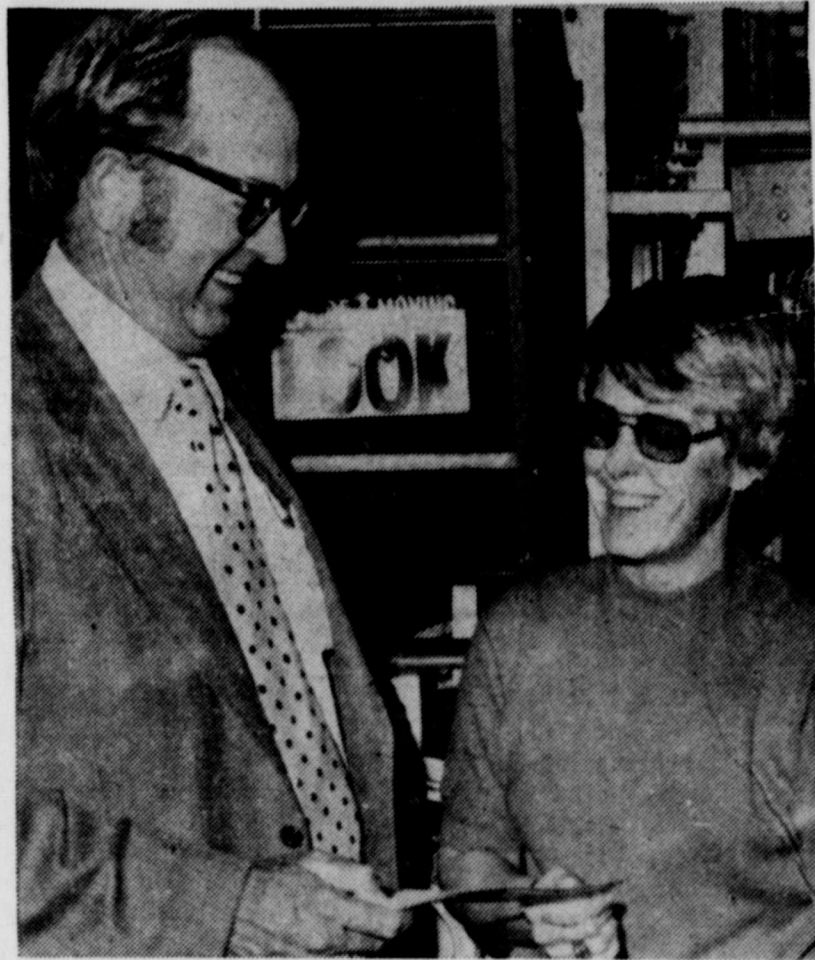

## BRONTE TRACKSTERS IN 3RD PLACE

Coach Gerald Sandusky's track team looked good last weekend when members accumulated 90 points to come in third at the Robert Lee Relays.

Jim Ned with 129 and Wall with 122 were the only teams to outdo the Longhorn team. Robert Lee was fourth with 46½.

Jim Dan Raughton was the big gun for the Bronte team, earning 35 points with his first place wins in the 120 yard high hurdles with a 15.9, and in the 330 yard intermedi-

ate hurdles with a 42.5. He also finished in the broad jump and high jump and ran on the second place mile relay team.

The mile relay team added points to Bronte's score when the four members came in second with a 3:38.4. The team is made up of Raughton, Marvin Ensor, Nelson Coulter and Alan Barbee.

In the mile run Randy Parker was third with a 5:31.2 and Randy Leigh came in sixth.

Bronte High School students really showed their mettle last Saturday when they participated in a preliminary University Interscholastic League (UIL) meet held in San Angelo.

Only two divisions were set up for the meet: Division I was made up of 3A and 4A schools while Division II was made up of AA, A and B schools. Consequently, the kids from Class B Bronte had their work cut

out for them.

Only a typist from Central High School of San Angelo outdid two of the Bronte girls. Her score of 134.50 was only slightly above Janie Raughton's 129.96 and Jodie Freeman's 128.39. Coach Mrs. Linda Thornton said she thought her girls did extremely well considering that Class AAA and AAAA schools are allowed to use electric typewriters, while Class B schools must use manual machines.

Other typists who competed Saturday were Kim Caperton and Marian Clark.

The Bronte science team, composed of Bobby Hamilton, Billy Hamilton, John Heaner and Bobby Taylor, won the Division II contest.

Bobby Hamilton won the veteran science division and Heaner was fourth. Billy Hamilton was winner of the novice science division.

Entrants from Bronte in Division II slide rule competition were Bobby Hamilton and Heaner. They were both classed as veteran winners.

Billy Hamilton took fourth place in the novice division of slide rule competition.

## Amendment Vote Scheduled April 22

A special election has been called for April 22 when citizens of Texas will vote on two amendments to the state's constitution.

Both amendments are concerned with pay raises for governmental officials of the state.

