Disaster Aid Asked for Coke

Gov. Dolph Briscoe requested federal aid Monday for Coke County, citing that the county was a disaster area because of the extreme and prolonged drouth of the past several months.

The Governor's request for aid was sent to U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz.

Briscoe has now asked federal disaster assistance for 34 counties in Central and West Texas.

The sun was shining brightly in the Bronte area Thursday after an early morning fog was burned off. The sunshine came after about 12 days of rainy weather which dumped as much as 17 inches of water in some parts of the area.

Bob Cox, who lives northeast of Robert Lee reported 17 inches since the rain started in earnest on Monday of last week.

Dave Seibold, who keeps accurate rain records at his place, said he had recorded 11.5 inches here in town. Some Bronte residents reported as much as 12 inches.

Workers at the West Texas Util-

ities plant at Oak Creek Lake reported 9.66 inches of rain and a rise in the lake's elevation of 5.65 feet since Sept. 16.

Engineers at Lake Spence at Robert Lee reported the lake's elevation Monday at 1859.86 feet above sea level, which was 5.9 feet above the 1853.96 feet of Sunday a week ago. Robert Lee's Mountain Creek Lake was full and running over the spillway.

Cool temperatures have been prevalent during the long rainy spell, staying down in the 50s for a high on most days. The Thursday sunshine sent the mercury up to the high 80s, according to The Enterprise thermometer at 3:45 p.m.

Farmers and ranchers are happy with the drouth breaker, as just about every tank and hole that would hold water is full. The small city lake in the Bronte Park reached its 82 acre feet capacity last week and has been running around.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m. and fans are urged to be on hand to boost the team.

A Gardner lime discovery has been completed two miles east of Bronte.

The strike is Triton Oil & Gas Corp. of Dallas No. 1 C. N. Webb Jr. It is located 467 feet from the south and west lines of T. C. Nations Survey 28 1/2.

Daily potential was 13 barrels of 36 gravity oil, plus 50 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 5,120-44 feet, treated with 7,500 gallons of acid. Total depth was 5,300 feet, plugged back to 5,266 feet.

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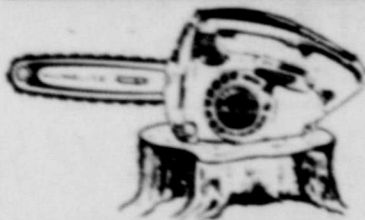
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**Austin Disappears
In Flood Waters**

Coke Austin, 48, of San Angelo and a native of Sanco, reportedly was swept away into flood waters in Dry Creek Park near San Angelo last Wednesday. Chief Deputy Ernest Haynes of the Tom Green County Sheriff's Office told the Enterprise at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday they had not been able to locate the body.

He said boats were going up and down the North Concho River as often as they could and an airplane supplied by Alvin Miller Crop Dusting Services had flown along the surface of the river, but to no avail.

Haynes said they are waiting for the waters to clear and that the water which is running six to eight inches deep, should be run down by Thursday morning if no more rain falls. He said the river banks were too muddy and grown up in high grass for searchers to walk the river banks.

It was reported that Austin and another man were at Dry Creek Park when the rise came. Austin reportedly waded out into the rising waters when he stepped into a hole and the rushing water and debris carried him away. He was not seen from the time he went under the churning waters.

Austin, the son of Mrs. Coke Austin of San Angelo, was born Dec. 23, 1925, at Robert Lee. He lived most of his life between Sanco and Robert Lee.

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For best results, use flat bottom utensils with tight fitting covers. Utensils of medium or heavy weight aluminum conduct heat faster, transfer heat evenly and respond quickly to temperature changes.

Match the utensil to the size of the unit. Use 8 inch units for large utensils. Use 6 inch units for small to average sized pans.

Use high setting for a quick start for any surface cooking, or to boil water quickly. When cooking temperature is reached, switch to a lower setting.

Do not pre-heat the oven for roasting or broiling, but do pre-heat the oven to the temperature given in the recipe for baking.

Select correct, measured heat. The accurate heat selector switch or oven thermostat enables you to select, exactly, the same correct temperature each time you use it.

For good heat distribution around the pans, when baking, they should not touch the sides of the oven or each other. Allow one inch clearance. Check for doneness at minimum baking time on recipe, don't keep opening oven door to peek.

