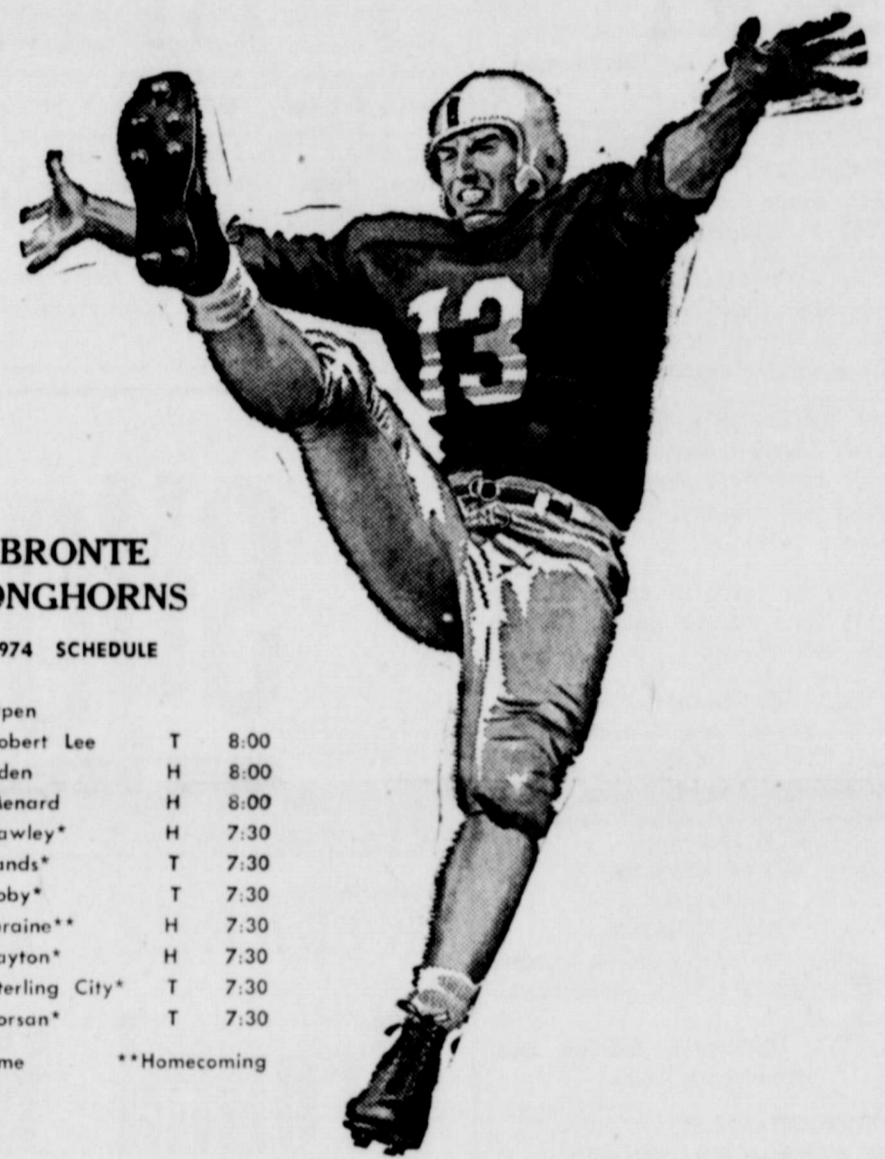