The first one on the ballot has to do with "revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of ten per cent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

No. 2 on the ballot calls for raising salaries of legislators to \$600 per month and setting a per diem pay of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate as provided by law for state employees.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Monday for Emmitt L. Caperton, 78, in the First Baptist Church of Bronte. Officiating was the Rev. Harry L. Morris of Ballinger, former pastor, and the Rev. M. E. Patterson, pastor of Central Baptist Church.

Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Mr. Caperton died about 10:30 a.m. Sunday at his home here, apparently

from a heart attack.

He was born Jan. 11, 1897, in the Maverick community and came to Coke County in 1915. He was married to Lillian Coleman Nov. 28, 1915, at Bronte.

Mr. Caperton spent a short time after his marriage farming, but in a few years went into the service station business in Bronte. He continued in this business until the late 1940's when he became Chevrolet dealer in Bronte, a business which he continued with his sons for about 20 years.

He had been retired from business the last few years. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Bronte.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, R. T. Caperton of Bronte, Matthew Caperton of Big Spring and Les Caperton of San Angelo; one daughter, Mrs. Savannah Ruth Belcher of Odessa; a brother, Bedford Caperton of Washington, D. C.; two sisters, Mrs. Lillian Carlton of Ballinger and Mrs. Genie Fort of Del Rio; 12 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

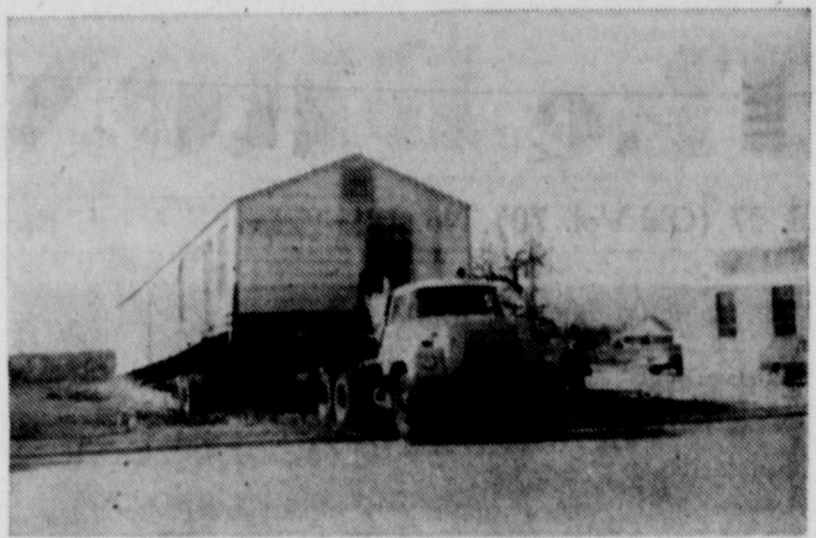

**ELECTION ORDER AND NOTICE**

**THE STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF COKE**

On this the 13th day of February, 1975, the Board of Trustees of Bronte Independent School District convened in regular session, open to the public, with the following members present, to-wit:

- Glenn Skelton, President
- James Oscar Koenig
- Grady Coulter
- James Lee
- Russell Carlton
- Delbert Coalson

and the following absent: Dale Thompson constituting a quorum and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

WHEREAS, the term of office of Delbert Coalson, Grady Coulter and Dale Thompson, members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1975, said first Saturday being April 5, 1975, and on said date a trustee election will be held in said School District.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election:

**THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BRONTE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:**

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 5, 1975, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District three members.

2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the following place, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

- (a) In election precincts numbered 2 and 5 at City Hall Building, in Bronte, Texas, in said School District, with Mrs. Otis Smith as Presiding Judge and Mrs. Dwain Pruitt and Mrs. Royce Lee, Clerks.
- (b) In election precincts numbered 4 at Green's Store Building, in said School District, with Mrs. Tom Green as Presiding Judge and Mrs. Robert Brown, Clerk.

The polls at the above designated polling place shall on election day be open from 8 o'clock a.m. to 7 o'clock p.m.

4. Mrs. Clark Glenn is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting and Mrs. Dana Robinson and Mrs. Eva Jo Lee are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Bronte Public Schools within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 P.M. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code

of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

7. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

9. It is further found and determined that in accordance with the order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient to the public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted continuously for at least 3 days preceding the date of this meeting.

It is further found and determined that this district is located in Coke and Rummels counties and that written notice of the date, place and subject matter of this meeting was furnished to the County Clerk of each county in which this district is located and that said notices were posted by the County Clerk of each of said counties on the bulletin board at the door of the county courthouse for said county, a place convenient to the public, at least 3 days preceding the date of this meeting. The returns of said posting shall be attached to the minutes of this meeting and shall be a part thereof for all intents and purposes.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted AYE: Glenn Skelton, James Oscar Koenig, Grady Coulter, James Lee, Russell Carlton, Delbert Coalson, and the following voted NO: None.
