County Adopts 1975 Budget

Coke Clubs Observe National 4-H Week

Coke County joins Texas and the nation in recognizing 4-H'ers during National 4-H Club Week, Oct. 6-12.

To date all clubs in the county have been reorganized and club members have indicated projects of interest to them.

Membership in the clubs numbers 250. Clubs in Coke County are Bronte Junior, Robert Lee Junior, Bronte Senior and Robert Lee Future Leaders 4-H Clubs.

Club members may choose from some 50 projects and may work in groups or with a parent. Some of the areas of interest in the past have been foods and nutrition, photography, clothing and child development. Approximately 50 boys and girls will have animal feeding projects this year with about 150 animals on feed. Another active group is the 4-H Horse Unit with 30 members and honorary mem-

bers on the club roll.

Individual projects carried out by many members include areas such as dog care, small engines, photography, gardening, rabbit production and lawn care.

In addition to the project work of the club members, leadership development and participation are stressed in 4-H Fun Day, record book competition, achievement program, fund raising events, Christmas party and judging and demonstration contests.

Adult leaders and parents are invaluable to the local program. Many work with groups while others assist with planning programs, events and activities and some work with their own 4-H'er in projects.

Working with the 4-H program in Coke County are local County Extension Agents Mrs. Foy C. Roe and Sterling Linksey.

SGT. RUSSELL BROWN NOW AF RECRUITER

Staff Sergeant Russell W. Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert I. Brown of Tennyson, has graduated from the U. S. Air Force recruiter school at Lackland AFB.

Sergeant Brown will be an official Air Force recruiter at Fort Worth. He was selected for the special school and recruiting duty as a volunteer with an outstanding military record.

The sergeant was trained in 11 areas of study, including the Air Force job classification system, testing procedures and community relations to broaden his qualifications in presenting Air Force career opportunities to young men and women.

Brown is a 1963 graduate of Bronte High School. His wife, Virginia, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. B. Richards of San Angelo.

The Commissioners Court of Coke County recently adopted the county budget for 1975 and allowed proposed expenditures of \$557,555.89 for the year. This figure is a little more than \$58,000 over the \$499,517.39 which is expected to come into the county treasury.

Spending more than will be tak-

en in, according to County Auditor Weldon Fikes, will be caused primarily by expending money for permanent improvements. The improvements (including the new show barn and recreation center at Robert Lee and the new community center at Bronte) were undertaken with the idea of paying for them with federal funds. It will take more than this year's federal revenue sharing to make the payments, and a lot of it's remain with the new Ford administration's policy on federal fund sharing. Consequently, the county government will be a little in the red next year, even if federal funds come through; and the red ink will get even heavier if the new President should cut federal revenue sharing.

Road and bridge fund (which also includes farm to market and lateral road funds): available resources, \$297,682.92; approved expenditures, \$192,400.20; ending balance, \$105,282.72.

General fund: available resources, \$229,341.06; approved expenditures, \$123,204.88 (the general fund will have to suffer a \$60,000 transfer to pay salaries of county officials and employees); ending bal-

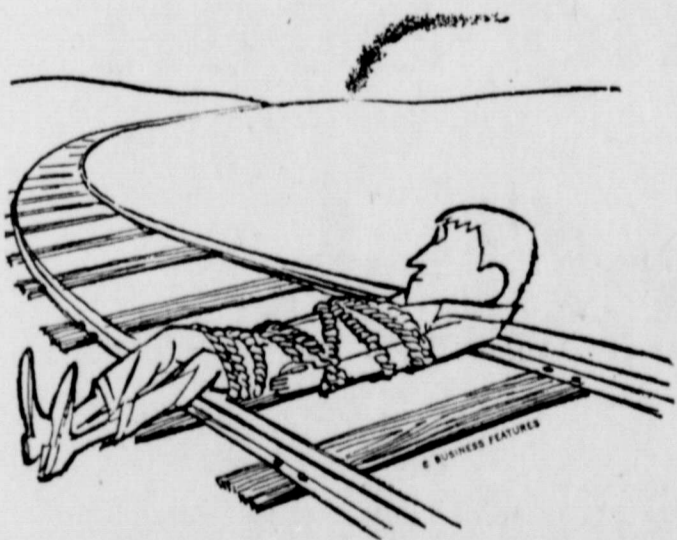
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Antlerless Deer Permits Available

Land owners of Coke and surrounding counties will soon have an opportunity to pick up their antlerless deer tags and permits for the coming whitetail season.

R. L. Flanagan, Coke County game warden, said the tags will be issued from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. on Oct. 16, at the courthouse in Robert Lee. He urged all land owners who want the tags to pick them up on that date.

Special antlerless deer tags are issued in lieu of permits in some counties. The difference is that permits are issued in limited quantities based on overpopulation of deer, carrying capacity of the land and in ratio to the proportion of land having surplus deer. No antlerless permits may be issued later than 10 days before the opening of the hunting season.

Special tags are used where either-sex hunts are approved.

There are no limitations on the number of tags a land owner may obtain since the hunts are designed to allow full land owner control of deer harvest.

