The mighty Bronte Longhorns will play their next to last District 3-B game Friday night when they go west to take on the Sterling City Eagles. The Longhorns maintained their perfect season record last Friday night when they licked the Jayton Jaybirds 26-0. Sterling City has a season record of 6-2 and in District 3-B they are listed with a 3-2 record. The Horns have a season scoring total of 316 points while their defense has held the opposition to 22. However, Nelson Coulter is pressing him closely with his six point addition last week for a total of 66. Jim Dan Raughton has 39 points; Bobby Bailey 28; Wayne Alexander 18; Marvin Ensor 6; Turney Coulter 6; and Randy Leigh 6.

Game time Friday night is 7:30 p.m. and Longhorn fans are urged to follow their team.

Funeral services for J. L. Carroll, 67, of Richland Springs were held Saturday afternoon in Richland Springs Baptist Church with burial there.

Mr. Carroll, former superintendent of Bronte Schools, died last Friday morning in a San Saba hospital.

He was born April 24, 1907, in the Bethel Community and was married to Vela Moreland Oct. 1, 1931, at Sterling City. He was a teacher and stock farmer. He was a deacon in the Baptist Church, a Mason, a patron in the Eastern Star and president of the Richland Springs school board.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Woody Carroll of San Angelo and Dr. Oscar Dorsey of San Marcos; a brother, E. C. Carroll of Richland Springs; four sisters, Mrs. Sterling Stratton of Richland Springs, Mrs. Mary Mallicoat and Mrs. Robert Harris, both of Fort Worth, and Mrs. Lorne Hare of San Diego, Calif.; nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Perhaps the most interesting race in Coke County was for sheriff. Democratic nominee, Doug Robertson's name was printed on the ballot, but he resigned from his office as present sheriff and announced that he was not running for reelection. Chief Deputy J. Lee Ensor announced that he was seeking the job just after his boss resigned. Ensor ran ads in last week's Coke County newspapers and passed out handbills, asking voters to write him in. The campaign worked for him as he received 587 votes. Robertson received 110, E. A. "Dink" Lanier of Robert Lee got 169, and Charles Timmons of Bronte received 22.

Another interesting aspect of the Tuesday election occurred in Precinct 4 where citizens decided a few weeks ago that they wanted a justice of the peace. Another write-in campaign took place and apparently Coke County will have a third JP beginning Jan. 1. Earl D. "Pete" Nutter took the win in this campaign with 85 votes. Bobby Scott received 28, and Charlie Boecking, who lives in Precinct 2, received 2 votes. County Judge W. W. Thetford told this newspaper Wednesday afternoon that apparently everything was in order in the Precinct 4 JP write-in campaign and that Coke County would have another JP as of Jan. 1, 1975.

Krueger Elected

Robert "Bob" Krueger of New Braunfels, Democratic nominee for U. S. congressman, took a win from Republican Doug Harlan of San Antonio and American Party candidate Ed Gallion of Crane, and looks like the successor of Con. O. C. Fisher who did not run for reelection. Coke County was one of Krueger's strongest supporters, as he received 736 votes. Harlan got

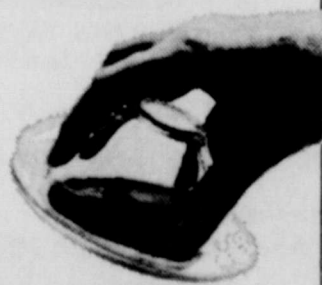

Oak Creek Lake Near Capacity

Oak Creek Lake was only eight inches below the spillway late Wednesday and water was still running into the lake. Some lake watchers were predicting that it might go over the spillway for the second time since it was built.

Ike Pate, owner of Sportsman's Lodge, sent The Enterprise a copy of his Fishing News this week. Here are some of the things Pate had to say:

Oak Creek Lake is rounding into a mighty fine looking fishing lake. About 70 per cent of the lake is clear, and unless more heavy rains fall most of the lake should be in good shape by the weekend. The water is rising about two inches per day, and at this rate should be going over the spillway in the next few days. This will be big news around here. It will be first time in 17 years this has happened.

