Coke County Cars Have New Tags

License tags for vehicles which operate on public roads were sold by the office of Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs up through Monday and he reported a total of 2863 sold in Coke County.

Approximately half of the new tags, 1415, went for placement on the front and rear of passenger cars; 610 for trucks; 320 for farm trucks; 235 for trailers; 155 for farm trailers; 44 for motor homes (travel trailers); 59 for motorcycles; 25 for miscellaneous, which includes heavy machinery and big trucks.

Such positions as assistants to physicians is a relatively new field in the practice of medicine. It is becoming more and more important all the time, as the supply of physicians becomes more and more hard to come by in small communities, as well in big cities.

The amount of experience, education and training required for a nurse clinician lies somewhere in between that required for a doctor and a registered nurse.

Zertuche began his medical career in the United States Air Force and was a medical specialist from that branch of the service. He is a graduate of San Antonio College and State Hospitals in 1960 and of

Arrests Made in County Burglaries

A number of burglaries which have occurred in Robert Lee during the past are being cleared up, according to Sheriff J. Lee Ensor.

However, in spite of the jailing of four suspects and the release of another on bond and charges being filed against a sixth, more burglaries took place last Friday night or early Saturday morning.

Ensor said he expects to have several more suspects under arrest by the end of the next week.

The burglaries last weekend involved drug stores, the Coke County Pharmacy in Robert Lee and Hurley Pharmacy in Bronte. The same burglars apparently robbed both stores, as their method of operation was about the same. Both stores were entered through the back door after it was rammed open by some sort of attachment to the front of an automobile.

Hurley said the intruders took approximately 1500 pills and some injections from his store, valued at about \$150. They also took valuable insurance papers, an electronic calculator and a Bible.

Irv Zeitler, operator of Coke County Pharmacy, said the burglars were not quite so hard on him, as they took only about 600 pills valued at approximately \$50.

Sheriff Ensor and Deputy Marshall Millican are being assisted in the investigation by Texas Ranger Arthur Sikes of San Angelo.

Ensor said he felt arrests of five persons and arrests which are to follow would clear up a number of Robert Lee burglaries, including those at:

six candidates, plus a write-in candidate, for three places on the Bronte School board of trustees.

The other two elections, as of Thursday, appear to be less interesting, where two incumbents are running for two vacancies on both the Bronte city council and the board of directors of East Coke County Hospital District.

All four of the elections will be held at the Bronte city hall, but with an additional polling place set up for school trustee balloting at Tennyson.

First National Bank of Bronte is paying for the publication of a sample ballot in the school board election so voters will be able to study the candidates ahead of time.

The Bronte city council called the one per cent sales tax election recently after it became apparent the city would have to have more money if present services to citizens are to continue. Mayor R. T. Caperton said it was a simple matter of economics. "Inflation is our main problem," he said, "and if we are going to continue to render present services to the citizens of Bronte, we have to have more money to keep up with the increased costs." The mayor said that it all actually boils down to voting the one per cent sales tax which everybody will pay, or raising taxes on property which only property owners would pay.

Mrs. Willie B. Millikin will serve as election judge in the sales tax election.

The six candidates for school trustee include Grady Coulter, the only incumbent, Billy Jackson, Jim Morrow, Martin Lee, Luis Charles and A. D. McCarty. In addition Mrs. Edwin (Pat) Forehand announced this week that she is a write-in candidate for trustee. She is announcing her candidacy in an ad in this week's Enterprise, but it came too late to get her name on the ballot.

Sensible food shopping is important to every homemaker, and it doesn't happen automatically.

A plan of action helps get the shopping trip organized. This can include tentative menus for a week, based on the Basic Four Food Guide, and a shopping list based on these menus.

Write out the list and don't rely on memory — the list will help avoid impulse buying.

Watch the newspaper for advertised specials and bargains. And in the store, watch for unadvertised specials. These may cause a change in menus, so the plan of action should be fairly flexible.

Turning to specific advice, compare quality and prices at different stores. It's usually desirable to pick a convenient, reasonably priced store and stay with it.

Compare quality and prices of store brands as well as national brands. Sometimes store brands may be cheaper and a better buy. Reading the label will help consumers compare nutritional information to determine which is the best buy.

Purchase the right quantity to fit the family's needs. As a rule, larger quantities of staples may be cheaper. But if they spoil before being used, they're no bargain.

One important consideration in

making a plan of action is family preference. The plan should be flexible enough to meet the needs of the changing market also.

Sweetness—The Choice Is Yours

Recently consumers have been faced with the fluctuating cost of sugar and are looking for alternative sweeteners.

The common sweetening alternatives include brown sugar, corn syrup, honey, maple syrup, molasses or sorghum and artificial sweeteners. The sweeteners may be more or less expensive than sugar, and consumers will need to check local prices to determine which alternative is the best buy.

A new publication, MP-1176, "Sweetness—The Choice Is Yours," helps consumers determine costs comparisons of different sugar alternatives. In addition, a sweetening conversion chart, general sweetening stretchers and recipes using sugar alternatives are given.

Angelo State University where he received his nursing degree in 1968. Educational and training programs in which he participated qualified him not only as a registered nurse, but also as a psychiatric and therapist specialist.

He was the first president of Alpha Delta Nu, nursing fraternity at ASU, and was the first male nurse to graduate from the school.

Zertuche was employed at a San Angelo hospital from 1967 to November 1974 when he left the job as head nurse. He also has worked as psychiatric coordinator at Baptist Memorial Hospital in San Angelo.

Dr. Harris said the ordinary procedure used when he is not on duty and Zertuche is in charge is for the nurse clinician to examine the patient and report his findings and recommendations to the doctor.

Dr. Harris said, "If he feels and I agree with him, the treatment proceeds as he has recommended. But if he feels that I need to see the patient, then, of course, that is the procedure we are following. Then between the two of us we work out the treatment both of us feel is proper for the patient."

Dr. Harris added, "It certainly is a big help to me, to the nursing staff and the staff of the business office to have Mr. Zertuche with us, and I hope all of our patients will be able to accept the tremendous help he is giving to the Bronte Hospital."

Since the illness of Mrs. Harris, who is serving as administrator of the hospital, Mrs. Dian Coulter has assumed the position of business manager. Zertuche is serving as assistant administrator.

Other changes Dr. Harris has made in the Bronte Hospital during recent months includes the installation of carpet throughout the hallways and rooms. Also, a new fire prevention sprinkler system has been installed throughout the hospital, including each patient room. The hospital is in the process of installing new patient room furniture, which Dr. Harris hopes to have completed within the next year.

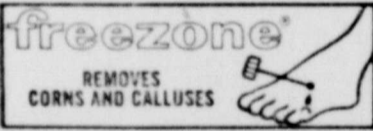

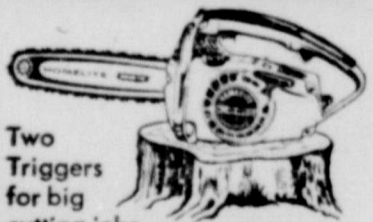

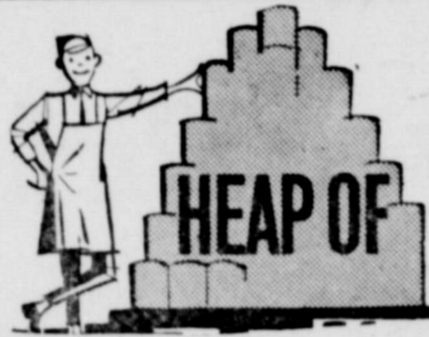