Horns Start District With Win Over Hawley, 46-0

The Longhorns are looking better all the time and they showed real poise and aggressiveness in their 46-0 win last Friday over the Hawley Bearcats. The game was played here and opened District 3-B play for the schools.

First Quarter

Ray Hurd kicked off for Hawley, with Marvin Ensoe taking it to his 35. On 2nd down Quarterback Nelson Coulter pitched to Alan Barbee, who then passed to Bobby Bailey, who made a dazzling catch on the Hawley 35. It was a 33 yard gainer. Coulter then kept for a 20 yard gain and a 1st on the 15. Barbee carried twice, but didn't gain, as the Bearcat defense was really bearing down on him. Coulter moved the ball to the 7 and on 4th down went for a 1st on the 5. Hawley was penalized 2 1/2 yards and on 1st down Barbee crashed through the middle for 6 points. His kick was good and the score was 7-0.

Barbee kicked off to Tony Pack who returned from the 14 to his 34. The Bearcats made 8 yards in three tries and punted. Bronte drew a 5 yard penalty, making it 1st and 15 on their 29. But the Longhorns were able to make only 11 yards, so Barbee punted out on the Hawley 26.

Pack made 8 yards and Morrow made a 1st on the 38. Pack carried twice for 8, then a 3rd down fumble lost a yard and Don Lambert punted into the Bronte end zone. Starting at the 20, Wayne Alexander went for 5, N. Coulter added 2 and Barbee made 5 and a 1st on the 32 to end the first quarter.

Second Quarter

Alexander made 3 yards, then on 2nd down, N. Coulter pulled a slick fake, kept the ball, went around the right side and sailed 65 yards to pay dirt. The PAT try

failed and it was 13-0. Pack was tripped up on his 36 after taking Barbee's kickoff. Pack then went for 7 and a bad pass brought up 3rd down. Third Quarter

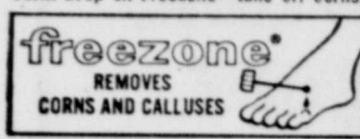



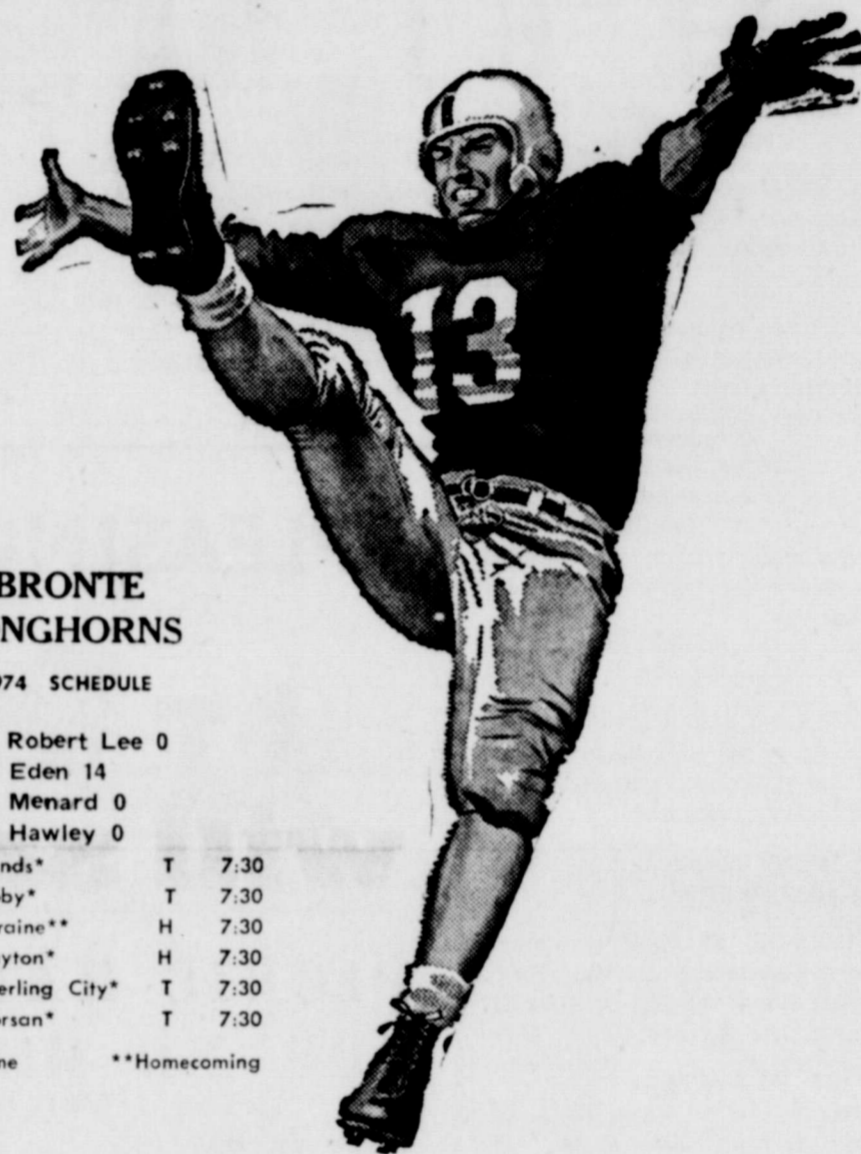