With the water so high, it created habitat that bass just won't be able to resist. Most of the big bass have been caught in shallow water on top water baits. It seems as if the bass are moving in as the water comes up. As soon as the water reached the spillway, this should stop and maybe we will know where and how to fish.

Leon Reeves of Odessa was a little unhappy. He had just moved from a spot when another fisherman landed a fish that would go six pounds or better. Two San Angelo fishermen had the top string—18 fish—with six going almost five pounds each.

The fishing dock has been a good spot for channel cat fishermen. Several strings of 20 to 40 fish were caught during the week, and a good percentage were in the two to four pound class. Gary Miller of Pampa caught 21 Saturday with the largest going four pounds.

From here it looks like we are in for one of our best winter seasons. The warm water from the power plant may well be one of the hottest fishing spots around.

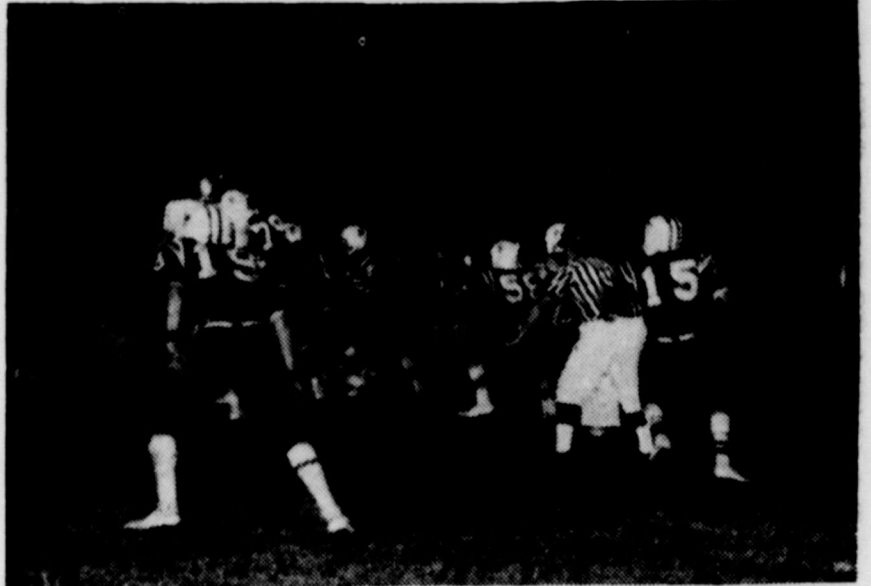
Bronte was penalized to their 1.