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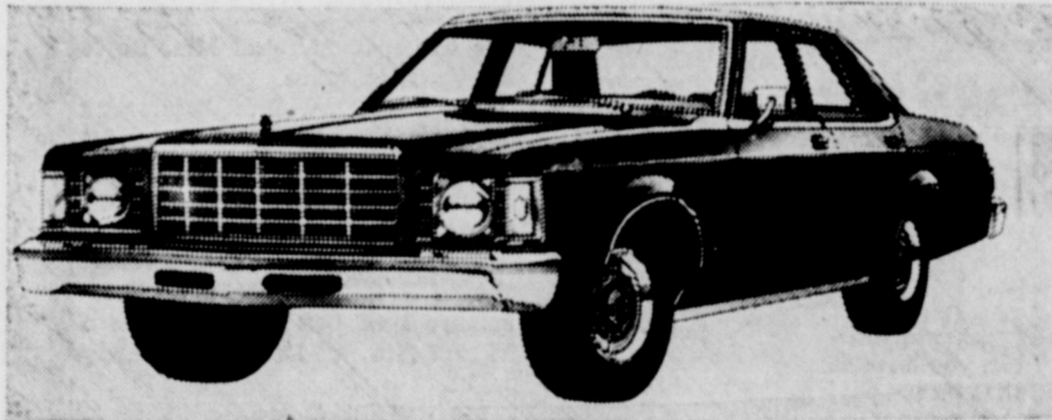
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Victoria Minjarez and Dave Balderas to Wed

SCS Collecting Irrigation Data

Despite urbanizing trends in Texas, agriculture remains a major sector of the Texas economy. Irrigation today has grown to phenomenal proportions with irrigation farming providing over half the value of all Texas crop production. Being the predominant practice in several Texas farming areas, irrigation is the largest consumer of water in the state.

Annually collected data is generally available for other forms of water use, but not for irrigation. Irrigation inventories have been made in some localities, and acreage for some irrigated crops have been estimated for the state. This data has been useful but often insufficient to fulfill the planning needs of state and federal agencies necessary to assess and project agricultural water use and needs accurately. This data has not been generally available.

To fill this void in basic data, cooperative arrangements were made with the Soil Conservation Service to inventory Texas irrigation periodically. The first inventory was in 1958 and additional data is collected on a five year interval. Other inventories were made in 1964 and 1969, coinciding

with the years for which U. S. Census of Agriculture data would also be available. By providing data from four inventories over a 16 year period, it is possible to make comparative analysis and indicates some trends in Texas irrigation.

When the field information is collected and sent to the Water Development Board in early 1975, all data for each county will be placed on a data card. Each data card will list the acres irrigated by water source, sprinkler acreages and the potential acreage for each individual basin-zone-district segment found in the county.

After the information has been collected and processed, it will be published in a bulletin.

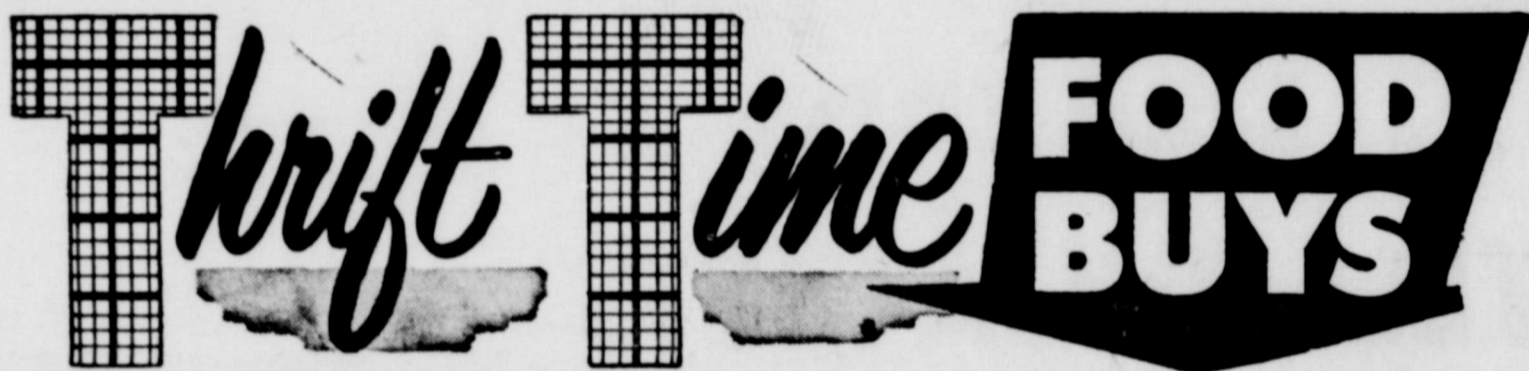
