At the time of his resignation Robertson also announced that he was not a condidate for reelection, even though he had been ciected the Dmocratic nominee for the job. He endorsed Ensor for the job and a writein campaign was begun for the General Election on Nov. 5. Ensor won the race casily with 587 write-in votes.