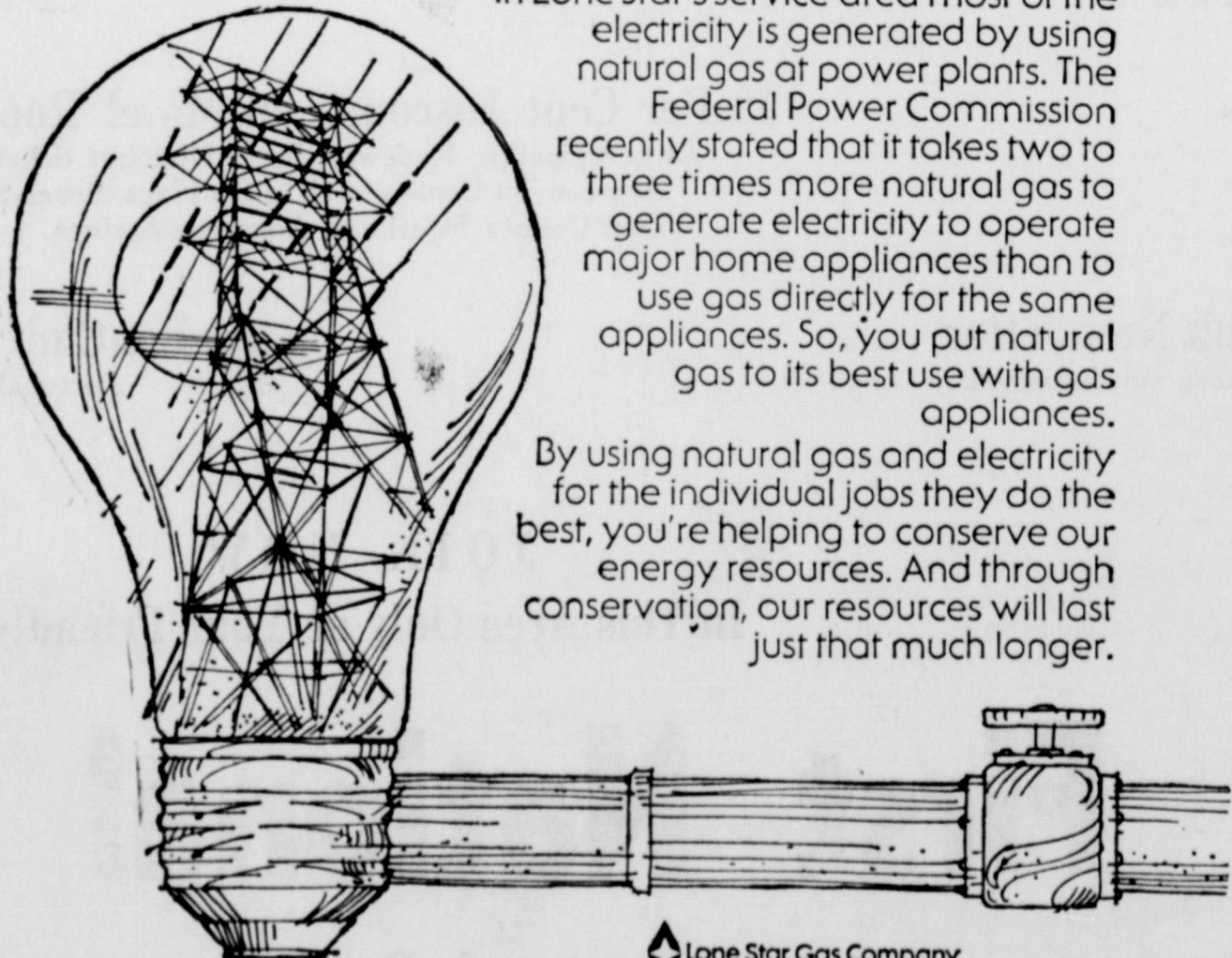

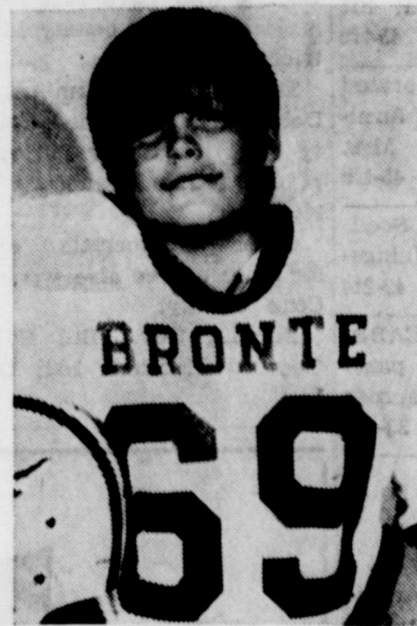

 Another race of great interest to Coke Countians was for state representative from the 63rd District of Texas. Democrat Mike Ezzell of Snyder was opposed by Republican John R. "Rich" Anderson of Gail. Again, Coke County was one of the strongest supporters of the district for the Democratic candidate. Ezzell won handily with 721 votes while Anderson received 169.

In an interview Tuesday night, Ezzell told the publisher of this newspaper that he was extremely grateful to the voters of Coke County who gave him his largest majority of any county in the district.

Democratic incumbent Governor Dolph Briscoe carried Coke County easily with his 776 votes. Republican Jim Granberry received 107 votes.
